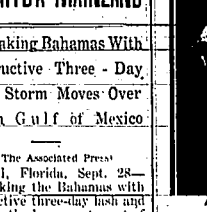

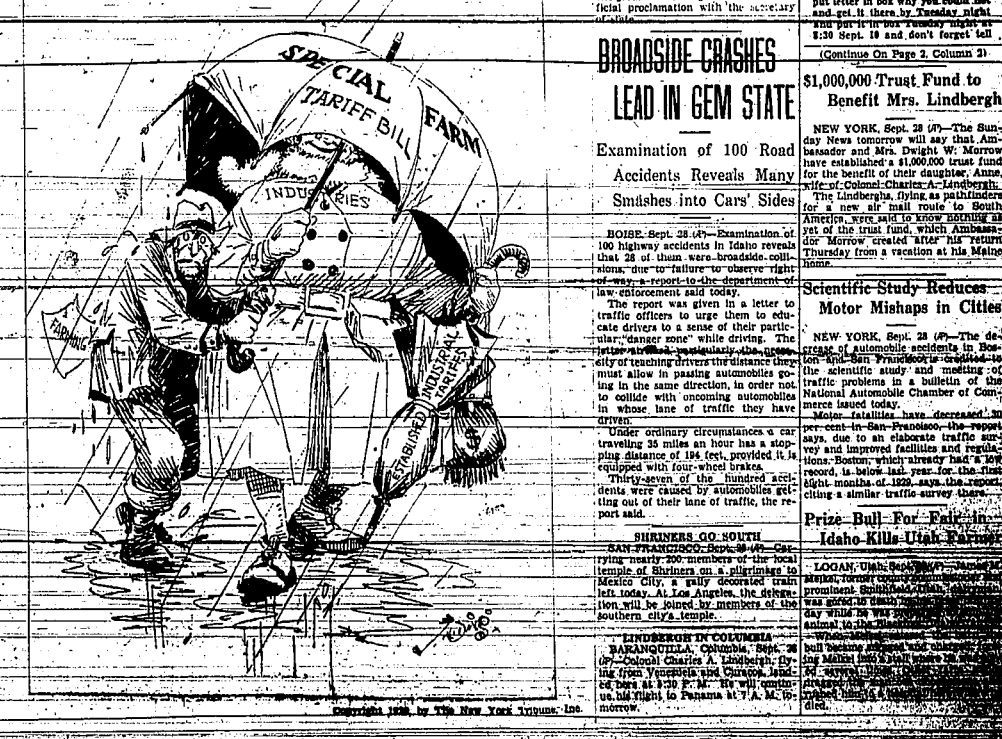

Develops Filament

The sewing thread filament was one of a series of substances tried by the inventor in his search for a practical light. He produced it by packing the ordinary thread with powdered carbon in an earthenware crucible which was covered with an asbestos top and sealed. After several hours under high temperature the thread had become carbonized and was cooled and sealed in a bulb from which the air had been exhausted.

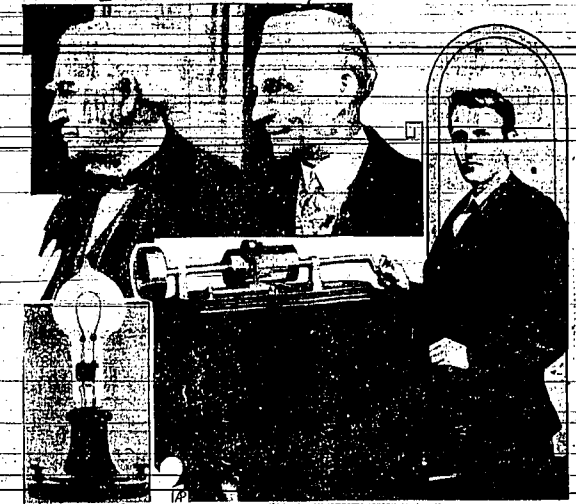

Accepted three days ago at SHANGHAI, Sept. 28, after almost three decades of service of guarding American shipping on the Yangtze river, four gunboats of the United States Asiatic fleet have been doomed to end their careers as targets for the blue-jackets of the destroyer squadrons in China waters.

One of these is the U. S. S. General Alava, which has been dispatched to a watery grave by the friendly signs of the fleet which she was for so many years a part. The three others, the Palao, the Monocacy and the Helena have been reduced to a reserve commission status. When taken out of the river, they are anchored in the Whampoa river from Shanghai to await the will of the commander-in-chief.

The General Alava was the most famous of the four vessels. She was built in Scotland 40 years ago for the Spanish government by A. M. Llanos and Sons, Ltd., Dumbarton. She was not equipped with wireless at the time of the Spanish-American war and did not learn of the capture of Manila by Admiral George Dewey until she sailed into the bay, bringing supplies and soldiers from Spain.

