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RAMSAY-MACDONALD OFF TO AMERICA ON GOOD-WILL MISSION

"I Am Going in Hope of Being Able to Do Something to Narrow Atlantic," Says British Prime Minister

LONDON, Sept. 27.—Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald tonight started on his historic mission to the United States with a parting warm handshake from United States Ambassador Charles G. Dawes.

General Dawes, meticulously clad in evening dress with a shiny silk hat, bowed his way through the huge workaday crowd which cheered "good old man," "Mac" and "Mac" were on the way to the boat, surrounded by friends and family.

Outside the railings of the station full sight of the MacDonald train a group of workers clamored to the top of taxicabs and began singing "The Red Flag" as the departure time neared.

Football Year Opens in District With 14 Teams in Action

Large Crowds See Athletes of South Central Idaho Play

Albion Normal Eleven Wins Over Bruins By 7 to 6 In Closest Contest of Series Launching Season

Large crowds, clear weather and swift moving athletes combined to make the opening of the 1929 football season an impressive one. The 14 teams of the South Central Idaho district yesterday plunged into battle.

Scenes in the series of contests, one-sided in most instances, were as follows: **Filer**, 13 to 0; **Kimberly**, 14 to 0; **Hazelton**, 60 to 0; **Over Oakley**, 44 to 0; **Albion Normal**, 7 to 6.

In setting his grid machine out against a college eleven, Coach R. V. Jones found his Bruins to be a sturdy lot, capable of determined and steady play, even manifest an aggressive and heavy team.

While first-name weakness appeared in both team play and in individual performances, the Bruins swept forward with an aggressiveness that seemed to promise one of the more successful seasons in the history of the first quarter of play for Twin Falls. A few-seconds struggle was staged and scoring threats were all effectively stopped.

Blackie Albion Paid

Near the close of the period Weaver kicked an Albion punt and the play ended with Twin Falls in possession of the ball, with 18 yards to go. The Bruins, however, were unable to penetrate the solid line in the second quarter and failed to make yardage. Albion kicked out of danger—Lester Weaver hit a kicked ball and Tomlin recovered. Then Smith, second team player last year who yesterday demonstrated beyond doubt his ability as a tackle, was called on to carry the oval. He raced to the right-side and broke away for first touchdown of the game.

The half ended with Twin Falls in possession of the ball on Albion's 40-yard line. The Bruins attempt at passing came in the second half when Albion failed. Coach Sperry's teacher half, advanced the ball 20 yards for Smith to receive around left. Albion, disastrously close to the goal line, fumbled and Weaver recovered. Smith punted, and then Albion kicked back to within 20 yards of the goal. Cruise took the ball and scored with a dash around right end. A perfect kick was the point by which Albion triumphed.

Bruins Thrust in Third

Twin Falls threatened again in the third quarter when Smith, after carrying the ball to the 30-yard line, advanced five more yards. The Albion Bruins, turning back Bruin threats to win the game, failed in the first period. Twin Falls completed a pass for 15 yards. Frazelle to Weaver.

Frazelle threw a punt to Albion, suffered an injury and was replaced by Thomas, Richards, a short line before substituted for Larson at left guard.

One Time Bulkiest Conference Eleven In "Midget" Class

Average Weight of 30-Leading Candidates for Team 177 Pounds With Burley and Filer Players on Top

(Special to The News).

MOSCOW, Sept. 27 (Special to The News)—Last Monday indications are that Coach Leo Galland will announce his few-hundred players in the starting lineup against Montana State college here tomorrow. Beef is scarce around the "midget" camp this fall, the first time in many seasons, but Galland has a starting lineup which is about average in weight, though not in height.

From about the heaviest team in the conference a few years ago, Idaho has become the "midget" camp. The average of 30 leading Varsity candidates this fall is 177 pounds. The average of 20 leading "Big Bill" candidates is 181 pounds 15.

It Galland's starting lineup contains eleven "iron men," then Idaho may not be so out of luck as it appears. In the past the season, but the minute the Varsity roster finds it necessary to send in reserves Idaho's average drops radically.

Two HEAVY MEN

Idaho has only one player this year who weighs over 200 pounds. "Big Bill" (Richard) Whitehead, who has averaged 200 pounds from eye end of the line to the other. The only other heavy-weight in line is Captain Gordon Diehl, Filer, tackle, who scales 195 pounds. Lester Squarrier, center, scales 190 pounds as does William Deister, who is likely to see first call at tackle position on the Coast.

Diehl and Deister look like the starting center for the Montana State game with Arthur Spang, scrapping sophomore, at right tackle. The starting guards doubtless will be Elmer Martin, letterman and John Cowley, who is developing into a fine running back. The aggressive Martin-Burley guards in prospect are Dick Thomas, non-letterman from last year, and Dick Thomas, letterman from last year.

Whitehead and William Becker will hold down tackle positions with Dan Govey, letterman from last year, and Clarence Adams, a Russell junior, non-letterman last year, as first receiver. Two lettermen, Bill Price and Clarence Adams, will appear as end with Jack Jensen, reserve end last year, and Harold Carlson, 1928 center who is developing into a fine position full-back ready to relieve them.

Quarter Carrier Ball

A whole flock of quarterbacks is likely to vie for position against the Hobcats. In the kind of football Galland is installing at Idaho the quarterback is the "engine" of the team. He calls plays and carries the ball about 75 per cent of the time. Call.

