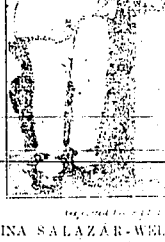

Slim Chance For Vandals To Halt Cougar Drive To Title

Game Offers Idaho Team Last Chance To Boost Standing

Washington State's Eleven Heavy Favorite to Win Thirty-Second Contest Between Two Schools

(Special to The News) MOSCOV, Nov. 7.—If Washington State is to be derailed in its drive to northern division football honors the Vandals appear to be the club to do the job. But Idaho has only an outside fighting chance to do it. After Idaho, Washington State meets only one more northern division team, Montana at Missoula, and a victory over the Grizzlies is conceded.

The Saturday game, the nineteenth meeting of football teams representing the University of Idaho and Washington State college, is Idaho's last chance to boost her conference prestige. After Washington State the Vandals have but one conference tilt, Southern California at Los Angeles. Although Idaho will throw everything into the Southern California game it probably will be only a test of whether the Vandals can hold the Thundering Herd to a low score.

Game to Attract Alumni.—This year, for the first time in many years, the Washington-State-Idaho game is not a home game and has neither team. But regardless of whether it carries the official homecoming character it will attract thousands of former students of both institutions by the thousands, for it promises to be a griltion classic.

Set-up for this year's game is of the sort that often develops into a thrilling contest. Washington State has everything in its favor and is a big favorite. On the other hand Idaho has a ball club that if it gets to clicking right early surprise the majority of the critics. Included in the lineup, probably forming Coach Lee Callahan in his preparation for the Washington State game has been in finding regulars for right end and at fullback. West, the team's wingman, who has held down the right end job so far, was injured in the Oregon State game and will finish his last week of conference football on the bench.

Injury Causes Wobble.—Fred Wilkie, regular fullback, was injured in the Oregon game and has not been in the lineup since. Whether Wilkie will even get in the Washington State game is doubtful. Coach Callahan does not want to take chances on playing him until he has fully recovered from his hurt.

Several reserves have been given trials at these positions. Ted Jensen, reserve end for three seasons, and Harold Carlson, who has been without team consideration, are battling it out for the line position. As starting fullback James Hilday, shifted from a halfback position, seems to be the best candidate. Wilkie has been Idaho's most consistent line player to date and his center smothering will be greatly missed in the Cougar game.

