GERMANS CELEBRATE FRENCH-EVACUATION OF RHINELAND ZONE

Tri-Color Floats to Earth After Waving For More Than Decade Over Famous Old Teutonic Fortress

(By The Associated Press) COBLENZ, Germany, Nov. 30.—The French tri-color that replaced the Stars and Stripes over the famous old fortress of Ehrenbreitstein after the evacuation of the American troops from the Rhine land was hauled down for the last time today, as the French soldiers began to evacuate the second Rhine land zone.

Most of the French soldiers entrained for Metz.

The lowering of the tri-color and the hoisting of the German Republic standard on the castle above the historic Rhine was the signal for celebrations throughout the Rhine land tonight.

People Give Vent to Joy. The people gave vent to their joy at being free from the yoke of foreign occupation that has lasted for 11 years. Only a few Germans watched the French soldiers depart.

Hundreds of bonfires were lighted tonight on the Rhine and Moselle hills. Fireworks display burst from the hills and the air was filled with Ehrenbreitstein, where the American army hoisted the Stars and Stripes in 1918.

Church bells rang out, prominent officials of the Reich presided over festivities to which they brought the congratulations of the government and the rest of Germany. It was "der tag" for every Rhine lander in the evacuated zone.

At Metz, thousands of persons gathered at the "Deutschens Eck" at the confluence of the Rhine and the Moselle, where there is an imposing monument to the former.

Braus' Bands Played. Brass bands played martial and religious music. The bands were used as a tribute of respect to the war dead.

A detachment of Prussian state police, headed by a police band, marched into the city after the evacuation to replace the foreign military police.

The celebrations at both Coblenz and Aachen were broadcast throughout the country.

JACKSONVILLE, Ill., Nov. 30 (AP)—Alvin-Carlson, Lewistown, Montana, former service man, who has been a victim of amnesia for the last 10 years while his family may have had up to date, tonight was on his way home with his brother Edward who located him in the Jacksonville hospital. Alvin had been admitted under the name of Harry Sicker four years ago, being transferred from Elgin.

Carlson's mother, brothers and sisters are still living in Montana, his brother having died five years ago.

Carlson was found through a picture published in the Red Cross magazine and was seen by his brother who communicated with the hospital authorities and arranged to see the patient. Alvin's memory apparently cleared up after short conversation with his brother and the identification was complete.

FEDERAL FUNDS HELP BUILD MANY ROADS

Total of \$82,736,978 Goes to Construct 7402 Miles of Highway During Year

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—Seven thousand four hundred miles of road built in the United States and \$82,736,978 were added to the other thousands of miles that have received federal aid in 1929.

A total of \$82,736,978 was expended on this and 1088 miles of other road, but the record of mileage improved for the year decreased slightly as compared to the previous year.

In his annual report, today Thomas H. MacDonald, chief of the bureau of roads, explained that by expending a balance from the yearly fund appropriated for road building had been abated and that it was necessary to keep expenditures under the limit of the current appropriations, which have amounted to \$15,000,000 yearly.

The federal aid system comprises a total of 188,875 miles of main interstate and local roads. At the close of the fiscal year, MacDonald said, the length of roads in the system improved with federal aid was 78,000 miles, or 41.3 per cent of the total.

During the year the bureau cooperated with Vermont, New Hampshire, Kentucky, Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi in the building of roads damaged or destroyed by floods in 1927.

MacDonald's report also negotiated between the bureau and Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi in the building of roads damaged or destroyed by floods in 1927.

TRAIN MOVES WEST WITH 68 WAR DEAD

HARRISBURG, Pa., Nov. 30 (AP)—The special train bearing the bodies of 68 veterans of the memorable winter campaign in Archangel in 1918-1919, was crossing the Allegheny river on the Pennsylvania tonight, after ceremonies here late today. The next official stop is Philadelphia.

