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STATE TROOPERS GO TO SCENE OF STRIKE IN NORTH CAROLINA

Three Persons Dead; Six Dying and 10 Injured Following Riots Between Strikers and Authorities

By The Associated Press. MARION, N. C., Oct. 2.—Three men, believed dying and ten others in the hospital here today brought state troops to Marion for the second time in two months to put a stop to textile strike troubles.

Two men were killed outright and another died as a result of a riot at the gate of the Marion Manufacturing company cotton mill in Marion today morning. Who fired the first shot is a question of dispute, leaders of the United Textile Workers Union asserting that it was fired by sheriff's forces and the chief of police claiming that a striker fired first, after officers had used tear gas.

Chain Breaker. The mill was the scene of a strike as two weeks duration, which was ended on September 11 in an agreement whereby the East Marion mill and the Marion Manufacturing company's mill were reopened on a non-union basis. Members of the textile union recently claimed that the agreement was not being lived up to by the East Marion mill management and at 1 P. M. today a score of workers in the night shift walked out in an unexpected strike.

A picket line was formed outside the gate at two o'clock when the shift change, about 100 persons were at the gate. Sheriff O. F. Atkins, McDowell county, and a number of deputies were on duty.

A fight started. Sheriff Atkins in a statement said that John Jones, a striker, who died, was shot today of wounds he had on the head. The sheriff attending to Sheriff Jones, while this was going on the arrest, some of the strikers were killed and killed Sam Vickers, a union member, shooting being more general and the strike said more than 100 shots were fired.

LEGION CONVENTION FAVORS CHANGES IN HOSPITAL AT DOISE

Louisville—National Gathering Endorses Idahoans' Resolution on Veterans' Institution Expansion

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 2.—Expansion of a hospital for veterans' convalescents, the American Legion went tonight to business today, selecting hosts for the 1920 convention and paving the way for the election tomorrow of a national commander and other officers.

The legion recommended that the hospital at Boise, Idaho, be transferred to the jurisdiction of the veterans' bureau and that its capacity be increased to 100 beds. A resolution to this effect from the Idaho department was adopted unanimously. It will require only one ballot for Boise to win over Los Angeles, which had been in doubt.

Delegates gave serious consideration to their comrades when events of 1917-18 fell in body and mind, pledging their support to 64 resolutions of the committee.

By HIRSH BELL (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—The Cubs out-number the Athletics in catchers, three and one-half to two, but it seems reasonable to suggest that Connie Mack would not trade the brilliant Gordon Cochrane for all the Chicago receivers. Harriet is the Cub's half. He can catch but cannot throw. However, he can hit and probably will be seen during the series with a ball in his hand even if he is deprived of the privilege of dominating the catching area.

When Cochrane goes out to yell "right here" for the first time in the series he will be enlisted for the duration of the war, barring unexpected injuries. If the Boston University alumnus is hurt, Cy Perkins, a spy veteran will be the relief. The A's have only two substitutes listed as catchers, but should Cochrane and Perkins both fall by the wayside Jimmy Fox would move in from first base.

Taylor, Cub Catcher The Cub catching staff consists of Zach Taylor, former Giant, Robin and Brave. The bulk of the receiving will fall on his capable shoulders with a chance that Mike Genesias, another veteran, may see action. Jimmy Sumner, the former Cardinal, is the other spare. Harriet, who will not catch, is thought to hit on the Chicago side.

The broad shoulders of the hustling young Philadelphia star will carry the burden for the American league. Cochrane can throw, hit and run. He probably is the fastest catcher the game has known in a generation and with Jimmy Lyons, peeks next of the "pepper" of the club. SECOND TRIAL IN MANSLAUGHTER CASE

Court Dismisses Jury After 48 Hours Deliberation

Fall to Bring Agreement

Olsen Martin, Oakley, 20, will go on trial a second time for manslaughter in connection with the death of W. M. Shovel. Twin Falls fatally injured in an automobile collision near Meru, Idaho, last May 3. It was announced yesterday following dismissal of a jury of 5 men in district court that had deliberated 48 hours since 2:30 P. M. Monday without agreement on a verdict in the case.

Date for the second trial was set for Thursday, October 17, to follow trial in seven civil actions set for trial beginning next Monday.

During its long deliberation the jury did not ask for additional instructions or communicate with the outside world except to ask Tuesday morning to be released. That request was denied.

The state alleged that Martin crashed into the car in which Shovel was riding with five other men returning from a following at Burley. Two persons were fatally injured in the collision, the second victim being Ethel Tracy, 16, daughter of William E. Tracy, Oakley, who, with two other persons, was riding in Martin's car.

Martin based his defense on evidence that a third car, standing without lights on the road, had caused him to swerve and strike the Shovel car.

Denies Issuing Check
Without Funds in Bank
On arraignment in probate court here yesterday, O. C. Clanson charged not guilty to a misdemeanor charge of issuing a \$150 check last February 23, without funds in the bank. Hearing in this case was set to be held next Monday. J. Hughes, manager of Twin Falls Credit association, stated the complaint.

JURY MAKES SHORT SHIFT OF BREW CASE

Brief Deliberations Bring Verdict of Acquittal for Jess Turner of Hansen

Within a few moments after it received the case late yesterday afternoon a jury in district court here decreed that Jess Turner-Hansen had not sold a bottle of home brewed beer to federal prohibition agents at his home last July and brought in a verdict of acquittal on a felony charge of second class illegal possession of liquor.

Five witnesses, including Turner himself, testified to their belief that Turner was away from home all day on July 21, which was Sunday. The witness were: Mrs. Jess Turner, wife of the accused; William Bell, owner of the North Side farm, where Turner was employed; Ben Hoos, employed on an adjacent farm; L. C. McFarland, operator of a lather service station.

Chemist Testifies
Homer S. Voth, chemist, who had been retained for the state that the brew when he analyzed it, contained 4.4 per cent alcohol, was recalled by defense counsel and stated that the analysis had been made July 30-nine days after the alleged seizure.

Story of the alleged sale of the brew by Turner to the officers was told by Edgar L. Marston and E. D. Paris, federal agents, and P. C. Frater, sheriff. Court records showed that Turner had previously been convicted in February, 1928, of illegal possession of liquor.

W. L. Dunn, Turner's attorney, argued that state's witnesses were mistaken about circumstances in connection with the alleged sale. He stated that while the prosecuting attorney insisted that the question was one of certainty of the witnesses.

In selection of the jury yesterday afternoon, the defense exercised the prerogative challenge, of prospective jurors, and the prosecution, two.

Sentence Postponed
Barney Ellis, convicted last week on a felony charge of illegal possession of liquor, will not receive sentence until next Saturday. Judge Hugh A. Baker announced yesterday, when the sentence was to have been pronounced. Petitions for leniency in the case are being circulated, it was understood.

A jury to be impaneled this morning in trial of one of the two criminal actions remaining on the court's docket. These are the cases of L. A. Repass and of Ross Davis, each charged with operating an automobile while intoxicated.
