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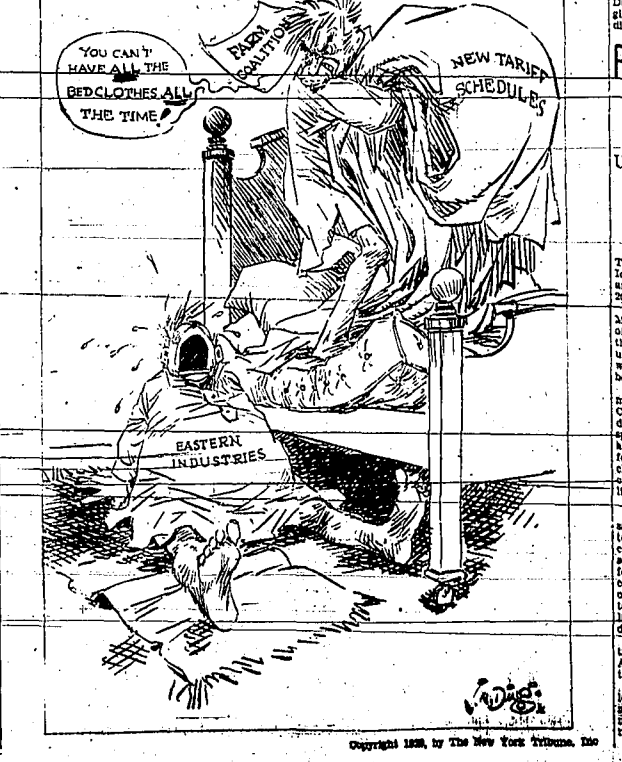
SAMPLES AT JEROME SEED SHOW WILL GO TO FAIR AT CHICAGO

Leo Calland Trying To Correct Vandal Habit Of Giving Up

Effect On Powerful Idaho Team of Touchdown Lead For Opponents: Puzzles Critics of Grid Sport

MOBICOV, Nov. 14—Coach Leo Calland is trying desperately this week to get his Vandal football club cured of the habit of giving up so easily when an opposing team gets a touchdown or two ahead. To break this habit and perfect a defense against Gonzaga's passing attack which has the Vandal mentor worried, will be the main items on the training program for this week in preparation for the Idaho homecoming football game Saturday.

Vandal Team Powerful

That the Vandal club packs plenty of power is thoroughly demonstrated in a summary of statistics for the six games played this season. Because the Vandals have on people disappointed that they carry this line punch critics are puzzled at the physiological effect a touchdown lead seems to have over them. In three cases this psychology has worked disastrously.

In six games Idaho has accumulated 80 first down and 185 yards from scrimmage to 30 first downs and 874 yards from scrimmage for its opponents. Vandal has not done so well in the forward pass division, having only 16 first downs from passes to their opponents' 18.

Against the Idaho backer the Vandals showed greatly improved form in this department, completing 17 out of nine passes while Washington State completed 5 out of 10.

Coach Calland will send against Gonzaga this backfield combination, most effective against forward passes. Prospects now are that Howard Berg, formerly of Twin Falls, a speedy sophomore nose, and Dick Thomas, 170 pounds, the Bill Kerashnik for this game. Berg has shown up exceptionally well in backing up the line and is one of the best Vandal backs in upsetting forward passes.

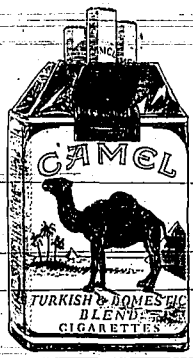

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Hyde Sees Reforestation as Aid to Farm Surplus Control

LANDS TOO POOR FOR CULTIVATION MAY BE USED TO GROW WOOD

Of 955,000,000 Acres of Farming Area Only 605,000,000 Produce Crops

Eagerness of Government Brings Over-Production

"Our Immediate Concern Avoidance of Increase in Supply," Says Expert

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, Nov. 14—Control of farm surpluses by government withdrawal of uncultivable lands for reforestation was urged today by Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde.