Nature, as if sensing the appropriateness of the occasion, provided a fitting setting for the last of the long journey of the veterans of the distant world which gained the name of the Polar Bear from its service in the cold of Russia during the winter of 1918-1919.

The train was steamed from the cold when the train pulled into the Pennsylvania railroad station here.

A detachment of soldiers, their ears and faces red from the stinging cold, stood at attention in the train shed which had been band from the veterans of the Foreign War played a funeral dirge. The soldiers fired a salute over the train.

A wreath was placed on one of the caskets and the train started westward again in 15 minutes.

The destination, Detroit, is expected to be reached about 9 A. M. tomorrow.

Three Major Public Utility Companies of Southern Part of State Expect to Equal 1929 Expenditures

(By The Associated Press) MOISE, Nov. 30.—Two of the three major public utility companies operating in southern Idaho estimated today their expenditures would be at least equal expenditures of 1929 and in some lines exceed them. The third company was unable to make a statement as the budget for the year has not been made up at headquarters.

The Idaho Power company will spend \$1,100,000 in improvements, betterments and extensions of service with an especial trend toward expansion of rural service. H. J. Plimburgh, general manager of the Oregon Short Line, telegraphed from Salt Lake City that the 1929 budget had just been made up.

Operation and maintenance work, however, will be fully up to the 1929 level with extensions possible with increased business. The Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph company was unable to make an estimate.

Much Money for Roads. That the state will not be lax in other expenditures promised for the state, state and federal money to the extent of \$3,200,000 will be spent on highways with a possible enlargement of this sum by \$1,000,000 if congress increases the federal schedule. In addition to this is an estimate.

FRIENDS PLAN TRIBUTE TO BLACKFOOT PHYSICIAN

BLACKFOOT, Nov. 30 (AP)—The funeral of Dr. Clayton A. Hoover, dean of Idaho physicians, who died here today at the age of 70, will be held at the residence here at 2 P. M. tomorrow under Masonic auspices.

Dr. Hoover was a past master of Montpelier lodge. He was graduated from Georgetown university and came to Idaho in 1882, when he was the only physician between Evanston, Boise, Montpelier and Buhl.

His son, Stewart Hoover, was the first West Point graduate and the first Idaho soldier to be killed in the World War. An American Legion post here and one at West Point were named in his honor.

Dr. Hoover is survived by his widow and five grown children.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 30 (AP)—A locomotive engineer was killed and six persons were injured late this afternoon as the Byamcoer, fast Big Four passenger train running from Cincinnati to Chicago, crashed into a standing locomotive one mile east of Acton, 15 miles southeast of here.

George Kern, Indianapolis, engineer of the passenger train, was crushed to death in his cab.

SEVEN PERSONS DIE IN RAILWAY WRECK

Early Morning Accident on Eastern Shore of Virginia Takes Heavy Toll

NORFOLK, Va., Dec. 1 (Sunday morning) (AP)—Seven persons were killed and a number injured in the wreck of a Pennsylvania railroad excursion train at Onley, on the eastern shore of Virginia, last night about midnight, according to information received here early this morning.

Train was en route from Norfolk to New York. Only one of the dead had been identified. M. H. Calloway, Delmar, Virginia, passenger brakeman. Four women were said to be among the dead.

Cause of the accident was not known here, but possibly other dead had to leave left the rails and turned over, although the engine and the first two coaches remained on the track.

At 1:30 P. M. it was said all of the bodies and possibly other dead had not been removed from the wreckage.

Frigid Wave Paralyzes All Shipping On Great Lakes and Causes Extreme Suffering Over Broad Area

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—Gradual relief from the sub-zero cold wave that held the Middle West and Great Lakes sections in its grip, leaving more than a score dead in the wake, began today with the slow rising of temperatures.

The frigid wave paralyzed shipping on the Great Lakes, and caused blizzard-like proportions over the lower St. Lawrence valley and southern Saskatchewan and caused extreme suffering.

