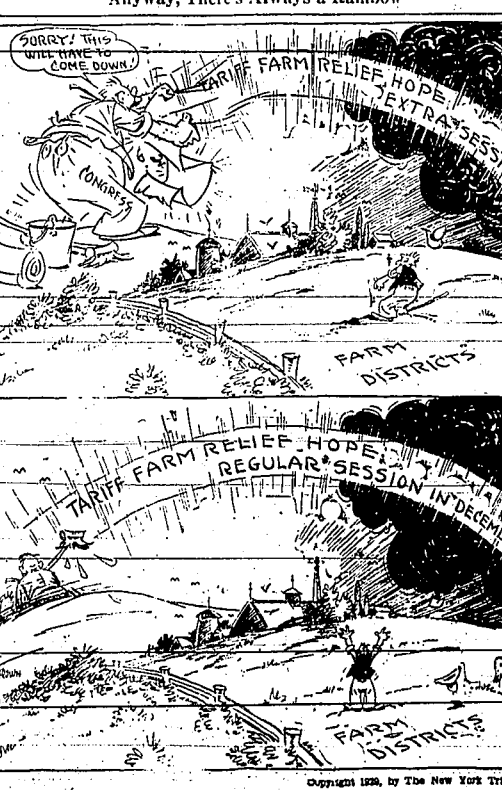

# For Stiff Grid Games Draw Interest Of Southern Idaho

## Twin Falls Plays Tough Eleven From City at Dam Site

### Rupert Meets Idaho Falls and Hansen Clashes With Albion While University Machines Vie at Gate City

There are four games in southern Idaho today, winding up the season, and all stirring interest in the football fans of the Twin Falls section. Here at home, on Lincoln field, the hour of 2:30 will see the kickoff of the battle between the Bruins and American Falls. Both teams in the best of form, with more than a smattering feeling that in another chance it could walk the champion of its district, and each will try earnestly to prove its caliber on its today's opponent. Thanksgiving is traditionally one of the most important days in the football season, and the game is one of the most eagerly awaited. The Bruins are the favorite, and the American Falls are the underdog.

At Pocatello the Moscow university team takes on the southern branch. It is an Idaho classic, with a rivalry that is old, and a considerable number from Twin Falls, appearing in the team lists of both institutions. In the southern lineup will be the boys from the Sullivan-Jackson-Martin and Laramie, not so long ago wearers of the Bruins' uniform. The excitement of the game is being keenly felt, because they are home boys and because they play in a contest between two largest state institutions.

At Burley, Albion high school and Hansen's team, both undefeated, clash in an attempt to determine the championship of the district. The game is a special one, as it is the first game since the season was interrupted by the flu epidemic. The score in the first game several weeks ago between these two teams was a tie.

The team has more power than many observers realize, when it keeps its eyes on its mind on its team work. It has no running stars, but can play the most effective kind of a "line" game. And that the winning style was met by the team backed by the patience and courage to keep up and drive it through.

play in case of war emergency. One army authority said the extra railroad would serve as a link between the first and second railroads, and would not be used for anything but military purposes.

## COURT SETS DATE IN BUHL POWER HEARING

Supreme Tribunal to Pass on Constitutionality of Proposed Sales Contract

BUHL, Nov. 27 (Special to The Spokesman)—The date for hearing on the petition filed by Carl Miller, Buhl, as a taxpayer to enjoin the city of Buhl from installing an electric light and power plant by means of a conditional sales contract with the Fairbanks-Morse company, will come in on November 12, before the supreme court of Idaho.

It is the contention of Miller that such installation would be violative of the provision of the state constitution which forbids any city or county to incur indebtedness in excess of its current income and revenue for that year, without submitting the question to qualified voters.

A bond issue was voted by the city of Buhl for \$25,000 installation of a distributing system. It was then proposed by the city to enter into a conditional sales contract with the Fairbanks-Morse company, manufacturers of the diesel engine to install an electric power plant and building for \$27,000 to be paid for out of earnings of the plant. Miller claims that this is equivalent to incurring indebtedness in violation of the constitutional provision, while the city contends that does not constitute any such violation as it alleges.

## SIX MEN TAKEN IN RAID ON TWO TOWNS

Jerome Sheriff Leads Expedition Against Hazelton and Eden Liquor Vendtors

POCAHONTAS, Nov. 27—Football teams representing the two divisions of the University of Idaho, the Vandals from the main campus at Moscow and the Trojans from the southern branch, will play here Thursday afternoon before the largest crowd ever witnessing a football game in this section.

The Thanksgiving day game, the first time a University of Idaho varsity has appeared in Pocahontas since 1910, will be the central feature in the program coming for the southern branch. The Vandal squad reached Pocahontas Tuesday morning from Los Angeles, where it defeated the Trojans at the hands of the latter, and played the University of Southern California team. The Vandals carried several seven-pound linemen in the Trojan game and will enter the Pocahontas game Thursday night on five regulars. The hospital list includes John Conroy, center, and starting guards, Walt Price, end, Howard Berg, Twin Falls, fullback, and Herbert Owens, Twin Falls, halfback.

