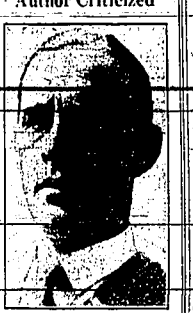

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# Idaho Educator Aids in Hoover's Child Welfare Survey

## PRESIDENT KELLY OF STATE'S UNIVERSITY SECTIONAL CHAIRMAN

Head of Common-wealth Institute of Plans After Attending White House Conference

(Special to The News) MOSCOW, Oct. 26.—First announcement in the West of what probably is the greatest survey ever attempted in the United States on child health and protection was made by Dr. F. J. Kelly, president of the University of Idaho, upon his return from Washington, where he returned from the White House conference on child health and protection. President Kelly was accepted as the chairman of the section on education and training in the national effort of at least 160 national authorities on child welfare.

The child welfare program is sponsored by President Hoover because of his personal interest in the field which he called together in Washington about leading authorities in the United States on various phases of child welfare and protection. These representatives have been assigned to a planning committee which outlined at a meeting late in the summer a general survey program to cover the entire United States. The various survey units will have several hundreds of thousands of dollars available to pursue their activities although none of the funds are from government sources. After the first report is made, which will be in the form of a summary, the committee will narrow the field to certain particular subjects to which major attention is to be given.

President Hoover first became interested in the field of child welfare, explains President Kelly, while he was in charge of the United States bureau of homes in Europe during and following the World war. President Kelly feels that it is his duty to be an ambitious authority on child welfare. "With this broad view of the general conditions he has instituted a program for children which is intended to be the most constructive and far-reaching ever undertaken and which should greatly improve existing conditions," says Dr. Kelly.

The purpose and program of President Hoover's conference is outlined as follows:—The purpose of the conference is to study the present status of health and well being of the children of the United States to report what is being done for child health and protection; and to recommend what ought to be done and how to do it. The procedure outlined by President Hoover calls for committees in the various fields to do the following: prepare information; compile reports; prepare recommendations for presentation to a general conference to be called when the work is completed.

President Hoover's personal interest in the movement was apparent when he called the conferences for the cabinet room of the White house. During the conference President and Mrs. Hoover entertained the 24 representatives at luncheon at the White House. Dr. Kelly is the head of the Mississippi asked to accept a committee chairmanship. His section—education and training—will have six sub-chairmen heading the following divisions: family and parent education; Louis Slane, chairman; child labor, John E. Anderson, Minneapolis; the school child, Thomas D. Wood, New York City; vocational education and child labor, Annie S. Davis, Chicago; recreation and physical education, Henry Breckenridge, New York City; special classes, Charles S. Berry, Appleton, Wis.

The committee headed by the University of Idaho's chief executive is now in the final stages of its work. At the head of Hoover's planning committee is Dr. Ray Lyman Young, secretary of interior and former president of Stanford university. Working with Secretary Wilbur on this organization are a score of nationally

## NORTH IDAHO SOIL ALONE NEEDS ADDITION OF LIME

MOSCOW, Oct. 26 (Special to The News)—The University of Idaho, in which need applications of lime are confined to the northern part of the state, reports C. R. McBride, soil expert at the University of Idaho college of agriculture experiment station, in answer to questions concerning the use of this soil for agricultural purposes. Representatives of the state experiment station have taken numerous samples of soil in the principal agricultural regions of the state. In the sections where the soils are well supplied with lime, the results are well supplied, with lime in some cases the lime content is excessive rather than deficient. The first indication of a need of lime is usually found in soils where clover and alfalfa cannot be grown successfully. The fact that difficulties are experienced in obtaining satisfactory results in the raising of such crops is a lack of lime as there are many other factors that will affect the growth of such crops. Farmers who are interested in the soil should confer with their county agent or write to the experiment station at Moscow, Idaho, for information in connection with soil tests and a need of lime for farmers supplying a need of lime in their soils, concludes the station soil technologist.

The state's claim was for back taxes on land growing out of transfer of the land to A. M. Wiker from the estate of his wife, Janet D. Wiker, 10 years ago. Owners of the land, suing to quiet title, claimed that they had paid and were not liable for the state taxes.

