

Biggest Excavation Machinery Ever Brought Into Gem State Removes 1,500,000 Cubic Yards Of Earth And Rock For Gooding Project Canal

Contractors at Work on 44 Miles of Ditch for United States Reclamation Office

Government to Issue Invitations for Bids on Construction of Additional Stretch of 15-Miles-in-Length Equipment for Digging Channel Includes Drag-Line Used in Building Levees on Mississippi

(By The Associated Press)
BOISE, Oct. 19.—A million and a half cubic yards of earth and rock have been clawed out of the big Gooding project canal and some of the biggest excavation machinery ever brought into Idaho is pressing the work forward, a report to the state department of reclamation indicated today.
Contracts are now being let in effect on approximately 44 miles of the big ditch and it is expected that invitations for bids on another stretch of 15 miles will be issued soon.
The canal is being built by the United States bureau of reclamation, under an agreement with the American Falls reservoir district No. 2, to convey water from American Falls reservoir to the relief of the Wood river project which has suffered recently from shortage of water during the last few years.
The canal will drop water into the Little Wood river and one of the main canals of the Big Wood river system. In effect it will about divide this project in such way as to give of the Big Wood river water to the upper section in exchange for the Snake River water which will be poured out on the lower section.
The total area of irritable land under the big canal is about 50,000 acres. Other lands in the Wood river valley will also be benefited.

CATTLE OF COUNTY AGAIN PASS TESTS

Federal Department of Agriculture Extends Tuberculosis Free Rating

Twin Falls county's cattle again have met requirements for federal department of agriculture rating of the county as a "modified free accredited area of tuberculosis" according to advice received at the office of the county commissioner, and county veterinarian agent through Dr. W. A. Sullivan, Boise, federal veterinarian.

This rating implies that cattle in this county are virtually free from tuberculosis.

The new tests included 3440 cattle in 137 herds and disclosed only three animals that reacted to the tuberculosis test.

The original tests three years ago took in 25,302 cattle in 2861 herds and disclosed 27 reactors.

During the interval between the tests, official tests were made at the instance of owners of 3991 cattle in 234 herds, showing 20 reactors.

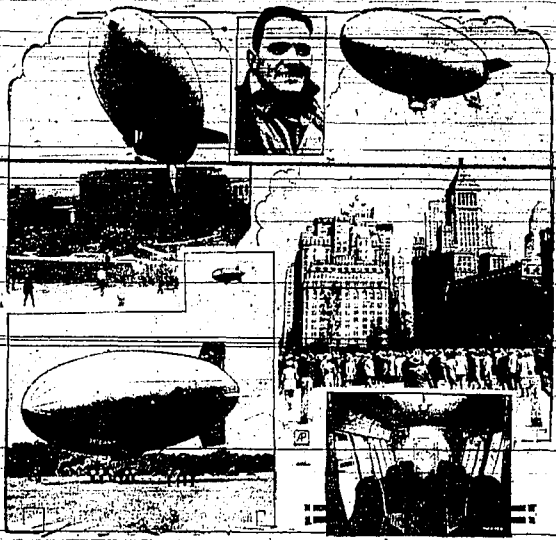
SIX NON-RIGID SHIPS PREPARE AMERICANS FOR MODERN TRAVEL

Pilgrims, Oldest of Group, Flies With 60-Horse-Power Engine
Non-Inflammable Helium Fills Dirigibles' Bags
Comfortable 10-Passenger Cabin-On Defender, Newest Craft

AKRON, Ohio, Oct. 19.—The little fleet of blimps of the Goodyear company is credited with doing much to promote the cause of lighter-than-air flight. Single and in groups, the non-rigid dirigibles are preparing thousands of Americans for the day when aerial cars filled with passengers and freight are the rule.

