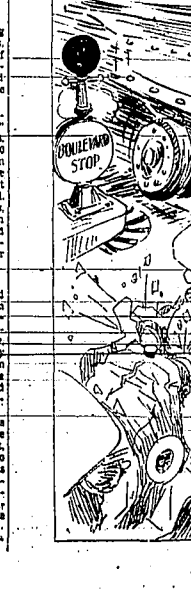
DECLINE IN TEMPERATURE BRINGS SNOW TO KANSAS

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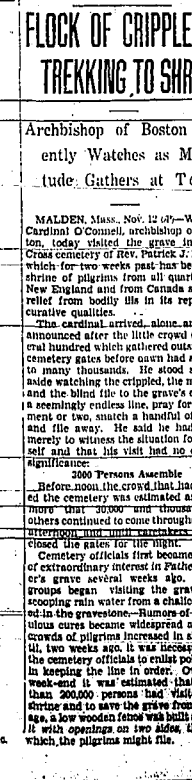
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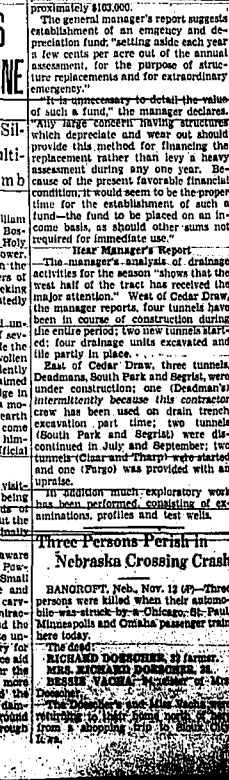
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### Meat Cutters Win Over Cafe Bowlers

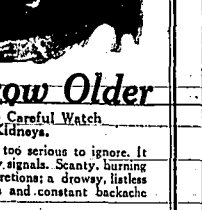

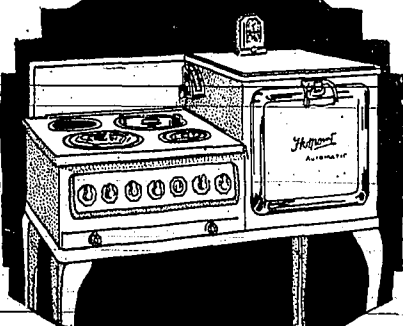

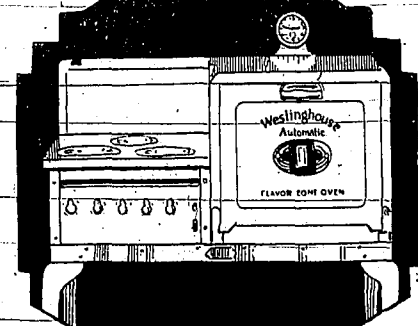

# Nineteenth Annual Gem State Seed Show Ready For Opening At Jerome With Displays Finest In History

## Program of Lectures and Discussions Forms Important Feature of Exposition at Grounds-in-City-on North Side

(Special to The News.)

**JEROME, Nov. 12**—Idaho's nineteenth annual seed show, brought to the south central section of the state near the heart of seed production this year, opens with a two-day program Thursday morning.

Officials in charge of the show today declared that one of most complete displays of fine seeds ever assembled in the state will feature the show. They are urging growers to take full advantage of the event by inspecting seeds and taking the series of instructive lectures included on the program.

The exhibit hall is open at 9 o'clock in the morning and remains open until 10 o'clock in the evening of each day. The program commences at 9:30 each morning and recovers at 1:30 each afternoon. The program is conducted on Thursday and Friday, but will not be held on Saturday. The exhibits, however, will be on display during that day. There is no admission charge.

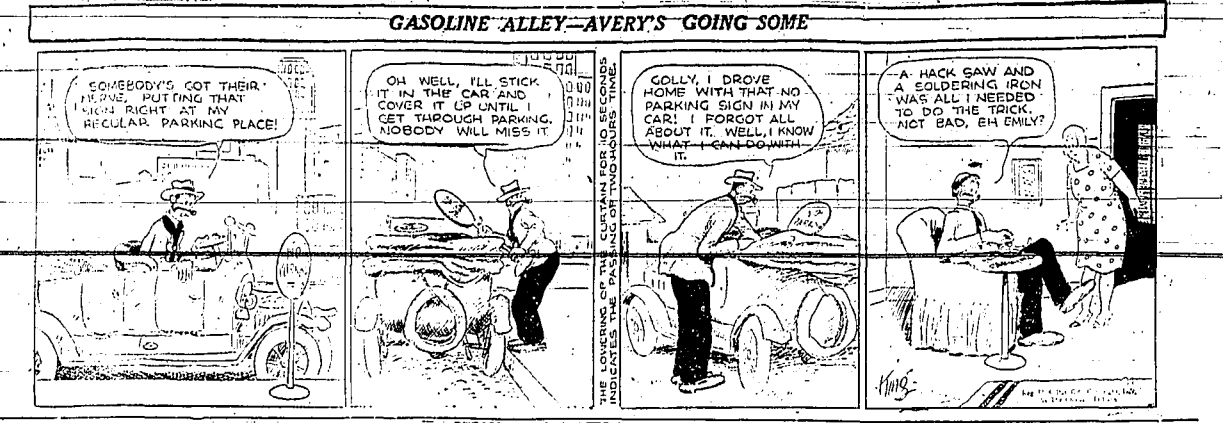

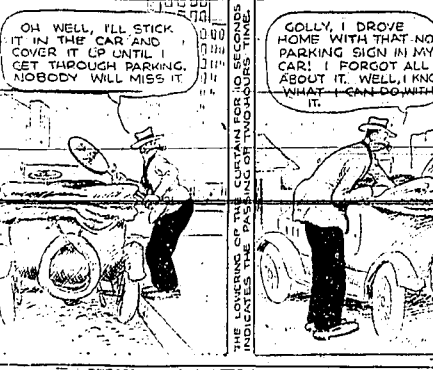

### COUNCIL AVERSE TO HASTY ACTION WHEN REMODELING RULES

Ordinance to change Traffic Laws Placed On First Reading; Clerk Checks Funds at End of Period

Twin Falls city council will not act hastily in remodeling traffic regulations, but will afford full opportunity for the presentation of suggestions and constructive criticism. It was made plain last evening when J. E. White, commissioner of public safety, introduced a proposed ordinance embodying a number of changes that have been under consideration for some time, and the measure was placed on its first reading. It will be read again at the council meeting next Monday evening, and timely notice thereto when final action is to be taken.


The proposed ordinance provides for prohibitive status at intersections within a radius of one block from the intersection of a main street, avenue and Shoshone street. It also prohibits use of sidewalks for parking within 10 feet of another sidewalk and a similar distance from the curbs of State law regarding maximum speed limits, right of way, stopping and turning, stopping on crossing through streets and on entering or leaving alleys and private drives.

It is within the province of the council was advised by the city attorney last evening, to raise the statutory speed limits if it is deemed desirable. Statute provides for maximum speed of 15 miles an hour at school crossings, 20 in business districts and at intersections where the view is obstructed, and 20 miles an hour in residence districts. These speeds to be uniform throughout the city.