The toll of deaths attributed to the cold stood tonight at 22. Of these 11 were dead in Chicago, nine in Ohio, one in Indiana and one in Wisconsin.

Three of Chicago's dead were from Chicago's expected a minimum of 14 degrees above tonight to contrast with the zero touched last night.

Everywhere on the Great Lakes ships were reported stationary. Most of the stalled vessels were grain carriers, while tomorrow meet a rise in insurance rates.

Some of the record low temperatures for November reported last night were: Duluth, Minnesota, 10 below; Peoria, Illinois, 2 below; Devils Lake, North Dakota, 0 below; Minneapolis, Manitoba, 10 below; St. Paul, 4 below; La Crosse, Wisconsin, 0 below; Columbia, Missouri, 0 below.

BLIZZARD HALTS SEARCH FOR CARL BEN EIJELSON

NOME, Alaska, Nov. 30.—A terrific blizzard which raged at Teller, Alaska, combined with low visibility at North Cape, Siberia, prevented further attempts today to rescue Carl Ben Eijelson, and his mechanic, Earl Borland. The aviators have been missing since November 4, when they were still attempting to reach the far landing ship Nauk, locked in the ice at North Cape.

Pilot Joe Crosson left here for Teller today, shortly after his arrival from Fairbanks to join Pilot Frank Dorland, who is engaged in the rescue work.

Eijelson became lost while on a second trip from Nome to the Nauk.

Fire Fighters Continue Battle Against Fierce Western Oregon Blazes

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Nov. 30 (AP)—Fighters today continued fighting doggedly innumerable forest fires, one of which destroyed the Northrup Ply Logging camp here today.

In addition to destruction of the logging camp, homes of ranchers along the Coos river were tormented.

Although all of the fires were considered dangerous, United States forestry officials sent more men to the blaze south of Powers, Oregon, where the 2000-acre fire was ravaging valuable timber.

Heavy winds fanned this fire toward another large blaze in Coos county, reported to be burning over a 12-mile front.

All available men in Curry and Coos county are fighting fires from the Coos county line north through the two counties. The supply of men, forestry officials, said is diminishing rapidly.

MORROW IN LINE FOR POSITION IN SENATE

American Ambassador to Mexico Will Be Offered Place in Upper House

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 30 (AP)—An announcement that Dwight W. Morrow, American ambassador to Mexico, will be named as United States senator for New Jersey, immediately after his return from the London naval disarmament party, was made by Governor Morgan F. Larson here tonight.

Morrow will be expected to attend a testimonial dinner to Walter E. Edge, ambassador to France.

David Laird, at the same time Governor Larson, had sent him to David Baird, Jr., Camden, whom he had already designated to fill the vacancy, by the resignation of Senator Edge when the latter was appointed ambassador by President Hoover.

Mr. Baird's nomination as senator was issued by the governor today. Mr. Baird will go to Washington within the next fortnight to take the oath of office. He will serve in the Senate until such time as Mr. Morrow work at the London disarmament conference. He will then succeed Mr. Morrow will be appointed for the unexpired term.

LEADING POWERS OF WORLD ACT TO END RAILROAD QUARREL

Expressions of Desire of Governments that War Between them Arise in Course of Discussion at Capital

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—The attitude of powers interested in avoiding Chinese-Soviet hostilities in Manchuria has been indicated to the United States by British, French, Japanese, Italian and German governments.

The expressions of the desire of these governments that be averted were made in the course of consultations initiated by Secretary Biltmore and carried out in various capitals by the American government.

A day filled with conferences marked the return to the capital of the secretary of state after his absence over Thanksgiving. He conferred early this morning with President Hoover on the situation and later talked with Ambassador Biltmore.

The British charge d'affaires afterward was made in the course of another talk with the president.

The discussions with the various principal powers are continuing. Mr. Biltmore said he added that there is no plan of intervention or anything approaching intervention being considered.

Absence of reports of fresh conflict between Northeast Manchuria yesterday morning, however, was noted by the Russian and Chinese officials who had occupied war attention since the opening of the war when the Soviet army was in full drive.

