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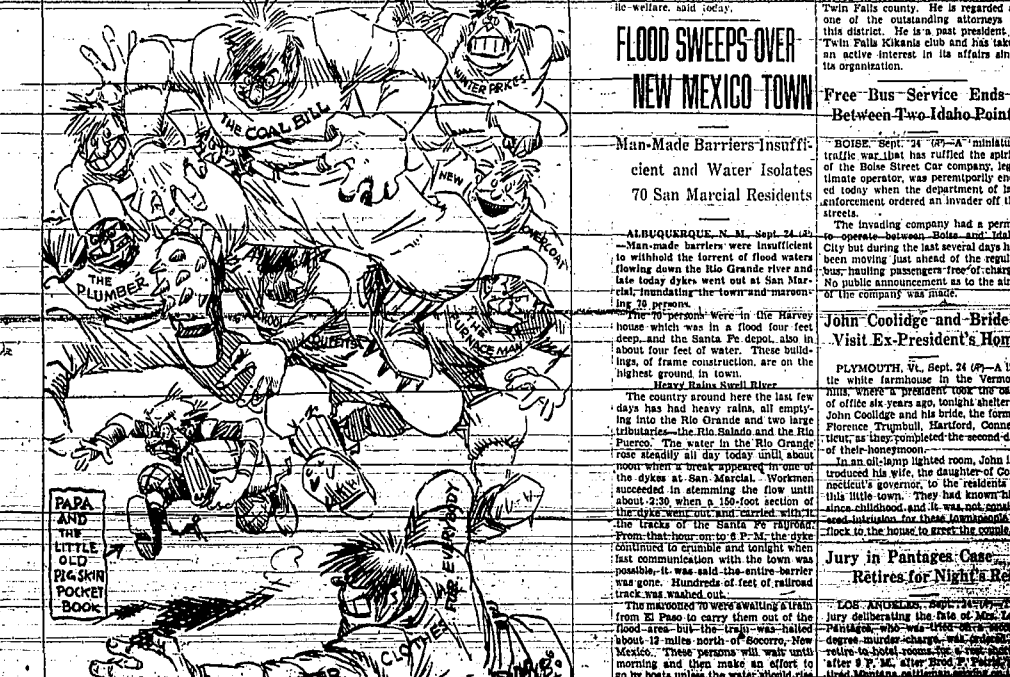
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JEROME ASSEMBLES MAKINGS FOR FAIR

Atmosphere of Plenty Per-
vades Grounds—Already
Teeming With Industry

Jerome county is assembling on the fair grounds at the west border of Jerome an exhibition of superior products of farm, home and school room, that, with a wide variety of services and machinery for entertainment, will make up Jerome county's annual fair opening tomorrow morning and continuing for three days.

Work of assembling the fair which will be completed this evening, was well under way yesterday.

Premise of fair weather and the atmosphere of prosperity that comes with the harvest in the Jerome country this season, are factors already in operation, making for what seems likely to be Jerome county's biggest and best fair yet.

Among right community organizations which will enter competitive exhibits of grains, grasses, fruits and vegetables, Eldorado Heights club had completed preparations in the new barn which will be located on the west side of Products hall, and members of Canyon Side grange late in the afternoon yesterday were completing their decorative scheme of blue and gold at their booth in the south quarter of the building.

New Building Blazed
Carpenters were busily engaged in completion of the new Merchants' and Women's building, a great frame structure 52x60 feet, that has been constructed on ground between Products hall and the race track.

Child-Novelist Held
A dozen or so horse men including cattle and race track men and well known race horse men of this territory already were in their stalls, some being accommodated in the new barn that has been built this year, in a shelter twice the number of race horses heretofore accommodated at Jerome county's fair—5000 feet of stalls in the new barn have been in process of preparation for some weeks, was pronounced excellent as well for the performances of the racing horses as for the making of a novelty exhibition to be provided in anticipation of a "fleet of little automobiles" striped and aimed to their bare chassis liver colors.

