### Babson Says Individual Retailer Continue-Dominant Factor in Great Distribution System of 48 States

**More New Independent Stores Starting into Business Than Chain Firms Declares Noted Statistician of Day- State**

By ROGER W. BABSON

By BABSON PARE, Mass. Sept. 26-It is a surprising fact that more new independent stores are starting business today than chain stores. Figures reported by the Commerce Service company during the month of August, for instance, show that 4252 new independent retailers against 52 new chains and 927 new branch stores of existing chains. This certainly does not look as though the independent retailer is losing ground. The retail trade in the United States' total retail is about \$41,000,000,000 annually, sixty-one per cent of the total business, or \$24,960,000,000. Of this total, independent stores are doing 46 per cent and the chains are doing 54 per cent. The independent stores are increasing 2 per cent, the chains are increasing 2 per cent, and the company stores are increasing 2 per cent.

In spite of its rapid growth, the chain store is still a comparatively small factor in the total retail distribution.

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# Jack Sharkey Knocks Loughran Out of Heavyweight Picture

**Bombastic Sailor Scores Technical Knockout in Third**

**45,000 of Faithful Pay \$300,000 to See Boston Puglist Batter Philadelphia to Quick Defeat**

By EDWARD J. NEIL (Associated Press Sports Writer)  
**YANKEE STADIUM, New York, Sept. 26.**—To a comeback that was swift and stunning Jack Sharkey, bombastic sailor from Boston, swept back to the top of the heavyweight brigade tonight with a sensational three-round victory over Tommy Loughran.

A crowd of 45,000, drawn to the spacious American league ball park by the lure of the final heavyweight spectacle of the outdoor season, sat astonished and silent as the temperamental tar, at times the most menacing of the present-day heavyweights, suddenly turned tiger again and crushed Loughran from the picture in just 27 seconds of the third round.

That crowd that paid approximately \$300,000 for the evening's entertainment saw one of the most amazing endings of modern title battles as Loughran, rendered helpless by a vicious left hook to the body and right that crashed full on his chin, took a count of five, rose to his feet, and stood dazed in a neutral corner as Referee Lou Magnolia stopped the fight.

**Sharkey at Peak**  
 Seldom in all his varied career of success and disappointment, has Sharkey appeared to better advantage. From the opening gong, Loughran, a slight favorite, was well nigh helpless before the vicious gobb's power and confidence.

Even in the short span of their appearance Sailor John outboxed the former master of light, heavyweight, and middleweight titles, and he and his opponent, who had fought and fought with ease and insistence in the clinches. With startling suddenness, the fast careful rolling of the first two rounds turned into a slaughter in the third. The echoes of the gong still were echoing in the arena but when Sharkey, as though finally loosed from a leash, drove across the ring, rammed his left hand into Loughran's face and before Tom could raise his guard, he had a winning right to the chin. The blow caught the surprised Philadelphiaan a clinching crack on the chin and he fell backward to the floor, his head resting across the lower rope in his own corner, his face throbbing in his right.

**45,000 Faithful Cheer**  
 Tommy didn't seem to be greatly hurt for he looked about him, climbed to his feet at the count of five as 45,000 of the faithful rose with him in a mighty roar. Almost sedately, the white skinned youngster, his face composed and eyes open, raised his right hand to a neutral corner, one hand raised to his cheek.

There, while the audience looked on amazed, the referee jumped about excitedly and Sharkey hopped gleefully across the ring. Loughran turned his back to his foe and raised his right hand to the audience, oblivious to his surroundings. Sharkey, like a mad animal released, almost climbed Tommy's back

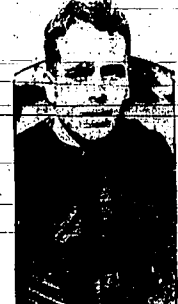

## HUMIDITY AFFECTS MOTOR CAR'S POWER MATERIALLY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—The belief of many motorists that an automobile gives smoother performance in wet weather is given some basis by the United States Bureau of Standards. Although the impression doubtless is largely a psychological factor, and absence of sootiness caused by the lubrication of springs by water, the bureau reported, recent tests indicate that it may result partly from mechanical factors.

The tests showed that increased atmospheric humidity or "wetness" reduces the maximum power output of both of which would be to give another flow of power.

One result of these tests—the bureau concluded, "will be to add to the troubles of automotive engineers, since it is obvious that in accurate comparisons of engine power, humidity also must be measured and allowance made for its effect on power."

MURDER CASE JURY WITHOUT AGREEING RETIRES FOR NIGHT

Seven Hours Deliberations Fail to Bring Accord on Fate of D. P. Moon, Pioneer Resident of Twin Falls

Jurors in district court here into whose hands has been placed the fate of Daniel P. Moon, pioneer Twin Falls resident, charged with first degree murder, went to bed in the jury room at the court house at 12:30 this morning without reaching an agreement on their verdict after seven hours' deliberations that began when they received the case at 5:30 P. M. yesterday.

With the lapse of time that is aptly no word from the jury. Briefly stated, the verdict of homicide in a lesser degree than that charged would be returned, or that the jury would fall together to reach an agreement on their verdict.

Members of Moon's family remained in the court room for a time after the jury retired, expressing confidence in an early acquittal.