However, the course of peaceful negotiations is being followed. The long standing dispute over the Chinese Eastern railway was still obscure. Moscow had reported the acceptance by the Chinese government of the terms of a preliminary peace conference and also made known its rejection of a conference stipulations by Nanking.

On the other hand Foreign Secretary G. T. Wang was emphatic in saying that the Chinese government would not authorize the Nanking government as preliminary to formal negotiations.

The Chinese armies, apparently driven 100 miles or more back from the Western frontier seemed to have maintained their position. British and Chinese sources said that Mongolian tribal chiefs had agreed to send 30,000 soldiers to Manchuria to bolster the defense.

Suggestions of international intervention in the dispute which had been held in abeyance pending developments and the opinion in Washington was that the two nations involved might be expected to find their own solution.

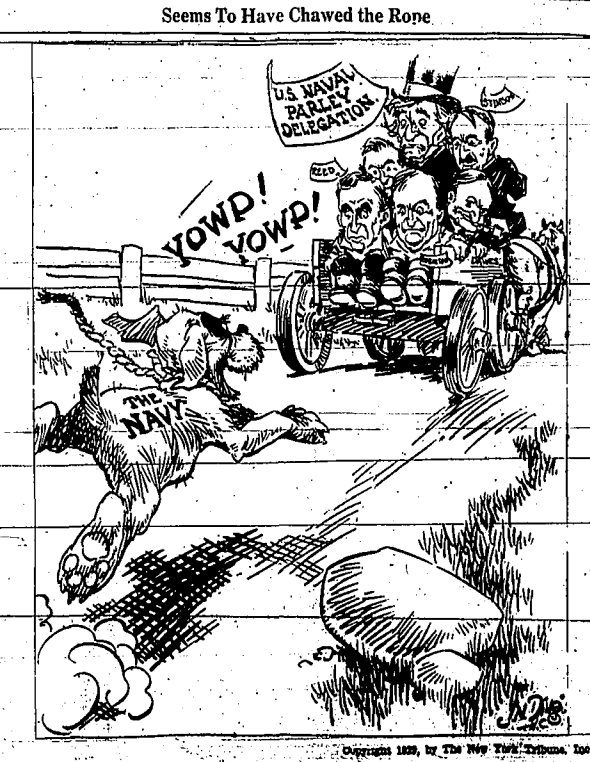
Firth 4-H Judging Team Scores at Kansas City

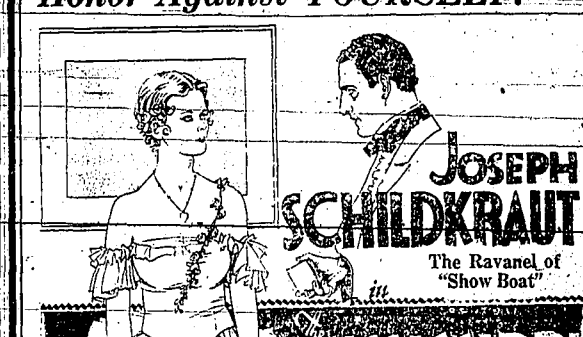

WITNESSES RELATE ACCOUNTS OF FATAL AUTOMOBILE CRASH

Prosecution Hastening to Close in Presentation of Case Against Oakley Boy Accused of Manslaughter

They also had evidence that Martin and members of his party were more or less under the influence of liquor.

"If ever get out of this alive, I'll never take another drink," John A. Nelson, one of the passengers in the Shotwell car, said he heard a girl's voice exclaim immediately after the crash.

The score was 7 to 0, and 83,000 persons in Yankee stadium, a record Eastern crowd, saw the battle that was desperately fought to bitterly cold weather.

NOTRE DAME'S hard and well fought gridiron battles were brought to a close when it met the Army in New York yesterday. Cagle, the Army's ace, threatened the brilliant record of the Irish but Carrideo, Notre-Dame's field general, was no less a menace to the cadets.

