COLLISION OF LAKE FREIGHTERS CLAIMS SEVEN MEN'S LIVES

Heroic Rescues in Third Major Lake Tragedy in 10 Days Keep Crew of 28 Off List of Casualties

(By The Associated Press) MILWAUKEE, Oct. 31 - Ploughing through a heavy fog, two lake freighters collided 20 miles off Port Washington today, sending one of them, the Senator, down with the probable loss of 28 on board.

With its crew split, the Marquette quickly began drawing water but was able to keep afloat until 10:15 a. m. when it sank. Captain W. F. Amesbury, skipper of the Senator, declined to talk with the Marquette.

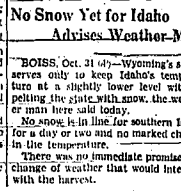

College of Idaho Football Team Slight Favorite for Caldwell Contest

**CALDWELL, Oct. 31 (Special to The News)**—College of Idaho Coyotes, after losing two Northwest conference football games in six meetings, are preparing for the game with Linfield college to be played here November 2. Coach Anse Cornell is noncommittal on the outcome saying "both teams will be fighting for victory, as neither has broken into the conference winners' column yet this season. Coyotes have a little edge according to dope. Linfield lost to Whitman college, 71 to 0, while the Coyotes lost to the Missionaries, 31 to 21. This gives the Coyotes a 31-point advantage over Linfield. On the other hand the 72nd team was trounced last week by Willamette, 42 to 0. Willamette is rated about 10 points better than the Pacific university team, which beat Linfield, 26 to 0, and this calculation would give the Wildcats a 12-point margin over the Coyotes. So it looks like anybody's game with a real fight promised. The game is called for 2:30 on the College of Idaho field.

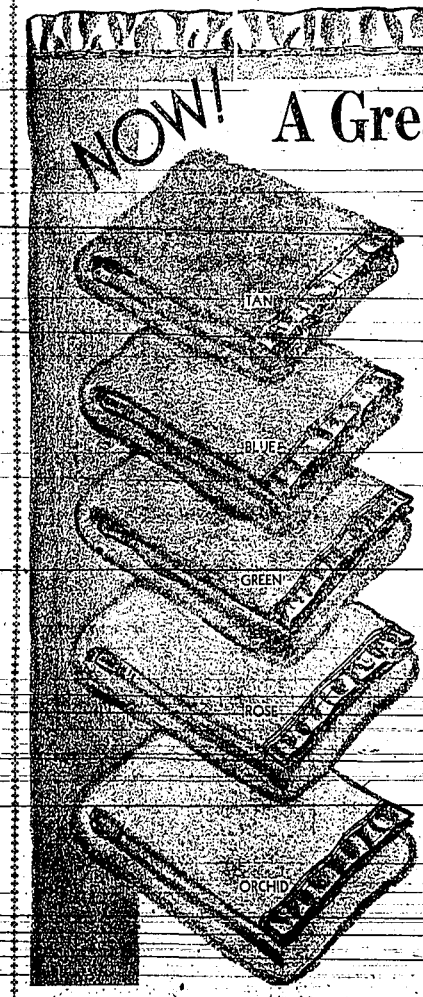

# Hoover's Plea For Action On Tariff Causes Storm

## COALITION REFUSES TO COMPROMISE ON REVISION MEASURE

Factional Leaders Characterize Chief Executive's Proposal as "Preposterous" and Not Possible

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (Special to the News)—The coalition of Senate Republican leaders agreed to pass the tariff bill in two weeks brought another storm in the senate today and characterizes the executive proposal as "preposterous" and "improbable" of execution.

The White House statement was issued shortly after Senator Watson, Indiana, the Republican leader, had made a final stand in the senate for resolution of differences and a speeding-up of action. He leaves for Florida tomorrow to rest.

This plea alone brought quiet and emphatic replies from Democrats and Republican Independents that there would be no compromise, that the coalition was in control of the situation and intended to write the type of bill it wanted.

At the storm over the president's statement subdued the senate was plunging along in its customary slow pace with hardly any hope of completing even a quarter of its work in two weeks time.

**Promise to Expedite Bill**  
Senator Borah, Idaho, and Senator Norris, Nebraska, leaders of the Republican Independents, and Senators Simmons, North Carolina, Walsh, Montana, and Harrison, Mississippi, minority chiefs, all promised to expedite the bill but warned that ample discussion would be required on many items.

