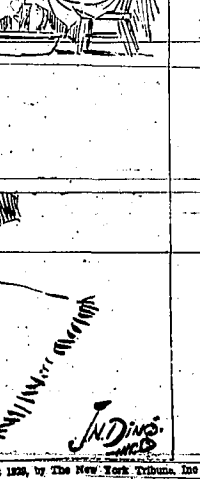

### IMPROVED HIGHWAY ACROSS NEVADA IN 1930 SEEMS LIKELY

Representatives of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and State Find Prospects to Be Good

Neal B. Wright, secretary of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, and A. C. Blomgren, Boise, aeronomics engineer of the department of public works, returning from a conference held at Ely, Monday, with representatives of the nine counties which are members of the All-Idaho association of Nevada, were enthusiastic over what they believe to be the prospect of securing completion during the next year of a section of the actual highway known as the Sawtooth park highway. All the way from Wells north to connect with the road now completed to the Idaho state line and south to Las Vegas. They also expressed belief that an arduous work also completed at the same time through Twin Falls, connecting through Wells, Ely, Ploche and Las Vegas with the Salt Lake City and Los Angeles route.

"It was a genuine surprise to me to see the rapid progress that has been made in the past few weeks in the actual construction of the connecting links of the Nevada federal highway cross-section," said Mr. Wright.

The highway under consideration at the meetings of the north and south highway from Twin Falls south across Nevada occupied the most attention. The matter of securing a complete construction from the Nevada-Idaho line clear to Las Vegas by means of a joint state, county and federal project was outlined in detail; and the All-Idaho counties association has pledged itself to put this program across. People who have not been in Nevada will be much surprised at the wonderful improvements that have been made on all of the main Nevada highways this summer. At the present date, routings can be made to all California points over highways that are 40 per cent improved roads. Directly next summer will witness the closing of practically all of the gaps either by state, county or federal highways.

May Connect With Airways

The possibility of securing the connecting of the north and south always routing survey from Twin Falls clear through a Nevada route to the Transcontinental Airways route at Las Vegas was a cleared understanding by the Nevada people. # Congress Turns to Tasks Presented by President Hoover

## MEMBERS OF LOWER HOUSE MANY TIMES EXPRESS APPROVAL

Silent and Listlessly Attentive Senate Receives Lengthy Legislative Program of Chief Executive

By FRANCIS M. STEPHENSON (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Given a larger order of business today by President Hoover, congress turned to its task with the strife-torn senate cleaning up old unsettled disputes as the administration-controlled house poised to prepare for tax reduction.

A silent and listlessly attentive senate received Mr. Hoover's lengthy legislative program involving numerous domestic and international propositions. As soon as reading of the annual message was completed, the senate plunged into disposition of the three-year old dispute over the right of Senator-elect Vane, Pennsylvania, to seat.

More demonstrative, the house interrupted reading of the Hoover message occasionally with—bussing. The representatives applauded the president's wish to make Washington a model city in law enforcement and his designation of law enforcement as the nation's most serious issue.

Threat of Filibuster.—The first division in the senate of this session was the tariff coalition of Democrats and Western Republican Independents of the extra session in sway again to reject an attempt by the Republicans to regularize the tariff until next Monday. With those lines intact, the senate went doggedly into this controversy and soon heard threat of a filibuster.

A recess was taken tonight after Senator Norris concluded his appeal for a vote against Vane on account of his expenditures of more than \$725,000 in the 1920 primary race. The senate voted overwhelmingly to meet daily from 10:30 A. M. until 3:30 P. M. during consideration of the case.

In both the house and senate, bills were already on their way tonight to carry out some of the many recommendations of President Hoover. Tomorrow the house will and many congressmen to prepare a report on the proposed \$100,000,000 tax reduction legislation, and on Thursday the house will take it up. Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee introduced the resolution in the senate but that chamber will await action by the house.

Public buildings and funds construction legislation to meet the presidential program for public works at the time were before both branches.

Senator Smoot, Republican, Utah, submitted the bill for ratification of the French debt. Representative Williamson, Republican, South Dakota, proposed again to consolidate all such matters of all matters pertaining to soldiers under the veterans' bureau.

It appeared certain tonight that Mr. Hoover's extensive program, including a reorganization of the judicial branch, functions of the government, creation of a commission to administer the Missouri Cession, Alaska state power project, and a permanent federal power commission, would wait well into the next year before getting attention.