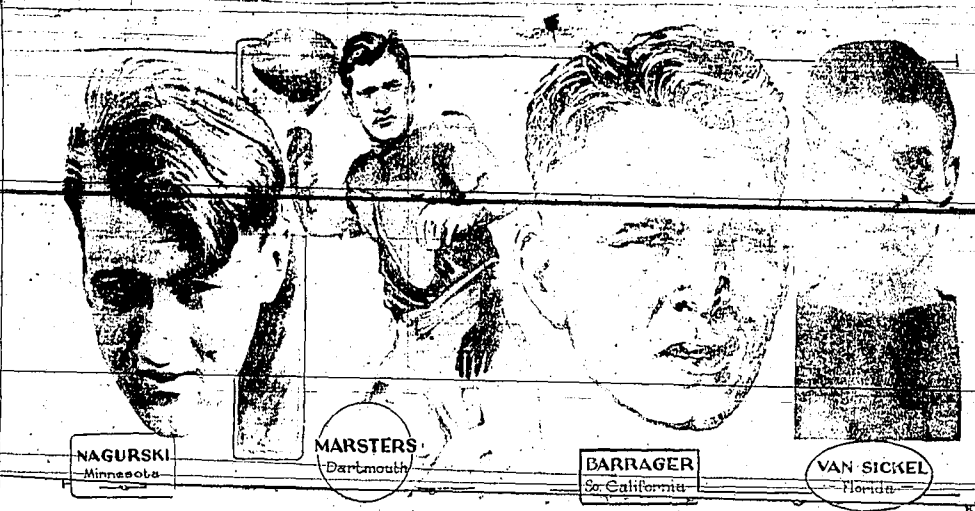
Oregon Matchmaker Bidding For Woolley

4000 HUNTERS TAKE 1000 TO 1200 DEER DURING SEASON HERE

L. W. Hawkins, Deputy Game Warden, Reviews Recent Operation On Twin Falls County Grounds

Between 1000 and 1200 deer were taken out of hunting grounds in Twin Falls county by hunters during the season. According to L. W. Hawkins, deputy game warden, the season was the best since 1925. Mr. Hawkins believes, however, that there are many deer left in Twin Falls county, but that the hunters are not of benefit because he says he checked out a great many deer and none of them had horns.

Mr. Hawkins says that the hunting season was the best since 1925. He says that the hunters were very successful in their operations.

Defends Hunters

"I think one of the most successful deer seasons has ever closed here, that Idaho ever had. At least 4000 hunters took out 1000 to 1200 deer. Some of the hunters weren't sports but I maintain they are a good deal better than a man who goes out of a week and spends \$20 and in 10 days time to pack into a section and kill one deer or whether he can go and do the same deer within a 24-hour period. In this case, the hunter of time and money make poor sports out of a lot of us, as a great many took advantage of this season and find it an impossibility to go north to hunt some other county's deer. Of the 4000 hunters who went between 1000 and 1200 deer were taken out, which I believe was a benefit as a great many that I checked out had no teeth. At the rate I would rather see them grace the table of some amateur hunter than to fall on any one's to the peacher, cougar, old age and poaching situation, as one of these things may happen if this section went on closed another 10 years, as they deer could not have lived that long.

Slaughter Admitted

"Some have spoken of it as a slaughter. It is true, it was easy for a few days to kill a deer, but who do you suppose in the North country? Because the deer are plentiful and not used to a gun. Why do they die out the first week of November? Because the birds are plentiful off their guard and easily killed. I cannot see that it is any greater sin to kill a deer in Twin Falls county than in any other county. It was estimated by some that Twin Falls county had 400 or 500 deer before the season opened. One hunter estimated that he had approximately a thousand and that he was enough unchecked to bring that number up to 1200. I do not believe that this number was in excess of 1000. In consultation several old-experienced deer hunters who declared there was plenty in Twin Falls county as yet, but due to timber and underbrush, it was next to impossible to kill one at the latter part of the season. The majority of them however, the first few days of the season for their winter feeding grounds in Nevada. Cowboys reported seeing them in droves of hundreds of hundreds, many for 20 days. A great many deer were seen in the county line in Cassia county, which was closed.

In Line for Salvage

"As for crimples and dead deer, there were not as many as would ordinarily happen as hunters were too many disappointed hunters after the first day who were willing to salvage crimples and dead deer. But crimples and dead deer to be expected, even as you find pheasants in pheasant season; likewise ducks. To have read the papers one would imagine they were hanging under every pine and that one could easily kill a deer with a club. I cannot see any of this and I believe a great deal of territory in the time was there.

It is no opinion that this department is to make hunting and not sports. In hunting was there, which was proven. There were hundreds of hunters who killed their first deer and I believe they are sports, and will give this department a hundred per cent cooperation in protecting the deer for another season, as their interest in the deer has been renewed.

"It is a pity to kill deer, but isn't it a pity for the poacher to kill them? Is it a pity for them to die of old age, by the cougar and of possible starvation?"

