MACDONALD CARRIES GOOD-WILL MISSION INTO NEW YORK CITY

Thousands of Persons in Three Audiences Listen to Words of Prime Minister of Great Britain

By JAMES L. WEST (Associated Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, Oct. 11—With spoken word and eloquent gesture, Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald carried forward today his mission toward tighter ties between the British and American peoples.

Thousands of persons in three audiences in this gateway to America and to countless others in homes on both sides of the Atlantic, his pleasing voice carried news of peace and good will.

The British statesman spoke first at a luncheon under auspices of the St. Andrew's society, the British societies and the English Speaking Union of the United States, next at a reception given in his honor by the English Speaking Union, and finally in a speech for delivery before the council of foreign relations at a dinner at the Ritz-Carlton hotel.

Points Out Nonsense Speaking directly to descendants of the British people at the noon day luncheon, the prime minister said it was "all nonsense" to challenge such American citizens because in a new country they are not citizens.

Recalling that Great Britain had its "Oregon Trail," he said that "we never could be a great nation made up from one strain."

He said: "We bring this diversity to the rest of America as a great part of our people to help to make that greatness still greater and finer in quality than it has hitherto been."

After this talk, the organ played "God Save the King" and the light rested on the British flag at the end of the room.

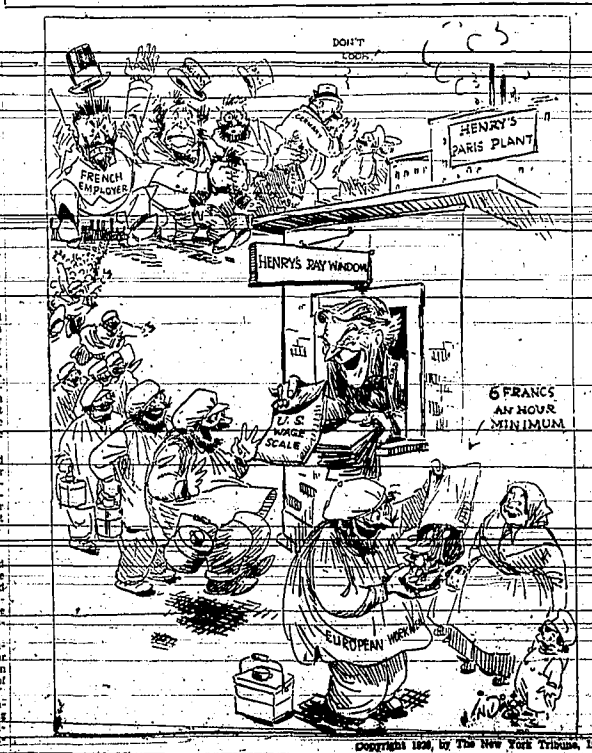

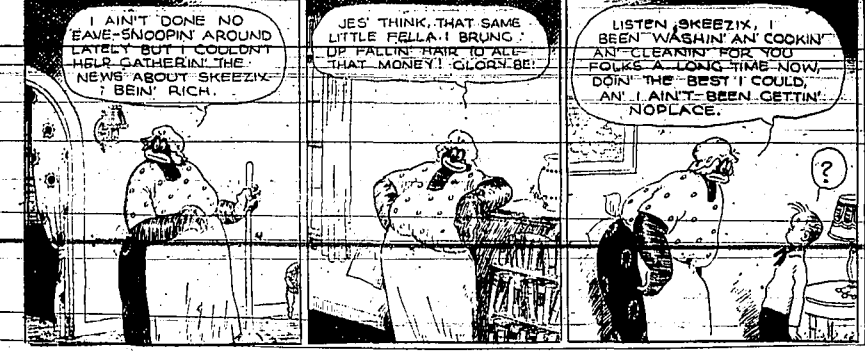

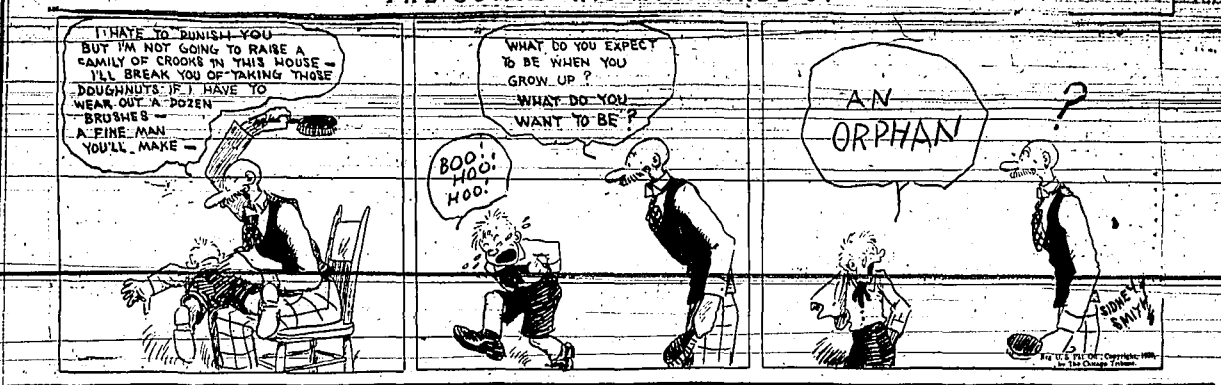
