COMPANY PLANNING TO BRING NATURAL GAS TO GEM STATE

Ohio Corporation Applies For Certificate to Introduce Fuel Into Pocatello and Southeastern Idaho

The Associated Press, Nov. 19.—The Ohio Oil company, represented by John McFadden, resident manager, and L. D. Denning, another official of the company, today applied for a certificate of convenience to introduce natural gas into Pocatello and Southeast Idaho.

The application was made as part of a general extension of the company's field in western Utah. It called for construction of a line through the Cachee Bear river valleys from Oden to Idaho. The company sets its supply from Wyoming, Utah and Colorado fields, and according to J. H. Devine, Oden attorney representing the company, and E. Fitzpatrick, managing vice president, has a supply for at least 35 years.

The natural gas, supplied particularly for large scale use, will come into direct competition with the Public Utilities Co. and other corporations now supplying natural gas to Pocatello. Devine said, looking toward the company taking over the local plant in the Salt Lake city and Ogden.

In the application the company asked to supply gas to communities in Franklin, Oden and Blaine, and to extend particularly to the cities of Dracay, Malad, Pocatello, Franklin, Dunes and McCallum.

Whether Mr. Fitzpatrick has any information as to whether the company planned to extend the service through southern Idaho by way of Twin Falls, is not known.

The route to be taken from the present terminus of the line at Oden is now being surveyed by engineers. Surveys are now being made over the route from Pocatello through Blaine, then on to Malad and generally northward through the Lewis and Clark river valley alternative route going north from Blaine to Malad. A lateral would in this latter case be over the ridge between Malad from the vicinity of Garland in the Bear river valley to cities in the Cachee valley.

The extent of the working force and the money to be expended by the company was not estimated by Mr. Devine, but he said \$2,000,000 had been spent up to date in bringing the supply into Utah and distributing it.

On this job 3200 men were employed in order to rush the job to completion.

COMPANY CHALLENGING DEDUCTIONS OF COURT

BOISE, Nov. 19 (AP)—Challenging the accuracy of the deductions of the Supreme court, attorneys for the Burroughs Adding Machine company today filed a petition for a rehearing of the case in which the district court awarded \$23,000 to Robert Paris, a Boise high school teacher.

In the complaint it was charged that Burroughs company driver was negligent in speeding to the crash which occurred three years ago. In the petition for the rehearing, it was declared that the physical facts surrounding the automobile accident in which young Paris was injured could not have resulted in this type of settlement, which formed the basis of the Supreme court's decision in upholding the district court's award.

Further, the petition claimed that the injuries allegedly received by Paris had not damaged his mind to an extent that would justify "his graduation from high school and his entrance into the national guard were obtained by fraud."

ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY EXPELLS 21 STUDENTS

Council and Law Fraternity Take Action Following Campus Liquor Scandal

URBANA, Ill., Nov. 19 (AP)—Twenty-one University of Illinois students were expelled today at a meeting of the university council of administration and Gamma Eta Gamma, legal fraternity involved in last week's campus liquor scandal, was ordered "to show cause why it should not be disbanded."

Eight members of the fraternity were among those ordered expelled.

The wholesale expulsiens were said to be the most drastic disciplinary action ever taken by the council. Among the charges against the students were drinking, peacocking and sale of liquor and violation of the university no-car rule.

Wilton J. Sherman, Crown Point, Indiana, senior in the law school, who was fined \$500 after pleading guilty to possessing liquor found in the Gamma Eta Gamma house in a sheriff's raid early Sunday morning, was one of those expelled. Other members of the fraternity who were dismissed on liquor charges were: A. J. Withers, Hibbing, Minnesota; E. E. Lamborn, Marion, Illinois; A. Butwell, Cicero, Illinois; E. R. Hughes, Burlington, Iowa; J. P. McMillan, Carthage, Illinois; Charles Binkert, Quincy, Illinois; and Robert J. Hartley, Toulon, Illinois.

Robert Webb, Geneva, Illinois, a senior, was expelled for buying and transporting the liquor that was found in the possession of B. W. Hoare, sophomore, from Glendale, Illinois, whose revealing letter "his arrest" Saturday night led to the Gamma Eta Gamma raid.

