## SENATE REFUSES TO COMMIT TARIFF BILL TO FARM PRODUCTS

### Motion to Restrict Revision Goes Down to Defeat by Decisive Vote of 64-10 for Second Time

HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Oct. 21—After reading the bill, the senate refused to commit it to the tariff bill to limit proposed increases in duties to agricultural products. The senate agreed today to begin consideration of the controversial tariff schedule tomorrow.

It was the second time this session that the senate defeated a move to restrict tariff revision exclusively to the farmers' interests, although the first vote, taken last June on a proposal by Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, by a single vote—59 to 50.

The motion today was made by Sen. Thomas, Democrat, Oklahoma, who stated the pending bill represented a general revision instead of a limited one as recommended by President Hoover. Enactment of the measure would mean a declaration of "economic warfare" on the farmers of the country.

Both Democratic and Republican Independent members who voted with Borah, Jan. 10, took the floor against the Thomas proposal, arguing the coalition of the two parties had "betrayed" the farmers through double dealing in the contest over the administrative provisions and was in a position to "sell out" the farmers in the industrial rate schedules it felt would be brought about by higher duties.

### Leaders Dispute Claim

Republican leaders dispute the claim and contend the coalition will split when it comes to voting upon individual bills, retaining the wholehearted support of the voters today, as compared with those on the Borah resolution, Senator Brien, Democrat, Idaho, called for an immediate breaking off of relations with the Democrats with the Western Republicans.

The senate was "going through one of the greatest feuds in its history" and added the Democrats never could support a man in the White House who had changed their leadership. Senator Borah himself was announced as going against recommitment today.

Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, the minority leader, Senator Ross, Nebraska, and other Republican Independents, of the 10 who supported the motion were Senator Harris, Republican, Idaho; Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho; Senator McClellan, Democrat, and Frazier, Howell, McMaster, Nye, Pine, Schall and Waterman, Republicans.

Approximately 50 committee amendments and over 200 proposed changes by individual senators are pending on the tariff schedule. Several senators spent on the administrative provisions. Only six weeks remain for consideration of rates before the special session expires.

## Gifford Farmer Dies in Railway Crossing Crash

LEWISTON, Idaho, Oct. 21 (AP)—Walter McDowell, 45, Gifford farmer, was killed today as he drove his automobile into a gasoline passenger coach. Witnesses said McDowell drove his automobile into the Spaulding crossing, 12 miles east of here, stopping for a passenger train traveling westward, as it cleared the track. He drove his automobile into the path of a gasoline coach approaching from the west. The automobile was demolished and McDowell's back was broken. He died here in a hospital five hours later.

## Idaho Woman Victim of "Hit-and-Run" Driver

## GERMAN PLANE FLIES WITH 100 PERSONS

WALTENHOFEN, Switzerland, Oct. 21 (AP)—The giant Dornier plane Do-X today showed itself in greatest passenger-carrying capacity in the history of aviation by carrying 100 persons in flight for exactly one hour over Lake Constance. Almost directly across the lake is Hungary's chief city in air transportation, the Graf Zeppelin, which carried an average of about 60 persons in setting its round the world flight record.

The Do-X took off from the lake waters at 11:15 A. M. and its 12 motors, which have 1,000 horsepower, lifted the 91 tons easily. The weather was perfect and the motors functioned faultlessly. An altitude of 12,000 feet was reached and at the end the huge plane made a smooth landing that, those on board scarcely felt the jar.

Treaty Imposes Limitations. The plane was built here by Maurice Dornier because of the limitations on aircraft in the aviation treaty of Versailles. The flying-boat, which may be used for a trans-Atlantic crossing, was built in great secrecy and its flight had been made with it previously.

Its builders maintain that eight of its motors are sufficient to sustain it in flight. It is 150 feet up to tail and 150 feet from one wing to the other. It has three decks and can provide comfortable accommodations for 100 persons. Total crew of 100, including 159 passengers were carried and all had seats, although a bit crowded.

## GRAND JURY INDICTS ZION CITY OFFICIALS

High Officers in Municipal Government Will Answer For Shortage of Funds

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 21 (AP)—Indictments charging Alvin Keddigion, city auditor; R. N. Young, former city treasurer; Karl E. Williams, deputy city auditor; and William A. Brown, city dog tax collector, with felonies in connection with a shortage in the Salt Lake city treasury, were returned today by a county grand jury here this afternoon.

Young is charged in 11 separate indictments with embezzling public funds. Two indictments charge Keddigion with misappropriation of public funds and Colvin and Williams are charged in one indictment each with concealing a felony.