They are the only craft dirigibles in the United States and the only ones which may fly unhindered by governmental regulations.
The blimps, named for the Lipson crop defender in aerial racine, are the Pilgrim, Puritan, Volunteer, Mayflower, Vigilant and Defender.
Pilgrim Smallest
Smallest and oldest of the fleet is the Pilgrim. It is 110 feet long 21 1/2 feet of beam and carries three persons. It is driven by a 60-horse-power engine. Its capacity is 55,000 cubic feet.
The Puritan, Mayflower and Vigilant the latter three launched this year, are of 85,000 cubic feet capacity and have two 100-horse-power engines.
Newest and largest is the Defender, launched this fall. Its spacious, comfortable cabin seats 10 persons including two pilots and two mechanics. Two 125-horse-power engines drive it.
To demonstrate their maneuverability the ships have landed on buildings, in wide streets in Washington, Cleveland and other cities, and have made contact with ocean-going vessels.

Use Helium Gas
All are filled with non-inflammable helium gas. Being of the non-rigid type they depend upon the pressure of the helium to maintain their shape. There is no internal bracing. Within the large gas bag is a smaller bag filled with air to take care of the expansion and contraction of the gas.
When hot weather makes the gas ex-

and, air from the inner bag is released making it unnecessary to valve out the excessive helium.
The pilots form an unusual group being the only commercial lighter-than-air pilots in the country. Dean of the group is Jack Boettner, veteran balloonist and airplane pilot. He has had 1700 hours in the air as an airplane pilot and more than 400 hours in free balloons. He has participated in three national balloon races and one international competition.

Hazards of Deer Hunting Grounds Like Those of Bullet-Swept Battlefields

Deer hunting grounds in Twin Falls range of about three hills—that is, well-kept and well-wooded. Hazards on the hunting grounds, the sheriff asserted, will be increased by the score of the fact that many inexperienced hunters, carrying high-powered rifles, will be about bent on bringing down deer, and that, through mistake, deadly bullets may find other targets.

The sheriff related an incident lately brought to his attention. A miner in Nevada, he said, was fired upon three times when he wheeled out a load of rock from the tunnel where he was at work. The first bullet whizzed over the miner's head, the second buried itself in the ground nearby, and he shouted a warning. The third bullet tore through the miner's shoulder. His fellow workers carried him 12 miles on a stretcher to the nearest doctor.

In order to avoid mishaps of that nature, the sheriff repeated advice often given hunters—be sure of what you are shooting at before you fire.

"Triple mishap on the hunting field, he remarked, brings pleasure in hunting to an end for a long time—one who is killed and the other who unintentionally takes life and threatens others' names of remorse continuing throughout his lifetime.

In the interests of self-preservation, the sheriff advised every hunter to provide himself with clothing of red or other bright color, and, if nothing more, to tie a red bandana handkerchief over his hat.

Bull Man On Exciting Bear Hunt In Salmon River Region Mountains

An exciting bear story of the Idaho wilderness was told by Herbert Brown, freight conductor on the Oregon Short Line who runs through Twin Falls, and who recently returned from a deer hunt in the Salmon river country, on which he was accompanied by Harry Wilson, Albert Kelly and P. C. Meredith, all of Mercedille, Deloit, and Oregon Meredith, Las Angeles, and on which they got several deer and two bears.

**FARMERS OF IDAHO
USE EXCESS LABOR
IN HARVEST SEASON**

Employment Survey Shows
Industries Active With
Shortage of Field Work-
ers For Large Beet Crop

(By The Associated Press.)
BOISE, Oct. 19.—A survey of employ-
ment during September and early October, the
monthly industrial employment survey of the
department of labor said today. Harvesting of

riously hampered on account of the forest
fire hazard are gradually resuming nor-
mal proportions.

The railroad shops worked full time
with full forces engaged. An increase in
the freight train service forces came in
October. The supply of railroad labor
was barely equal to the demand at the
close of September.

