

Hornsbly And, Coox Under Glare of World Series Spotlight

Two Hitters Stand Out Clearly Among Contesting Players

Cubs' Shortstop Has Best of Argument if Season's Offensive Figures Stand As Basis for Prediction

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—After a discussion of the infielders to match strength in the world series through the spotlight on two opposing players standing out in bold relief—Hornsbly of the Cubs and FOX of the Athletics—one of the heights of a great career and the other standing on the threshold, Hornsbly is the Cubs' leading hitter and an inspirational player with one foot in the American league and the other in the reason's play-as-one position.

Fox is regarded as a better batsman than Grimm, who will play first base for the Athletics. Fox has many things to learn about the fine art of first base play. Grimm will have a distinction of being the only left-handed batsman in the Cub lineup.

Hornsbly is a definite find. He has been hitting about ninth. But up to the second round series more than 100 points on the basis of their season's work, but here this fielding advantage will reduce Hornsbly's lead. Hornsbly is an adequate defensive baseman, but DiStasio at times is an extraordinary performer.

Coming to shortstop the Cubs will have the better of the argument if the season's offensive figures are to be regarded as the basis for prediction. Hornsbly is a better hitter than DiStasio, though he may be a better shortstop than that baseman does well enough at the position he will occupy in the series. Hornsbly will play a sound fielding game, but he cannot be figured to hit with the power of DiStasio.

On the Cub infield Hornsbly and Grimm are 300 hitters and English has batted 200 hits. McGowan has batted about 270. The As have two 300 hitters in Fox and Dykes. Both English and McGowan have batted more than 200. McGowan's percentage will be slightly in favor of the Cubs.

The Athletics' infielder tower over other plays than any other club in the American league and the Cubs lead the National league in this department of play, but the Athletics have the ability to choose between the two defensive combinations.

MAJOR league baseball players associated with clubs other than the Chicago Cubs and Philadelphia Athletics are just finishing the season but "barbering" is rampant on the approaching world's series.

Although they will not be called on to participate in the autumn classic either then, conversationally, every player on every other club has some ideas as to the approaching managerial strategy. The American leaguers think the As will win and the National athletes string along with the Cubs but that is not the main argument.

There is room for debate on the speed of the fast ball pitchers involved. If the Athletics knew whether Robert Moses Grove can throw a high hard one with more or than can George Farnshaw, or George Wallace, the big "Babe" they remain discreetly silent, but it is not so with the players who bat against the trio.

MEMBERS of the St. Louis Browns cast a vote for Farnshaw. The Cleveland Indians' ballot went to Grove and an umpire in the vicinity said Wallace was faster than either of his colleagues.

Let Bib Falk take the stand. "When Grove wants to throw that ball as fast as he can, look out," said the big Texan.

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10,000 Guns Will Boom Opening Of Hunting Season

Birds Flying High Over South Idaho Observers Report

Number of Geese Considerably in Excess of Last Year, Biological Advises in Gem State

(By The Associated Press.)
BOISE, Sept. 30—Ten thousand guns will boom out in the morning to advise ducks and geese that fall is here—and that means fall.

The morrow marks the official opening of the duck season not only in Idaho, but in Utah, Oregon and part of Washington. And what an epoch that opening day marks. It is the gunning season, the time of the year. Moreover, Western sportsmen are beginning to realize that they are privileged to crack into some of the best shooting in these United States.

Hunters will be faced with a high flight and probably not much of that reports here today indicated.

As yet, practically none of the northern states have arrived, these days principally in Washington and North Idaho grain fields. Moreover, except in scattered sections, the biologists here "duck census" has disclosed a scarcity of local Mallards.

On the other hand, the number of geese is apparently in excess of last year. On Lake Lowell, near Nampa, the census revealed more geese than ducks. Most of them are feeding on the lake however, which is a migratory bird refuge and barred to hunters.

