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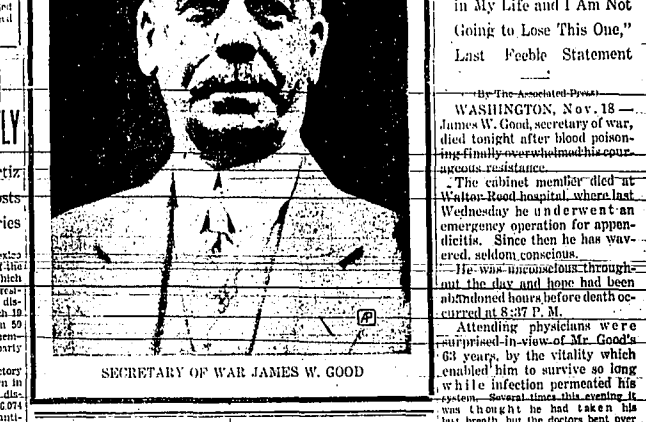

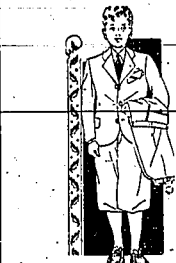

Name on Mississippi Boat Honors Veteran News Reporter

FUSSY PACKET PILES STREAMS AS TRIBUTE TO YEARS OF LABOR

Writer of Marine Copy Believes River One of Romance

Newspaperman Spends 13 Years Along Mississippi Memphis Evening Appeal's Employee Relates Experiences

By JAMES H. STREET (Associated Press Correspondent) MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 18.—The Joe Curtis, a fussy little packet with a cheerful bell and a blustering whistle, is plying the Mississippi as a tribute to a newspaperman.

Joe Curtis, after 13 years as a marine reporter, still thinks the fickle old stream is the river of romance.

Curtis, a reporter for the Memphis Evening Appeal, started writing about the river in 1896 and has worked on boats and newspapers from Pittsburgh to New Orleans.

He was old man river then, and it is old man river now—dangerous, beautiful, fickle—a gold mine for the strong and a graveyard for the weak," he said.

"I have seen the river take the Mississippi state and give it to Arkansas. I have worked down the river when we never lost sight of great packets from St. Louis to New Orleans."

Man's effort to make the river easier to navigate have changed pilots more than it had the river, Joe says. The treacherous sand bars have been removed and channel lights now show the way.

"The old pilots knew the river marking and altered from them," he says. "The pilot would look back across the water and see the river take the state where we were. Or at night, he would step onto the hurricane deck, scan the outline of trees and announce our whereabouts."

"I guess I have seen quite a bit down the valley. I wrote river copy for Irving S. Cobb when he was city editor for the Daily World. I jotted a showboat once."

Business Increases "One day I was sitting alongside the pilot and he pointed to a string of freight cars moving on a track near the bank. They were auto-manufacturing, some day," he said. "And they did, but it is coming back. The glamour is not there, but the river is the same. More business is being handled than ever before."

Curtis knows the whims of Father Mississippi so well that he can, besides, he can tell you the date of the 1927 flood—and got it right. River men know him and believe in him and tell him their stories—and there are few "outsiders" who ever hear the stories of the Mississippi.

So when owners of a new packet looked about for a name, someone suggested Joe Curtis and all agreed. The little boat was christened in Memphis while Joe the reporter was here city editor for an hour, stood in the pilot's box, smoked free cigars and smiled at the crowd.

BRIDGE SCHOOL DISTRICT VOTES FOR NEW BUILDING

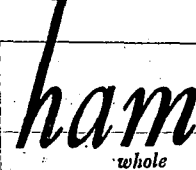

Four Engineers Finish Survey of System and Confer With Superintendent

The visitors have been in the United States two months, and have mastered the language sufficiently to make themselves understood.

JUST IDAHO

Comment on Current Conditions in The Gem State. By GUY FLENNER

The latest Idaho legislature, in its zeal to disclose added sources of taxation, enacted what is known as the inheritance law that upsets all the procedure of the past.

FORGET THE STOCK MARKET
