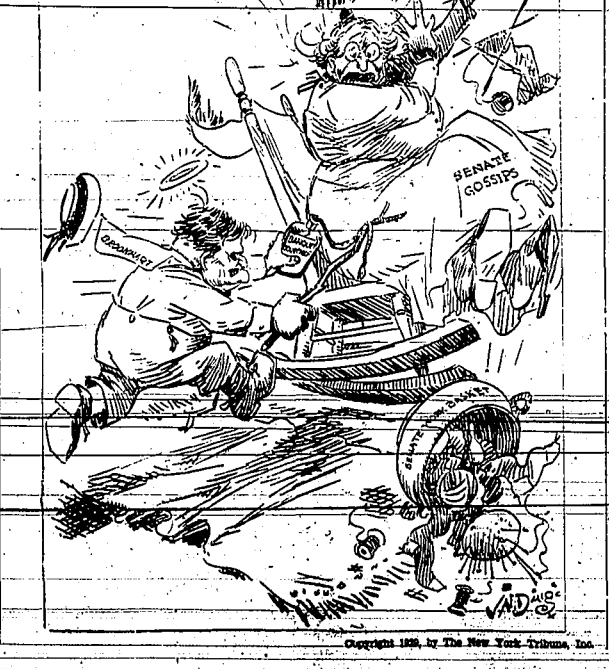

# Filer Eleven Triumphs Over Buhl by 7 to 0 On Home Field

## Wildcats Score In Fourth Quarter Of Contest With Pass

Drive Over Line for Touchdown Follows Eight-Yard Aerial Attack in Final Moments of Close Game

FILER, Nov. 8.—Playing a game that took them inside Buhl's 10-yard line seven times without a score, Filer finally drove to a touchdown in the last two minutes of the game, and won 7 to 0, here this afternoon. Filer's Yardage Greatest  
The story of the game is best told by the figures—Filer carried the ball from scrimmage 440 yards to Buhl's 150. Filer completed the one pass for eight yards, when it was vastly needed. Buhl completed one to end the game for five yards, with Wheeler out from injuries and Jones out. Buhl's offense was not strong enough consistently to make yardage against the Wildcat line. End runs and passes went but little better. Buhl, with almost no chance to score, indeed Buhl had no ball in Filer's territory only a few times. Buhl settled down to the task of keeping all that fighting Filer backs had to offer, intent only on keeping the Wildcat away from that goal line. And the score:

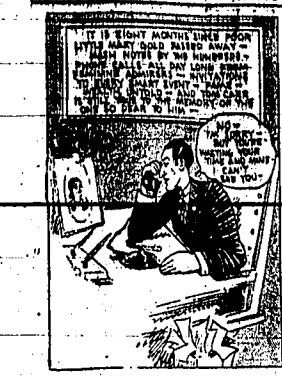