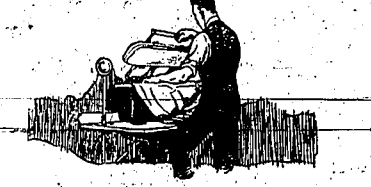

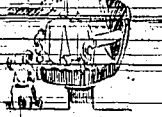

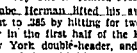

Idaho Sportsmen Will Find Large Supply of Native Ducks

Season's Approach Brings Promise of Excellent Hunting

Game Department Reports Indicate Small Number of Migratory Birds for Nimrods of Gem State

By The Associated Press
BOISE, Sept. 28.—Idaho hunters will have a good supply of native ducks but few migratory when they go hunting on October 1, reports to the state game warden indicated today.

Rich crops have attracted birds from outlying swamps in to the central-feeding grounds in several sections, this being particularly true of the Snake and Tanners report native ducks in big droves for such an early season.

Hunting has been going on in the five extreme north Idaho counties since September 10 as the migratory movement starts earlier from there.

In the balance of the state the season is open as usual from October 1 to January 15. As very few ducks reserves were set aside by the last legislature, hunters can go about their business without interference from unexpected hunting signs.

Good River Hunting

The old Snake river, wrapped around the state like a belt, provides good hunting for ducks along its entire length. Especially is there fine hunting around American Falls, reservoir, which harbors hundreds of thousands of ducks and is one of the principal stopping places of the migratory birds when they drift down from Canada and points north.

Simple good hunting is ample good hunting.

Up on the plateau north from Gooding, hunting is good along sections of the Snake and better on the Wood river and Silver creek. This hunting improves with the first snow as the ducks come into the stubble fields to feed.

Pheasant Season Later

Later in the season, beginning on October 15 in most of the southern counties, comes the pheasant season, which makes a rare combination with duck hunting.

In the Boise valley the ducks fly low during the early morning hours—sometimes—and then go out of range as the first heat of the sun scurries toward Lake Lowell. During the middle of the day, the hunters take out into the fields, pheasants and then as the sun lowers, return to the river for the evening flight of ducks.

It is an old story—provided the ducks are flying and the pheasants are feeling right sporty.

STARVATION AND HUNTSMEN DANGERS FACING IDAHO GAME

BOISE, Sept. 28 (AP)—Starvation and hungry hunters are the two big dangers facing Idaho game birds and animals this fall as the result of forest fires which have swept through the hunting areas.

French Theory of Retributive Justice Differs Greatly from Practices in United States and Produces Remarkable Results

Inmates in Modern European Prison Never See Fellow Convicts and Go About Daily Tasks Without Talking

Continental Experts Set Forth Statistics Showing 50 Per Cent Decrease in Penal Population in 30 Years

Rebellious Prisoners Go to Cell in Utter Darkness to Live on Bread and Water and Sleep on Wooden Beds

A DOOM to military confinement, silence and the wearing of a mask so that no inmate can recognize his fellow convict, does not to American ears sound like a 1929 conception of modern penology. Yet this is the prospect of the most recent of the prisons of France, one of the largest and by far the most modern of France's prisons.

Presnes is, of course, only one of many, each of which differs from the others in both plan and management, with great differences left to the warden of each. James M. Heybroon writes in the *Baltimore Sun*. In Paris alone there are five prisons, the most famous of which are the ancient prison of St. Lazare, housing women alone and soon to be destroyed, and the Sante prison, in which are confined men awaiting trial. At the same time, prisoners remain varied from a few days to as long as fifteen months, depending upon the time required to prepare the case and to complete the police search for accomplices if there are any.

The French, it must be remembered, leave no stone unturned in bringing justice to all those involved in a particular crime.

The prison of Presnes is really several prisons in one. Juvenile delinquents are handled there in a separate section and men and women are classified in several different divisions. Women prisoners having young children from whom they cannot be separated are housed there, but in such a manner that the child has no realization that he is in a prison. The "impression" is given that he is in a hospital. In this section alone do the prisoners mingle in a big walled yard in which there are both grass and trees. Each mother has her bed in a dormitory. Each bed is a crib for the child; children are quite frequently born in this prison, which undoubtedly would cause grave concern to the American sob sisters of both sexes. In this section they dine in a central hall. The floor is concrete, the hall is furnished with the crudest prison furniture and the food is served in metal dishes, but even so the standard of living is probably higher than many of the inmates have been accustomed to and probably not widely different from the standard of the masses in France.

New Insect Pest Hits Maple Trees

STAMFORD, Sept. 28.—Sept. 28.—A new insect pest, announced as hitherto unknown, is being discovered attacking one of the popular shade trees of the east, the Norway maple.

The insect attacks the leaves, dropping them by hundreds as it cut off by a knife.

