GREY-HAIRED WOMAN TESTIFIES IN TRIAL OF GOTHAM GAMBLER

Star Witness of State in Arnold Rothstein Murder Submits to Merciless Questioning by Defense

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—A tiny, grey-haired woman, an innocent bystander at one of New York's billiard parlors testified at the murder trial of George A. McManus that she heard a "crash" in the Park Central hotel the night of November 4, 1928, and saw a man staggering down the hallway a moment later.

The witness was Mrs. Marjorie A. Putman, a wife of the late Marjorie Putman, and a guest in the Park Central hotel; the state contends McManus, a well-known gambler, was shot in the hallway while running after her, his hands pressed to his abdomen and a "terrible" look on his face.

Later, however, she talked the matter over with Judge Hyde Stark, Asheville, and his counsel came to New York and told her to Assistant District Attorney Marbro, she said she had decided to testify in the case.

Mrs. Putman was preceded on the stand by "Nigger Nate" Raymond, Pacific coast gambler, who was a participant in the shooting and where the state alleges are the motive for the killing.

Raymond testified that he was \$20,000 from Rothstein that September Sunday in Jimmy McEneaney's apartment, but had not collected the money. He had nothing to show that Rothstein owed it to him.

Raymond said that being a stranger in town, he had asked Rothstein for a memorandum after the game but the rest of the crowd laughed at him and told him to get out. He was asked if he decided it was a fair case.

Mrs. Putman testified that the testimony of all the gamblers participating in the case pointed to the fact that she had preceded Raymond on the stand, as it was struck from the record as irrelevant.

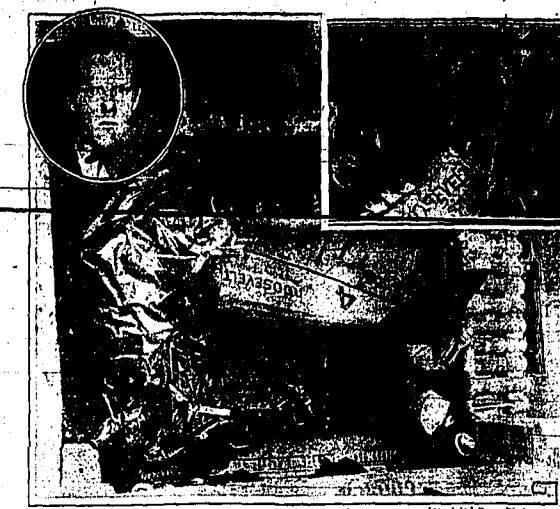

FRANCE WANTS CUSTOMS MEN TO AVOID "PRYING"

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Sent back to France after an absence of a year and a half, United States customs men have been instructed to avoid all suggestion of prying into the secrets of French industries.

The men were withdrawn on complaints from Paris that the Americans were inquiring into industrial secrets and were being sent to American competitors of the French.

High Duty Results. By consent of the French government it had been their business to acquaint themselves with the domestic value of French exports. After their withdrawal the United States treasury had no choice except to assess ad valorem duties on French merchandise on the basis of value in American markets. It resulted in duties so high that in many cases French manufacturers suffered a loss of trade.

Investigation of the treasury prevents the complaints to have been without foundation and that there is little or no ground for believing American agents ever betrayed their trust. The new understandings between the two governments places American agents on much the same footing as that enjoyed when they were recalled.

The scramble for tickets has been little short of sensational. Spectators tonight were reported to be buying and obtaining as high as \$150 a pair for such tickets as they could get in time for the game.

## Griffith Conquers Basque by Decision

### Woodchopper Finds Youth From Iowa Tough Battler and Many Blows Go Wide

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—Jerry (Tuffy) Griffith defeated Pablo (Elfin) in a cage tournament here at the Chicago stadium tonight, getting a decision of the referee and two judges.

Griffith found the rain-soaked Iowa youth tougher than he anticipated and charged in ruthlessly in the seventh, eighth and ninth rounds. Griffith was punching cleaner, however, and scored decisively with both hands to beat and body with Paulino doing considerable damage with his right-hand shot to head and left hook to jaw. Griffith showed his "old" ability to box Paulino's whips and was boxing cleverly.

Paulino hooked a left to the jaw in the sixth that sent Griffith to the ropes and was followed by a right which Paulino nailed Griffith with another "loose" left, however, and then missed a high dozen rights in an attempt to connect with a finishing punch.