The White House statement, the second to be issued from that quarter since the senate tackled the tariff, referred to conferences between the president and Senators Watson and McNary, Oregon, and Reed, Pennsylvania, all Republicans, and in which the senators pointed to the "grave situation that has arisen by delays in tariff legislation."

While some senators considered progress "hopeless," because it appeared to them that the coalition intended to delay or defeat legislation or did not intend to give adequate protection to industry, the statement said others felt that "some understanding" should be attempted to speed the measure to conference at an early date.

**Would Fulfill Promises**  
The president said "that campaign promises should be carried out by which adequate protection should be given to agriculture and to the industries where the change in economic situations demand their assistance."

He stated that he "could not believe and therefore would not admit that the United States senate was unable to legislate and that the interests of the country required that legislation should be completed during the special session."

The statement went on to say that Mr. Hoover did believe the differences that have arisen in the senate amply demonstrated the desirability of a "flexible clause."

Under such a provision, which the senate has eliminated from the bill, the president believes "difficulties in rates could be promptly corrected by scientific and impartial investigation and

put in action without such delays as the present discussions give proof."

Senator Borah said he agreed that campaign promises should be fulfilled and added that was what "some of us are trying to do."

"I think there need be no uneasiness over a suggestion that the senate will call to legislate," he asserted "it will legislate, but it will take time to revise the bill in the senate."

### CHURCH TO RESTORE OLD IDAHO MISSION

Repair Work to Start on Northwest's Early Outpost of Christianity

**KAMIAH, Oct. 31 (Special to the News)**—The old Methodist mission near here, one of the first outposts of Christianity in the Northwest, is to be restored.

This ancient Presbyterian edifice, dating back some 50 years, to the time when the first Indian converts to become candidates for the ministry were taught "by blackboard and prayer," saw the first efforts of the two sisters who pioneered the missionary work. The mission was started by T. H. Spaulding, co-worker of Marcus Whitman and among the first mission workers were Rev. H. C. Crowder and the two sisters, Sue and Kate McBeth. It remained for Sue and Kate, however, to continue the program of imparting Christianity to the Indians until their death, when Mazie Crawford and Elizabeth Crawford, their neices,

took up the cross. The former is still active in the work, although it has now been transferred to Lapwai.

The old building, has three rooms, a frame porch and a gable-and-bell chimney. The Walls-Walla preachers of the church has let the contract for repairing its tumbled down roof, broken flooring and rusted windows. The blackboards first used by the missionary sisters are still in the building.

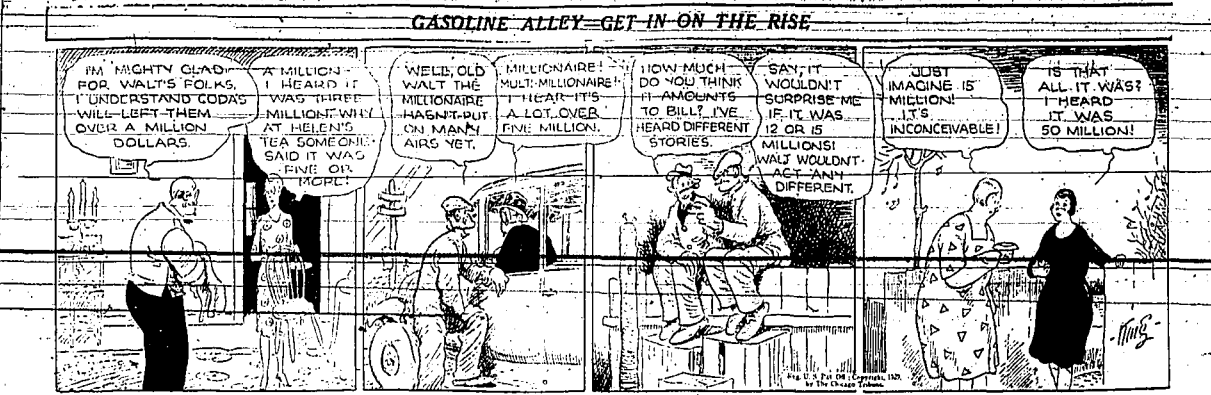
