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STRIKE OF DRIVERS OF TRUCKS SPREADS

New York City's 4500 Milling Stations May Become Involved in Controversy

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—The strike of the gasoline truck drivers threatened today to spread to the city's 4500 mill stations.

Announcement was made at Local 553 of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters and Chauffeurs that 2000 of the nation's motor trucks—about one-third of the American fleet—organized for the American Federation of Labor, to enter their own strike tomorrow on a sympathetic strike.

The strike, which reached the stage of violence today, did spread in one unexpected direction. 60 Standard Oil subsidiaries drivers tried to take strikers' places going on strike themselves when refused a pay increase from \$15 to \$20 a day.

The violence today occurred in Brooklyn where anti-strike police as strikers attacked a truck loaded by substitutes. About 100 men joined the fray, armed with sticks and bottles, and someone fired three shots, wounding a bystander perhaps fatally. There was also a report that a child was run over by a motor truck in the confusion of the fighters and spirited away by the police. About 1000 strikers were taken to jail by the police.

STATE PLANS TO OIL ROAD OUT OF BOISE

Stretch of Oregon Trail From Capital to Mountain Home Will Be Improved

BOISE, Oct. 14.—Bids were called today by the state highway department for construction of a 22-mile stretch of standard highway on the Boise-Mountain Home stretch of the Old Oregon trail.

Completion of the job will bring a standard paved road condition to the stretch of the highway except that section between American Falls and Burley. The project has been in preparation by the department for several months but was held up owing to unavoidable delays in obtaining right-of-way and the state now requires more federal aid money.

The work calls for grading and surfacing the present road, widening it on the present road between Mountain Home and Cleft. The section between Cleft and Regan will follow a new location, widening the present road and saving two miles in distance. It is planned to have both jobs open to traffic early in 1930.

Due to heavy traffic on this stretch the roadbed will be 28 feet in width with gradual side slopes, and will have a 25-foot surfacing. A ballast of 100 feet will permit later widening.

# Thomas Deals Return of Fish Taken From Idaho Waters

## Game Warden Seeks Repayment Of Bass Seized By Deputies

**Gem State Official Asks That Neighboring State Use Own Product in Repaying 200,000 Fishes**

(By The Associated Press)

BOISE, Oct. 14.—A. B. Thomas, state game warden, today demanded that Washington fish and game authorities take fish from her own waters instead of Idaho waters to repay this state for 200,000 bass taken last week on the Idaho side of the Snake river.

The demand was made on Sam Hathorn, Washington state game warden, after Warden Thomas had been advised that the Washington authorities were replacing fish taken last week from Idaho sloughs, by seizing those very same waters.

The action of the Washington game officials last week in seizing 200,000 bass from the Snake river in Idaho brought on the arrest of three of the Washington game deputies and seizure of considerable equipment. This was later released through Thomas as declared he had not ordered such a release.

In settlement of the affair, the Washington officials promised to return the fish which they had taken to stock Washington lakes. When they began seizing the fish from Idaho waters, however, Thomas made a protest.

Suits for crop damages from the Salmon River Canal company will not be tried at the present term of district court here. It was determined yesterday when counsel for the canal company offered amendments to the amended answer for the company. In the suit wherein C. W. Rayburn and J. M. Kirkman are suing for \$2543 damages for injury to a crop of 50 acres of beans alleged to have been caused by the canal company's failure to deliver water to which they claim they were entitled during the 1928 season. This is one of a number of similar actions. It had been set for trial yesterday.

The canal company's answer was amended to meet an objection raised in another suit brought by Rayburn and the canal company had not exercised reasonable care and diligence in delivery of water. The canal company denies any liability for payment of the damages claimed. Alleging among other things that claimants failed to keep their ditches clean and in condition to receive water and that they had knowledge that their lands were at the extreme end of the Salmon River project where water was most difficult.

The jury was excused by agreement of counsel and the suit of W. H. Turner against A. D. Sartwell was tried before Judge Hugh A. Baker yesterday. In this action Turner seeks judgment on a \$1000 promissory note executed some time before Sartwell entered bankruptcy proceedings from which he was recently discharged. Turner alleges that he had no notice of the bankruptcy proceedings. The court took the case under advisement at the close of the hearing in which Turner was represented by J. H. Barnes and Sartwell by E. L. Rayburn.

## IDAHO SOLON COMES IN FOR CRITICISMS BY UTAH STATESMAN

Borah Tells Smoot No Man in Calm Moments Could Be Expected to Decide Without Long Discussion

By D. HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Factional leaders in the senate tonight dispute to day accused each other of holding up the measure in party chieftains sought an understanding to speed debate so the issue might be disposed of at the special session.

Chairman Smoot of the finance committee, in a formal statement, characterized as "preposterous" the "constant efforts of Senator Borah, representing the opponents of the bill, to place the responsibility for the slow progress on the majority members of the committee."