Many Workers Harvesting

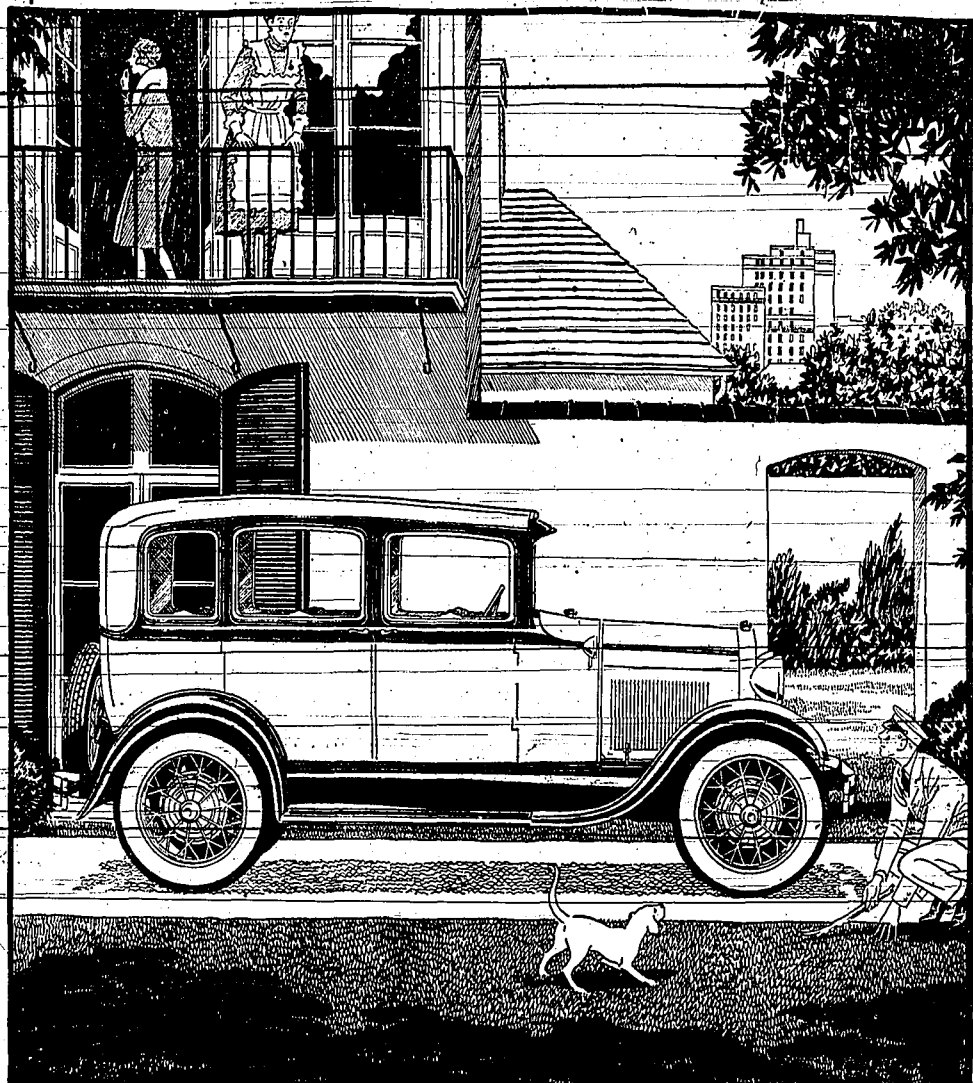
In the Pocatello district harvesting of

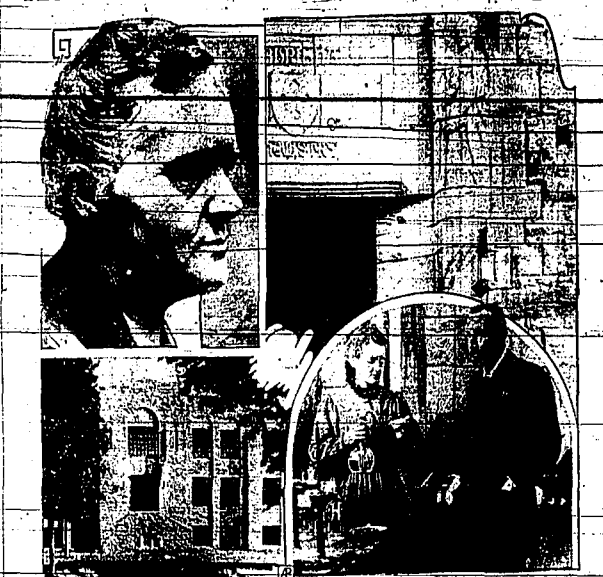

Madame Curie Will Spend Birthday At White House in National Capital

NEW YORK, Oct. 19—Madame Curie will celebrate her sixty-second birthday in the White House as the guest of President and Mrs. Hoover, and receive there \$20,000 as birthday gift from her American admirers.

The world's premier woman scientist, co-discoverer with her husband of radium, will celebrate her birthday on Nov. 7, and friends in the secret hunt that Madame Curie is arranging her homecoming for as soon after her birthday party as possible.

On tomorrow she goes to Detroit with Owen D. Young, who will be her American host—conducting a considerable part of her stay. The next day she is scheduled as a guest at the Ford celebration

in honor of Thomas A. Edison's sixtieth birthday.

Two days later she is to be welcomed to Schenectady by Mr. Young, and there visit the great scientific laboratories of the General Electric Company.

On October 25 she will motor with Mr. Young to Lawrence University, Canton, New York, of which he is an alumnus. There she will receive an honorary Ph. D. degree. On the twenty-sixth she will dedicate the university's new chemistry laboratory, Heppburn hall, given by Mrs. A. Barton Heppburn. On one side of the entrance, carved in stone, is a likeness of Madame Curie. At this dedication she is expected to make her only American speech.

Following again with Mr. Young she will return to New York by October 28,

with the Hoover visit ahead. Mrs. Hoover's American committee there made gifts to Madame Curie. The first was a gram of radium, then costing \$10,000, presented by President Harding. The second was an income of \$5000 to relieve her of comparative poverty.