Other farm relief measures discussed at a session of the association of land grant colleges and universities devoted to the federal farm board's problems, were removal of county extension agents from county and states influences opposed to cooperative marketing and educational campaigns, to acquire the farmer with his rights under the agricultural marketing act.

Six members of the farm board were present and each addressed the meeting. They were: Chairman Alexander Leake, C. S. Wilson, Sam H. McKelvie, James C. Stone, Carl Williams and C. T. Johnson. Secretary Hyde explained that of 955,000,000 acres of American farm land, only 365,000,000 actually were cultivated, while 590,000,000 produce crops large enough to supply the United States and its foreign markets and to support a farm bloc in the United States senate.

Over-Expansion Apparat Over-expansion, held by the secretary to be the cause of agricultural ills, was brought about, he said, by the eagerness of the government to cultivate every potential farm. He proposed that sub-marginal lands be taken by the government for reforestation.

"The farmers of the United States are now able to produce more food and fibers the nation needs and will be able to do so for decades to come," he said.

"Our immediate concern is not to stimulate greater production, but to avoid it. We need to seek out and make practical application of what we already know, to make researches for new uses of present products."

Clies Board's Task

The federal farm board is charged with the task of encouraging and fostering cooperative marketing organizations for agriculture. "He said, "this we hope to build up the farmer's own organization which can advise the farmer as to markets, supplies and demands; can aid in controlling the supply by preventing it; can level out the flow of commodities to market; give the farmer a voice in the sale of his products; and extend his farm and influence over his line fences and into the markets of the world. We can take the problems of the farm out of the realm of politics and into the domain of economic a by collective thinking, stabilization of prices, reduction of waste in the marketing system and the consolidation of the economic power of agriculture."





Upper House Increases Levies on Agriculture Products

**REPUBLICAN REGULARS
RISE TO DENY RECESS
OF WEEK IN SENATE**

**Legislators Spend Three
Hours Overtime On Bill
to Revise Tariff Sched-
ule and Record Progress**

By D. HAROLD OLIVER
(Associated Press Staff Writer)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Denied a week's recess by the Republican regulars—the senate spent three hours overtime on the tariff bill at its first night meeting of the special session to-night and adopted with unprecedented celerity a score of Republican proposals to increase duties on various agriculture products.

Not a single roll call was taken as the tired legislators approved all raises in farm tariffs proposed by the finance committee Republicans on milk, cream and other dairy products. A well filled gallery looked on while the senators worked.

A contest on cherry duties was on between senators from New York and Maryland on the one hand, and California members on the other when the recess hour of 10:30 P. M. was reached and decision was deferred until tomorrow.

A statement by Senator Copeland, Democrat, New York, that a vote should be postponed by a caucus Senator Edge, Republican, New Jersey, who was absent, desired to speak on the subject, brought Senator Johnson, Republican, California, to his feet with a declaration:

"Senator Edge ought to be here."
He added that absence of senators should not be an excuse from now on for putting off votes on any item in the bill.

Approve Duty on Cream
The senate tonight approved a finance committee amendment to increase the duty on butter and cream from 30 to 55 cents a gallon. The house bill carried a duty of 45 cents.

The first change approved in the agricultural group would increase the duty on fresh or sour milk from 3 cents a gallon to 6 cents. The house proposed 5 cents. Light dried blood albumen was given a rate of 12 cents a pound and dark blood albumen a duty of 5 cents a pound. Both now are on the free list.

Completing work on committee amendments to the wool schedule, the senate approved the one to reinstate maple and lumber—except flooring—on the free list, as against a duty of 15 per cent ad valorem in the house bill. Acting rapidly, the senate proceeded without record votes or discussion to

pound, and that on dressed poultry from 10 cents a pound, also were approved.

On a division vote the senate then adopted an amendment to place a duty of 20 per cent on chips, now on the free list. The house provided a duty of 35 per cent.

Reaching the important grain products, the senate approved an increase in the duty on oats from 15 to 16 cents a bushel.