One of the lightest teams in the game the Vandal varsity for the first time this season will face a heavier unit. Weighing in at an average of 177 pounds and a starting line-up scaling about 178 pounds, the Vandals rank as the lightest club in the east conference. The Trojans starting line-up in prospect for the game, however, averages only 165 pounds. Because of the large number of injuries sustained in the game at California and the fact that this game is the fourth consecutive contest for the Vandals, many of the Trojans expect a tough game. Coach Platinio of the Trojans has assembled some fine material at the southern branch and in his appearance has shown several scoring records. The Trojans have scored 143 points and allowed their opponents only 23 points. No team facing the Trojans has scored more than 10 points against Platinio's eleven, indicating a strong defensive ability.

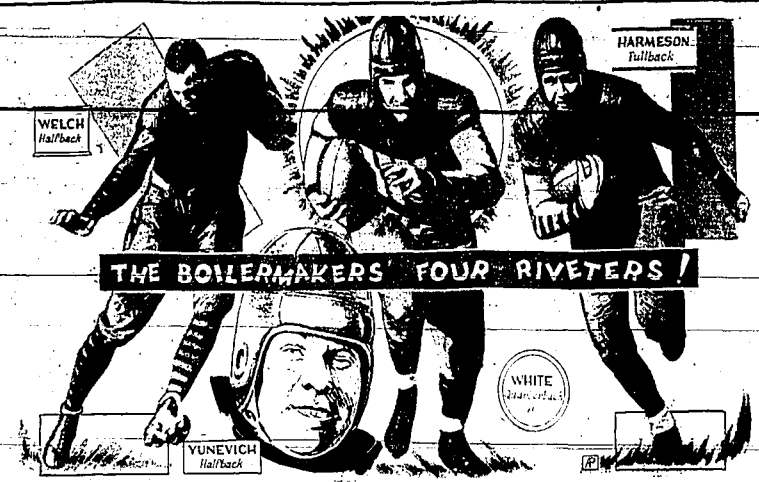

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—The multitudinous families which enjoy Thanksgiving day turkeys tomorrow will be observing a custom that prevailed ages before the Pilgrims first gathered round their festive board.

Smithsonian Institution's records bridging the thousands of years that veil the aboriginal civilizations, showed today that the Indians of the Southwest domesticated turkeys—and fattened them for the choicest moments of their ceremonial feasts. When the Pilgrim fathers, grateful for good harvests and a year of prosperity in a new world, decided on a day of thanksgiving to be celebrated at the banquet of roast turkey, they gave posterity the spirit of thanksgiving. The practice of such feasts, however, had been established long before by the cliff dwellers who got their birds from a pen instead of a thicket.

The turkey of the aborigines more nearly approximated the modern Thanksgiving fowl than the scrawny wild birds felled centuries later by the blunderbuss of the Pilgrim. Most of the domesticated varieties, especially the "Bronze," descended from the Mexican wild-turkey that ranged over Arizona, western New Mexico and southern Colorado—virtually the dooryard of earliest American civilization.

The Pilgrim's turkeys was the wild variety that ranged the eastern part of the United States from Maine to Florida. Like the two other wild varieties, that



# Dangers Of Selling Stocks Short Far Outweigh Possibility Of Gain For Average Investor, Says Babson

## Noted Bay-State-Statistician-Sets Forth 10 Major Reasons For Avoiding Technical Side of Market and Warns Amateur Speculators Against Practice Hazardous Even to Experts

By ROGER W. BABSON  
BABSON PARK, Mass., Nov. 27.—Short selling may be perfectly legitimate for the professional operator of a broker who deals in stocks as a business—in fact, at certain times short selling tends to stabilize the stock market. However, for the investor or small speculator it is very dangerous and should be avoided.

**Hazardous Reasons**  
There are at least 10 major reasons why it is hazardous to sell short. First, when buying stocks for the long account, if the market goes against you you can pay for the stocks and put them away until the market comes back. This you cannot do when selling short. You have to definitely cover your commitment some time and the brokers do not like to wait too long for you to do so.  
Second, this very covering of short sales tends to send up the market still further. Thus, your own actions work against you. In the third place, when buying stocks for the long account the more people who buy the same stock the better it is for you; but when selling short if too many people follow you, for example the combined group may sell more than the total outstanding capital of the company. Hence, a technical corner may be created. This results in a big loss to sell.

Fourth, when buying stocks for the long account they can be bought outright; but not so when selling short. To sell short you must do a margin business. All margin business, whether on the bull side or the bear side is distracting, disconcerting, and worrisome, and much more dangerous than outright purchase.

