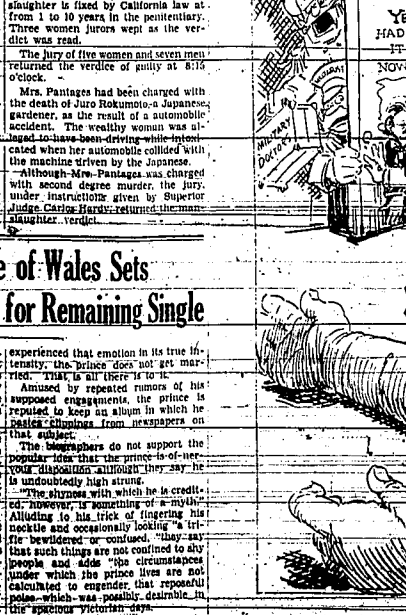

Twin Falls, Filer And Burley Men to Vie for Positions

Coach Calland and Aides Reluctant to Predict Outcome of Game Against Eleven of Montana State

(Special to The News) MOSCOW, Sept. 25.—The University of Idaho's 1929 Vandal football warriors are swinging through the last lap of their pre-season training schedule, which ends when the squad enters a short rest period prior to the first game of the season, against Montana State college, here Saturday—September 28.

As for wheat, he said the Farmers National Grain Marketing corporation was now being organized and if established it is to be undertaken that agency would be able to do it with more safety and dispatch than the board itself. (By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—The battle of the inebriated hurrapers took on a new life today under the encouraging rays of a warm sun.

The steady flow of customers past the Madison Square Garden box office brought forth smiling predictions that Jack Sharkey—the talkative fat, Tommy Loughran the equated light heavyweight champion, will wage their 15-round leather warfare before 50,000 persons and a gate of \$200,000 in Yankee stadium tomorrow night. In just two days—mid-weather—the doubtless interest in the final heavyweight slug of the outdoor boxing season.

Confident that Loughran will not "beyond the sixth round, Sharkey finished his training today with a light heavyweight champion, will wage their 15-round leather warfare before 50,000 persons and a gate of \$200,000 in Yankee stadium tomorrow night. In just two days—mid-weather—the doubtless interest in the final heavyweight slug of the outdoor boxing season.

Loughran, merely loosened his muscles for the battle that must mark the turning point in a brilliant career. The light heavyweight king who never wanted a challenge can step into the front rank of pretenders to the vacant heavyweight throne by decisive victory over Sharkey. Loughran hopes to balance the bar, 185 pounds, the greatest weight of his career. They are equally matched in height, reach and muscle with Loughran the better boxer and Sharkey a bit heavier puncher.

Case Grows Out of Corrupted Deal Between Secretary and Doheny

Murderer Removes Government's Chief Witness in Naval Oil Lease Scandal

By JAMES L. WEST (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Insistence of Calvin Coolidge as president generally is credited with being the reason for the decision of government prosecutors to undertake to bring Albert B. Fall to trial.

After many postponements, October 7 was the final date set for the former secretary of the interior to face a jury in Washington.

The bribery charges were made out of the estimated \$100,000 transaction between Fall and E. L. Doheny in 1920. At that time, according to the two estimates in the wealthy oil man's possession, the lease for the Elk Hills naval oil reserves in California, a lease subsequently carried by the United States supreme court.

That transaction was the basis for the conspiracy charge brought jointly against Fall and Doheny which was dismissed by a jury in the District of Columbia supreme court three months ago after a sensational trial.

Doheny insisted that the transaction was so far in the past that it was a fellow prosecutor, and it was on that ground that the verdict of not guilty was rendered.

In view of that action, government counsel believed it would be virtually impossible to seek a conviction of either Fall or Doheny on the indictments charging bribery, growing out of the name transaction, but information of the present case insisted that all indictments be pressed.

At any rate, after Pomeroy, one of the special counsel, presided at a conference with the president some months ago, that the bribery charges against both Fall and Doheny would be pressed. Decision was made to try Fall first and to let the verdict in that case determine the question of bringing Doheny to trial.

