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GREAT BANK LOOSES PURSE STRINGS TO LOWER SUGAR TARIFF

President of One of Most Powerful Financial Institutions in World, Relates Part in Lobbying

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—How the National City Bank, New York, one of the most powerful financial institutions in the world, loosed its purse strings to advocate lesser duties on sugar during the tariff dispute, was related today to the senate lobby by the president of the committee, Gordon S. Rentschler, president of the bank, testified that its monthly bulletin, which cost \$200,000 a year, was used to disseminate material on the subject and that a direct contribution of \$10,000 had been made to a fund for use in presenting to congress information advocating a low tariff on the product.

Mr. Rentschler was not asked and he did not volunteer to estimate the proportion of the \$200,000 annual expenditure for the bulletin which might be charged to the item of sugar duties. The bulletin, he said, was issued for the discussion of general business conditions, and he expressed the opinion that his company had a right to give its views on any economic problem.

Extensive Holdings in Cuba Summons to give the committee information concerning the holding in Cuba, Rentschler said the investments were worth "considerably in excess of \$25,000,000" and consisted of 225,000 acres which produced a year around 2,100,000 bags of sugar. When he was requested to give the committee information concerning the investment of the General Sugar company, organized by the bank to manage its Cuban sugar holdings, he agreed to do so, but, however, he said the advice of his attorney who was present.

Rentschler said the bank's bulletin had a circulation of 200,000 copies, and was edited by George E. Roberts, vice president of the institution, who had published items relating to sugar duties, and he expressed the opinion that congress had been considering tariff legislation.

Traces \$10,000 Payment He testified that about \$10,000 direct sugar contribution had been turned over to H. C. Lakin, president of the company, New York, and Edwin P. Shattuck of the Hawaiian Sugar planters' association, for use in obtaining additional information for presentation to the senate finance and mercantile committee and the senate finance committee in regard to a low sugar duty. "I know nothing of any publication that has not been open and above board," he asserted, adding that he had the "fullest confidence" in Lakin and Shattuck.

Informing the committee that he regarded the present Cuban government as "stable and sound," Rentschler said he knew nothing of the employment of John H. Carroll, Washington attorney, by Cuban sugar producers, as an adviser in connection with reports of possible intervention by the United States as the result of attacks on the regime of President Machado.

HEARING ON PROPOSED RAILWAY PROGRESSES

More Than Score of Witnesses Testifies During Day On Need of Link

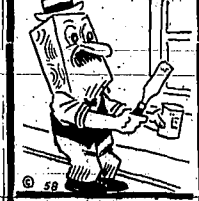
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20 (AP)—The private commerce commission hearing "into" the necessity of a proposed Great Northern-Western Pacific railroad from Klamath Falls, Oregon, to Ketchikan, California, gained momentum today as more than a score of witnesses testified on the stand. Most of the testimony came from northern California residents although Oregon and Utah representatives were heard. Director C. D. Maltbie presided for the examination, called much time by throwing out even greater masses of evidence than had fallen by the wayside at previous sessions. His reasons were that the material in most cases was largely repetition and that other parts were unimportant.

Testimony this afternoon came from a group of farmers in the area to be crossed directly by the proposed link. They included Mrs. Cecelia Chamberlin, secretary of the Greenview Chamber of Commerce; Pete Gerig, Bleher Stockman; Calvin W. Barney Farmer, F. W. Locant, Pituitville, sheepman; George Harper, Adair stockman, and H. C. Jack Bleher. They added specific examples to the record already compiled concerning impediments in transportation service from their territory expected to result from the building of the 200 mile railroad.

PRODUCERS OF WOOL DISCUSS NATIONAL SALES ASSOCIATION

Hagenbarth Urges Growers to Unite Against Eastern Interests "Which Believe They Hold Us in Peonage"

(By The Associated Press) SAN ANGELO, Texas, Nov. 20.—With action to be taken on the proposal tomorrow noon, discussions and addresses before the sixty-fifth annual convention of the National Wool Growers' association today centered around the new National Wool Marketing association. The wool growers were drawn up by a special committee of 15 here earlier in the week. The growers' association will vote tomorrow on acceptance of the marketing association, which was formed in cooperation with the federal farm board.

Governor Dan Moody, Texas, and P. J. Hagenbarth, Spencer, Idaho, president of the National Wool Growers' association, both referred to the proposed working agreement between wool warehouses marketing systems and the National Marketing association. Governor Moody said that federal aid was the avenue by which the wool growing industry could find its way to a plane of equality with other industries. President Hagenbarth declared it was time that "we get together on a wool marketing plan with other industries. President Hagenbarth declared it was time that Eastern interests which believe they hold us in peonage."

"We should not play second fiddle to Wall street, or to any industry of this country," Hagenbarth asserted. He emphasized the failure of the wool growers to obtain their desired wool tariff in the new tariff bill, declaring the wool growers' tariff was cut to 31 cents "while manufacturers of the wool were given increased tariff protection." "If this marketing plan is made broad enough, fair and simple," the growers' president said, "it will be a success. We have the farm board behind us, backed by half a billion dollars, and with broad powers that give any other government agency. There is no reason why all growers should not come under the shelter of the farm board. We want to say who we will take, not having others say what they will give."