She gave the dose of the Guide Institute of the University of Paris; the second she used to "rent" radium from the Cancer Hospital of Warsaw, Poland, her native city.

This time the gift will be either radium or a check for its present price. The donors await Madame Curie's wishes before deciding.

BRAINS HERITAGE NOT DEVELOPMENT

"Intelligence Not Gained by Attending College," Declares Noted Physician

HAMILTON, N. Y., Oct. 19 (AP)—Brains are a matter of heredity, says Bernard A. Laird, director of Colgate university psychological laboratory.

Physical differences are as nothing compared with the enormous differences that may be found in mentality, Dr. Laird says.

"Brains do not seem to improve one's regular equipment of brains," he added. "Children who are found by tests to have a little less than the usual modicum of brains in the first grade are still a little behind the average when they are in the fifth grade, and in case they reach the eighth grade, they still test a little below."

"Intelligence is not increased by going to college. Neither is it a chance affair. Parents with brains much above the average have children with brains much above the average. Brains seem to be quite definitely inherited, just as eye color, stature, or temperament."

"If education does not improve intelligence, what makes college men successful? Of hundreds of men tested in the army mobilization, the average score was 65. After the war the same test was given to a large number of students entering college for the first time. The average score by these freshmen was 150. This does not mean that the college freshman has twice as much intelligence as the army man, since the army score does not start with zero intelligence. But this difference does mean that the ordinary college man is much better equipped than the ordinary man of the streets."