The rise of the Snake river due to decrease in irrigation demands was eliminated a touch of disease which cost a number of ducks early in the year. The level of the reservoir has fitted enough to feed many backwaters sections whose stagnant waters seem to affect the migratory birds.

Probably the big duck center is the best Bear river region on the north end of Great Salt Lake. Here the famous "millionaire" club is located and the almost equally good public shooting grounds recently opened at a federal expense.

Shooter's Paradise

What is a shooter's paradise? It is the "millionaire" club. There you walk to the water's edge and see a man in a suit apply if you are one of the few members' favorite duck pond on a wooden path—and a public row boat to be hired. There you sit smoking at only the choicer ducks of the flocks lured in by beds of newly planted rice. When enough ducks are down, your guides reports with the boat and—Beh! you are rowed back to the wooden walk.

But myriads of other good hunting grounds are available in these four states. North Idaho and Washington are spotted with promising lakes and creeks at almost every point by creeks and rivers. In Oregon, best known to hunters of this vicinity are inland and down lakes in the southern part of the state. Swarms of geese make that section their headquarters and en-

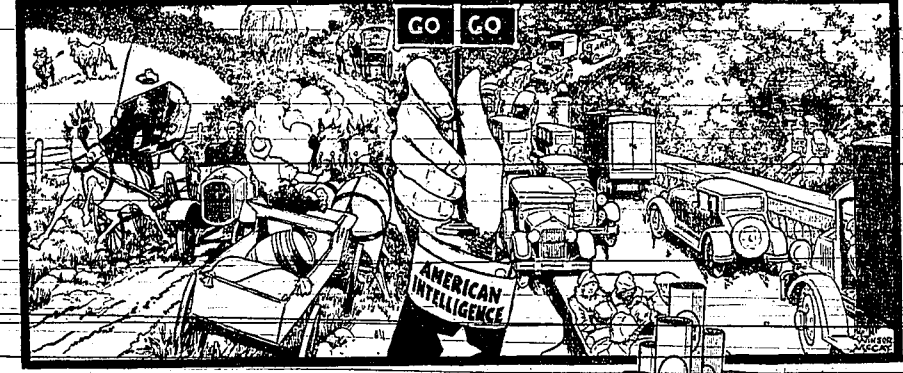

Tax Tangles

It is easy to tax real estate, and collect the tax, because the property is visible, tangible and permanent. It is easy to tax other forms of property. "Personal property" of most kinds is elusive. Wealth in the form of money is especially slippery, vanishing quickly when the tax assessor starts looking for it. Hardly less slippery are the intangible values that form so large a part of our possessions.

The value of funds in the enormous multiplication of industrial securities call attention to the ease with which this form of wealth escapes taxation. This bears heavily on the farmer, and hardly less heavily on city home-owners. It is one of the chief factors in "bearing" the national real estate market.

Fifteen states have laws making all forms of property uniformly, and in nearly every case these laws are a dead letter. Tax rates outside for some forms of property are regarded as confiscatory when applied to money, but bank deposits escape. Through fear of double taxation, more and more investments escape. For many reasons, household goods and various other kinds of personal property are valued as low as possible.

It is held by most tax authorities that it is better to establish different tax rates for different kinds of property, on the ground that a low but high but unfair one. This movement is bound to gain strength.

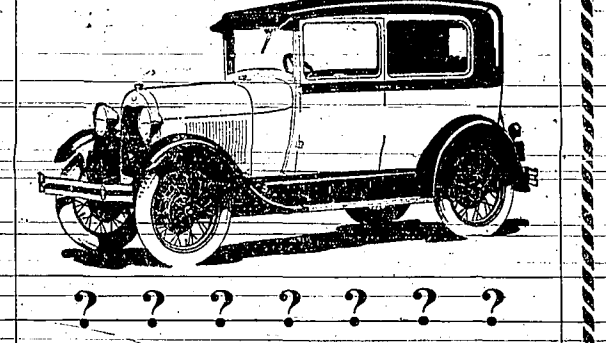

Vitaly Significant Element of Relativity of Power on Seas Plays Prominent Role in Arms Negotiations

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—Whittled down to the naval accord problem confronting President Hoover and Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald is that of two-inch differences.
What they have to do is to find a formula of cruiser relativity that will permit each government to build to its own needs in six-inch gun and eight-inch gun ships without jeopardizing the national security of either in the event they ever clashed in war.
In the answer they are seeking is bound up not only vast naval expenditures but political questions that might strain Anglo-American friendship to the breaking point.

