State Board Ruling Disadvantageous to Coach Kline's Team

RUPERT, Nov. 26 (AP)—Rupert's football team, bearer of the championships of the Southwestern and South Central Idaho districts, leaves tomorrow for Idaho Falls to battle with the team of that city for the state championship.

Rupert has had a good season, demonstrating a scoring ability far above any other in high school circles, and what is not so common in high scoring teams, showing an ability to settle down to a hard, grueling game when forced so to do by opponent strength. Bear Hunting Good in Northern Idaho

Sheep Owner of Council Urges State to Assist in Destruction of Bruins

BOISE, Nov. 25 (AP)—With the poor bear hunting season approaching along with the first snow, Thomas Morgan, sheep owner of Council, today urged the state game department to do all it could to further the destruction of the bear.

This animal—playful or vicious according to whether a sportsman or sheepman is describing him, is one of the most destructive animals in the state among both livestock and wild game animals, Morgan declared. He was indignantly incensed by a report circulated that dogs cannot be used in hunting them.

Through pointing to the feeding of the law which makes bear hunting with dogs legal, Game Warden R. R. Thomas

did not agree with the view that the bear should be entirely wiped out. "Even Morgan, in his letter, admitted that it would be virtually impossible to destroy the bear."

"He was more insistent, however, that nothing be done in the way of hunters going after the animal, for, he said, they can kill scores of sheep in no time at all—even if it is merely in play."

MOON WINS RELEASE AT SECOND TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

Jury Returns Verdict After Brief Deliberations Finding Accused Aged Man for Release in Absentia

Daniel P. Moon, 56, tried twice on a charge of first degree murder for shooting of Jack Lemmon here last July 11, was found not guilty by a jury in district court here that returned its verdict shortly before 10 o'clock last evening after deliberation of little more than an hour.

The aged man manifested his delight over the result. With beaming eyes he moved over to the jury box and each man "kissed" out the aged man in turn. Moon and wife, Mrs. Bell Lynch, who were with him almost constantly during his long ordeal in the court, were embraced by the "paddy" huggers over his vindication.

The verdict of acquittal came at the close of a second trial that occupied two days.

Testimony in his own behalf yesterday, Moon, 76-year-old father of Twin Falls, for 21 years and resident of 11 1/2 blocks in fall of the fatal shooting and the events that preceded it. He said he lived when he believed there was no other way for him to escape an attack that he believed was aimed at his life. He said he reached inside the door of his house for his .40-caliber and "one-up-one-down" and fired.

His wife, Mrs. Bell Lynch, who was with him at the time, testified that she saw him with a gun in his right hand and reaching toward his hip pocket.

His attorney, E. V. Larson, in his closing argument, said that Moon and Lynch were innocent of the murder of Lemmon and that Moon was a victim of a conspiracy.

In closing arguments for the defense, Frank L. Stephan, former attorney general, said that Moon was innocent and that Mrs. Lynch took a gun from him and shot him.

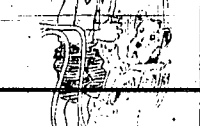
The jury took to its deliberations a number of photographs of the scene on which the shooting occurred and some other photographs showing the position in which Lemmon fell.

The jury in the first trial last September disagreed and was discharged after nearly 48 hours deliberation. The jury in the second trial which resulted in acquittal of the accused man was composed of D. N. Engelbrecht, D. E. Reman, Grover Davis, J. M. Kirkman, Harry Hinkman, H. Murphy, A. M. Best, George Bryant, H. E. Zim, H. L. Conrad, Orin McVey and William Harrison.

Charles G. Noble and Walter Denison, who were empaneled as substitute jurors and sat through the proceedings, were excused before the regular panel became deliberators last evening.

The aged man was released in this case, except for those serving in this case, were excused by Judge Hugh A. Baker last evening until Friday, when a second trial is to open in the case of Glen Martin, Oakley, charged with manslaughter in connection with an automobile collision in which two persons were fatally injured last May 2.

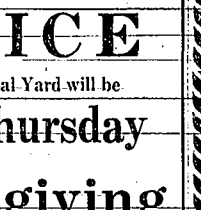

England Depends on Motor Car to Recover World Business Leadership

BRITISH MAKERS OF MOTORS PREPARE TO VIE WITH AMERICA

English Dominions and Colonies to Deprive Foreigners of Huge Sum Yearly

Manufacturers Soliciting Home Products Patronage

One of Richest Companies in World Will Back Automobile Industry of Land

By WADE WERNER (Associated Press Feature Service Writer)

LONDON, Nov. 26 — Great Britain soon should be rolling out of its industrial depression on the balloon tires of a big automobile boom.