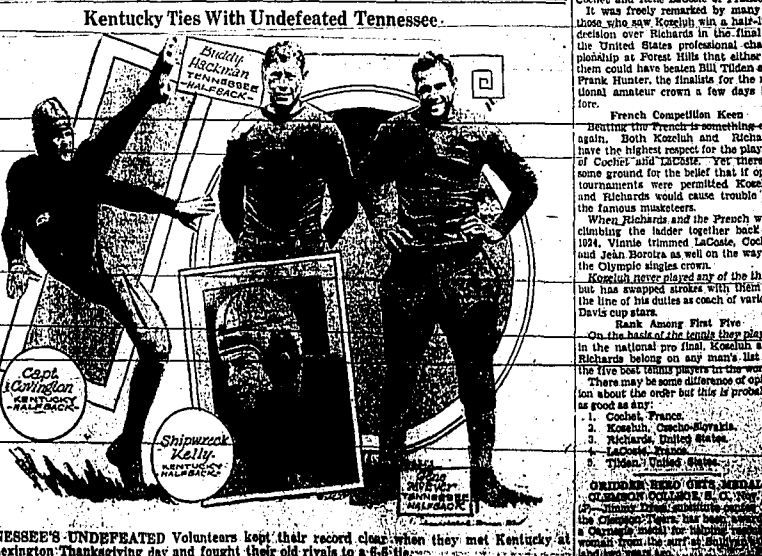

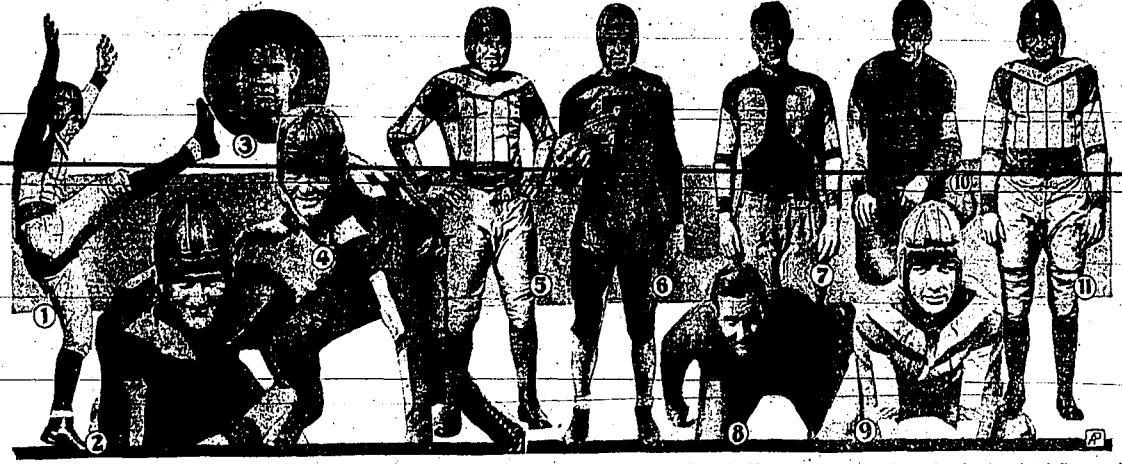

Armstrong's machine, individually and collectively as compared to its 11 regional competitors.



SEVEN MEMBERS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF UTAH football aggregation were placed on the all-star team of the Rocky Mountain conference selected by the Associated Press and based on the opinion of coaches, officials and sports writers. They are: 1. Summerhays, Utah, halfback; 2. Olson, Utah, guard; 3. Graves, Colorado Aggies, guard; 4. Simpkins, Utah, tackle; 5. Pomeroy, Utah, fullback; 6. Clark, Colorado College, quarterback; 7. Price, Utah, halfback; 8. Brozman, Denver, tackle; 9. Jonas, Utah, guard; 10. Worthington, Montana college, end; 11. Watkins, Utah, end.