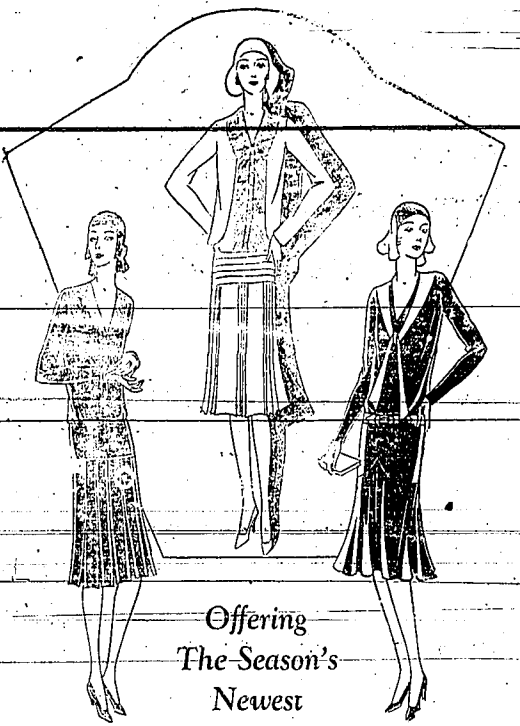

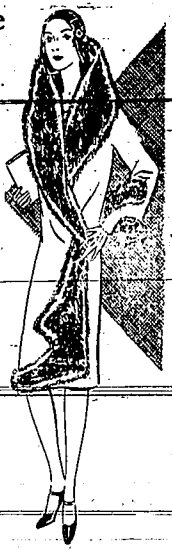

Response to Radio Concert Amazes Noted Orchester Leader

**LEOPOLD STOKOWSKI
READS EVERY LETTER
FROM VAST AUDIENCE**

Philadelphia Organization

Will Broadcast Two
More Programs

Men Display Greatest
Interest in Fine Music

Conductor Studies Sugges-
tions of Construc-
tive Nature

(By The Associated Press)
PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 7 —
Amusement in its deepest mean-
ing is Leopold Stokowski's reac-
tion to the response given his
first radio broadcast.

Hesitant for years over per-
mitting the Philadelphia orches-
tra, which he conducts, from go-
ing before the microphone be-
cause of the limitation he felt
radio placed upon good music, the
impressive conductor has been over-
whelmed by thousands of letters.

The correspondence greeted the
broadcast of the orchestra in the first
series of three Sunday afternoon
concerts over WEAJ and coast to coast
network. Bankers, factory workers and
industrial leaders were represented by the
letter-writers.

Conductor Exalting
Exalting in the conduct of his or-
chestra to the point where he has
stopped in the middle of a number to
restate what he has heard of talking
in his audience, Mr. Stokowski affect-
ed informal attire in leading his or-
chestra on the radio. He wore a turtleneck
and before the concert was completed
he had discarded his coat and necktie
and had opened his collar so that
nothing would interfere with free
movement of his baton.

He is a strikingly tall man, with
windblown white hair, the son of a
Polish father and an Irish mother. His
two children, Uba, two, and Sonya, seven,
are the delight of his home life.

When he introduced himself over the
radio, he said: "If you want jazz, we
will give you jazz."

Then followed a request for letters
of their impressions from the audiences
of 52 broadcast stations.

"I am simply amazed at the over-
whelming number of communications,"
he says. "I have read every one because
so many contained suggestions con-
structive and creative, in the sense of
looking into the future of radio."

"Men were in a majority. This indi-
cates that a new era is coming into
American musical life. It has always
been women who have organized every-
thing connected with music. Now men
are beginning to be interested in music
and are realizing that one may be
sensitive to beauty in art and yet be
manly."

While in the main I was satisfied
with our first broadcast, there was one
feature which did not reach up to my
ideal. The modern orchestra can de-
velop enormous climaxes of tone and
then recede into an eloquent softness.

Limited Range
"In our first concert these great con-
trasts were not completely realized, be-
cause engineers at the coast station
kept the tonal mass more in the half way
place. When I protested, he replied that
many receivers were not capable of fac-
ing the two extremes. For our next
concert I am asking him, nevertheless,
to give us this wide tonal range, as I
am willing to restrain and restrict
great music for any consideration what-
ever."