**Unvaluable Position**  
In the fifth place, the stocks that may look like the best short sales, may in fact be the poorest ones. This is because a lot of other people have the same idea about a given stock. Any considerable number of short orders for a stock are at once known to the professional. This is because the brokers have to go to the loan specialists to borrow the stocks on the floor of the exchange each day. The "long crowd" becomes aware at once when there is too great a short interest in a stock. They have it in their power to "organize" a bull pool, buy the stock up, and force the short sellers to cover at tremendous losses. The public scarcely realizes how closely the professional and insiders know all times the market position of a given stock. They know who the shorts are and often times they loan the stocks which the short sellers are borrowing.

**No Limit to Losses**  
Sixth, there is scarcely any limit to the amount a speculator can lose on the short side of the market because nobody knows how high a stock may go. On the other hand, there is a definite limit to how low a stock can go, even if that limit is close to zero. You know how much you can lose on the long side, but you don't know on the short side.

The seventh reason is the danger of corners. While corners are not very frequent, the possibility of them is a real danger in short selling. Manipulations may result in virtual corners. There are many examples of virtual corners caused by pool operators in which most settlements took place at great losses to the short seller.

The eighth reason is that short selling is expensive. Any dividends paid on the stock between the time of short sale and the covering of that sale must be paid by the short seller. Moreover, when stocks are loaning at a premium he has to pay that premium for the privilege of borrowing them. Also, if any extra or stock dividends are declared in the

interim, these are very expensive to the short seller.  
Nine, there is the danger to the speculator through possible failure of his

brokerage house. Of course, every one is not great and this danger can be avoided in most instances by using great care in the selection of a broker. However, the short seller is under obligation to return to the lender the stock that he has borrowed whenever the lender demands it. If in the meantime, his brokerage house should have failed, he loses not only the margin he has put up, but is still under obligation to buy the stock in the market regardless of how high the price may be, and return it to the lender.

Ten, short selling is essentially a highly speculative proposition. As such, it does not appeal to the conservative investor, and should not appeal to anyone except the professional trader. We have had in the past months a very remarkable example of the disastrous results of over-speculation for the rise. It is to be sincerely hoped that the speculating public has learned a lesson, and will not rush into



# Women Of Far Climes Contribute To Delicacies Of Thanksgiving



Recipe for Stollen, the cake baked above all others in her native land. Senator Sue Thore is a daughter of Denmark. Mrs. F. Grisanti, minister from Venezuela, tells the secret of the delicious cake which means so much to American tables.

Mrs. Edgar Prochnik, wife of the minister from Austria, presents a traditional English recipe for Stollen. Mrs. Krapfer, just the thing to serve on Thanksgiving.

Here are the recipes:  
Stollen (Frau Krapfer)  
2 pounds flour, 1 cup milk, 2 eggs, 2 yolks and three whole eggs, 1 pound sugar, 1/2 pound butter, a pinch of salt, 1/4 pound seedless raisins, 1/2 pound bitter almonds, ground, 1 small piece each of chopped orange and citron, the grated peelings of 1 lemon.

Sift the flour into a large bowl, make a little hole in the center, pour about 1 cup lukewarm milk into it and break all the yeast therein, mix it lightly with a little of the flour.

Allow this to stand about 1 hour in a warm place.

When it has well risen add eggs, sugar, melted butter, salt, and the rest of the milk. Beat very well for some time.

Then cover the bowl with a clean towel and let the dough stand once more in a warm place for about 1 hour.

Then the dough is put on a rolling board and all the other ingredients, raisins, almonds, citron, orange, and lemon—are sprinkled on top and

must be evenly and thoroughly kneaded into the dough, which is then rolled together and formed into an oblong loaf.

This must again be allowed to stand in a slightly warm place till it has well risen—generally about 1-1 1/2 hours.

Before putting the stollen into the oven, lightly brush it all over with a little melted butter and after that with the unbeaten whites of 2 eggs. Then sprinkle a little sugar with some fine sliced almonds on top and bake in a well heated oven for about 1 hour. After about 1/2 hour cover with paper so that sugar and almonds will not turn brown.

**Stuffed Cake (Senorita Grisanti)**  
Pound cake cut in four layers. First layer of praline stuffing must with praline sauce. Between the other layers spread the following mixture: Cream yolks of two eggs, one cup of milk and

two tablespoons of sugar. Beat the cake with sugar and thick. Mrs. Krapfer (Mrs. Prochnik) Measures in grams must be changed as

Make a dough out of 170 grams of flour, 140 grams of butter and 70 grams of sugar (on board). Form little balls and put them on a buttered and floured pan. Press into the middle of each small hole. Cover with thin layer of white of egg, so that crystal sugar will stick. Bake in medium oven till light gold in color and fill center of cavity with your favorite jam.
