Lindbergh and Party Sight Additional Maya Ruins in Jungles

NATIVES OF BRITISH HONDURAS FLEE WHEN SHIP APPEARS ABOVE

Discovery of Ruins as Explorers Drone Through Skies Near Lake Yaxha

(By The Associated Press) BELIZE, Brit. Honduras, Oct. 8.—Members of the Lindbergh aerial exploration party will return to Miami tomorrow. In their search of ruins of the ancient Maya civilization was made today and carried them over the Western base of the colony with a landing in Flores lake, Peten, Guatemala.

DISCOVER ANCIENT RUINS

MIAMI, Oct. 8.—Discovery of additional Maya ruins, believed never before seen by white men, was the result of the flight of the Lindbergh expedition (Colonel) Charles A. Lindbergh in his flight over the dense jungles of Guatemala.

Discovery was announced in a terse radio message received here from the Lindbergh plane as it wheeled over the dense forest of the Peten, Guatemala. The message was cryptic but the Lindberghs always, wireless headquarters which had been in almost constant communication with the flight.

Five columns of gleaming white were spotted near Lake Yaxha. "They must be massive edifices," said the radio message. "Lindbergh is making wide circles and the scientists are jotting down notes. Everybody has turned observer."

A few miles later, the plane passed through a dense forest. Lindbergh alighted so deep in the forest that it is only cleared spot in many miles. "We have discovered a new Maya ruin in nine months was found to cover the party cleared ruins of a pyramid, said Lindbergh, believed to have been a Mayan astronomical observatory dating to the first century after Christ."

Kansas Chemist Finds New Kind of Life-Supporting Air

DIFFERENT FORM OF ATMOSPHERE MAKES ANIMALS HEALTHIER

Discovery Comes About As By-product of Seven Years Study

Laboratory Resembles Zoo to Casual Visitor

Wide Field For Knowledge About Gases, Scientist Thinks

(By The Associated Press) McPHERSON, Kas., Oct. 8.—Air different from anything man breathes, which supports life in white mice more effectively than present atmosphere, was found by Dr. J. Willard Hering, chemist and physicist.

Findings of two life-supporting atmospheres has come out as a byproduct of Dr. Hering's study of what part rare gases play in normal life.

He has discovered that a mixture of oxygen, 78 percent, nitrogen, 19 percent, and other gases including argon, neon, krypton, xenon and carbon dioxide, in one experiment helium was substituted for the 78 percent of oxygen.

Mice More Active
In a series of tests with this atmosphere, Dr. Hering found that the white mice were brighter, more active and a better health condition than in normal air.

But when the percentage of argon was raised by but three points to 78 the mice could not stand it.

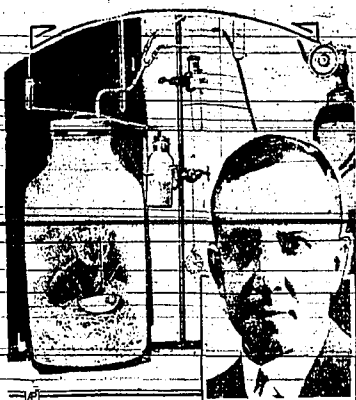
Dr. Hering said he is convinced that the comparative low toxicity of helium accounts for the difference.

Test Many Animals
The experiments have been performed on guinea pigs, mice, rats, rabbits, cats, guinea pigs, turtles, and upon many other animals that in an unlimited variety for the laboratory research.

The Kansas chemist believes there is a wide field of practical application for more knowledge about rare gases.

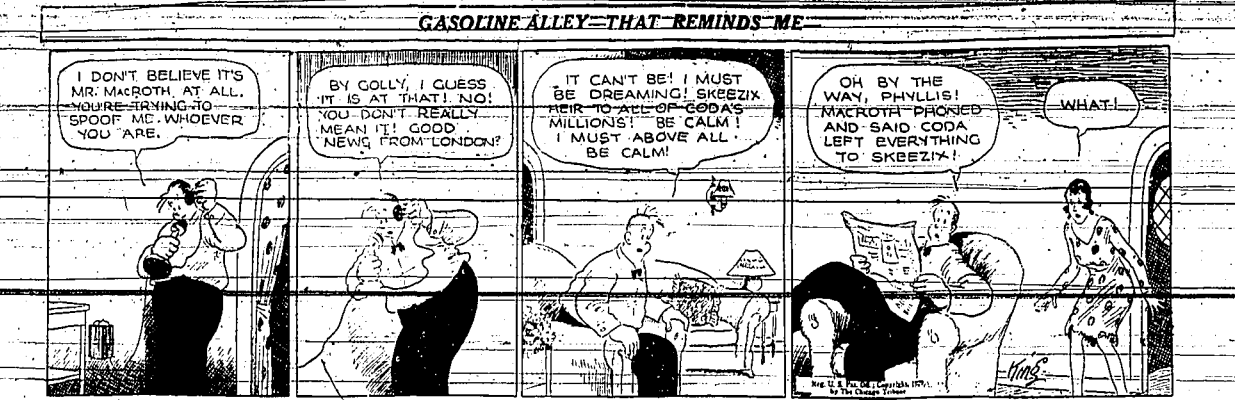

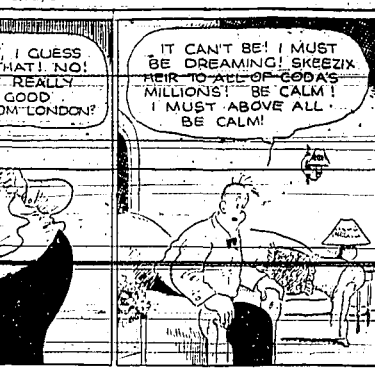

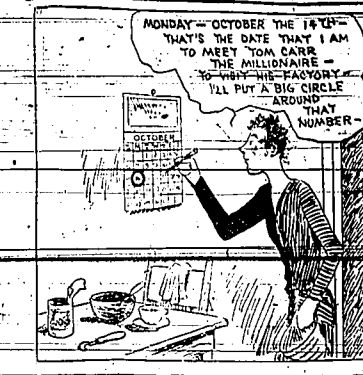