Of future broadcasts offer the pres-
ents, Mr. Stokowski says.
"We have an intense desire to make
our future concerts better from a tech-
nical standpoint. Our engineers have
several ideas which we believe will lead
to broadcasting results hitherto unat-
tained. As soon as these new possibi-
lities are fully developed we hope to play
more radio concerts, but it is impos-
sible to say when that will be."
The concluding program is on Decem-
ber 8.

Gum Sticks During Year

DEEP PLOWING ENDING SAND MENAGE IN TEXAS

DALLAS, Nov. 7 (AP)—Thanks to a frost that stopped blowing away when it was plowed—many farmers in Northwestern Texas have boosted their earnings more than 20 per cent.

For eight years winds had blown sand over young crops in that region, often forcing replanting. One county did some deep plowing on its roads, and the plows turned up a clay sub-

stance that made good highway surface in dry weather.

The idea spread to farmers, who experimented by plowing their sand-swept fields. The upturned clay, it was found, not only ended the sand menace, but increased crop yields from 20 to 30 per cent. It also holds moisture well in a territory that rarely gets more than 15 or 18 inches of rain a year.

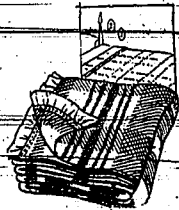

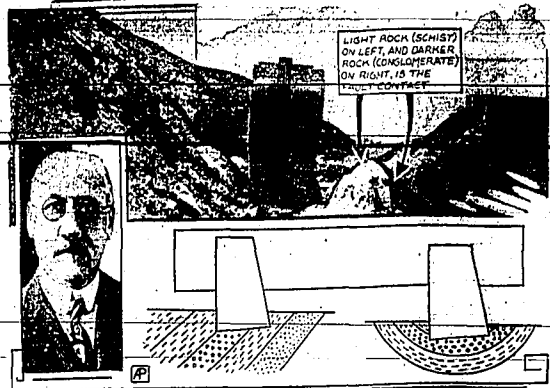

Geologist Plays Important Role in Skyscraper's Safety

KNOWLEDGE OF ROCK FORMATIONS BEFORE CONSTRUCTION VITAL

Professor H. Ries Explains Necessity for Investigation Soft Structure Unable To Support Great Weight Line of Fracture in Earth Causes Breaking of Large Dam

ITHACA, N. Y., Nov. 7.—Geologists, which detect faults, and soft, deep-buried structures, is part of the safety insurance of new American skyscrapers that are going up to 1000 feet and more.

In the construction of huge buildings of today, says Professor H. Ries, head of the department of geology at Cornell, the character of the underlying formations must be looked into carefully to determine whether they are sufficiently solid and durable.

Not that there is any remote danger of cities causing the earth beneath them to sink, for bed rock is strong enough to hold anything that even a melting power can convert.

The trouble is that bed rock does not always reach the surface, and the soft formations above it may not rest on the solid rock. In such cases it is often necessary to excavate down to it, and the services of the geologist are used to locate the bed rock.

There are times when even the bed rock, although apparently solid, may weaken under the action of percolating water and give way, or exhibit certain structural defects which preclude the possibility of its being strong, and these troubles are usually found by a geological examination.

One of the most important examples of recent years, Dr. Ries said, is the case of the San Jacinto dam in California, which broke about a year ago, causing great loss of life. The fault was in the dam, according to Dr. Ries, but in the rock on which it stood.

Almost atwart, its center, was a fault, a term used by geologists to describe the line along which slipping had occurred.

The dam was an extreme case, unlikely to apply to the foundations of a building, but illustrating the contention of geologists that a geological examination should be made before building.

"As far as I know, no building has ever been built on a fault," Dr. Ries said, "but it is a possibility which must be considered."

Three States Buy Third Of Insurance Policies

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 7.—Three states in the middle Atlantic section, New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey, are buying approximately one-third of the total new life insurance being issued in the United States.

A condition of fairly equal prosperity throughout the nation is credited by the life insurance sales research bureau for the increasing volume of life insurance underwriting.