Boise Release Fund
The Boise Chamber of Commerce has inaugurated a fund for reward and hiring detectives and J. T. Lockwood, secretary, said he was encouraged in his efforts here since he was sure that the reward would be quickly raised.

Possibility that the slayer, scurrying miles away to freedom, was carrying in his pocket a little book of tips as a guarantee "keepsake" was seen by Captain Ernest A. Blodgett, chief of the Boise detective force, who today launched a sweeping investigation.

Captain Blodgett said that the book was missing and through it and several Elmore county officers had combed the north shore of the Snake river, thoroughly there were unable to find it or any other clue to the crime.

Boise officers admitted that they had been unable to get out any new solution of the murder. They have tracked the movements of yaguna arrested in a radius of 50 miles, without result and have questioned several local men.

The only other man investigated since the murder was discovery of a blood stain on a willow some distance from the scene of the murder on the north bank of the Snake river but it was not known whether this would lead to anything other than to indicate the general direction taken by the slayer after committing the crime.

Huskies Doped as Championship Contenders Despite Handicaps of Record and Internal Difficulties

GOHRIE (Associated Press Sports Writer) SEATTLE, Sept. 24.—All-American halfback and coached by a man whom the student board of control attempted to "pay off" last winter, the University of Washington football team which won only two conference games last year is doped to be a championship contender in the Pacific conference season.

With 20 letters back for duty and some extra line equipment material on hand, Coach Hanson looks with favor on the Husky prospects. He says that Coach Clark Carroll, All-American ace through graduation last year, "has the better" of the Washington eleven will have a better all-around combination this year.

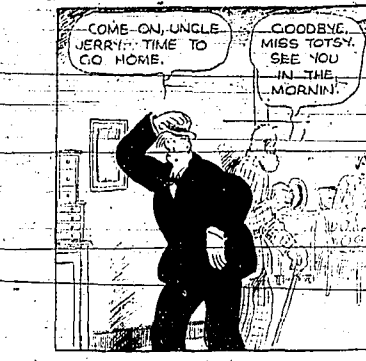

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MOON'S ATTORNEYS TRY TO SHOW SLAIN HERDER WAS ARMED

Heads in Second Day of Murky Trial—Tend to Disclose Basis for Plea Justifying Tragic Act

Daniel P. Moon, 76, on trial on a charge of first degree murder of Jack J. Murr, herder, here yesterday, will plead self-defense and will endeavor to show that Murr was armed and provoked the encounter in forest of moon's ranch near Twin Falls.

Mrs. Belle Lynch, 35 years old, wife of Jesse Lynch, a civil war veteran and an eye witness of the shooting, who occupies the stand most of the day, was questioned closely in this regard by defense counsel. She testified that she saw Murr shoot Moon in the back of the head in the court here yesterday.

Mrs. Lynch was one of only two known eye witnesses to the fatal shooting. The other was Merrill Ayres, oil company employe, who testified Monday that he had witnessed the shooting from the top of a wall surrounding the oil company's plant directly across the street from Moon's residence on Third avenue.

Witnesses followed one another in rapid succession after Mrs. Lynch testified the night about 4 P. M.

W. B. Vandervoort, who testified that he had known Moon about 20 years and lived close to him for a year and a half, told the jury that he had seen Murr following the shooting of Murr.

He said Mrs. Lynch was holding Murr's head in her arms while he and George Lamb arrived immediately after the shooting, and there were no other persons in sight. He denied that Mrs. Lynch was carrying Murr when she went with him to her house where both Murr and Moon were killed and then came back to the scene where a crowd had gathered.

Denies Statement Immediately before the shooting Vandervoort testified he had gone to Moon's house to see Murr. He said he had told anyone that "Van was not in the fight as long as Belle Lynch fed him."

He said Moon denied having made that statement, and that he had told Mrs. Lynch he had followed him to Moon's house, called out, "That's always the way with you, Moon; to say something and then deny it."

In reply Vandervoort testified Moon shouted an oath and threat to kill Murr.