Difference Slight
A two-inch difference in the bore of naval guns seems a trifling matter. Germany before the World war, six to 11-inch main batteries for her battleships, while British and American vessels carried 12-inch guns. The British 14-inch, 15-inch and finally 16-inch guns.
German 11-inch weapons gave a good account of themselves in the attack on the heavier British battleships. Yet still, to solve a clash of opinion over the seemingly insignificant factor of two-inch difference in gun bore threw the three-power naval conference at Geneva on the rocks.
Nowhere else in the whole range of gun calibers, from shoulder rifles of eight-inch weight to the 40-pound, 100-gallon, 10-inch naval guns that hurl a ten-foot steel and explosive 30,000 pound shot, does the really significant element of relativity of naval power enter into the picture.
And the reason is because a six-inch gun can be loaded by hand, while an eight-inch requires a crane. It is not that. That two-inch difference means no merchant craft can carry eight-inch guns without a virtual loss of deck strength decks and install mechanical means of loading her rifles.
Since the World war the United States has considered construction of any cruiser to carry guns of less than eight-inch bore. That policy offsets Great Britain's policy of building a heavy merchantman, to be used in war times as swift six-inch gun commerce raiders.

Light Cruisers Needed
Great Britain agrees with her trade routes to dominions and colonies that must be kept open to preserve the slight, little ships—and the commonwealth has felt she must have enough light cruisers with six-inch guns to police those routes at all times.
Her programs of cruiser construction have provided over six-inch gun ships for each eight-inch gunner build down. Now Hoover and MacDonald, each of whom has been in the White House, are safeguarding the ultimate security of the nation for which he speaks, are at tempting solution of this two-inch problem on new lines.

They are trying to determine in the light of more than a century of Anglo-American peace and common pledges not to resort to war, what amount numbers of eight-inch and six-inch gun ships for that still would equal comparative equality of naval power.
If that can be decided, without sacrifice by either of ultimate naval security, American and British naval rivalries at least can be swept into the past.

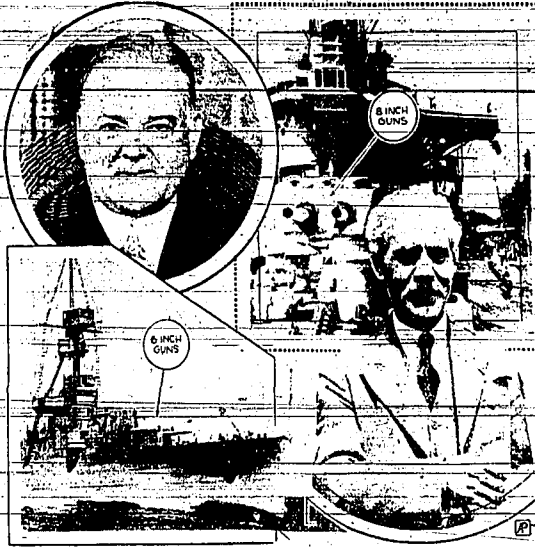

STUDY OF TRAFFIC IN IDAHO WILL CONTINUE

R. H. Shoemaker Announces Further Survey of Federal Aid Roads in State

BOISE, Sept. 30 (Special to The News).—The comprehensive study of traffic on all federal aid highways in Idaho began September 1 will continue for one week, it is announced by R. H. Shoemaker of the bureau of highways. During the same time similar surveys will be made in all Western states and in each instance the federal bureau of public roads is cooperating with the highway department of the state.
Information for Programs
Information useful as a basis for construction and maintenance programs of federal aid highways in the state will be collected as well as information on which to form policies of slow removal and traffic regulations.
The survey will also give a complete history of the use of federal aid highways as well as answer questions in regard to tourist travel.
A variety of facts concerning the traffic are being collected for the solution of many problems arising in highway administration. For example, the data required are those which will furnish an accurate idea of the flow of traffic throughout the state, others required are knowledge of where traffic enters or peaks daily; others of some fraction of total traffic, such as motor trucks, foreign vehicles, etc.