It was explained that they were charged with a shortage in the treasury of \$100,000. However, city treasurer found dead apartment after a check of his accounts had been started.

## BORAH DECLINES TO REPRESENT COUNTRY AT LONDON MEETING

Idaho Senior Solon Refuses to Comment on Decision Other Than to Announce Refusal of First Offer

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 21—General approval was heard in the senate today of the announcement by Secretary Bristow that Senator Robinson, Arkansas, and Reed, Pennsylvania, had accepted places on an American delegation to the London naval limitations conference. With assurance of a delegation of at least three men, headed by Mr. Stimson, it was expected that President Hoover will go along with this with the appointment of Charles D. Daves, ambassador to Great Britain. Hugh Gibson, ambassador to Britain, also is regarded as likely to be a member of the American delegation.

Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee, who declined an invitation to be a member of the delegation, gave no explanation beyond the statement that he did decline immediately when tendered the post. Senator Robinson is the Democratic leader, a member of the foreign relations and naval committees, and was the Democratic nominee for vice-president in the last campaign.

Senator Reed is a Republican member of the foreign relations committee and chairman of the military affairs committee, and served during the World War as an officer.

## ORCHID NURSERIES BRING \$2,500,000

More Than 135,000 Plants and 35 Acres Under Glass Involved in Transaction

NEW YORK, Oct. 21 (AP)—The subtle greed, always associated with wealth, today entered the "important money" class with the sale of two nurseries devoted to their growth for \$2,500,000.

These nurseries cover 30 acres at Bound Brook, New Jersey, on which 35 acres are under glass. They were started 22 years ago by Thomas Young and are sold by him to Selected Industries, Inc., and Rayburn Company, Inc.

More than 135,000 flowering plants are included in the Bound Brook sale and some of these specimens are valued at from \$100 to \$700 each. The extreme fact that seven years must pass before a plant produces a bloom accounts for their high market value.

## WIZARD RE ENACTS INVENTION OF LIGHT BULB 50 YEARS AGO

Detroit and Dearborn Acclaim Chief Magistrate On Ride Through Streets in Cold, Driving Rain

(By The Associated Press) DEARBORN, Mich., Oct. 21—President Hoover left Dearborn late tonight for an overnight trip to Cincinnati, where tomorrow he will dedicate a monument to mark the anniversary of the invention of the light bulb by Thomas Edison.

(By Raymond Z. Henle (Associated Press Staff Writer) DEARBORN, Mich., Oct. 21—Commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of the perfection of the electric lamp, President Hoover paid tribute here tonight to the tireless zeal and patience of this country's inventive genius that has lifted Detroit from the shoulders of the American people.

With the aged and eminent inventor, Thomas A. Edison, at his side, Mr. Hoover said every American owed this genius "no legal a debt for great benefits that have brought him to our kind; but also a debt for the honor he has brought to our country."

The ceremonies at which President Hoover, attended by the mayor and city officials, so dedicated the Edison Laboratory, the gift of Henry Ford, "Our scientists and inventors—our most precious national possessions," the president said. "It is no sum that the world could not give for the privilege of the originality of mind that devotion to industry to carry scientific thought into the practical world, which spreads to the comfort of every home."

Rides Through Driving Rain The speech came at the end of a day crowded by the progress of Edison's perfection of the lamp during, which the president had been accompanied by the chauffeur of Dearborn as he rode in an open automobile during a cold, driving rain. Edison, wearing his words over a coat-to-coat hooding of rain slickers.

Measuring the unselfish devotion which scientists give their work, the president said, "and all the profits of all the banks in the world can measure the contributions which these men make to the progress of our country."

"And they are the least interested in the monetary result," he added. "Their satisfactions are in their work itself, and in the knowledge of some atom of knowledge which will become part of the great mechanism of progress."

"Their discoveries are not the material for headlines. Their names are not mentioned in the papers. But their nation owes them a great honor and is proud to demonstrate through Mr. Edison today that their efforts are not unappreciated."

Witnesses Unusual Contrast Before Mr. Hoover spoke, he had witnessed an unusual contrast of circumstances that years can bring when he watched the now aging and distinguished inventor who had been the first lamp he did, a young, hopeful, ambitious but unknown inventor, 50 years ago.

Standing by the inventor in the same laboratory Edison used a half century ago, brought here by Ford, the president saw how the inventor had been fighting wires ushered in the age of light.

With Edison and President Hoover were Ford and Francis J. Hill, who, as a youth, aided the inventor with his experiments. They saw an old man, now lauded with the laurels of the world, deftly construct his lamp within a few moments which 50 years ago was thought being only a few days of patience, trial and error.

