 HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 23.—Christopher (But) Battalino, Italian black-belted Italian boy born to a fighting name, stepped into the crown room of the featherweights tonight and with all the ease, speed and insolence of youth swept the coronet of champion from the head of Andre Routis.

So wide was Battalino's margin of superiority that the boxing laws of Connecticut, gave every one of the 15 rounds to the challenger, while the 17th of the faithful, came to cheer their maine town hero, roared the fury of stadium with applause for the new champion.

There was no hesitancy, but the wild maneuvering about the ring, caused Battalino to slip to the floor twice as punches caught him off balance. Once Routis went down the same way but neither was in danger of a knockout at any time.

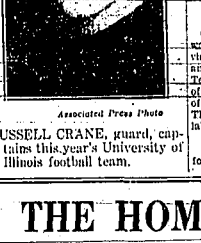

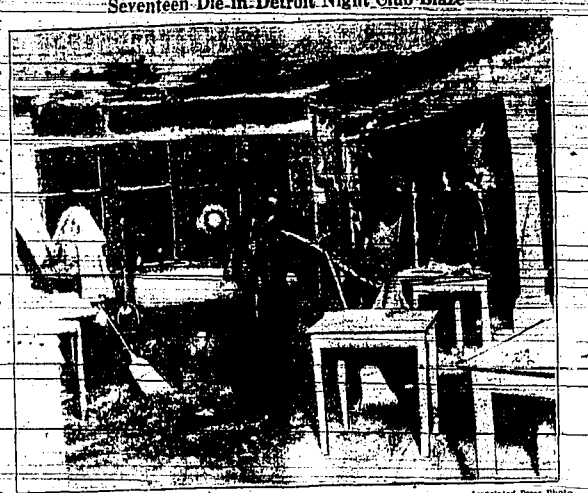

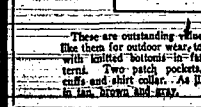

World's Longest Suspension Bridge to Span Golden Gate

STRUCTURE TO HANG ON MASSIVE CABLES FROM TWO TOWERS

Plans Call For Expenditure of Approximately \$50,000,000

Single Deck to Stretch Distance of 4100 Feet

Selection of Type Result of Demonstration by Experts

By W. A. WELLS, Associated Press Feature Writer

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 23.—It's a long span which holds the title of the "world's longest suspension bridge" these days, but San Francisco's Golden Gate structure will have the honor for at least a time.

Measuring 4100 feet between towers, the arch span will be more than 400 feet greater than that being built across the Hudson river in New York and will be as long as any other bridge ever built of this type.

Originally projected as a combination cantilever and suspension bridge, the design made 100-100-foot spans. This was reached after the New York engineers had demonstrated the feasibility of constructing cables sufficiently strong to carry the tremendous weight.

Must Vote Bonds

When the state legislature authorized the forming of a bridge district and the levying of a tax for this preliminary work \$200,000 was authorized but bonds must be voted to pay the cost of the actual construction. The central span alone will cost \$27,000,000 and the approaches about \$8,000,000 more.

The relatively small cost of the bridge, compared to that underway in New York and others such as the Philadelphia structure, is due in great part to the fact that the government owns the abutment property and it was not necessary to condemn a right of way for purchase. Also, there will be no tower deck, as in the case of the Hudson span, to accommodate rail traffic.

The Golden Gate bridge will hang on cables between two towers. The cables will be built of three steel strands twisted together in the thickness of three feet. The floor will be about 200 feet above the water level.

War Department Objects

Objection of the war department on military grounds, which was an obstacle to the construction of the San Francisco-Oakland bridge, does not hinder the proposed to span the Golden Gate, it is said. The depth of the water, ranging from 300 to 250 feet, and the strength of the current in the gate channel would prevent the bridge's being a barrier to navigation, even should it fall.

BEAN CROP SHORT IN EASTERN DISTRICTS

New York State Correspondent Tells of Price Paid to Product's Producers

Bean growers and others may find of interest the information contained in the following paragraphs of a letter written to a Twin Falls publisher from Wyoming county, New York state. Reference to the scarcity of the bean crop in that section bears out previous information as to conditions in the bean area of New York.