Must Fix Penalty Under the law and the court's instructions, the jury, it is thought, must fix the penalty which may be either death or life imprisonment. It may return a verdict of guilty of second degree murder or of involuntary manslaughter in any of which cases the court would fix the penalty.

In order to answer affirmatively Moon's contention of justifiable homicide, the jury, under the court's instructions, must find, first, that Moon was believed to be in danger of losing his life or suffering great injury and, second, that the shooting was in good faith, and that Moon believed such action to be necessary to save his own life.

Trial Over Four Days The jury received the case last evening at the close of the trial, which during the day the story of the shooting last July 11, of Jack Lemon, shepherd and loader for two years, at the residence of Mrs. Betty Lynch, two doors away from Moon's residence on Third avenue south, had been told from varying angles by witnesses, with the prosecution and the defense.

Cross-examination of Moon, who testified in his own behalf, with attorney's arguments and the delivery of the court's instructions occupied the final day of the trial. Under cross-examination by E. V. Larson, prosecuting attorney, Moon did not depart in any material respect from his story of the shooting as he had presented it under questioning by his own attorneys.

He declared he fired in self-defense when Lemon rushed at him with a rock in one hand and reaching toward a left hip pocket with the other.

Evidence on both sides showed that ill feeling had existed between Moon and Lemon for more than two years. Members of the jury took with them to their deliberations the single-barreled shotgun shot gun from which the fatal shot was fired, and a bullet torn flat that Lemon had worn, and a group of photographs of the body of the dead man as it lay on the sidewalk in front of Moon's residence after the shooting.

Prosecuter and Lester Parker, who had served during the trial as alternate jurors, were excused just before the 12 members of the regular panel returned to the courtroom. Members of the panel charged with responsibility for Moon's fate were J. D. Dyer, Andy Johnson, George Newby, W. C. Beck, A. P. Senior, Ed Clayborn, E. A. Deem, F. D. Grootes, J. P. Avant, W. C. Hall, H. G. Munson and George Murray.

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RAINS AID PLOWING IN SOUTHERN IDAHO

BOISE, Sept. 26 (Special to The News)—Rains which fell in southern Idaho between Sept. 15 and 20, this morning interfered with threshing of beans, alfalfa and clover seed, but freened ranges and softened the soil for fall plowing, according to the weather and crop summary for the week ending September 24, received by the United States department of agriculture, weather bureau.

The following reports of conditions are included in the summary: SOUTHWEST IDAHO—The forecast of the week was very smoky, but fresh northwest winds and showers cleared the air Friday. Hail fell over most of the district some time between Friday and Monday morning. This interrupted the week's hay-making and threshing of beans and alfalfa and clover seed, but it did much to freshen pastures and ranges and helped farmers who have been waiting for rains to soften the soil preparatory to fall plowing. Good progress was made in the picking, packing and shipping of fruit and peaches. Good crops of excellent quality being secured in fine conditions. SOUTHEAST IDAHO—Temperatures were moderate during the week.

HIGHFIELD—Weather cool; good rains fell Friday; first frost Saturday night; threshing about completed; potatoes in good shape, but digging not yet begun; pastures very dry.

GOODING—Rain on Friday followed by much cooler weather; more moisture is needed to permit of general fall plowing.

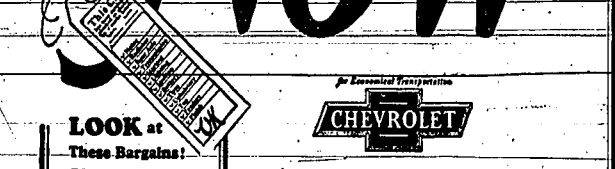

## BURLEY DAIRY PLANT BUSINESS INCREASES

Volume of Butterfat Received Shows Gain for Cooperative Creamery Company

BURLEY, Sept. 26.—(Special to The News)—Business of the Milk-Cream Cooperative dairymen's plant at Burley, for the year 1929, is showing a decided increase. According to C. W. Hoax, fieldman, during the month of August, 1929, the Burley plant purchased 1,054,245 pounds of milk containing 27,881 pounds of butterfat, and they also purchased 26,192,241 pounds of butterfat in the cream or a total of 26,074,117 pounds of butterfat. During the month of August a year ago the plant purchased 20,692,198 pounds of butterfat in milk and 23,637 pounds of butterfat in cream, or a total of 20,928,835 pounds of butterfat. This shows an increase for August of this year over August of last year of 10,740 pounds.

For butterfat in the milk 48 cents a pound was paid and 44 cents a pound for butterfat in the cream during August this year, or \$41,228.18 from the dairy plant. Many improvements have been made in the plant during the last two weeks. A casing drier was installed about two weeks ago and has been running day and night with two 12-hour shifts, drying 870 pounds of casing per day. Until the purchase of this drier the casing was shipped to Bull.

At the present time the United States is importing almost one-half of the casing used, and more users are being found for it all the time. Casing is used in the manufacture of glue, paint, fruit spray, color dye, wash of paper, shoe polish, shaving cream, tooth paste, rouge, Nuts, artificial fur, hosiery, and picture films. An elevator which will handle a ton of product has been installed. New automatic milk weighing scales have been purchased and a new 20-horse power boiler was placed in operation Tuesday.
