LABOR FAVORS LODGE PENSION PROPOSALS

IDAHO FEDERATION AT MEETING IN POCATELLO ENDORSES EAGLE LODGE UNDERTAKING

POCATELLO, Dec. 10.—The Idaho State Federation of Labor and the farmers' branch will meet in harmony, according to sentiment which developed at the second day's session of the annual convention of the lodge here today. The convention will close tomorrow with the election of officers and a dance at night.

CARAWAY CARRIES ON FIGHT AGAINST NOTED HIGH DUTY ADVOCATE

Lobby Committee Member Takes Note of Pennsylvania's References to Solons as "Old Women"

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Reporting on the lobbying activities of Joseph R. Grundy, Pennsylvania, to the senate, Chairman Caraway of the lobby committee called attention today to the possibility of Grundy's appointment to the senate in the place of the banished William B. Vane.

Caraway took note of recent references by Pennsylvania Republican leaders to himself and Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, as "old women" and in reply referred to Governor Fisher, Pennsylvania.

"Mr. Grundy states that he is undecided whether he will accept a seat in the senate or not, which is forecasting will be offered him by the governor of Pennsylvania," he continued. "I want to correct that last statement; but by the governor of Pennsylvania. Not by the people who bought and paid for the office of the governor of Pennsylvania now occupies."

Senator Caraway offered these observations after the six-page printed report of the lobby committee on its investigation into Grundy's activities had been read by the senate in the morning. It related Grundy's actions in helping to raise \$700,000 for the Hoover campaign last year and recalled he had been "almost a member of the senate" in Washington since the tariff bill was started a year ago.

In conclusion, the report read: "It was unwise to include in the testimony of Mr. Grundy that either he or anyone of his force was in a situation to offer any enlightenment to members of either house on any matters pertinent to the discussion of the tariff bill not available to them on application of the tariff commission and other branches of the government."

"The influence is irretrievable that it was believed by him and by those associated with him that by reason of the very substantial aid he had received as revenue raiser for the political campaign he would be able to influence the action of his party associates in the congress."

Discussing Grundy's zeal for the protective tariff which was described as "religious in its intensity," the lobby report stated that he had been "increased as the senate finance committee proposes, to 55 per cent."

"The purity of his faith is subjected to further support from the fact that, while he says he is not objecting to the production of steel, a leading product of the state of Pennsylvania and more particularly is it impugned by the fact that he interested himself not at all in controlling rates for the agricultural schedule, though he did not overlook wool, in which he is directly concerned."

The report said that Grundy had referred to "highbrow states as 'pork-waters'" and had suggested that their senators "should talk damned steel."

NEW BLOOD TEST SHOWS ADVANCES IN MEDICINE

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Dec. 10.—Reports of the health committee of the League of Nations rate as superior to the famous Wasserman test a blood disease test developed by Dr. R. K. Kain, youthful director of the laboratories of the University of Michigan hospital.

WESTON SLIDE-RULE TO MAKE FIGURING SIMPLE

COLUMBIA, Mo., Dec. 10.—The electrical engineer's calculations have been simplified by a log-log vector slide-rule invented by Professor M. P. Weinstock of the University of Missouri. His device, which includes features of ordinary slide-rules, and adds the opportunity to figure vector quantities, may be used to determine the activity of electric current in time and distance.

The slide-rule is designed for general use. It is particularly adapted for the electrical engineer, with trigonometric and hyperbolic scales permitting many mathematical forms to another.

Sixteen separate operations by ordinary calculation, equated with references to books of functions which aid orthodox slide-rule operations, can be done with three movements in 15-20 many seconds on Professor Weinstock's rule.

MOONLIGHT EFFECT MADE FOR CLEVELAND BUILDING

CLEVELAND, Dec. 10.—Something new in outdoor illumination, called "moonlighting," is used in lighting the exterior of the museum of fine arts here.

The idea is to produce on the face of the building the dimness of real moonlight. This is done by reflecting lights and using beams of different intensity so that angles which in real moonlight would appear dimmer than the face of the building, receive less artificial light.

The result is to give depth to the form of the building. The lighting was designed by W. C. Goring of the General Electric company.