In September the average increase for the life country was 18 per cent over last year's figures, they reported. They were Oklahoma, Alabama, Mississippi, Florida, South Carolina and North Dakota.

Florida Markets Moss For Use in Upholstery

INVESTMENT, Nov. 7.—Florida is most abundant in this region of west Florida, is going to add to the income of citizens in the vicinity of Lake Wales. A moss packing plant will open soon in this little town of 1000 population.

Locomotives already had pulled trains, both in England and America, before that, but the opening of the L. and M. was the first railway undertaking of sufficient magnitude to convince the public that a new form of transportation actually had arrived.

Department of Commerce records indicate that there have been no foreign purchases of American made electric locomotives this year.

Domestic shipments of steam locomotives have increased from 285 during the first eight months in 1928 to 480 for the same period this year.

At the same time, shipments of electric locomotives dropped from 92 to 22.

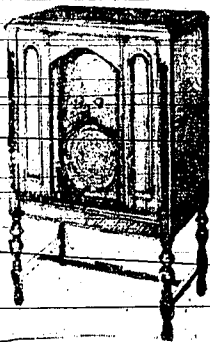

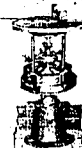

Stock Market Decline No Reason For Holding Up Purchases of Merchandise Declares Massachusetts Statistician

Country Fundamentally Sound, Volume of Business Good and Plenty of Money Available For Legitimate Needs, Says Roger W. Babson

By ROGER W. BABSON

BABSON PARK, Mass., Nov. 7.—Business men are unnecessarily troubled about the stock market. There is no reason for holding up purchases of merchandise because the stock market has declined. The country is fundamentally sound and there is still a good volume of business. Plenty of money is available for legitimate needs. Employment is good and there is every reason that business should go on as usual.

Of course, a lot of money has changed hands during the last two weeks; but there is just as much money today in the country as there ever was. One person can't make a dollar in the stock market without another losing it, and another loses it without another making it. Fluctuating in the stock market is like playing poker with chips. There is always the same number of chips whoever wins. Hence, there is no fundamental reason why a break in the stock market should hurt legitimate business. On the other hand, the ultimate effect may be good business because during the past few months too many business men and employees have been devoting time and thought and money to the stock market which they should have devoted to their legitimate business. Now that they have not their fingers burnt they will settle down again to earn an honest living.

Law Determining Prices

Stock market prices in Wall Street are determined by the same simple law that determined land prices in Florida. When there are more buyers than sellers, prices go up, and when there are more sellers than buyers, prices go down. The greater the percentage of buyers the more rapidly prices go up, and the greater the percentage of sellers the more rapidly prices go down.

But why do people buy and sell? What is the motive actuating purchases and sales in Wall Street stocks? The motive actuating trading in Wall Street stocks is exactly the same as the motive actuating trading in Florida land. A grain of the buying is merely speculating with the idea of selling out at a

profit. Considering the very low yields of the stocks which have been skyrocketing the past year, it is evident that about 99 per cent of these purchases were purely speculative. They people kept buying so long as they could sell at a profit, but when they found they could not sell at a profit they stopped buying. This situation was reached the first of September. For two months there has been almost no speculative buying and gradually forced selling has been needed in an entire reversal of sentiment, feelings, and sales in Wall Street. In April more people wanted to buy than to sell and we had increasing prices causing common stocks to be very popular. Today most people want to sell than to buy and we have seen crumblings in price, resulting in common stocks going out of style. Moreover, I believe that the speculative market in the market is over for some time to come. The market should be dull for a while now.

Bonds Attractive

So long as first mortgage bonds of companies can be bought at yield double what the common stocks of these companies yield, it is evident that bonds will now be more attractive than stocks to real investors and come back into style. There also are three other reasons why bonds should attract more attention in the future. One is that money rates should tend to decline; a second is that the equities protecting these issues have become so much greater, and the third is that the purchasing power of the dollar should tend to increase. This latter is a very important matter in connection with bond prices because the bond buyer has a fixed rate of interest. When a man has a 6 per cent \$1000 bond he gets \$60 a year, and the more that \$100 will buy in food, clothing and shelter, the more the bond is worth to him.

