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COALITION FACTION IN SENATE WIELDS HEAVY AX ON RATES

Western Independent Republicans and Democrats Alacrity Pointing to Rout of Administration

By B. HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—From success in important contests over the administration, the coalition faction in the senate fatigued today with an alacrity that pointed to a possible rout of the administration group.

Taking up the first rate schedule of the Hawley-Smoot bill that embracing chemical oils and gums, the senate accepted by a vote of 45 to 23 a Democratic amendment to cut to 18 cents a pound the existing duty of 20 cents on medicinal tannic acid.

Then, without record votes, it approved two amendments by Senator LaFollette, Wisconsin, which would give the Republican Independents, slanting the present levy of 8 cents a pound on potassium sulfate to 5 cents and the 12 cent rate on pyrogallol acid to 10 cents.

In all three instances, the senate finance committee had recommended elimination of house increases and restoration of present duties.

Approve 11 Reductions Eleven other reductions in house chemical imports were approved, but all on the finance committee majority.

In a general assault on the schedule preceding the votes, Senator King, prominent Utah and LaFollette, president of the big chemical corporations of the nation as a powerful giant that needed an additional tariff protection.

PEOPLE'S ARMY OF CHINA DEALS BLOW TO RULING FACTION

Atmosphere of Uneasiness Prevails Following Reports of Kuominchun's Advances Toward Hankow

(By The Associated Press) HANKOW, China, Oct. 22.—Nationalist government forces today were reported to have suffered a severe setback at the hands of the Kuominchun or People's army which has been threatening a descent upon Hankow.

Although it was generally quiet here there was an atmosphere of "nerves" in the city, it was noted here, however, were confident that the Kuominchun troops would not reach this city.

Dispatches tonight indicated that while the defeat was severe, it was not decisive, the Kuominchun forces were said not only to have broken the Nationalist lines, capturing Singchow in northern Hsuian, about 150 miles north of Hankow, but to have penetrated further along the Kiangnan railway capturing Yen-cheng, just towards Hankow.

The reports indicated that the Kuominchun had driven the Nationalist forces along an east and west line 100 miles south of the Lungyai railway. As the Nationalists were to have planned to assume the offensive, it appeared that the holders of Feng Yu-Hsiang, leader of the Kuominchun, had thus far out-maneuvered the Nationalists.

Communist forces were reported to include Hankow, Wuchow and Nanchang, and have been sent northward to assist in the effort to halt the Kuominchun. This action has left the region around Hankow devoid of troops.

French Cabinet Resigns After Internal Strife PARIS, Oct. 22.—The French cabinet, headed for the eleventh time by Aristide Briand, was overturned by the arrival of deputies tonight less than three months after it had appeared before parliament and asked for "a three-month truce" in internal politics in order to face the problems of the League of Nations conference which will convene at Geneva.

Air Mail Pilot Lands At Weiser Instead of On Salt Lake City Port

BOISE, Oct. 22.—One of the nation's most famous air mail pilots on air mail plane which manufactured by night flying was held here today.

John Holland Assisted By Senator Walsh, Montana, Will Probe Deep Into Upper Chamber Affairs

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Pretending to broaden its inquiry, the senate lobbying committee today employed a special investigator and attorney, John Holland, who assisted Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, in unravelling the Teapot Dome oil scandal.

The committee will extend primarily about the activities of the Atlantic Coast Fisheries corporation to secure a re-visit to the case on fish in the bill now before the senate.

F. W. Bruce, president of the corporation, said in that connection he had called upon Senator Bingham, Republican, Connecticut, a member of the licensing committee, who was "loaned" a paid officer of the association to assist in his share of writing the tariff bill.

Charles E. Caraway, that officer, and J. E. Hutchins, an employee of the association, will be questioned.

Chairman Caraway said Holland's report is to assist the committee in determining whether the fees collected from those whom it intends to investigate. He indicated that the committee intends to go more fully into the relations between those who employ lobbyists and members of congress.

GREENBRIER EN ROUTE TO LOUISVILLE, Oct. 22.—President Hoover's presidential party left Ohio to Louisville on his first little tugboat tonight to finalize with a speech in the Kentucky city the "rehabilitation" of the river. The Queen of Alfalfa Valleys 11 Irrigated Farms

Sale Will Be Held on the Steps of the Grand View State Bank

The Grand View Valley, in which these farms are located, consists of about 12,000 acres of low lying bench land along the Snake River, being on both sides of the river, partly in Ada County and partly in Owyhee County, Idaho. 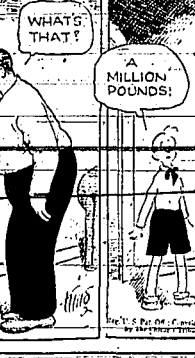

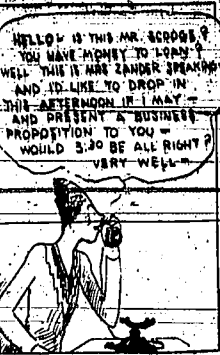

JURY'S FINDING FOR PLAINTIFF HELLMAN

Judgment Carries \$1000 Actual and \$500 Exemplary Damages in Old Dispute

At 1:55 o'clock this morning the jury in the case of Helman against Joseph Abbi involving claim of \$1500 damages for alleged malicious prosecution returned to the district court room to announce its finding for the plaintiff in the amount of \$1000 actual damages and \$500 exemplary damages. The suit, on trial for the last two days, went to the jury at 11:50 o'clock last night.