A proposal by Senator Brookhart, Republican, Independent, Iowa, to make the rate 20 cents was defeated after a heated exchange between Brookhart and Norbeck, Republican Independent, South Dakota, over each others farm relief attitude.

FAMOUS AUTHORITY ON FORESTRY VISITS IDAHO

MOSCOW, Nov. 14. (Special to The News)—Professor C. H. Guyse, noted forestry authority of Cornell university is on the campus making a two weeks study of the University of Idaho school of forestry as a part of a national survey of forestry schools being conducted by the Carnegie Foundation.

Professor Guyse is a national director of the forest education inquiry, which is probably the most extensive study of its kind ever made. While he is here he will investigate every phase and department of the forestry school—class room work, research projects, laboratories and

equipment, and lumbering operations in this section of the country. Professor Guyse is on leave of absence from Cornell for the purpose of conducting the survey.

The University of Idaho school of forestry has long been recognized as one of the best in the United States. Dean P. C. Miller, commenting on the survey said:

"It will help everyone engaged in any phase of forestry, and it will give forestry training recognition and standing it has not had heretofore."

J. C. Evenden, in charge of the United States government entomological headquarters at Coeur d'Alene, recently alumnus of the school of forestry on insect pests common in forests of the west. Mr. Evenden is in charge of a federal district that includes most of the western United States.

Boost Duty on Milk
The duty on skimmed and buttermilk was raised from 1 to 2.05 cents a gallon; unskimmed condensed milk from 1 to 1.2 cents a pound; sweetened condensed milk from 1 1/2 to 2.75 cents a pound; all other condensed milk from 1 1/2 to 2.0 cents a pound; dried cream from 7 to 12.33 1/3 cents a pound; dried skimmed and dried buttermilk from 1 1/2 to 3 cents a pound, and malted milk from 20 to 25 per cent.

As the butter increase proposed by the house was not amended by the finance committee, this item was passed by and the next amendment was adopted to raise the cheese and turkey sub-

stitutes duty from 5 cents a pound to 8 cents, but not less than 25 per cent ad valorem.

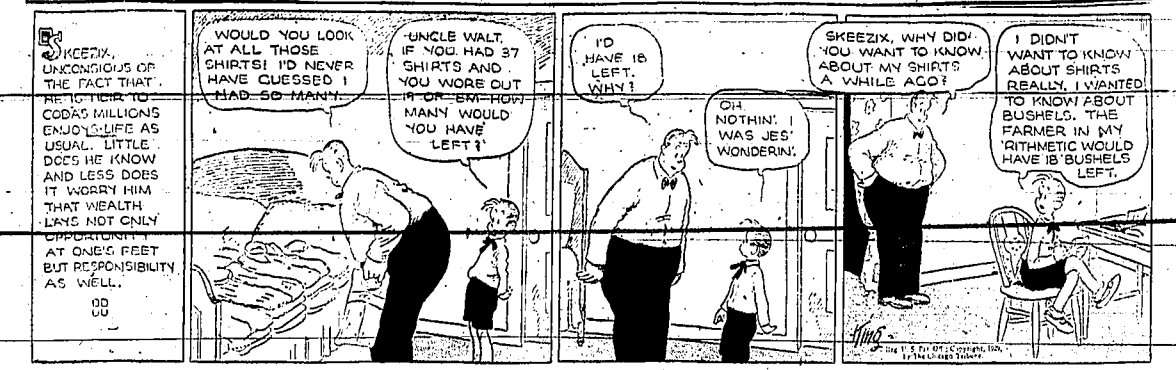

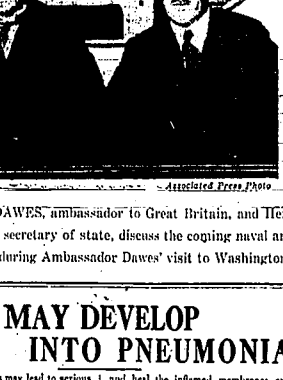


