Members of the jury, at the inquest held in the Drake funeral parlors, heard the testimony of nine witnesses, including five persons who saw the crash and listened to a voluntary statement by Henry Schultz, Arpin, Wisconsin, driver of the car that struck Custer's machine as it was passing into the driveway at his residence.

Answers Seven Questions

The jury then made answer to seven questions propounded by E. W. Logan, prosecuting attorney. These are the questions and the jury's answers:

1. What was the name of the person killed? B. C. Custer.
2. When did he come to his death? About 8 P. M., October 17, 1929.
3. Where did he come to his death? Twin Falls county hospital.
4. By what means did he come to his death? A wound inflicted on the head as a result of an automobile collision.
5. Was the death of the person killed accidental? Yes, accidentally.
6. If death was accidental by the act of another, was it occasioned by criminal means? No.
7. If death was occasioned by the act of another, by criminal means, who is guilty thereof? No one.

The verdict was signed by all members of the jury—A. E. Dicke, George Parks, A. O'Brien, H. H. Mueser, C. W. Muro, C. W. Taylor, W. A. Thompson, Lester C. Walker and Denver Hanson.

Traces Cause to Injury

Evidence at the inquest indicated that the head wound which caused Mr. Custer's death was the result of a blow inflicted by the impact against a handle on the inside of the door of the field truck of the car, with such force as to make a break off the handle and fracture the skull at the right temple.

Witnesses were Dr. John F. Campbell and Dr. George T. Hatcher, who described Mr. Custer's injuries; Mrs. J. B. White, George Davison and Harry Lane, who witnessed the crash; Ralph Allen, Arpin, Wisconsin, and Carl Berg, Kimberly, Minnesota, who were riding