Common stocks will continue to be very popular. Professor Fisher is one of the greatest economists in the world today and a most useful and successful citizen. I love him very dearly. The only reason that he has been wrong on the stock market is that he thinks the world is ruled by figures instead of feelings, or by theories instead of styles. When the style changes, however, women will quickly change their wearing apparel. In the same way, the rule Wall Street. CAMEL AND ARCTIC OX ONCE INHABITED IDAHO

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (U.P.)—The camel and the sun-baked desert and the moose or "buck" of the frozen Arctic, but 100,000 years ago their ancestral relatives lived in Idaho.

Fossil bones of the creatures have been found by Dr. J. W. Oliver, Smithsonian paleontologist, in the Snake river valley where they were probably deposited during the great ice age.

The ox, belonging to the same group as the present-day Arctic animal, was a monster creature, more than twice the bulk of the living species.

That the creature was a common animal in the region was established in finding bones of half a dozen individuals, although not enough to reconstruct a complete skeleton.

"The camel bones indicate that the climate must have been mild," Dr. Oliver said, "although the remains of the extinct ox point to the reverse."

"We must secure a better knowledge of Idaho fauna to solve the interesting question whether the climate was colder than we have thought or whether the ox ranged farther south than the living species."

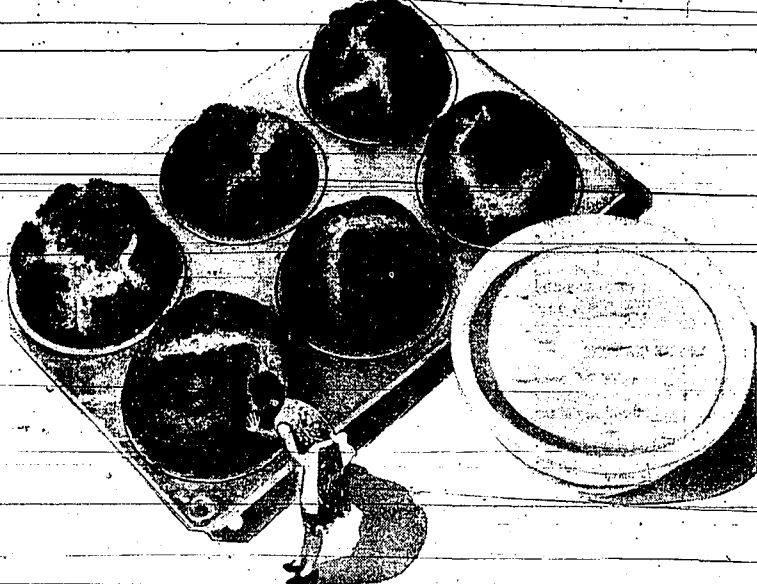

GERMANS MONOPOLY ON DYES WEAKENING

Progress of United States in Post-War Industry Reverses 1914 Condition

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Germany's virtual world monopoly of the dye industry has not only been broken but American products are now invading that nation's markets.

The post-war industry, reversed by the department of commerce survey as conditions existing prior to the war.

During the first six months of this year, exports of package dyes totaled \$130,587. Of that amount, \$29,815 went to Germany, as compared with \$146,772 in the same period of 1928.

In 1914 the total domestic production

of synthetic dye amounted to 7,000,000 pounds. Imported dye by necessity when the German supply was cut off, it rose to 48,000,000 pounds in 1920 and to 29,187,000 pounds in 1927.

The United States is the largest consumer of dyes in variety as well as quantity. Less than a dozen individual dyes, however, are purchased from European countries in quantities sufficient to warrant the necessary research for their economical production in this country.