Hagenbarth suggested that financing for growers be handled through intermediate banks. He pleaded with congress "not to let little details stand in the way of a working agreement between the warehouses and the marketing association."







Stanford Professor Takes Action Upon Students' Standing

(By The Associated Press) SANTA CLARA, Nov. 20.—Guido Simoni, John Casanova and Marvin Owen, three outstanding athletes of the University of Santa Clara, which defeated Stanford university football team Saturday, were declared ineligible today for further collegiate athletic competition on the ground that they had signed away their amateur status in accepting contracts to play with the Seattle club of the Pacific coast basketball league.

The action of disqualification was made by Professor William Owen of Stanford university, president of the Pacific coast conference. Simoni and Casanova are seniors and Casanova is a junior. Simoni is a halfback on the Santa Clara football team. Casanova is a halfback on the football team and a pitcher on the basketball team. Owen is first baseman and captain of the basketball team. The backs of the disqualification were the signed standing by the three students of the Pacific coast conference. Simoni is to play with the Seattle club. The agreement, it was asserted, was made through Joseph Fitzgerald, Santa Clara baseball coach and coach for the Seattle club. It was said that he had signed the contracts with the Seattle club, but they admitted having entered into an agreement with a contract for May 21. They all denied having received any money for having made such an agreement.

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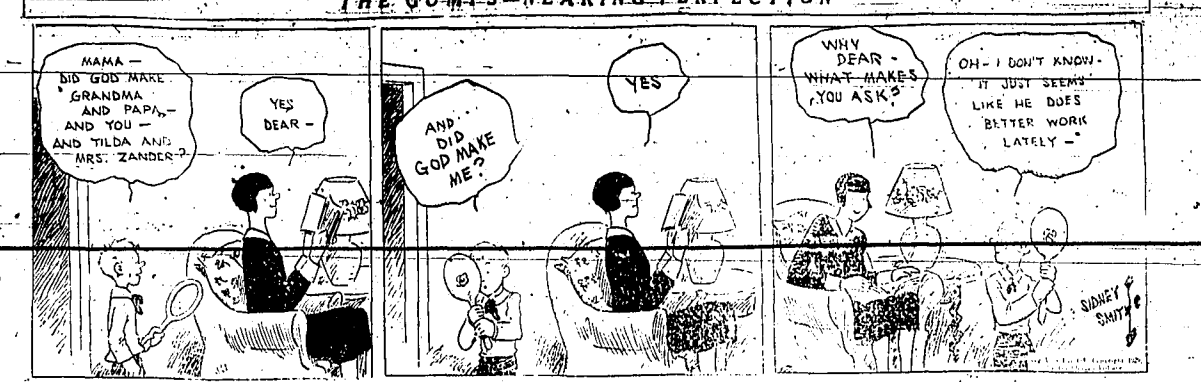

COURT DENIES MOVE TO DIRECT VERDICT IN PETERSEN TRIAL

Judge Baker Rules Jury Should Pass On Question of Night of Way Involved in Administration Case

Judge Hugh A. Baker in district court last evening denied a motion for a directed verdict of acquittal in the case of Henry J. Petersen, Twin Falls produce farmer, charged with the murder of William W. Hays, Twin Falls farmer, last October 23.

Judge Baker held that the jury should pass on the question of whether Petersen should be held liable for the death of Hays, as a result of driving on the wrong side of the street on an executive rate of speed.

The motion for directed verdict was sustained by Judge J. R. Bohstedt of the same court, when E. V. Larson, prosecuting attorney, tested the case for the first time before the jury.

Testimony agreed that the collision occurred at the south corner of the intersection of Main and Washington streets, and that Petersen was driving on the wrong side of the street while Hays was driving on the right side.

Three Eye-Witnesses. The three eye-witnesses were told by Arthur H. Barker, who witnessed the fatal crash from the street near the First National bank building, and by C. Roschelle, hotel clerk, and Orlin Marrow, newsboy, who saw Hays' Twin Falls automobile.

Other witnesses were Dr. H. E. Lambie, who attended the fatally injured man; W. H. Bush and William Taylor, the first police officers on the scene; H. W. Merritt, special surveyor, and W. A. Flower, photographer.

A special venire for 10 additional jurors was ordered by Judge Baker to complete the panel of jurors in this trial at the close of the main session and the special venire being included in the panel.

The jury, as finally chosen, was composed of Charles C. Noble, Wilbur Eckler, Ed Claiborn, G. E. Chastain, W. O. Kearley, A. H. Herge, D. E. Hayden, H. C. Farnsworth, W. L. Hays, W. M. Madden, L. I. Bonch, H. E. Goodrich, and Additional Jurors Called.

An order for drawing of 45 additional jurors to be in attendance on the court next Friday was issued by Judge Baker yesterday. A second trial in the case of Daniel P. Moon, charged with murder of Jack Lenoir, here last July, will be set for Friday.