It is likely that either Walter Lee Pedersen, sophomore, who has been somewhat of a flash in practice, or Clinton Duff, two-year letterman, will start with Herbert Owen, letterman last year. Kenneth Barrett, non-letterman, has been playing a practice-line back last fall, likely to get a chance to carry the ball before the game is over.

Varsity followers will get their first glimpse of Big Bill Kerzhnikin in his new post of outside halfback, where he has been playing a practice-line in practice. His outside and inside halfback will be backfield Captain Grville Bull, Burley, in Kerzhnikin and Bull, Galland has two of his best blocking halfbacks on the coast. Arthur Borby, non-letterman from last year and Otto Bull, a transfer from California Junior college, doubtless will get first call if Galland decides to replace either Kerzhnikin or Bull.

Gymnics will continue to be between Fild Wilkie, sophomore, James Hall, Dick, letterman from last year, and John Beck, letterman from last year.

Because of his demonstrated ability at driving Wilkie is likely to give first call. However, Hall has a knowledge considerable about the art of ducking his head and driving through the line.

WITNESSES DECLARE LIQUOR PLAYED PART IN FATAL COLLISION

Progress Rapid in First Day in Trial of Oklawaha Man Charged With Blame for W. M.'s Shotwell-Death

Liquor played a part in an automobile collision near Murrain in the early morning of last May 3 in which two persons were fatally injured, according to testimony of witnesses for the prosecution in the trial of Glenn Martin, Oklawaha, 20, bean in district court here yesterday.

Martin is charged with manslaughter in the collision with the death of W. M. Shotwell, 35, driver of Twin Falls car, who was riding with three other men, C. B. Lindsey, John Nelson and Earl Tracy, 16, daughter of William E. Edger and H. D. Bailey, both of Oklawaha, in Martin's car, who was fatally injured.

Immediately after the crash, John Nelson, one of the passengers in the Shotwell car, testified yesterday he heard a woman's cry when he was thrown out of this. "I never take another drink."

Tell Conduct of Dance One woman and three young men had attended a dance at Murrain which Martin and his party were visiting on 10 P. M. until midnight on the night of the fatal collision. Testified that Martin had danced with her, and apparently had been drinking.

Defense counsel during the day indicated a course to show that Martin, traveling fast and his son, were turned his car to the left directly in front of the Shotwell car, that was traveling westward, in order to avoid collision with the machine which was without lights on the south side of the road.

Prayer and passengers in the Shotwell car testified that they saw a standing car, but that shortly after the crash a car traveling eastward passed the scene of the collision without stopping.

Fire Follows Crash All three men who rode with Shotwell in the collision were thrown out of the witness stand during the day. Each one told of a zigzag course traveled by the Martin car as it approached the Shotwell car.

The impact they agreed, showing the Shotwell machine being thrown forward the bagpipes. The Martin car was thrown back about 10 feet. Immediately following the collision the Shotwell car caught fire. It was with the car when Laban Woody, left the scene 20 minutes later.

These witnesses told of climbing out of the car because the doors had been jammed by the impact, and of lifting Mr. Shotwell's crumpled body from the floor at the front of the car, over the front end and through the difficult exit that remained.

Other men in other cars, who with the Shotwell family were returning from a meeting of the Masonic lodge at Murrain, quickly arrived on the scene. Mr. Shotwell and his son were brought to Twin Falls in Glenn Johnson's car. Martin and members of his jury, including the fatally injured girl, were taken aboard a car driven by Stuart H. Stevens, Oklawaha, and brought here.

Dr. D. L. Alexander, Twin Falls, called as the first witness for the prosecution, testified that he examined the body of Mr. Shotwell three days after the collision.

Trial Moves Rapidly Testimony of three or four witnesses, including some from Twin Falls, county general hospital staff, remains to be introduced today. E. V. Larson, prosecuting attorney, stated just before court adjourned last evening.

Swaley and Swaley, presenting the case for Martin, did not indicate the number of witnesses they expect to call to the stand; but it was expected that the trial would be well toward its close by late evening.

Judge Hugh A. Baker, presiding, remarked last evening that "excellent progress" had been made during the first day of the trial.

During selection of the jury, which was completed shortly before noon, seven prospective jurors were disqualified, by peremptory challenge and six were excused for cause. Some of them stated they had formed definite conclusions on the issues raised in the case. Prosecution used five peremptory challenges and defense two.

Best attorneys involved of each candidate for the jury called to be a member of any organization by reason of which he would be embarrassed in appearing as a witness.

BEAN COMMITTEE TO REPORT ON FINDINGS

Organization Will Submit Recommendations to Mass Meeting in Twin Falls

Recommendations relative to bean prices will be made to a mass meeting of growers which will convene at the Park hall tonight at 8 o'clock. It was announced last night by the Southern Idaho Bean committee, following a session at which talks were made by Louis Dousman, Billings, Montana, representing the Montana Bean Growers' association; M. H. Hassted, Denver, representing the Colorado Bean Growers' association; A. M. McElride, Orem, Utah, representing the Utah Bean Growers' association; and W. H. Davis, Idaho commissioner of agriculture.

The committee declined to make public what its findings and recommendations would be. In addition to the talks, the committee was assisted in its conclusions by telegrams from different sources in Colorado, Wyoming and California, and by information from the United States department of agriculture. So far as can now be learned the total bean crop in the United States will be about 400,000 bushels last year. This foreign crop will be considerably larger in exporting countries but neither here nor abroad has there been any crop over 400,000 bushels, slump in estimate.

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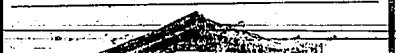