Because dye-making and munitions manufacture are both products of organic chemistry, the dye plants are rated by military experts as important factors because they can be turned almost overnight to defense purposes.

While American exports to Germany have grown along with those to other countries, imports from that nation have dropped. In September, 1928, Germany imported \$4.4 million worth of dyes from the United States. In September, 1929, they had fallen 43.95 per cent.

BRITISH URGES GERMAN BE TAUGHT IN SCHOOLS

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Not enough German is being taught in England, says the British board of education in a report pointing out that Germany is once more one of the leading commercial countries of the world.

The board's survey of secondary schools reveals that comparatively few schools offer German, while nearly all teach French.

In addition to urging "a substantial increase" in teaching German, the board states Spanish, too, is lagging far behind French in the schools, but not in the home, where it is being taught in a preparation.

J. D. WOOD URGES AID IN AIRPORT BUILDING

Idaho Commissioner Speaks at Los Angeles on Plan for Federal Assistance

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 7.—Federal aid for building airport and other facilities over the nation was urged today by J. D. Wood, Idaho commissioner of public works, in an address before the all-weather airport conference here.

Wood, chairman of the Western States Aeronautical association, declared federal aid, such as was provided in case of public highways, was the logical development of an industry that was demanding increasing activity factors in the way of terminals and intermediate landing fields.

"The personnel, the equipment and machinery for operating such a field plan is already in existence in each state's highway department, he said. Construction of airports and buying out of air routes can be directed by the department engineering forces."

Describes System
Describing the system by which it could be brought about, he said:

"There first must be an act of congress appropriating money for the construction of air navigation facilities, together with provision for equitable apportionment of the funds to the states."

Wood said that the various states would be planned by the federal government in a way that this system would require the approval of the aeronautics division of the department of commerce. The execution of the plan could be directed by the states under the general supervision of the department of commerce and perhaps in cooperation with the bureau of public works.

State's Acceptance Follows

"Following this would come acceptance of the principle and the plan by the legislatures of the various states, together with agreement for raising the states' share of the funds, by direct appropriation, bond issues, gasoline tax or other method."

He said that the mechanical development of aviation was already a matter for marveling and its further development followed almost as fast as predictions could be made. The present difficulty, he said, is the lack of adequate ground facilities. He predicted 800 airplanes would be manufactured this year compared with slightly more than half that number in 1928. Aviation utility is limited strictly to the availability of fuel, he declared, and offered this as reason for a program that would permit full use of this "phenomenal industry."

Only when this is brought about, by adequate appropriations by federal, state and local agencies, he said, will commercial aviation come into its own.

Plan to Open Alaskan Park to Public in 1932

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—So that American tourists soon will see this unique wealth of animal life and magnificent scenery in the Mount McKinley national park, the department of the interior plans to speed its development.

By the end of 1931, a modern hotel will be erected on Copper mountain, 30 miles from the railroad and reached by a road now under construction.

Mount McKinley is the highest mountain in North America. It rises 20,000 feet above sea level. Great herds of wild animals roam through the park.

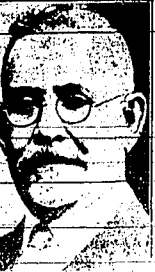

INCREASE IN TARIFF RECEIVES APPROVAL BY 60-10-18 BALLOT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Sorting out one of the bitterest disputes since it began the nation's tariff structure, the senate today voted, 60 to 18, to increase the duty on manganese, a mineral used in the manufacture of steel which the pending bill as reported by the finance committee placed on the free list.

The measure was introduced by Senator Odell, Republican, Nevada, providing a duty of 1 cent a pound on ore containing 10 per cent and over in metallic manganese, which would protect both low and high grade manganese producers in the West and South.

The present rate, 1 cent a pound on ore 40 per cent and over of metallic content, was retained in the house bill. It was first increased by a vote of 749 to 47 of the senate finance committee in its original report, but by a later vote of 6 to 5 it was wiped out the tariff act.