The state did not contest the action at hearing yesterday. The landowners were represented by J. J. Sweeley of Sweeley and Sweeley.

Twin Falls has a population of 10,821, according to the Commercial Rating Service. The estimate is stated in the latest edition of the Polk city directory for 1920-1921.

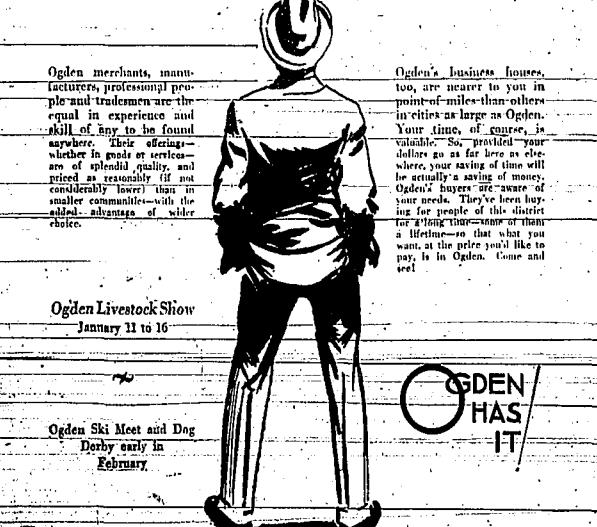

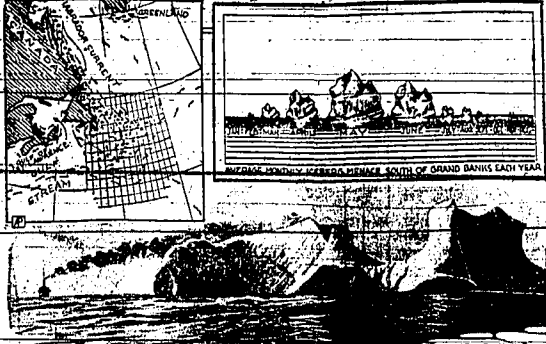
# Scientists Combat Iceberg Menace in North Atlantic

## STUDIES BY FEDERAL AGENCIES RESULT IN SAFETY FOR SHIPPING

### Frozen Masses Start Long Journey From Coast of Greenland

### One-Sixth of Big Blocks Above Surface of Water

Navy Hydrographic Office and Coast Guard Reduce Dangers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—The open season on icebergs is closing but a new crop of the frozen monsters is already on its way to menace next spring's north Atlantic shipping.

From Greenland's coast, where a thick ice mantle pushes its mass into the water, bergs are moving on a voyage of 1800 miles that will bring many into the lanes of commerce by early summer.

The menace will only be a gesture, however, because the icebergs are reduced to an exact science by the prevention of any recurrence of such disasters as that of the Titanic.

The agencies are the hydrographic office of the navy and the United States coast guard operations of an international ice patrol. Actual policing of the dangerous waters carried on by coast guard cutters.

It is through a scientific knowledge of ocean currents, based on years of study of such climatic factors as solar radiation, precipitation, melting ice, and tidal waves, that the ghostly frozen hulks have been tamed. The temperature and salinity of the water also have important effects.

Except in their advanced stages of melting, icebergs are so massive that they are almost completely unmovable. They are a deep sea draft and the forces controlling the drift, which take place beneath the surface of the sea.

Icebergs often tower 100 feet out of the water, unusual monsters having been reported that reached 200 feet above the surface. The greater part is below the waves, however. If an iceberg were a cube and of solid texture, only one-ninth of it would be in the open. An iceberg, made up of packed snow, exposes one-sixth of its bulk.

By October the menace is almost over, for only an occasional stray berg is reported off Newfoundland's grand banks. The criteria of the coast guard are usually whether the berg is a constant touch is kept with the situation by the hydrographic office through radio reports.

### Directors Find Work Progressing Rapidly at Reservoir at Jackson Lake

Work on raising the embankment at Jackson Lake to prevent overflow is progressing satisfactorily, it was stated here today by John E. Hayes, manager of the Twin Falls Canal Company on his return from an investigation of the river on which he accompanied W. H. Hatfield, D. B. V. Sharp, Flor, and J. P. Corbett, Twin Falls, members of the board of directors.

