WYOMING PAYS LAST TRIBUTE TO VETERAN FRANCIS B. WARREN

Snow and Leaden Sky Emphasize Mournful Atmosphere as Flag-Draped Casket Moves to Cemetery

(By The Associated Press) CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 28.—Wyoming's "army old man," Francis B. Warren, veteran of the United States senate, came home for the last time today and was borne to his final resting place in a casket draped with the stars and stripes of the flag.

Met at the railroad station at 8:15 A. M. today when the special funeral train reached Cheyenne, the senator's body was received by an escort of honor from the nation to which Wyoming gave its most distinguished citizen 37 years ago.

Eight eulogists men from Fort Russell, regarded by Wyoming as the greatest of its military posts, followed the casket and the other eulogists paraded past the casket. The casket was carried on a platform by the men of the post.

General Pershing Attends The funeral escort, consisting of the chief of the military post, received the body at 10:30 and began the eulogies in the place of the late senator.

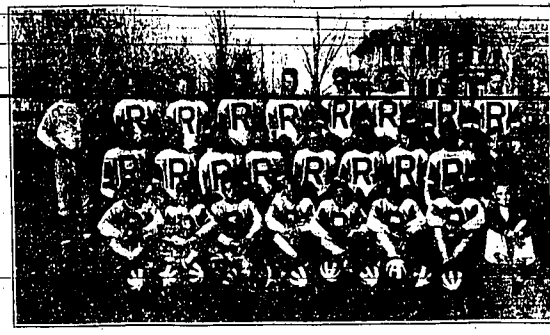

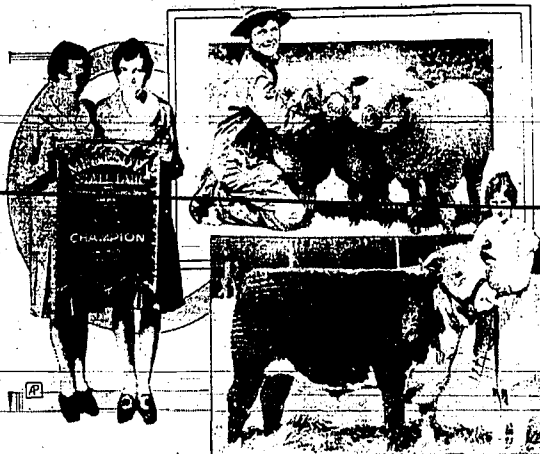

Official Sees Weather Received By Radio As Great Air Safety Factor
NEW YORK, Nov. 20 (AP)—Weather information radioed to pilots from the department of commerce stations is doing more than any other one thing to provide safety in flight, says Major Clarence M. Young, assistant secretary of commerce for aviation.
Twenty-four government radio stations now are broadcasting the weather for pilots in flight every half hour, and 13 more stations, covering the majority of the nation's airways, are under construction. Twenty of the present radio stations were constructed and put into operation last year.

When the department's radio weather chain is completed, Major Young said, there will be a heavy square mile in the United States where flying takes place that will not be covered by the radio weather broadcast.
A simple receiving set aboard a plane enables a pilot to keep in constant touch with the stations and is advised of changing weather conditions. The exchange of terminal weather conditions between the government's radio stations, the air secretary said, probably is the most important of the weather information that can be reported for the pilot because it keeps him advised whether a safe landing can be made at his terminal field.

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# All Fundamental Economic Tendencies Converging To Create Splendid Buying Opportunities In Bonds, Expert Avers

Investors Turning to Interest Bearing Securities  
Where Safety Forms Principal Feature,  
Declares Noted  
Statistician

By ROGER W. HANSON  
DABSON PARK, Mass., Nov. 28.—The successful investor is the one who guides his policies by fundamental economic trends and not by what the majority of people are doing. He recognizes that there are always opportunities, and he takes advantage of changing conditions to strengthen his investment position. Today the outstanding opportunity is in the purchase of good sound bonds. All the fundamental economic tendencies are converging to create splendid buying opportunities in the bond market. Let me repeat some of these factors.

**Treasuries Pay Higher Bonds**  
The enthusiasm for common stocks which was so rampant a few months ago has dispersed. Investors are turning to interest bearing securities where safety is the prime feature. The style has changed almost overnight from common stocks to bonds.

The purchasing power of the dollar will increase as commodity prices gradually decline. Such a situation is highly favorable to the bondholder because it means that his income is constantly worth more in terms of the cost of living. He has a fixed return from his bonds and as the purchasing power of that return increases he is so much better off.

Chances to obtain good bonds at high yields do not occur frequently. One may wait 10 to 15 years to secure a high yield on good bonds. As interest rates become easier, these high yields will no longer be offered. Extensive liquidation in the stock market is sure to cause money to a considerable extent. The wise investor is the one who buys bonds when the attractive yields are still available.