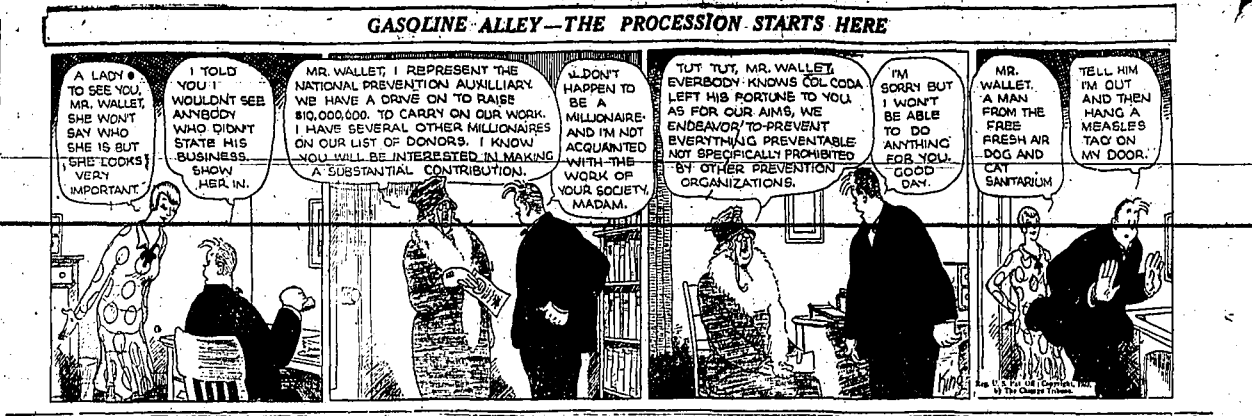

# COUNTY TREASURER AT JEROME ISSUES 3000 TAX NOTICES

Earl P. Kennedy Classifies  
Properties and Compares  
Valuation of Assessment  
of Farm and City Lots

(Special to The News)  
JEROME, Dec. 3.—Scores of tax notices for the 2000 taxpayers residing in the county property, city property and the property of public utilities, it was announced today by Earl P. Kennedy, Jerome county treasurer. These notices do not cover payments due on what is classified as personal property, such as such property as stocks of merchandise, livestock on farms and other miscellaneous items that cannot be charged against any real estate. Mr. Kennedy said:

"It will undoubtedly be of interest to the taxpayers of Jerome county to know how taxes are classified by the county treasurer. The county treasurer's classification follows:  
The real estate located throughout the county is entered on what is called the land roll. This includes farm land, improved land, improvements on land and the personal property of the owners of the land above the assessor that is located on the property.  
The property inside of incorporated towns and villages is classified in the city roll and consists of residences, town lots and the improvements on this property, such as houses, store buildings and other personal property, such as furniture of these owners more than \$400 in amount, merchandise stocks, machinery used in milk creamery and other tangible articles that the assessor may assess.  
Lines in Two Classes  
The public utilities roll consists of telephone and telegraph lines, railroads and power lines. The power lines are in two classifications. One is the transmission lines that are the main trunk lines carrying the electricity from the power plants to the sub-stations from which point the electricity is distributed on what is called distribution lines to the consumer. The transmission lines have an assessed valuation of \$11,105,377 per mile, and the distribution lines have an assessed valuation of \$128,100 per mile.  
Then there is another classification of property that is assessed on the public utilities roll which is called car line company. It might be of interest to know that these big sleeping car, tank car and refrigerator car companies pay a proportionate amount of tax in the various counties where these cars travel. All the assessing in connection with the public utilities is done by the State Board of Equalization on account of the fact that the public utilities affect every county in the state.  
Offers Comparison

You will note from the above that the city roll has a decrease of \$6929. This decrease is caused by property going to tax deed, and as it is county owned property, it is not taxed. The public utilities have an increase of \$108,877 which is on account of some new tank car companies being assessed in Jerome county, and the Idaho Power company building lines through the rural sec-

tion to supply farmers with electric current. The increase of valuation on the land roll amounts to \$22,671 which is derived principally from homestead land being deeded and three buying school land contracts having the title passed from the State of Idaho to the purchaser. The amount of tax to collect as compared with last year is as follows:

You will note from the above that the total tax bill for the taxpayers of Jerome county is \$22,286.20 higher than a year ago. The principal reason for this

The assessment for Jerome city sidewalks and paving was not made for the year 1928 as the tax year period had expired. Nor was there any assessment made for Jerome Bremer sub-division sidewalks, but there will be an assessment made for curbing in the Bremer sub-division, which will be handled independent of the Jerome county tax roll.  
The assessment for the American Falls reservoir irrigation district, which is a charge against every acre of irrigated land, will be about the same as last year, except the portion of the

First Segregation that gets their irrigation water delivered to them by the North Side Pumping company, will have their first charge for American Falls. This part of the First Segregation has recently petitioned permission to be part of the American Falls reservoir district and as it is necessary for them to take up the deferred payments at this time, they will have an assessment of \$1,801 against every irrigated acre served by the North Side Pumping company.