Financial interests and manufacturers of motor cars are cooperating with the labor government's "minister of unemployment," J. H. Thomas, in preparations for a world-wide race on markets today dominated by American cars.

The British dominions and colonies have been spending, it is estimated, \$500,000,000 for American automobiles annually. This money, argue industrial and political leaders here, should go to British manufacturers.

Speed-Boom

If it can be made to go that way, most of Britain's 1,200,000 unemployed might be absorbed by the automobile industry and other industries, which eventually would profit by a boom in motor manufacture. The motor industry now employs 250,000.

The opening gun in the new offensive was the announcement that the Prudential Assurance company, regarded as one of the richest corporations in the world, had undertaken to back the British motor industry in a campaign for increased exports, and already had invested \$5,000,000 in Rover, Ltd., largest of the automobile distributing agencies in England.

Further developments, leaders of the

industry expect, will include an official assurance from the government that the McKenna duties, averaging 31.1 per cent on imported automobiles, will not be abolished by the labor government, thus maintaining the British industry in its present protected position in the home market.

As another concession the trade expects removal of the present automobile tax of 45 per horsepower. The average motorist's desire to keep down his tax has led to popularization in Great Britain of the very small, low-powered car.

American Not Impressed

To an American visiting the unusual British motor show the threat to United States manufacturers does not seem at first quite very serious. For among the automobiles priced around \$1000 factory in England, he finds cars which remind him of those sold in the United States for \$1000 back in 1916. His exception of a \$1000 car has changed radically in the 10 years since then, and it is hard for him to see how any foreigner could compete with America.

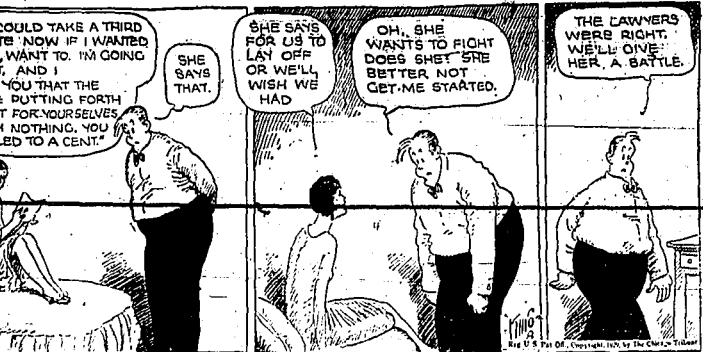

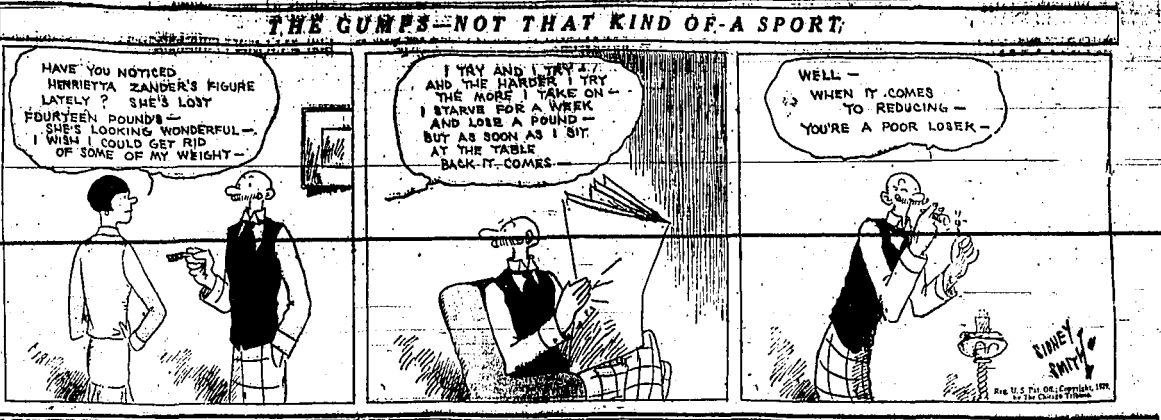