Not only are bonds attractive from the yield standpoint, but also from the stand point of conservatism. When the high-yield issues which are a discount of 10 to 15 points we must know that that situation cannot last. Sooner or later these bonds are going to be paid out at par, and in the meantime interest rates and the other factors mentioned will lead to appreciation in bond prices. Bonds ordinarily are not bought for appreciation, but here is an opportunity to obtain both a high yield and an increase in principal.

**Assets Behind Bonds Larger**  
Underlying equities behind good bonds were never higher than at present. These equities have been built up in two ways—first, through the sale of common stocks instead of bonds during the past few years, and second, through the great increase in earnings and assets of our corporations. Financing by common stocks and purchases of additional properties with the proceeds has merely added that much greater assets behind underlying bonds without any increase in the amount of bonds outstanding. In fact, many companies have retired most of their bonds, thus leaving the remainder in the strongest asset position in history. One of the common arguments for the purchase of common stocks heard in the past few years has been the increase in equities behind such stocks. How much greater has been the increase in the equities behind bonds, which, of course, have the first call upon earnings and assets!

Extensive mergers are making many junior mortgages of small companies the underlying liens of large corporations. The investment position of such junior issues has been, and is being, greatly strengthened by the merger movement.

Larger amounts for research and improved scientific production methods and greater industrial efficiency are

cutting costs so that companies are able to show larger incomes without the bond interest. At the same time the amount of interest requirements of many corporations has been greatly reduced through bond redemption, and also by reducing operations whereby lower coupon rates have been substituted for higher ones.

There has been a large increase in the number of people buying securities during the past few years. Many of them are now sorely disappointed over their stock market losses. However, they have become initiated into finance and may will turn to bonds. Thus, a much broader market for good bonds should exist during the next few years.

Bonds can now be bought to recoup a part of stock market losses. The prices of good sound bonds are low—that they offer a chance to make up at least a part of the losses entailed in the stock market crash.

Buy bonds for safety! The bitter experience of stock speculators during the past month clearly re-establishes the truth that bonds are the safest medium of investment. A bondholder has a definite claim on both earnings and assets of a business. The stockholder is merely a partner, and, as such, is subject to the losses as well as to the gains of the business. A bondholder's claims always come first.

**Discrimination Necessary**  
I repeat that now is a good time to buy good bonds. However, remember that not all issues bearing the name of bonds are worthy of confidence. Discrimination is highly essential in the bond market just as in any other market. Many securities are misnamed under the name of bonds which are little better than common stocks. Sound underlying bonds, however, offer the investment opportunity of a lifetime!

# MOSCOW PROFESSOR PREDICTS SUCCESS OF FEDERAL BOARD

## Dean E. J. Iddings Foresees Far-Reaching Results Toward Betterment of Farming Situation

(Special to The News) MOSCOW, Nov. 28.—Far-reaching results toward the betterment of the farm situation are predicted for the cooperative program worked out by the federal board in its first year of operation in Chicago with the presidents, deans and extension directors of American agricultural colleges by E. J. Iddings, dean of the University of Idaho college of agriculture.

"In my judgment, the most important meeting it has been my privilege to attend in the past few days," Iddings' comment on his return to Moscow this week. He attended the first annual conference of the national farm board, held upon the request of the farm board, agents and the national extension specialists and supervisory officials in forming the most comprehensive organization in the country for making direct contact with the farmers and with farm problems.

### Stress Marketing Side

Members of the farm board stressed the importance of the marketing side of agriculture in their discussion. Iddings called upon the colleges for assistance in training young men in the economic phases of farming, such as market trends and of market outlook material. Especially there was called by the board the active help of county agents and of all extension workers to make known to the public the policies and undertakings of the board and to get farm cooperation, the dean said.

The college president was favorably impressed by the statements of the board members and promised the board the whole-hearted cooperation of the American colleges of agriculture, reports Dean Iddings. Personal statements of the farm board's policies will be sent to farmers from the extension departments of agricultural colleges. The board also plans to set up machinery for making surveys of cooperatives within the state, to determine the needs of the farmers and the efficiency of business methods.

### In Full Accord

"We in Idaho are in full accord with the program of the farm board," said Dean Iddings. "Our experiment station force, especially our dairy and livestock divisions, are making a determining effect on farm income in Idaho, and our county agents and field specialists will be supplied with information and assistance to carry to the people of the state the farm board's message of an organized agriculture. Plans are now under way for a general conference of Idaho extension service staff to be held early in 1930. This conference will permit the review of extension plans and policies and the redirection of the program of work in Idaho, if needed, to cooperate closely with the general policies of the farm board for bringing the agriculture of the state into a stabilized and more profitable basis."

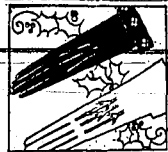

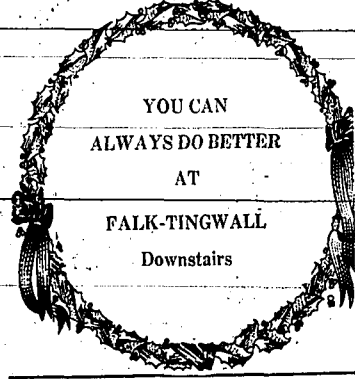