Replying to the committee chairman, a leader of the 46-republican-independent group in the senate, said a question of justice as well as delay was involved in the present situation. He contended it was "immature how long it takes to settle that end of a question so long as it is settled, it is settled."

Utah Irritable Borah said the Utah senator perhaps felt irritable about the progress being made with the bill, but added no man in his calmer moments could have proposed a bill like that reported by the finance committee majority could pass without prolonged discussion.

The committee could have framed a bill that could have gone through within a short time," he contended, "but this bill was framed to defeat of the interests of the people, save a few special interests."

The Smoot-Borah exchange came in the midst of factional conferences looking to an arrangement to facilitate action on the bill, which President Hoover would like to see passed and out of the way before the regular session in December.

The first of these parleys brought together Chairman Smoot and Senator Watson, Indiana, the Republican leader; Robinson, Arkansas, the minority chairman and Simmons, North Carolina, ranking Democrat on the finance committee.

No formal agreement to speed action either by Smoot, since at the night sessions was reached, but a step toward an understanding to eliminate all possible delay is understood to have been taken.

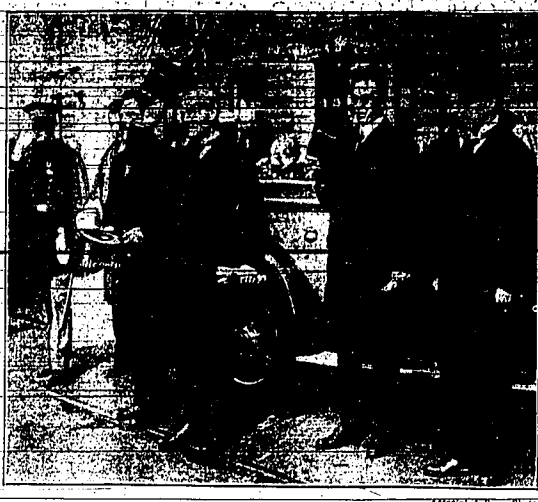

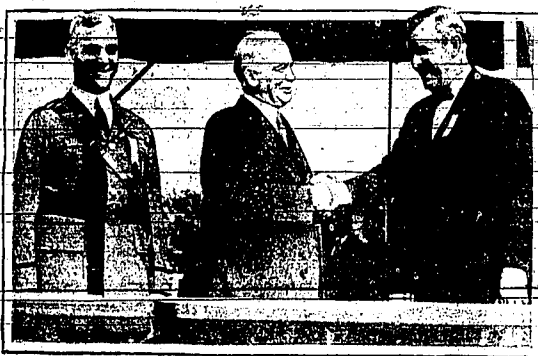

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### COMPANY ERECTING BURLEY MEAL MILL

Plant to Furnish Feed-Four Stock at Sugar Factory Yards Nears Completion

BURLEY, Oct. 14 (Special to The News)—In preparation for feeding large numbers of livestock at the feed yards at the local sugar factory this fall and winter, a heavy-duty mill-meal plant has been erected by the Portland Feeder company.

The frame and woodwork has been completed, a motor is now installed in the tower, and the machinery shafts are now being finished. The mill is equipped with 42-inch cylinder, having capacity of five tons per hour, and having a large and capacious for delivering bag from two wagons at a time. The ground meal is delivered to the tower from the grinder by a blower, where after being mixed with molasses from the sugar factory it is released into a bin having a capacity of 100 tons or more.

The equipment is mounted on a concrete foundation, including carriers for uniformly distributing the feed into the storage bin, and pipes for distributing heated molasses.

Feed wagons can drive into a passageway under the bin, where they are filled with the treated meal by gravity. The wagons are then driven along the passageway separating the various feedlots where the meal is fed into feeding troughs. Besides the syrup covered alfalfa meal, feed corn, sugar beet tops, as well as ground barley, chopped raw potatoes, stock carrots with tops on, and natural length alfalfa hay.

### 15 VARIETIES OF WHEAT IN CASSIA COUNTY TEST

BURLEY, Oct. 14 (Special to The News)—Fifteen varieties of dry land wheat were planted in two widely divergent dry farming localities in Cassia county Friday, by County Agent W. N. Palmer, accompanied by A. E. Stetson, county superintendent of the Aberdeen sub-station. This is in continuation of a series of dry farm experiments that have been carried on here for two seasons.

Wheats drilled in these variety plots were Kentucky, Turkey 103, Sherman, Garkov, Hussar, Crimean, Argentine, Marshall Royal, Oro, Moscow, Hesperia, Kaured, Albert and Gold Can. Of these varieties, the two first named, Karnout and Turkey 103, seem to be proving the heaviest yielders in the Cassia uplands. They are followed by yielding qualities by the two next named, and Sherman gives evidence of being most exceptionally small resistant. Pluto, chairman, said that the wheat sown in the first plot, showed no sign whatever this season. Oro also seems to be showing up as a fairly good yielding wheat.
