GORDON Cochrane, great Athletics' catcher who prefers to be known as Mike rather than the more familiar Mac, stands out head and shoulders when a comparison of world's series players is made by positions.

FINEST ANIMALS TO COMPETE IN ANNUAL EVENT FOR AWARDS

Leading Breeds of Dairy Cattle to Take Sum of \$30,000 in Cash Prizes

Boys and Girls Enter Judging, Showmanship and Demonstration Contests

(By The Associated Press) ST. LOUIS, Oct. 1—Prize products of farm, farmyard, kennel and paddock will parade here October 12 to 19 in a new \$1,500,000 arena built primarily for this annual event.

The national dairy show, now permanently established in St. Louis, is expected to attract 1200 exhibits of extraordinary animals. The national poultry and pig show and the national horse show, in conjunction, will bring hundreds of additional exhibitors.

Leading breeds of dairy cattle will be shown for \$30,000 in cash prizes. Prizes aggregating \$25,000 have been offered for horse show winners, including \$10,000 in the saddle class. Dairy exhibits in the daytime will give up to equine shows at night.

Youth to Participate
Thousands of boys and girls, 4-14 club members in several states and students of vocational agriculture, will participate in cattle judging, dairy and poultry demonstrations and showmanship contests for prizes.

After the arena's dedication October 12, special days for groups of states have been set for as follows: October 14, Arkansas, Louisiana and Oklahoma; October 15, Illinois and Indiana; October 16, Missouri and the mid-south, including Alabama, Kentucky, Tennessee and Mississippi; October 17, Kansas and Nebraska; October 18, Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

The National Dairy association, sponsors of the dairy show, is headed by Charles L. Hill, cattle breeder and dairying expert of Roseville, Wisconsin. For six years he has been the association's president.

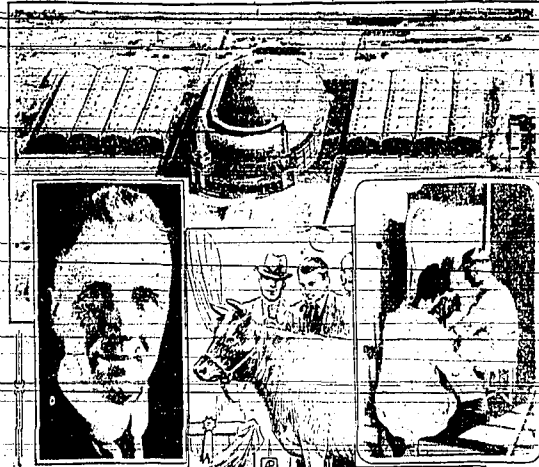

HEAVY FROST CUTS POTATO PRODUCTION

Growers Look for Highest Prices in Three Years for Weather-Reduced Crop

Michigan potato growers expect high prices for their crop this season according to a statement published in Michigan newspapers received by S. Claud Stewart, Twin Falls correspondent.

"Two weeks ago on the basis of information then available, Verne H. Church, Michigan agricultural statistician, estimated that should weather conditions remain substantially the same, Michigan growers would receive for their potatoes the highest prices in three years. Mercury dropped several degrees below freezing and some frost was reported here on Wednesday morning.

"That such a heavy frost should occur at this time of the season is not unusual, but it is a result of summer drought and early frost.

General droughts throughout the United States up to September 4 had reduced the United States crop to about 40,000,000 bushels for an estimated crop of 340,000,000 bushels. Michigan alone dropped 5,500,000 bushels in August. The only state to show any appreciable gain was Maine, the estimate there increasing to 2,500,000 bushels.

"If the final estimate should not change materially, that at September 1, the federal agricultural statistician in Michigan said on September 16, the crop will compare closely with that of 1928 in volume and be around 115,000,000 bushels smaller than the 1928 crop, which was the largest production on record. This indicates at better prices than have prevailed in either of the past two seasons, and unless the outlook changes materially, prices for the remainder of the season will be somewhat below the normal requirements, which should be favorable for prices above the average paid to growers during the past 10 years."

The report advised orderly marketing will tend to stabilize the price and maintain a satisfactory level throughout the season.

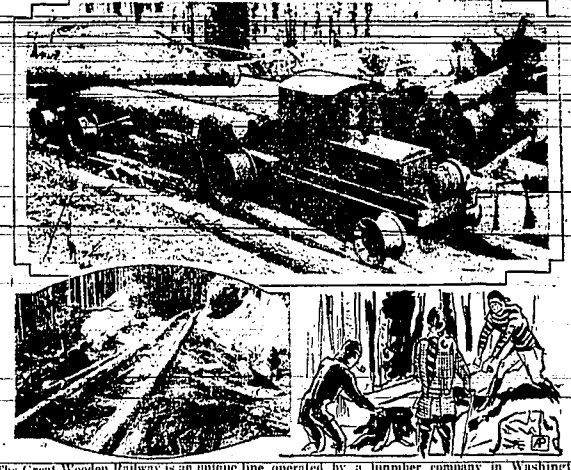