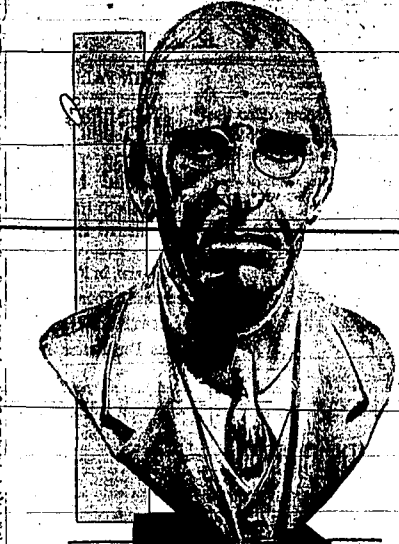
No disciplinary action was taken against Hoare.

GEM STATE HIGH PASSES STILL OPEN TO MOTORIST

Though this is not entirely unusual, yet, within the department reported, it is quite common at this time of year for several of the passes to be blocked by snow, some temporarily and some until late spring.

"Any day now," the department indicated, snow may block such ridges as Clear Fork between Salmon City and Missoula, Montana; Willow creek summit between Mackay and Challis; Stravell pass between Burley and Salt Lake City; Sheep creek divide between Montpelier and the Wyoming line; and Georgetown hill between Soda Springs and Montpelier. Snow has already hindered traffic on this latter hill.

Athletic Control Organization Re-elects Avery Brundage, Chicago, as Chairman of Association

LOUIS, Nov. 19.—The Amateur Athletic Union closed a stormy convention today by re-electing Avery Brundage, Chicago, to the presidency for a second term, ratifying the selection of Pittsburgh for the 1930 national track and field championships, and picking Washington for the next annual meeting.

The union completed the program of conciliation with the National Collegiate Athletic Association after a long-standing controversy, by changing its constitution to permit certification of athletes by those colleges and universities for connection in union records. Hereafter, only union registration has been accepted in national, district or club meets, but under the new regulation the statements of a college or university as to the eligibility of any of its athletes will be accepted without reservation.

This move is expected to have far-reaching effects in harmonizing the activities of the union and the colleges, heretofore in frequent conflict. If not actual open warfare.

GRAND JURY INDICTS REPRESENTATIVE FOR POSSESSION OF BOOZE

Action Adds New Force to Storm Over Prohibition Enforcement in Capital But Victim Denies Guilt

By ECHL B. DICKSON Associated Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—The indictment of Representative Edward F. Dunne, Illinois, by a federal grand jury today on a charge of possession of liquor added new force to the storm which has raged recently over prohibition enforcement in the capital.

A leaking salaried and trunk containing liquor, addressed to John Lavin, in care of Denton 411 house office building, were the basis of the indictment, which also named Dunne as the necessary link between the trunk and the indictment resulted from a mistake, and Lavin disclaimed any connection with the grand jury action.

The grand jury action followed a report by prohibition agents, November 8, that they had found a leaking suitcase at Union station and later a trunk containing liquor at Denton's home last January 19, after Denton returned from a visit to Panama. He made the Panama trip accompanying his nephew, Charles Lavin, St. Louis, his secretary, Miss Lucie Lee, and his wife.

Denton has been a resident of Twin Falls during his eight terms as representative of the twenty-fifth Illinois district, which includes Williamson county where the trunk was recovered. He voted for the Eighteenth amendment, the Volstead act and the Jones law. The latter imposes drastic penalties on liquor law violators.

He was advised at his home in Merion, Illinois, of the grand jury's action. The situation was explained to him by Miss Lavin in a telephone conversation, and an Associated Press staff reporter asked him if he desired to make a statement.

Expressing surprise that an indictment had been returned, Dunne said: "When the prohibition agents came to my office and inquired about it, I permitted them to inspect it. I found that the trunk was not mine; that it belonged to some one else and that the liquor was a mistake in the trunk. I am directing a trunk to me that I did not own. I explained it fully to the agents and a very nice receipt was returned. A similar mistake had been made in the past, with regard to my husband. His trunk, he said, had been made up of a mistake made by the wrong one sent to him. He indicated he thought the matter had been disposed of satisfactorily. He expects to come to Washington soon.