Clark and East Pomeroy, Utah fullback, were considered the best of the backfield talent. Pomeroy established a great ground gaining record and gave an equally great exhibition of backing up the line.

Education From Everybody's Angle

—A FOOTLIGHT VIEW OF COLLEGE

AM increasingly amazed at the rare and manifold opportunities our colleges and universities offer young men and women.

I may confess I am a little alarmed at their almost too perfect equipment—million dollar laboratories, elaborate gymnasiums, little theatres with lighting systems worthy of Max Reinhardt.

One wonders if things are not made too modern, too easy.

The students I meet impress me as being keenly intelligent, splendidly straightforward, friendly and polite. What they lack (and this perhaps is characteristic of young people today) is a certain inner warmth. Nor have they the sense of courtesy—not organized courtesy, but the gentle expression of the art of living.

There seems nothing they cannot learn at the modern university. They may nurse-journalism, mechanical engineering, dietetics, social hygiene, dressmaking and expert accounting; they may listen to the finest musicians and the greatest lecturers of today imported to their vast auditoriums; they may develop their bodies in stadiums, swimming-pools and gymnasiums that would have dismayed the Athenian athlete.

Yet there seems to me omitted from these elaborate curricula the one quality that should be trained at a plant and an impressionable age, an art: even call it science. THAT is the tragedy that we all, rich or poor, artist or business man, dreamer or politician—imagination.

The sense of beauty suffers bitter reverse in modern life and is all too quickly stifled. Yet without it, and its next of kin, the sense of humor, how are we to endure a world full of so many prosaic or irritating things?

Imagination cannot be taught: though

there are no ends of English readers ready to destroy it! It must develop through leisure and limitation, and these the modern university, in my opinion, fails to afford.

Despite the marvelous equipment, the endless resources, the brilliant proficiency offered the American student, I wonder if the Oxford undergraduate, jolling back in his punt, gazing now at the towers of Maastricht, now at the long grasses in the Chertwell, now at the dog-eared copy of Horace, is not better preparing for life in all its richness, serenity and beauty?

BLONDES GETTING BREAK IN LATEST TELEVISION

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (AP)—Blondes are coming into their own in their natural colors in the latest step of the Telephone Laboratories' toward producing pictures in color.

In earlier apparatus the blues showed well, but blond shades were darkened. This disadvantage applied particularly to persons of dark or tanned complexion.

The invention that gives truer values to yellow shades is described in a report to the Optical Society of America by H. E. Ives of the Bell Laboratories. It is a new kind of photo electric cell, which uses sodium instead of potassium as its active color registering coating.

In the new color apparatus the natural shades are picked up by a battery of 24 photo electric eyes, two of them receiving through blue glass, eight through green and 14 through red. The numbers show the relative sensitiveness of the cells to colors. Blue still is the strongest.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—The average cost of 43,222 one-family dwellings in 85 cities built in 1929 is estimated at \$4,902, exclusive of the land, says the department of labor.

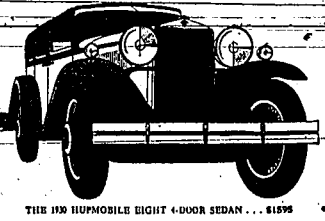

FEATURE FLASHES FROM FAR-FLUNG FOREIGN FIELDS

Chinese Eastern Railway Gives Back Jobs To 9000 Russian Laborers Who Worked Before Countries Quarreled

Company Agrees To Retain Employees as Long as Refraining from Spreading Bolshevik Propaganda, Says Liu Yuan Kwan, President of Road Which Terminates on Frontier of Russia.

By JAMES F. HOWE (Associated Press Correspondent)

HARRIN, Manchuria, Nov. 30.—Nine thousand Russian employees of the Chinese Eastern Railway are to be retained in the jobs they held for years prior to the break between China and the Soviet Union over the control of the line.