STUPENDOUS SCHEME PROPOSES CHANGE OF SOUTH EUROPE'S MAP

Three Men Continue Work After Four Years On Survey

Undertaking To Make Lake of Mediterranean

Originators of Idea Give Appearance of Enjoying Work

Marseilles, France, Sept. 30.—The most stupendous engineering scheme the world has ever known is in the process of being blueprinted by three French engineers.

They have spent four years in a preliminary survey and in three years more will be ready to propose a plan which will change the map of South Europe, join the Mediterranean islands to the possessions of France and Italy, and turn the Sahara desert into the world's most prolific garden.

The undertaking Even the originators of the plan admit that it sounds like a big undertaking.

At least a hundred plans for irrigating the Sahara desert have been advanced within 50 years, but none has been so thorough as this one. The scheme is to build two super-damns on the Nile and one on the Danube, and to bottle up the Mediterranean

with a concrete wall. Water taken from the Nile and African rivers would be pumped into the Mediterranean and forced into canals

stalled to force this water into canals leading to the desert. The estimates present interesting figures. Flushing the surface of the Mediterranean at approximately 2,500,000 square kilometers, they claim that the two dams and the water pumped into the canals would account for 400 to 500 cubic kilometers of water, which would have the level of the sea some 4 feet to six hundred feet above the level of the sea.

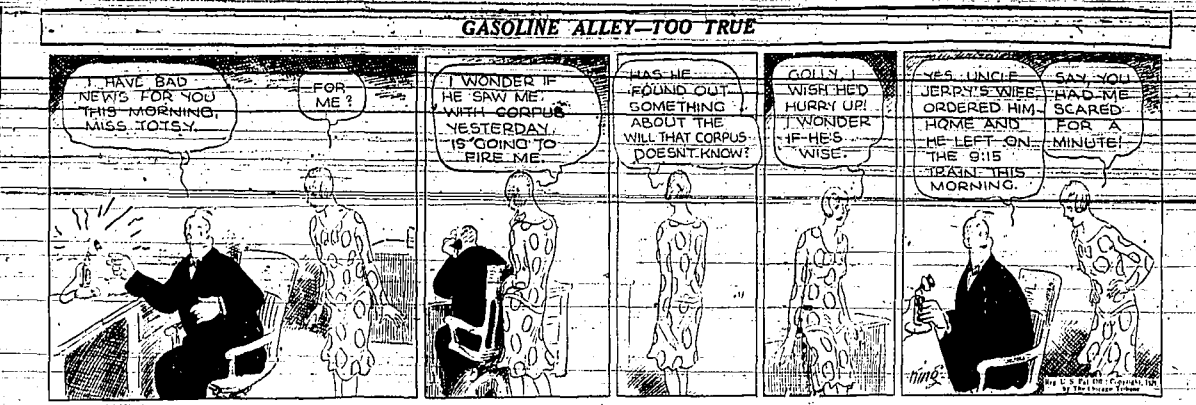

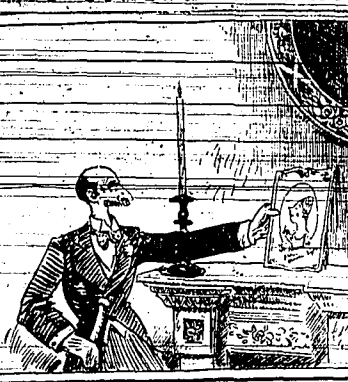