The top of the embankment which has been eight feet above high water mark is being raised three feet. Part of this increased height will consist of dirt. Other parts will consist of a stone wall three feet high. Work is also being done on the spillway.

So far this year there has been only slight snow on the high mountains. Last year at this time stormy weather prevailed. Work in progress is part of a three-year program. 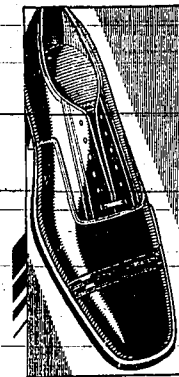

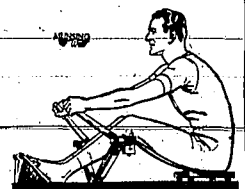

# Federal Farm Board Places \$100,000,000 at Disposal of Grain Cooperatives in Effort to Boost Price of Wheat

## RELIEF BODY MOVES SWIFTLY TO AID OF NATION'S PRODUCERS

### Commission Pledges Aid in Demanding More Funds of Congress if Necessary to Accomplish Objectives

(By The Associated Press)  
CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—The federal farm board placed \$100,000,000 at the call of the grain cooperatives today, pledged to aid in demanding more from congress if necessary, and gave its opinion that prevailing prices for wheat were too low.

While the new Farmers' National Grain corporation was perfecting its organization, Chairman Alexander Legge of the farm board, issued its statement of policy climaxing this week's final organization conference. His statement follows: "The federal farm board believes that based on known world supply, the present prevailing prices for wheat are too low. The board believes that this unsatisfactory price level is chiefly due to the rapid or disorderly movement which is putting a large part of the year's wheat supply on the market within a short time.

"The unprecedented liquidation of industrial stocks and shrinkage in values of wheat value which is entirely unwarranted and wheat producers should not be forced to sell on a market affected by these conditions.

### Urge Orderly Marketing

"The board also believes that the remedy lies in more orderly marketing. In order to assist wheat farmers to hold back their crop and at the same time have money with which to pay their obligations, the board proposes to loan wheat cooperatives, qualified as borrow-

ers under the Coppage-Vollmer act, sufficient to bring the total amount borrowed from all sources by such associations to the amount shown on the attached schedule. These loans will be carried on this basis until the close of the marketing season. The wheat cooperatives are now borrowing certain sums for advances to grain elevators, commercial banks, the federal intermediate credit banks and the farm board. The board will make similar loans to cooperatives in amount equal to the following price schedule, taking into account the economy differential:

- No. 1 white amber \$1.12 per bushel, basis Seattle.
  - No. 1 northern \$1.25 per bushel, basis Minneapolis.
  - No. 1 Durum \$1.12 per bushel, basis Duluth.
  - No. 1 hard winter \$1.10 per bushel, basis Chicago.
  - No. 1 red winter \$1.25 per bushel, basis St. Louis.
  - No. 1 hard winter \$1.15 per bushel, basis Kansas City.
  - No. hard winter \$1.21 per bushel, basis Galveston.
  - No. 1 hard winter \$1.15 per bushel, basis Omaha.
- This schedule is based on a grade price and does not take into consideration premiums for higher quality of wheat.

## GERMAN CURES DRUG HABIT BY SUGGESTION

SANATORIUM FOR CURING DOPE FIENDS WITHIN SIX WEEKS TO OPEN SOON IN GERMANY

HALLE, Germany, Oct. 26.—A sanatorium for the cure of dope fiends within six weeks will be opened shortly in Moesau Castle, between Halle and Lein, by Dr. Fritz Meyer who for 12 years was himself addicted to morphine.

Dr. Meyer, after 15 "unsuccessful" courses of treatment, claims to have been finally cured by psychoanalysis. FEATURE FLASHES FROM FAR-FLUNG FOREIGN FIELDS

Greater Tokyo, With Population Of Nearly 5,000,000 Persons, to Rank As Third Largest Of World Cities

City and National Authorities Planning to Incorporate 84 Towns and Villages with Capital and Bring Together 4,880,000 Citizens.