Destructive Waves of Pacific Ocean Due To Storms In Alaskan Region

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The destructive waves, or surging waves on the Pacific coast, are believed by Captain P. C. Whitney of the United States coast and geodetic survey to be due to Alaskan storms, 1200 miles distant.

Surges are more evident when the wind blows from the north or northwest. They rise and fall as much as a foot and a half and are strong enough to tear ships in open harbor from their moorings.

Their cause has long remained a mystery and Captain Whitney points out his contention is only theory. He thinks the fluctuations are due to rapid changes in atmospheric pressure near the Gulf of Alaska.

He bases his theory on a comparison of tide records, taken about the Pacific coast in open harbors, and on weather maps of the north Pacific.

The tides register periodic movements of the water due to the moon in a long wavy line, smoothly curved. The surges show up as superimposed sharp up and down movements that indicate the suddenness, height and duration in time of the surges.

The surges are long-period waves, undetectable to the eye. They occur all along ocean fronts but they present the greatest problem to shipping in the unprotected harbors of the Pacific coast where they bore in even high breakers, without warning.

It continued research upon Captain Whitney's theory, the pressure center fluctuations are due to rapid changes in atmospheric pressure near the Gulf of Alaska.

It is Captain Whitney's conclusion that if the surges are not due to rapid changes in the Gulf of Alaska, the phenomena is at least not local and due to some outside agency.

Radiophoto Plays Part In Diagnosis By German Physician 7500 Miles Away

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—An American patient soon may be able to obtain medical advice from any surgical specialist in Europe or vice versa, by submitting his case by radiophoto, together with a radiophoto.

Preliminary experiments were made in Berlin by Dr. Justo Lilo Pavia, director of the central hospital, who used radiophotos to consult Professor Mariano R. Castex, Argentine specialist, in the case of a young patient suffering from a tumor.

First, the patient's eyes were photographed, and the pictures prepared for transmission by radio 7500 miles to the specialist. It took hours of strenuous testing at the Naumen station to get the equipment ready, but once adjusted it functioned faultlessly.

A small group, including the Argentine minister Rescetti, gathered at the Berlin central, telegraph office to witness the experiment.

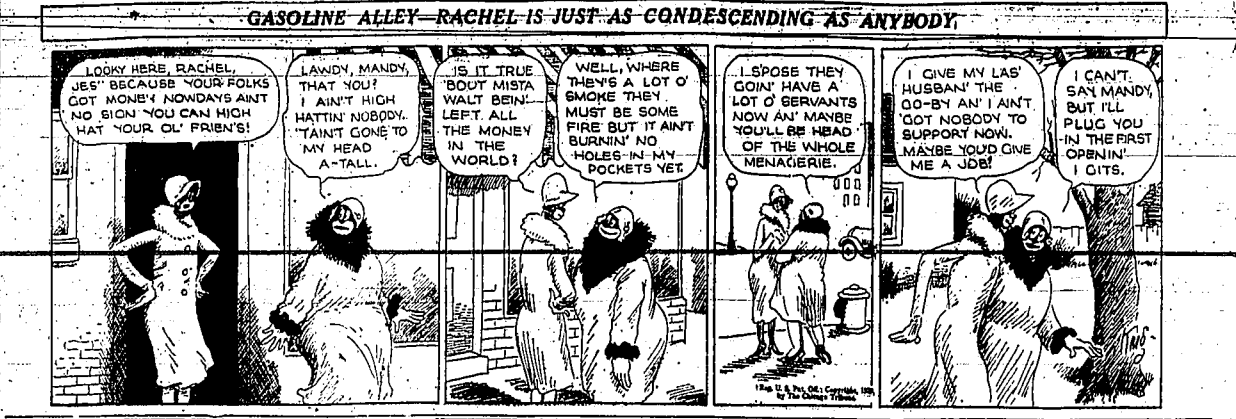