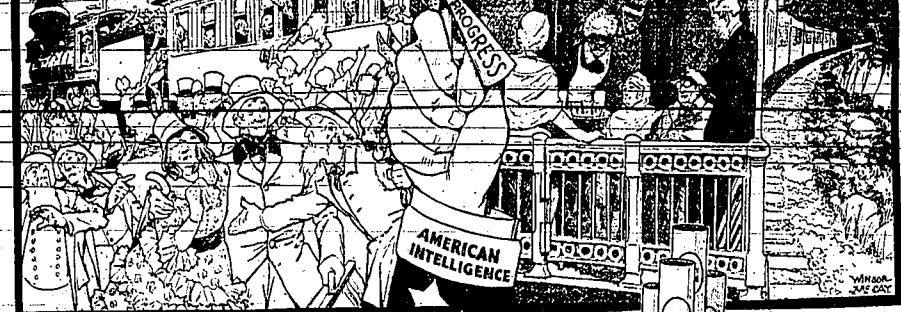

For eight rounds he could whip Davey because he couldn't hit him.

Singer demonstrates punches. Abad looked in tantalizing fashion from one end of the ring to the other while Singer threw every punch known to the trade as he rattled off a round after round. Singer never was perplexed as every hefty shot skidded off Abad's solid features or missed the mark by inches and sometimes feet. **COUNCIL VOTES TO  
EXPAND TWIN FALLS  
BUSINESS DISTRICT**

**Favorable Action On Petition Adds Half Block in East Quarter to Commercial Area Within Zone**

Twin Falls business district was extended by the city council in regular session last evening to include the southeast half of the block between Third and Fourth avenues and Second and Third streets east.

An ordinance adopted by the council for that purpose modified Twin Falls zoning regulations to that extent.

In this action, the council acted favorably upon a petition previously submitted by A. T. Reut, who is constructing a garage on a portion of the pro-

erty affected and by D. E. Magel of the Magel Automobile company.

Interval of one week was permitted to elapse after filing of the petition in order to permit other owners of property to file in the petition. One other property owner did so. A number of owners of property in the block are residents of Twin Falls.

The property placed by the action of the council in Twin Falls business district has heretofore been classified as residential property in the zoning regulations.

The property to be added is 14-14-15-16-20-30-31 and 32 of block 56.

**Holders File Applications**

Subject to the approval of the building inspector, the council last evening authorized issuance of building permits for the projects totaling \$16,150, including the Twin Falls Odd Fellows lodge proposed \$15,000 building on Third avenue.

In order to provide finances necessary for the next few weeks, the council by resolution authorized the mayor and clerk to issue \$100,000 in city bonds at five per cent and to be payable January 1, 1930. The resolution also authorized that the city may levy a tax of one cent on all property for the fiscal year that began last May but that these taxes are not payable until late this year and that state law permits issuance of the proposed tax anticipation notes. Such notes have been issued by the city each year

for several years.

Council ordered payments of bills totaling \$994, of which \$626 was for labor, \$142 for street sprinkling, and \$126 for laundry expense.

# Experimenters Rapidly Perfecting Home Television Sets

### NEWEST APPARATUS TO BRING PICTURES TO RADIO AUDIENCES

Device Soon to Go On Sale, Believes President of Company

New Invention Attaches To Broadcast Receiver

Observers of Tests Claim Reproductions Show Up Clearly

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Development of television to the point where it is hoped home reproducers may be available here in December is indicated in experiments now under way.

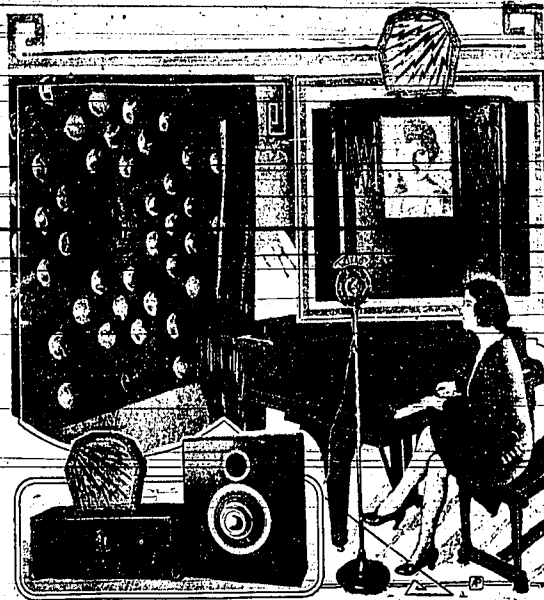
U. S. Sarnabria, young experimenter who has spent several years in an effort to improve transmission of light, and Professor L. F. Garner believe they have made progress which warrants a brighter outlook as to the time when television will begin to approach practicability.