"Beans are bringing very good prices here and about a few days ago I heard that they were selling for 12 cents which is the highest that has been offered locally although it was reported that 13 cents was offered in Chicago and some other places. The market has dropped a cent now but I very much doubt if it gets below 10 cents and attention is being given to the scarcity of the bean crop in that section bears out previous information as to conditions in the bean area of New York.

"Beans are very scarce and are bringing anywhere from four to seven cents depending on variety and condition. Wealthy and McIntosh U. S. No. 1 are bringing from \$1.20 to \$2.00 a bushel and orchard run offerings with few sales run anywhere from 1 1/2 cents to 4 1/2 cents a hundred for one exceptionally good lot. This price does not include container or hauling. The Wyoming Canning company is buying orchards for canning purposes. Their trick is to pack out the best fruit and can the remainder. Potatoes will yield slightly below the average and quite a lot under last year's crop. They are bringing \$1.75 a bushel and are in high demand as they feel the price will be better later.

Club Stocks Small Streams of Cassia County With Trout

BURLEY, Sept. 23 Special to The News.—Smaller streams of Cassia county have been nearly well stocked with trout, according to members of the Cassia Rod and Gun club. There have already been 120 cans distributed in the foothill streams, all fingerling cutthroat trout, two inches or more in length. It has been the former practice, says George Booth, one of the officials of

the club, to turn loose very small fish, about 1000 to the run. Of late, however, the youngsters have been allowed to grow larger, until now each can contains about 400. With larger fish turned into the streams, the mortality has been proved to be very low, whereas with the smaller trout only about 10 per cent lived to become large enough to catch.

Snake river, above the Miller dam is supplied with trout from the rearing ponds at Spring creek. This small stream is tributary to the Snake and, when the fingerlings are large enough the barriers are removed and they are chased out into the backwater from the dam. No food is necessary for the Spring creek fry, as the stream is clogged with watercress which swarms with small shrimp. The little trout grow rapidly with three shillings as natural food.

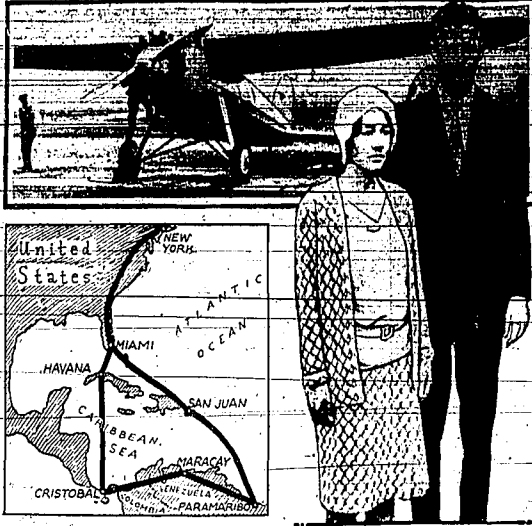

FAY DIRT
A young man who had been training for farming, came out of the World war with little left but a determination. He secured a job as a farm hand and later bought a farm in the wonderful productive Flair section. In a few years, he owned it. He has added a few forties. Today he is said to be worth \$75,000. He made a success of farming because he understood the business, applied himself intelligently, and was operating in Idaho's rich soil dirt. There are many others in agricultural Idaho who have become well off on the farm. They and the owners of all other properly conducted farms will make more money this year than ever before, for from all points, north and south, comes a chorus of reports showing unusually heavy yields, with a bright price outlook. Intelligent farming pays in Idaho. Fields of greenness that are unobtainable to easterners accustomed to shallow soil tend to break down the handicaps of distance from the large markets and even of occasional price slumps. Our successful farmers have gone in for diversified and specialized crops. One instance, among many, An enormous bean crop in the Twin Falls sector—some estimate it from 40 to 60 bushels to the acre—should yield an average of around \$150 an acre, and the cost of raising beans is not heavy. Hundreds of carloads of green peas are being shipped from Idaho to the further profit of agriculture. There is a satisfactory potato crop this year, but not all of it will be shipped. The crop will mostly stay home for various utilizations. Did you ever hear of the potato meal factory to be constructed at Burley? It will consume a lot of unmarketable spuds.