The pest is a tiny, nearly transparent caterpillar which works at the base on the leaf stem and produces a blackening and slight swelling there. Its discovery is announced by Dr. E. P. Taylor, chief entomologist of the Harriet Thayer research laboratories.

ever been required, more than once, sheltered during his imprisonment in a cell and dine on a meager, although nutritious, menu. The rule of silence prevails at all times. A view of the interior of the cell by the prisoner is through a narrow slit in the wall. The food is served through a hole in the wall. The cell is created only from the outside. Where Men Are Kept

Next came the huge, forbidding building with its black, brown walls, which housed the men. It is divided into three sections of four tiers each. Everywhere there is a network of day-railroad tracks, for the distribution of food and supplies. A single inmate is stripped of supplies, washed, shaved and furnished the prison garb, which includes a mask which covers his entire head and shoulders and which must be worn at all times when he is out of his cell. The mask is a thin, woven affair which permits the prisoner to see and breathe easily, but prevents his recognition by any fellow convict. After he is measured and fingerprinted and his record taken he is assigned to a cell, which is the same as those occupied by the women. The doors are to 9:30 they have the morning meal and

solid and permit no view of even the corridor. A small peep-hole, operated in the open in the prison, or prisoners made yards. Each prisoner, especially the yard-surrendering man, is made to march to his particular cell. A little exercise walk runs around the prison and there it runs in the center. At the end there are bars permitting a view of a little forest within the prison reservation. This end of the prison is covered so that the convict may be sheltered during his imprisonment, by the weather is not severe. The prison is made up of six rows of double-slashboxes, or alcoves, which will accommodate 250 persons, each fully enclosed in his own little closet, although a slit in which he can see nothing but the platform. 

Rome's Size And Importance Increases Under Leadership Of Mussolini's Fascist Rule

Di-Duce Continues Determined Program to Make Eternal City Center for Activities of Nation and Headquarters for Learned Groups

By ANDRUE BEIDING (Associated Press Staff Writer)

ROME, Sept. 28.—Mussolini's determination to make Rome the real capital of Italy is bearing fruit. In time, if the Diuce's efforts continue as fruitful, Rome may recall her ancient glories, when she was center of the Roman Empire.

The latest confirmation of Mussolini's idea is that Rome has just surpassed the 900,000 mark in population. Figures issued by the Capitolium, the statistical review of the city, give the inhabitants of the Eternal City as 900,000, an increase of 100,000 since the government against the migration of country people into the city.

The growth in population goes side by side with Rome's growth in national popularity. Mussolini has done everything he could to center the nation's activities in the City of the Caesars. He has made Rome the headquarters of the national leadership societies, has convoked national conventions here and has induced the various Fascist organizations to hold their reunions in the capital.

Financial Leadership Next

In time, as Rome grows in size, and influence, she may derive Milan of the financial leadership of Italy. Then she will become as true a capital city as London is of England and Paris of France.

Rome is now only 400,000 in number behind her population under the emperors. The highest point reached by the census of Augustus was 1,238,000, and this mark was never afterwards surpassed.

In a significant of Mussolini's belief that Rome should be the true capital of the country that city since the advent of Fascism to power has Rome come to a really active center politically of Italy. In 1927, before the Fascist march on Rome, the city had 691,000 inhabitants. Thus in the few years of the Fascist regime Rome added to its stature 211,000 people, an increase of 29 per cent.

While this tremendous increase has been going on, Rome has, with a great effort, kept her housing adequate. Four whole new suburbs have been opened.

Population Fluctuates

Rome has had greater fluctuations in population than any other city of the world. From the fact figure of 1,236,000 under Augustus, she decreased to 700,000 in the thirteenth century, when the barbarians burned the metropolis; to 17,000 in 1377 at the end of the Babylonian captivity of the Popes at Avignon; and to 20,000 when the Emperor Charles V in 1527 sacked the city.

Under Napoleon, Rome had 117,000 people. When the Pope was deprived of his temporal power in 1870 the population was 275,000. In the 50 years of the rule of the Sardinian kings Rome has gained 600,000 people.

With these figures to give them background, the residents of Rome are looking forward to the day when the Eternal City will be strong enough to rule at least the world as the Romans knew it, which meant the domination of the Mediterranean.

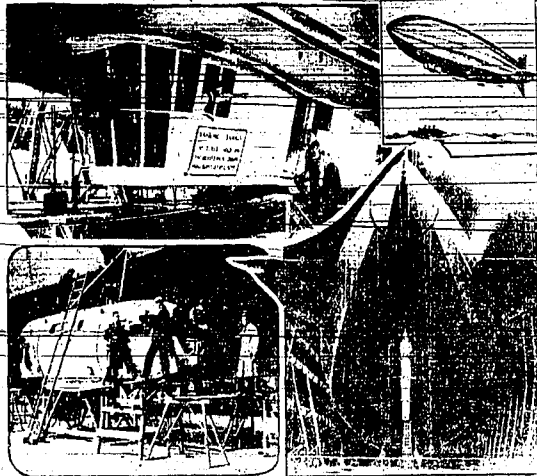