The prohibition agents' report said shipping tags on the box and trunk were addressed to John Lavin at Denton's office. When they first called at the office, they said Denton told them he did not have a trunk of that kind. When they called again, they said he had decided the trunk was not his and gave his permission for them to force it open. It is not clear how the trunk came to contain whiskey and gin.

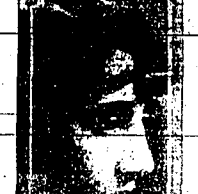

COMMITTEE HEARS SUGAR LOBBY AGENT

Washington Attorney Tells Investigators of Receipt of \$27,000 For Services

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Investigating a recent disturbance among Cuban sugar producers over possible intervention by the government in opposition against the administration of President Machado, the senate lobby committee was told today by John H. Carroll, Washington attorney, that he had been paid \$27,000 to ascertain the facts about the Machado government.

Carroll, who gave his age as "71 years old plus" and said he was "not an old-fashioned man," testified he had been employed seven months ago by H. C. Lakin, president of the Cuba company, New York, but had been prevented by illness from visiting Cuba.

The white-haired statesman, who complained frequently of being tired, said he planned to leave for Cuba Sunday and he promised Senator Borah, Idaho, chairman of the foreign relations committee, to give him a copy of the report he expects to make to Lakin on the situation in Cuba.

Carroll also said he had been paid \$10,000 by Lakin to act as advisor in an effort by the Cuban producers to obtain a lower duty on sugar in the pending tariff bill. He asserted he had not spoken to a single member of congress about sugar.

Other witnesses today were W. R. Callahan, chemist of the Cuba Products Refining company, New York; J. O. Bolton, Mississippi commissioner of agriculture, and Edwin P. Shattuck, representative of the domestic sugar producers' association.

Carroll said he had been employed as counselor to the Cuban embassy in Washington for several years at an annual salary of \$10,000 and was a personal friend of President Machado who, he added, "is one of the finest men I ever knew."

Federal Supervisor and Challenge Agent Speak to More Than 50 Men

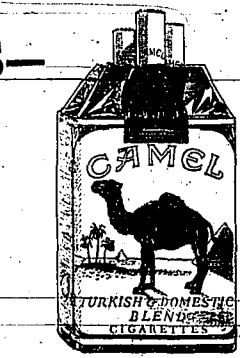

Optimism Pervades Conference for Progress in Business

RAILWAY EXECUTIVES PLEDGE COOPERATION IN BUILDING PROGRAM

Outlook So Encouraging Generally That Bankers Declare Prospects Bright For Lower-Interest Rates

By JAMES L. WEST (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—President Hoover's business progress conference got under way today in an atmosphere of optimism which is expected to go a long way toward removing such apprehension and hesitancy in the industrial and commercial fields as usually are manifest after a collapse of prices in the stock market.

Railway executives who gathered at the White House in the forenoon gave assurance of cooperation in the maintenance of employment by proceeding with full programs of construction and betterments, while members of the advisory council of the federal reserve bank reported in the afternoon that business and banking in each of the 12 districts over the country were in sound condition.

Outlook Encouraging So encouraging is the outlook generally that the bankers said the prospects were that money would be available at lower rates of interest to keep moving the wheels of industry and commerce. This was interpreted to mean that the council might recommend to the federal reserve banks a lowering of the rediscount rate from the present 5 per cent rate to perhaps 4 1/2 per cent now in effect in the New York federal reserve district.

Besides promising to carry out the

present program of construction and betterments, which during the next six months will exceed those of the corresponding period of last year, the railway chiefs said they would embrace the situation as to further possibilities of expansion.

Met With Board Meeting with the advisory council of the federal reserve board were Secretaries Mellon and Lamont, Governor Roy A. Young and C. S. Hamlin and U. C. Miller of the board, and John W. Folsom, director of the currency.

Governor Young issued this statement: "At a meeting of the federal advisory council, the members of which represent the 12 federal reserve banking districts in the United States, with the president, the general business situation was reviewed, and each member of the council reported that business and banking throughout his district are in a sound condition and the prospects were that money will be available at lower rates."

Because of the funeral of Secretary James W. Good at the White House tomorrow, the session of representatives of the industrial field has been postponed until Thursday morning, which was an open time at the executive office schedule for the conference.