By GLENN BARR (Associated Press Correspondent) TOKYO, Oct. 26.—Greater Tokyo with a population of nearly 5,000,000 may claim third place among the world's great cities shortly. City and national authorities are studying plans for the incorporation of eighty-four surrounding towns and villages with the capital, to make an administrative unit of what is already an economic and transportation aggregation.

This would make that double Tokyo's present population of 2,120,000, crowded into the 15 original wards of the city with an area of only 31.3 square miles. Greater Tokyo would have 4,880,000 citizens in an area of 223 square miles, which is less than Los Angeles' 390 square miles. Greater London's 700 square miles or Greater New York's 299 square miles.

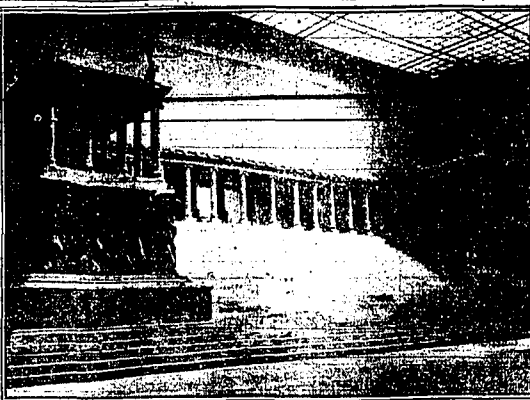
Regains Rank Japanese news-writers claim that Greater Tokyo would be the second largest city in the world, exceeded only by Greater New York, but they reckon without Greater London. Tokyo's present population of 2,120,000, crowded into the 15 original wards of the city with an area of only 31.3 square miles.

Greater Tokyo would include the nearby port of Yokohama with its half million population, although the intervening space is so closely built up that it is difficult to find open spaces between the two cities.

Greater Tokyo would move ahead of Berlin, Chicago and Paris, now ranked ahead of the Japanese capital, and would outdistance Osaka, Buenos Aires, Moscow, Vienna and Philadelphia, which hitherto have disputed sixth place with Hong Kong.

The altar, which was destroyed by a law suit instituted in the Berlin courts.

The theory is that the altar, which was reconstructed by the explorer Dr. Theodor Wiegand, is identical with what is referred to in Revelations II, 12, as the "seat of Satan" and that restored it to all concerned.

Irish Government Will Control Representation DUBLIN, Oct. 26 (AP)—A resolution of the constituents of the Free State for more equal representation in the Dail is being undertaken by the government.

According to the constitution the distribution of seats depends upon population, but the census of 1926 showed that 12 constituencies were over-represented while County Dublin has one member less than its rightful quota.

Trunk Line Between India and Indo-China One of First Results of Plan LONDON, Oct. 26 (AP)—Among the earlier results of the recent agreement concluded between France and Great Britain, wherein each nation agreed to help the other develop air lines in South America, Africa and the Far East, is a trunk line connecting India with Indo-China.

A French company plans a network of air routes connecting Calcutta, Rangoon, Bangkok, Saigon, Vinh and Plesau, which is near to the famous ruined city of Angkor, former capital of the Khmer Empire and one of the wonders of the world.

France and England are negotiating also about a line from Calcutta to Rangoon. French experts hope that England will agree to foreign operation of this vital link in the chain of empire communications.

Other plans visualize the extension of the line from Rangoon to Bangkok and northeast by way of Vinh to Canton and Hongkong and ultimately to Shanghai. Trial flights have already been made successful over part of the route.

This network, when completed, will combine with proposed extensions of the British Airways from India to Australia across the Dutch East Indies and will provide fast travel over large regions which are almost inaccessible by ground transport.