Since then, the chief witness for the government—E. L. Doheny, Jr.—has been killed by a companion whom he had defended. It was the younger Doheny who brought to Washington in a satchel the \$100,000 in cash which Fall used to extend and improve his ranch holdings in New Mexico.

Substitution of Doheny's name in the affidavit was noted because of the popularity made by Fall from that time, and the former interior secretary tried for weeks to conceal the source of the loan from the state oil investigating committee. He first sought to have one friend in Pittsburgh say he had advanced the money but that friend refused.

Publisher Alvin Karpis, who had received the mandate to investigate, was finally induced another friend, Edward J. McWhorter, publisher of the Washington Post, to say that he had made the loan.

Subsequently Doheny came forward with the information that he had supplied the money and that assisted a series of investigations, resulting in a naval lease by Fall that started the country and led to a long succession of civil and criminal court cases. The government recovered the naval oil reserves and the supreme court branded the transactions as surrounded by fraud. But Washington jurors refused to convict any of the three principals—Fall, Doheny and Harry F. Sinclair.

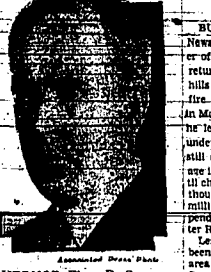

Minidoka Ranger Returns From Scene Of Fierce Fires in Bitter-Root Forest

BURLEY, Sept. 26 (Special to The News)—F. M. Youngblood, forest ranger of the Minidoka national forest, has returned to resume his duties in the hills here after spending over a month fire-fighting in the Bitter-Root forest in Montana. Youngblood says that when the left Minidoka river was considered under control, although 400 men were still at work. The extent of the damage in the district will not be known until checking is completed in January, although it has been estimated that 10 million and a half dollars has been expended in combating fires in the Bitter-Root forest alone.

Less than 10 square miles of fire have been put out in the Minidoka forest area this season, according to Forest Supervisor S. B. Stewart, and rangers have been sent out to help in the district that has sent out calls for help. Some development work has been done in the Minidoka forest hills, including road work, fencing and developing water supplies. Nine new sources of stock watering have been made available. This water has come from the development of logs and springs, the headwaters having been fenced, springs cleaned out and water piped to troughs.

There are four rangers in charge of the 637,000 acres included in the Minidoka national forest. From now until winter snowfall closes activities in the reserve, the rangers will attend to the sale of timber. Farmers and residents of adjoining settlements are now getting in their winter wood and posts and poles for fences and for rafters to cabins and cellars. When deep snow falls, the rangers leave their summer posts at the stations high in the hills and go to winter quarters in neighboring towns, awaiting the time to return in the early spring.

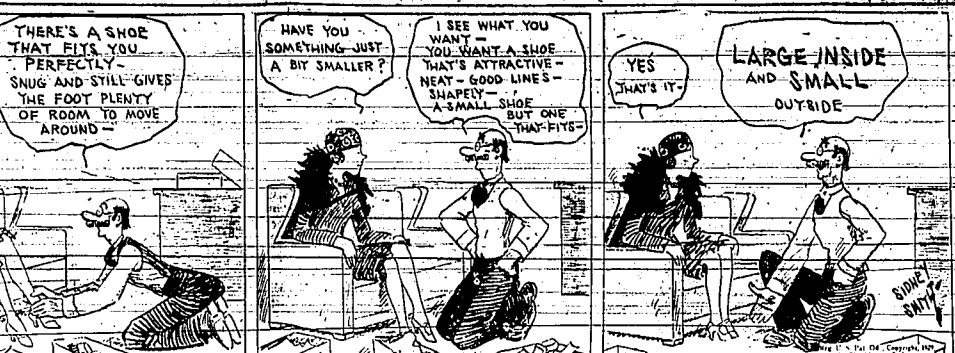

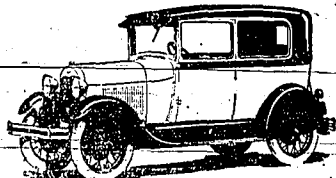