"So long as these employees attend to their own business and do not attempt to spread Bolshevik propaganda they will be kept on the pay roll," said Liu Yuan Kwan, 38-year-old president of the road.

In addition to the Russians, the majority of whom are "whites," the Chinese Eastern, which is the oldest concession railway in China, also employs 16,000 Chinese in operation of its 1100 miles of track. Its western terminus is Manchuria on the Manchuria-Russian frontier, where connections were formerly made with the trans-Siberian railway.

Quelled Russian Officers Mr. Liu has been credited by some of the officials with the content when he ousted the Russian road officers and brought a Siberian army of various units along Manchuria's boundary. He has been an executive of the road for six years. He speaks Russian fluently, but no English.

"Formerly, we had about 15,000 Russian employees, but after the severance of diplomatic relations with Moscow, some 400,000 Russians were either recalled by the Soviet government, or were forced to give up their places because of their own possession that they had evidence in our possession that they had been spreading anti-Chinese government propaganda under the leadership of trained hands from Moscow," Mr. Liu emphasized. "Naturally, when we took charge all the trouble-makers known to us were dismissed."

Operation Successful The president of the Chinese Eastern railway is proud in the fact that the railway has been operated successfully since the Russian general manager and the several thousand Russian employees were succeeded by Chinese.

"Moscow thought the road would go back to rack and ruin," Mr. Liu said. "But our freight and passenger service has been running along with few exceptions due to sabotage or the shelling or bombing of the yards at frontier points, ever since the controversy came to a head in July."

The American Methods At present when the fall crops are moving we have started to deliver daily approximately 10,000 tons of soy beans and other Manchurian products to the South Manchuria railway. Chinese plan to accomplish this we have adopted American railroad methods.

"That we have nearly doubled the tonnage of freight trains using two locomotives instead of one as formerly."

The railway may be operated in the future on a gold dollar basis. It formerly worked on a fixed gold ruble-yen basis but when Russia broke off diplomatic relations with China, the yen was made to get away from all Russian influences. This included the gold ruble.

Want Exchange Fixed Japanese interests are vitally interested in the fixing of the exchange rate owing to the fact that approximately 16,000 tons of freight are turned over by the Chinese Eastern to the Japanese South Manchuria Railway every day at Chitochuan. They desire that the exchange be placed on a yen basis, but the Chinese say that is out of the question.

British Airmen Plan To Take 80,000-Mile Trip LONDON, Nov. 30 (AP)—Flight lieutenant E. A. Gornall and Captain L. R. Shaw, the one an Australian and the other a New Zealander, have planned flights that will cover 80,000 miles and take more than a year to perform.

A trip in a light plane from Australia to Japan and back will inaugurate the program, which will be continued by a journey to England in the same machine. In England they will purchase a large plane and attempt a 45,000-mile flight round the world.

MUSSOLINI DECRIES BEGGING IN ITALIAN PROVINCIAL STATES

Duce Issues Circulars to Urge Right Enforcement of Laws Against Activities of Mendicant Types

By HUDSON HAWLEY (Associated Press Staff Writer) ROME, Nov. 30 (AP)—Mussolini is determined to stamp out begging in Italy. In his capacity as minister of the interior he has just issued a circular to all the provincial governors, warning them that not only they are to take the strict enforcement of the laws, but that they must personally guard against such particularly pernicious types of mendicancy as the begging of children alone with their parents, and the "house-to-house" begging.

Some Punishable The Duce's letter begins by stating that these are far too many and badly affected individuals abroad, particularly in the big cities, and that there are too many fake cripples. The latter class, he says, is doubly punishable under existing laws. He stresses, though, that reserved for these cases are the children, their mothers or fathers, and their other relatives in any case in popular centers like Rome, Naples, and Genoa.

Employment of Begging Against this class of offenders he enjoins his subordinate officials to employ all the means of the law. He also castigates them who, afraid to beg in public, get into apartment houses and hotels out of the street, into canvassers, and who by tears and menaces abuse the confidence of women, children and aged persons.