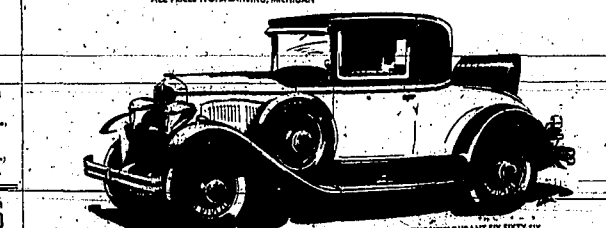

FEATURE FLASHES FROM FAR-FLUNG FOREIGN FIELDS

Nationalist Government In China Encountering Trouble In Abolishing Old Customs

Peasant Population, Unable to See Reasons for Discarding Ancient Habits and Religious Practices of Forefathers, Revolt When Police Remove Idols from Temple

By MORRIS J. HALLIS (Associated Press Correspondent) SHANGHAI, Oct. 19.—China's Nationalist government is encountering more difficulty than it bargained for in carrying out its plans to abolish certain ancient customs which it considers obstacles to the modernization movement.

In Canton the "Society for the Changing of Old Customs" is making headway, particularly in a campaign against the yearly custom of having married women pay expensive homage with seven payments and dress to the authorities there have warned shopkeepers not to stock up for this festival next year.

Peasants Hinder Police But the peasant population, unable to understand why they should discard habits and religious practices that were good enough for their forefathers since time immemorial, are taking things into their own hands in many instances, much to the chagrin of the police.

One of the latest customs to occur a few weeks ago in a Shanghai town, known as Yang-Hang, a suburb town in the cultural center of Shanghai district. The disorder resulted from an order by the Nationalist government that all temples and idols in the district should be destroyed. The order was carried out by the police until they arrived at the temple "An Fa-tai" a place of worship used by Yang-Hang for centuries. It happened, too, that the police arrived just as the peasants were celebrating the festival of several new idols. Money for this had been furnished by a wealthy woman of Canton.

Police Seize Idols When the police arrived the seven idols, both new and old, and arrested those responsible for repairing the place. The peasants, fully aware of what had happened, the police seized the idols and were locked up in the police station. A general alarm was sent out to the surrounding country and hundreds of farmers joined the villagers. There was a hurried conference, then the mob moved on the police station broke open the cells, released the temple officials and relieved their precious idols.

After the images had been put back in the temple, the mob tried to storm the residence of the town's leading official, an official who owed his place to the Nationalist political party. The Nationalist help had to come from neighboring villages before the police could disperse the mob and save the official from violence.

Use Old Calendar Aside from religious observances, there are other old customs to which the Chinese are clinging to with tenacious fingers. The ancient lunar calendar is still in use, although ordered abolished in 1912. In the western world, several months ago, many vernacular newspapers still use the old calendar and in Canton the customs clerks have started a campaign against such publications. Nevertheless scarcely a week passes without some fresh evidence of the awakening of the ancient land of the lotus. This is especially noticeable, of course, in the ports and railroad centers where western civilization has made its greatest inroads. For example, in Canton the sign "Specialists in Women's Hair Cuts" has become a common sight. The largest establishments tried to vary it and put out a new sign-board which proclaimed in letters two feet high: "Mere Females' Hair Dressing Parlor."

LIVING COSTS HIGHER IN FRANCE THAN IN AMERICA

PARIS, Oct. 19.—The Frenchman has to work twice as long as the American to buy the same food, says a French labor investigation. An analysis of the newspaper, l'Oeuvre, is the real proof that the cost of living in France is higher than in the United States. A long table of costs is presented by Henri Durell, an official of the French Federation of labor in a book he wrote after working in American factories. "This table shows that a quart of milk costs the French worker 22 minutes of his time, while the American worker needs only 11 minutes to do the same thing. Durell shows the Frenchman has to work from one and a half to six times as long as the American for the same thing. The Frenchman gets his living quarters for half the amount of work, but what a difference in the kind of lodging," says the newspaper, comparing the homes of American workers with those of the French workmen. It is accompanied without badgering, telephone, or steam heat, and frequently without running water.

