QUEER CHECK LEADS MAN INTO TROUBLE

Emmett Jackson Begins Series of Explanations with Attempt to Obtain Cash

A man who gave the name of Emmett Jackson began a long series of explanations when he attempted to tell officials at the First National bank here that a \$50 check that he wanted to exchange for cash had been given to him by L. L. Breckenridge, Twin Falls mill manager, in payment for labor.

The bank officials, however, a few minutes later when he faced Mr. Breckenridge, who had been summoned by the bank officials, and said that the check in a "trap game" Thursday night.

The check, written in pencil on an old counter check form, Mr. Breckenridge pronounced to be a forgery.

Jackson was arrested by police officers, and was held last night in the city jail facing prosecution on a forgery charge. Officers who questioned Jackson at police headquarters said that he seemed able to furnish only a vague and sketchy account of his recent activities and places of residence. He said, according to the officers, that he was 29 years old, and that he had been in Amarillo, Texas, and that he arrived in Twin Falls last Thursday. He was employed once, the officers said, he took a taxi for two months as a taxi-cab driver, but that was the longest period of employment that he could recall.

The check that Jackson presented for payment at the bank yesterday bore date of last Thursday, October 3. It was made payable to A. W. Wall, and was endorsed with that name. The name written on the check, officers said, bore considerable similarity to Mr. Breckenridge's signature, and was, they said, obviously written by someone who had made a study of his signature.

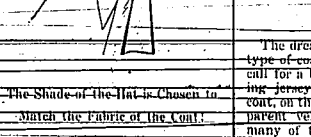

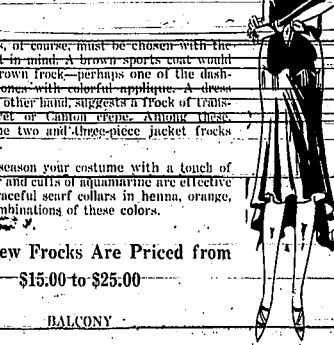

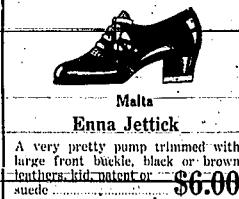