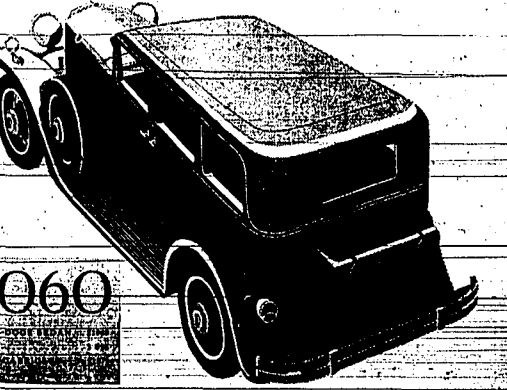

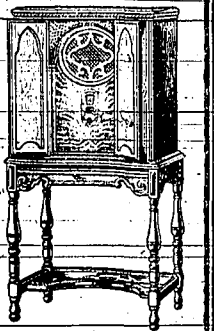

# 11 Irrigated Farms

**Sale Will Be Held on the Steps of the Grand View State Bank**

The Grand View Valley, in which these farms are located, consists of about 12,000 acres of low lying bench land along the Snake River, being on both sides of the river, partly in Ada County and partly in Owyhee County, Idaho. These farms are irrigated in part by a gravity canal, taking water from the Bruneau River and supplemented by pumping plant out of the Snake River. There is also pure artesian water. Grand View lies at an elevation of about 2500 feet above sea level. The weather bureau reports show that this is the warmest and driest area in the State of Idaho. Lying as the area does in a sheltered nook along Snake River, the locality is especially adapted to live stock feeding. Hence sheep and cattle in large numbers that during the summer graze upon the adjacent higher lands and mountain areas, are brought here for their winter feeding, thus affording a ready market for alfalfa at a price of \$2.50 to \$3.00 a ton more than prevailing prices. Land in Grand View Valley has produced as high as 9 tons per acre annually of finest alfalfa; barley, 98 bu.; oats, 90 bu.; wheat, 60 bu. Beans, corn, fruit, all grow profusely here.

## PARCEL NO 1. Famous Shoo-Fly 645 Acre Farm

This ranch is located about 3 miles east of the town of Grand View in Owyhee County, Idaho. At present there is about 450 acres under cultivation; the soil is a mixture of sand and lava ash, being an alluvial deposit about 40 feet thick, entirely free from rock; level land with a gentle slope towards Snake river on the north. **IRRIGATION:** This ranch has its own independent water supply, unlimited in quantity, from Snake river by means of a pumping irrigating system consisting of pump house, machinery, pipe line, canal and laterals. The pump house is equipped with two 250 h. p. motors and two 15-inch centrifugal pumps, each with a capacity of 700 miner's inches of water. One of these pumps and motors is a spare unit "standing by" for emergency use; initial cost of pumps and motors installed was \$9500. The appurtenant water right for the Shoo-Fly ranch embraces the pump house, all machinery, pipe lines and ditches comprising the irrigation work; on account of the gentle slope of the land, the irrigation requires a minimum of labor. Two men can irrigate the entire ranch and for considerable periods of each season, during the past few years only one irrigator has been necessary.

**FEED CORRALS AND LAMBING SHEDS:** At the upper end of the ranch, located on a 40-acre tract, leased from the state of Idaho; feeding corrals have been built sufficient to accommodate 1300 head of cattle and about one-fourth of a mile away from the cattle corrals, lambing sheds have been built sufficient for the accommodation of about 5000 ewes. These corrals and sheds were built to accommodate cattle and sheep, men who purchase hay at the ranch being glad to pay \$1.00 per ton more than prevailing prices in the vicinity. In these corrals are situated 2 of the artesian wells above mentioned with water piped to 4 concrete tanks. This warm artesian water and the dry, warm, sandy soil with excellent drainage make this site perhaps the best winter feeding quarters in the state of Idaho. At periods when most feed lots are knee-deep in mud, these corrals are dry and clean. The artesian water is also piped over to the lambing sheds. These improvements; sheds; feed racks; water tanks, fences, etc., represent an outlay of several thousand dollars and go to the lucky purchaser of the Shoo-Fly ranch. Actual crop sales were \$24,000 in 1928.

This ranch is capable of yielding over 3000 tons of finest alfalfa hay annually at minimum cost of production.

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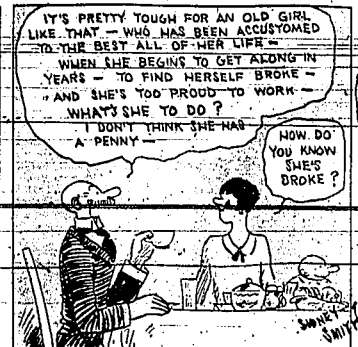