Frost First Appears In High-Points-of-Rockies

Freezing Temperatures Hit Parts of Idaho in Late-Summer

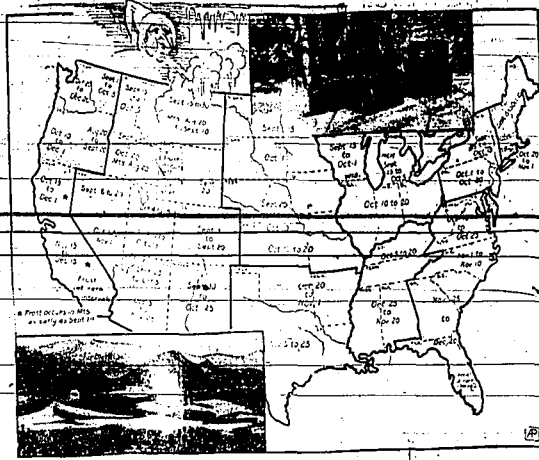
(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Oct. 19 — The schedule on which Jack Frost and the coming winter may be expected to move southward across the United States is charted on a frost map made from United States weather bureau records of the last 50 years. The map is compiled by the American Automobile association as a guide to motorists and aviators on when to be prepared for freezing weather.

Rockies First
Frost's initial appearance is in the high elevations of the Rockies. It arrives about August 20 in some parts of high Montana and Idaho, while the upper reaches of Wyoming have no frost-free months.

But for the lower altitudes of most of the United States, the frost crystals come over the Canadian border, between September 15 and October 1. Up along the Maine coast for 50 years frost has come about mid-September, but from Chicago and western Kansas is a whole month's delay, the average frost date being October 20.

The Gulf stream not far off shore probably accounts for this abrupt change. Some of the New England south shores rank in late-October of frost with the Cayman coast, and parts of Tennessee, Oklahoma, Arkansas and northern Louisiana, where late October is the likely period. In the east-west belt of the middle United States there are few places, except high elevations, where frost is due before October.

Coldest in America
Theoretically an Arctic heat not leave his own country to find temperatures lower than the north pole's known extremes, which Stockholm, the coldest

...says probably do not go beyond 60 below. Popular River, Montana, had its below January 1, 1855, the coldest record in the United States, and the extreme northern border of North Dakota occasionally reaches just under 60. It is not necessary to leave the United States to find temperatures virtually as hot as anything yet recorded on earth. The United States weather station in Death valley has a record of 124 degrees, which is exceeded only by a spot on the edge of the Sahara desert with 124.5.

NAVAL STORES MEN TO RESTRICT WORK

Conservation of Vast Natural Resource in Southeast Object of Movement

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 19 (AP)—Conservation of a vast natural resource in the southeastern states, the proposed curtailment of the production of naval stores, one of the most important and prosperous industries in this section of the United States. Georgia, Alabama, and Florida foresee an ultimate shortage in resin, turpentine and allied products, and 90 per cent of the operators of naval stores in this section have combined to plan a "restriction program" which will allow these basic products—the pine tree—a chance to catch up with production.

Development of the naval stores production in this country dates back 225 years. Colonists had scarcely landed on American shores before Great Britain encouraged them to look towards new fields for the production of tar and pitch. From the 400-barrel English export figure achieved by Jamestown colonists

almost a generation after the first settlers arrived, the naval stores industry has reached an annual dollar value, centered in the southeastern states, of \$60,000,000. Wide usage of the naval stores products in the whole range of manufactures, from ship-building to cosmetic confection account for the ever increasing demand.

Mustapha Kemal, president of the Turkish republic, has adopted as his son and given his name to a 12-year-old shepherd boy whom he recently talked with for a few minutes on the outskirts of this village on the Asiatic coast of the Marmora. BRUSSELS, Oct. 19 (AP)—Smoking is such an art in Belgium that contests have been organized to determine who is the greatest artist in handling Lady Nicotine.