TURKS TRANSLATE LATIN FOR CULTURAL MOVEMENT ANKARA, Nov. 30 (AP)—Leaders of the western culture movement are celebrating the first translation into Turkish of a Latin classic. "Theoclytus," which has just appeared in Turkish, translated by the prominent deputy and close friend of President Kemal, Fehmi Okret Bey.

This is the first of the government's projected translations of Latin and Greek classics which are being made as a result of a recent decision which classifies the "cervical column" of the occidental culture with which Turkey is to replace the Persian and Arabic influences of the past.

High Turkish Taxes Close Movie Houses Tariff on Films Makes Necessary Shutting of Doors to Peasant Fans

UZ-DUZU, Turkey, Nov. 30 (AP)—Anti-movie feeling is spreading among the recent movie fans since they have known the joys of the silver screen only four or five years, are seeing their picture theaters close one by one.

Soon only three movie theaters will be left in all Asia Minor, those being in Ankara, Smyrna, and Samouni.

The new Turkish tariff is the cause. It classifies films as luxuries and raises the customs duty to 400 per cent. Municipal taxes on films have gone up in the same proportion, making the total tax on imported films \$4.00 a seat.

Since there is no analogic exemption clause in the tariff, Anatolian movie theatre managers have to pay this same high rate on the antiquated European and American films which have been imported for small-town consumption.

Meantime Constantinople, Ankara, Smyrna and Samouni theaters are importing the latest hits of international favor in order to sweeten office receipts and meet the increased taxes.

Film importers are outraged because the government has classed their wares as luxuries.

"American and European movies have been an important factor in westernizing Turkish mores," says a leading importer, Kemal Bey. "They have also aided in the dissemination of the latest news of the world and in the education of the masses."

Government officials are classifying their pictures as necessities.

Agriculture Department Renews Cotton Planting BRIDGEPORT, Mississippi, W. I. Cotton and the establishment of the cotton industry is being attempted by the Department of Agriculture. MUNSTER, Nov. 30 (AP)—An announcement hailed here as a new step toward the understanding of the mysterious forces, is the discovery by a German biologist, Dr. Walter Stenop of so-called "Life Rays" or "Organic Rays."

These rays are described as rhythmic radiations given off by living cells. It is thought that they are bound up with, or are an effect of, the process of metabolism which is a fundamental characteristic of living organic matter.

Dr. Stenop's experiments have been made with both animal and vegetable subjects, varying from small frogs to onions. The rays are reported to have been detected through crystal plates that had passed through jelly plates.

Labor Matters Note This revolutionary monastic life has been caused by agitation of the lay monks, who have been charging the monks. Union leaders have taken the initiative against the Buddhist temples which, the lay monks allege, have been used to perpetrate superstitions.

The street car workers' union of Peking has been causing the Tien Shan Buddhist temple into a school. Similar conversion of other temples is being agitated.

To Support Beliefs The announcement that the monks are to earn their own bread sets forth the fact that the Buddhist monks have been rendering services to mankind and in return have received their physical needs from society. "It is realized that a worm is turning in China and that economic conditions have placed such a heavy burden on their fellow men that the monks have decided to work for their own support."

DUTCH DIAMOND CUTTERS FEAR LOSING EMPLOYMENT

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 30 (AP)—There is alarm in the great diamond cutting industry of Holland.

For months there has been a steady movement in South Africa toward having the country's output of the precious stones cut and polished locally, and now mills there have been buying cutters from the Dutch centers with higher pay.

Up to the present only the larger gems have been cut in Africa, as the smaller diamonds will not provide for the high rates of pay. But in Africa in Amsterdam that the South African Government may take a hand with financial assistance, and in this event the Dutch industry, which exports \$150,000,000 worth of cut stones annually, and gives employment to 20,000 skilled workers, will be shaken to its foundations.