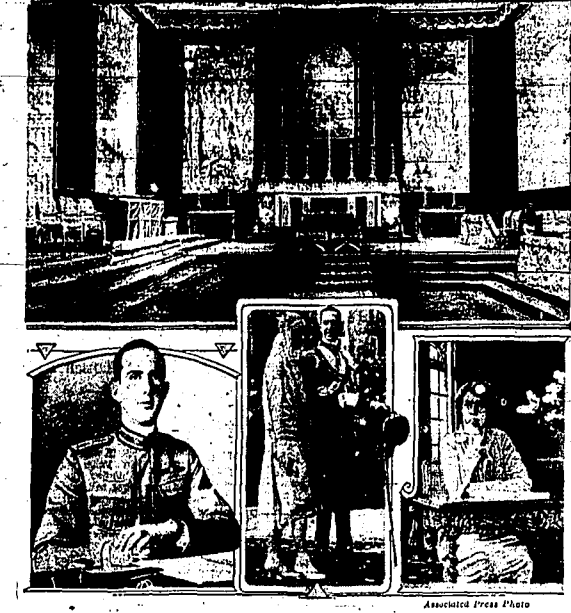

SNAKE-RIVER DAM WOULD SAVE FARMS

State Reclamation Commissioner Suggests Method For Relief at King Hill

BOISE, Dec. 10.—In a further effort to assist the farmers on the King Hill project, George N. Carter, state commissioner of reclamation, this week will study the possibilities of increasing the water supply for the project by construction of a dam across the Snake river.

This is only one of several possibilities which have been suggested for salvation of the project which will be taken up by the project committee of the reclamation department of Dr. Elwood Mead, United States reclamation commissioner, are carried into effect. Commissioner Mead declared the project was "in such favorable conditions as to warrant no further expenditures or participation in its operation on the part of the government."

Settlers Unable to Pay Reclamation investigators recommended appropriation of \$31,000 asked by the project for reconstruction of ditches and additional concrete lining for the canal and further that it be "written off" the reclamation department accounts as settlers were unable to make any payment to the gov-

ernment for construction costs. A number of recluses have been suggested for the project, including one made by Commissioner Carter to move all settlers up on the plateau to new lands under the Cooding ditch. This met with universal disfavor on the part of the settlers who disliked the prospect of abandoning results of years of effort in improving their place even in face of constantly recurring shortage of water and increasing cost of maintaining the troublesome canal.

Black Canyon Dam similar Of the possibility of building a dam for the project, Commissioner Carter pointed out that this would put it on a basis similar to the Black Canyon project on the Payette river. The dam impounds water which is used to generate power. This in turn is used to pump water from back of the dam to canals out on the land. Much water is required, but ample is available at this point, Commissioner Carter said.

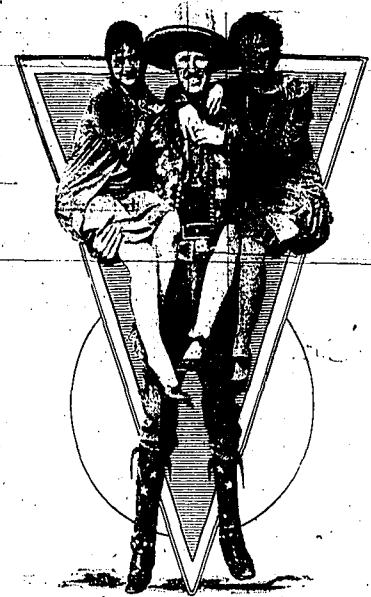

Republican Regulars Score In Tilt Over Tariff Schedule

MONTANAN AND BAY STATE SOLON HOLD SPOTLIGHT FOR DAY

Aided by Widest Split in Ranks of Coalition Members of Finance Committee Score in Upper House

By D. HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (Special to The News)—Aided by the widest split in the ranks of Democrats and Republican Independents since these two groups combined in the senate to rewrite the house version of tariff revision, the Republicans on the senate finance committee today succeeded in its program to increase severely important duties on wool wastes used in the manufacture of cheap clothing and blankets.

After an all-day argument featuring the clashing of views of Senators Walsh, Massachusetts, and Walsh, Montana, both Democrats, four rolls showed plainly the sentiment of the majority and proposals advanced by Chairman Smoot of the committee, went through with plenty of votes to spare. Amendments offered by Senator Blaine, Republican Independent, Wisconsin, to slash materially the committee rates were defeated by like margins.

Proponents of the increase advanced them to bring wool wastes more in line with the rate on raw wool, which previously had been raised by the senate and house from 31 to 34 cents a pound.

The senate devoted nearly all of its six and a half hour session today to the tariff, although the first few minutes discussion touched upon the issue from another angle.

An appeal addressed to members of congress and a full page advertisement appearing in today's Washington Post, signed by more than a hundred editors and publishers of rural newspapers in Minnesota and asking that congress enact the tariff bill without delay, provoked a brief tilt between Senators Allen, Republican, Kansas, and Norris, Republican Independent, Nebraska.

The appeal said the bill—with its "splendid new farm rate schedule"—should be passed speedily and not "held up indefinitely to slash existing industrial rates."

Allen read the advertisement into the record and immediately Norris jumped to his feet and demanded that the lobby committee call the shavers before it to determine who paid for it. He said he wanted the farmers of Minnesota to know what their papers, which were "pretending" to be the farmers' friends, were spending their money for.

Allen replied he had been informed that the Minnesota editors and publishers mentioned had paid for the advertisement themselves and resented Norris' characterization of them as "so-called country editors."