SEASON'S WORK ENDS ON JACKSON LAKE RESERVOIR

DUNDLEY, Nov. 19 (Special to The News)—Repair and reinforcement work on the Jackson Lake reservoir has been closed down for the season, according to Project Superintendent R. H. Darlington, who has returned from a conference with Joseph Markham, Jackson reservoir superintendent, whom he met at Pocatello.

Superintendent Darlington says that the summer's work was devoted to the replacement of massive rock below the spillway distribution of loose rock on the top of the embankment, building of additional boom protection in front of the dam and concrete surfacing of the rock ledge just below the structure. Much additional material was also piled on top of the embankment. A large quantity of drift wood accumulation was also assembled and burned.

Although the embankment is some what increased in height, there will be no increase in the height of the present water level of the reservoir when full.

Weather conditions have been favorable for these operations during the season. No further work will be carried on until next spring, and the nature and scope of next season's work was discussed by Superintendent Darlington and Mr. Markham at the Pocatello conference.

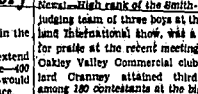

SPREEDWAY SEEKING RACING AGES ABROAD

General Manager of Indianapolis Track Goes to Europe to Draw Interest

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 19.—T. E. (Pop) Meyers, general manager of the Indianapolis speedway, has gone to Europe to arouse interest in racing drivers and manufacturers in the 500-mile race.

Manufacturers and drivers will be visited in England, France, Italy, Belgium, Germany and Spain. New rules which provide for two-men cars and much larger motors, will be explained by the promoter in the hope that the continent will begin early preparation.

That Europe is taking greater interest in the next race than in recent years is indicated, according to Meyers, by inquiries received regarding the kind of automobiles eligible.

The changes will increase the winning chances of foreign drivers, Meyers believes, because they long have been used to racing machines and have come to depend on them. There are few American speedway drivers who have ridden in a race other than alone.

Outstanding of the supercharger, too, should work to the advantage of the foreign entrants. In recent years the American supercharger and high type 4-cylinder motor have eliminated European entrants almost from the start, being many miles faster.

Meyers' departure, incidentally, virtually ended hopes of some of America's premier pilots that the race might be modified to permit use of their old 911 cubic inch motors.

Time was, back in 1912, '14, '15, '16 and '17 when foreign cars in most instances driven by foreign pilots, won America's auto racing classic. Since the supremacy on the oval has belonged almost without challenge, to the Yankees.

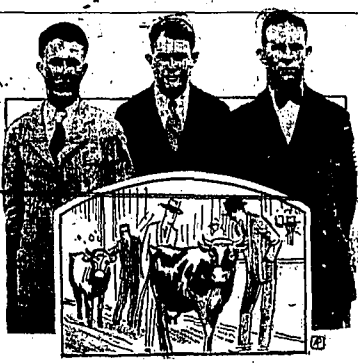

WALL STREET AWAITS HOCH-SMITH RULING

Millions of Owners of American Railway Securities Interested in Decision

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Wall Street and a million owners of American railway securities are watching the crucial decision of the United States supreme court for a decision on the constitutionality of the Hoch-Smith resolution.

The resolution was adopted in 1925 and was interpreted by the supreme court to the maintenance of an adequate system of transportation, to increase and effect with the least practicable delay changes in the rate structure of the country as well as permit the freedom of the movement by common carriers of the products of agriculture including live stock, at the lowest possible rates compatible with the maintenance of adequate transportation service.