Working in the laboratories of the Western Television corporation, which operates in conjunction with WIBO broadcast station, and W9XAO, short wave plant, they have used two wavelengths, the broadcast channel of 525 meters for voice and 146 meters for pictures—the smallest wave length through sound and light.

Their progress has led Clem Wade, president of the corporation, to express the belief that the reproducing apparatus they have designed for the home will be ready before the end of the year. He said it could be attached to any broadcast receiver, which is used to pick up the voice on a loudspeaker. It also brings in pictures on the short wave of 146 meters and reproduces them on a screen in the front of the cabinet.

The size of the picture received, the engineers said, ranged from an inch and a half square up to about 8 by 12 inches. They have copied pictures up to 21 inches square, but so far these have not been practical.

The screen is mounted on an adjustable extension arm, so that it can be moved back and forth in front of the lens to change the size of the received

The reproducer has the usual sound and television pick-up, a motor to drive the disk, a neon lamp and a lens.

Observers have reported that the pictures transmitted approach the clarity of good newspaper pictures, with little if any distortion. The experimenters have transmitted from the studio pictures ranging from closeups to full length, including ballet dancers, quartets, an eight-piece orchestra and amateur choirs.

The engineers said the width of their television band, generally considered 100 kilocycles for good detail, occupies less than half that space because of a specially designed scanner.

The television "microphone" for the pickup in the studio consists of a battery of photoelectric cells, a light source and a motor driven scanning disk. The experiment has been conducted in experiments for more than a year.

### Many Visitors to City

Similar reports from other sources lead to the belief that there were more visitors from outside the town on Sunday than on the preceding Saturday. At both the Orpheum and Idaho theatres standing room only was available a large part of the time.

# Japanese Waltzing Mouse Detects Deadly Gas in Mines

### ODD CREATURE FROM ORIENT NEWEST ALLY OF GREAT INDUSTRY

Experiment Station Finds Animals Better Than Canaries  
Benefactor of Laboring Men Incessantly Active  
Warning Signal Brings Apparatus Into Life  
Saving Task

By OSCAR LEIDING, Science Editor (Associated Press Feature Service)

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 19.—The Japanese waltzing mouse, odd creature from the Orient that dances its way through life, is the mine's new ally in detecting deadly carbon monoxide gas. Bundles of activity in fantastic and ceaseless motion, the tiny rodents have been found in tests at the Pittsburgh experiment station of the bureau of mines to be more responsive to the gas than canaries.

#### Birds Become Dull

The caged birds, which betray the presence of gas by becoming dull and stupified, are reticent in the service of rescuers who generate the earth's carbon dioxide after a disaster where carbon monoxide, tasteless, odorless and invisible, may live in the atmosphere as a constant source of death.

Rescuers carry breathing apparatus, but the supply of oxygen is limited and the atmosphere may be so saturated with the gas that it is dangerous to be present.

#### Limbs Weaken

In comparative tests with canaries, the mice showed response to carbon monoxide far in advance of similar tests in the birds. The signs were first manifested in a weakness of the hind limbs, in falling, and by a slowing down of the erratic movements.

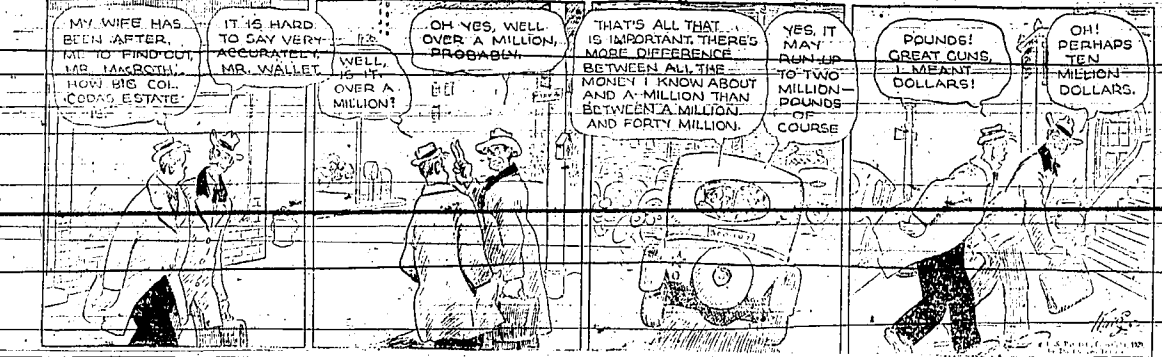