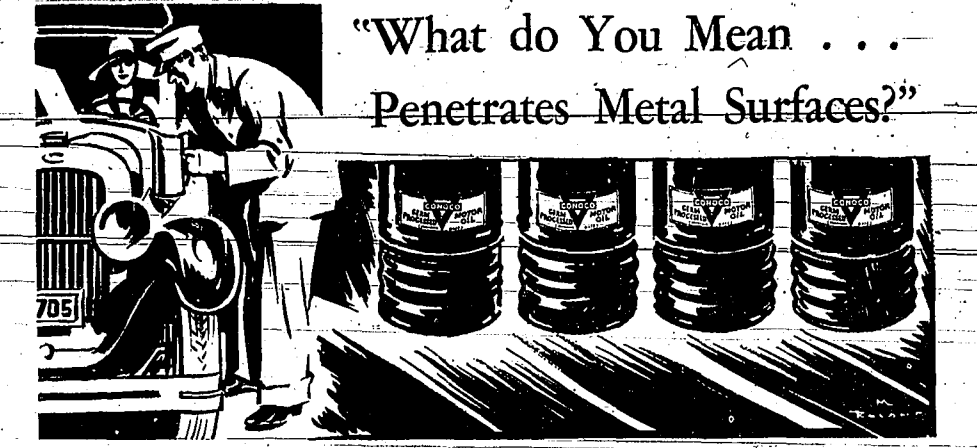
This position has been a determining factor in most of the commission's decisions on rates in the past four years. In the desks of commission members are 165 bundles of rate increase requests under the resolution. A few cases al-

ready have been argued and passed upon. The general effect of the resolution thus far has been to lower instead of raise rates.

The railroads recently pushed their fight against the resolution into the supreme court. The case now involves the commission's action in reducing freight rates on perishable fruits from the California area. The commission cut the rates 8 per cent. The railroads called the reduction arbitrary.

The banks, insurance companies, institutions and trusts which are the chief holders of railway securities believe that a clear cut decision on the constitutionality of the resolution will have more far-reaching effect on the future of railroad earnings than did the Federal decision of last summer.

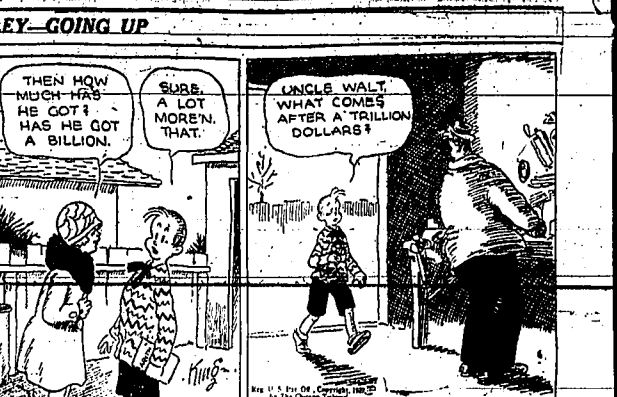

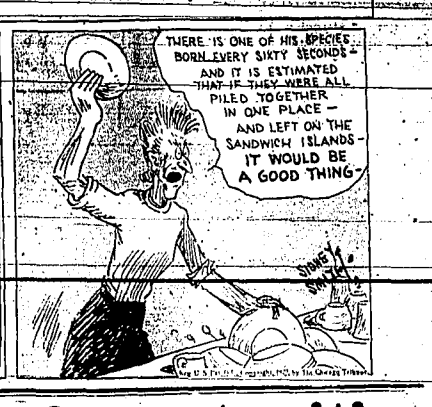

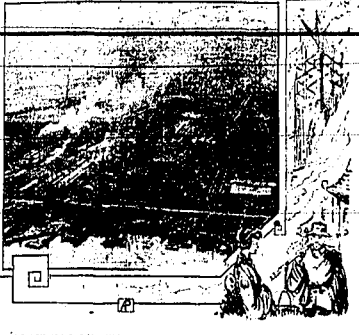

GENEVA, Nov. 19.—Commercial seamen from galleys to bridges—provide a baffling problem to industrial leaders in the world crusade for an eight-hour working day.

Two formidable obstacles in the way of protecting every man, Jack, from over-work through international agreements were thrust into the spotlight during the recent international Maritime conference here of 61 nations.

First—the natural circumstances of seafaring men, scattered over the seven or more seas, constituted one ultimate physical hindrance to the scheme for an eight-hour day, in pulling for regulated conditions of the toll.

Second—the world's shipowners are almost unanimously opposed to international agreements for limiting work hours of men and women who seek their living by going down to the sea in ships.

Although they number hundreds of thousands, maritime workers have scant opportunity to pool their ideas and strength, since they stand much of their lives far from the home base. Lacking essential contact with one another, they tend to lose unity in negotiating with employers.

Seafarers will be the last workers in the world to be successfully organized, said one of the prominent delegates to the maritime conference. "They admit
