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FISHER'S APPOINTMENT TO SEAT IN SENATE TAKES OFFICIAL OATH

Pennsylvania Manufacturer Spites Frequently During Hours Fraught With Outspoken Condemnation

By FRANCIS M. STEPHENSON (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Dec. 12—Joseph R. Grundy, Pennsylvania, advanced happily to the senate today tonight after a long and harsh discussion over his right to a seat and took the oath of office.

For the first time since William S. Vard, the Republican power of Philadelphia, made that same advance and was turned back two years ago, the Pennsylvania manufacturer and veteran has tariff advocates on his side during the hours in which he heard himself and Governor Fisher of Pennsylvania, who appointed him, satisfied in outspoken language.

A long time was spent in determining what to do with the resolution of Senator Nye, Republican, North Dakota, proposing to declare that Grundy is not entitled "to retain" his seat because of his participation in the \$2,000,000 primary of 1920 which resulted in the nomination of Governor Fisher.

Finally without even a roll call vote, the senate approved the motion of Senator Johnson, Republican, California, referring the resolution to the elections committee and ordering the immediate administering of the oath.

Shortridge Protest

Chairman Shortridge of the elections committee protested that the senate was asking his committee to do "an idle and futile thing." He said tonight he did not know where he could call the committee together.

Democratic and Republican declaring leaders joined in declaring throughout the debate that the senate must accept the result of the governor of a sovereign state.

Senator Nye admitted that he had slight hope of stopping Grundy but both sides were ready to fight. Republican, New Mexico, insisted that the senate must reject Grundy if it was going to be consistent with its vote to bar him from the presidency of \$75,000 in the 1920 primary.

By a coincidence, Senator Grundy—upon entering the chamber with Senator Reed, Republican, California, in the seat of Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, who sponsored the resolution excluding Vard.

Both he and Norris laughed with the senate when the situation was noticed as the Nebraska entered the chamber a moment later.

His ready face as he entered the senate, the newest senator arose and bowed, beckoning Norris to his seat.

The Nebraska laughed heartily and told him to sit.

In a little while Norris was in the thick of the contest, referring to Governor Fisher as an "ass" for appointing Grundy and denouncing the appointment "a stench in the nostrils of the people."

Almost the first word spoken as Grundy came down to the senate was a tariff debate on the wool schedule was his own name.

Colonel Charles Goodnight

"Father of Texas Panhandle" Loses to Death

TUCSON, Ariz., Dec. 12 (AP)—Colonel Charles Goodnight, whose pioneering in the Wild West 50 years ago brought him the title "Father of the Texas Panhandle," died at the age of 82 years at his winter home here today following a two days' illness from influenza.

The colorful, rugged old rancher tonight probably will be taken back to his last ride, to the great Panhandle country for burial in the town named after him, Goodnight, Armstrong county, Texas.

Death found him at his bedside, fighting a losing battle against disease and old age. With him were his widow, Mrs. Corinne Goodnight, and members of his family.

Colonel Goodnight's holdings were among the largest in the Panhandle, some of which were acquired by him as a hunter and now about 200 head still live under protection on his ranch.

For the last several years Colonel Goodnight lived during the winter in Arizona. Shortly before his death, it was learned, he was completing plans for the purchase of a cattle ranch in southern Arizona.

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AUTHORITIES LAUNCH SEARCH FOR MISSING AUBURN PRISON GUNS

Three Leaders of Mutiny Among 1553 Shivering Convicts Successfully Veil Identity in Penal Riot

(By The Associated Press) AUBURN, Dec. 12—Within the walls of Auburn state prison, which twice within the last five months have looked down on scenes of mutiny, riot and bloodshed, state and county officials tonight pressed an intensive search for 10 guns which disappeared yesterday during the outbreak in which eight convicts and the principal keeper were killed.

Two guns were discovered during the day in the south wing where riot and destruction are in the same condition as they were 100 years ago and not equipped with modern locking devices which enables an entire row of cells to be locked by a single motion. Three convicts in the prison hospital in a serious condition, while eight bodies had been distributed among local undertakers.

Not on Duty In his residence, Warden Edgar E. Jennings remained under the care of the prison physician while George A. Sullivan, sergeant of the guard and acting warden, was in command of the prison forces.

In the quarters of Principal Keeper George A. Durstuck, a widow and two boys, were taken care of.

RIOTING MARKS SESSION OF NEW BERLIN COUNCIL

BERLIN, Dec. 12 (AP)—Rioting marked the first meeting of the new Berlin municipal council tonight. Two hundred outsiders, mostly communists, forced their way into the town hall and aided by the 57 Communists and 13 Fascists in the new council tried to yell down the 63 Social Democratic members.

A small emergency squad of police was rushed to the place, but was unable to cope with the situation. When reinforcements arrived, they came with clubs in hand, but were compelled to eject each disturber individually before the council could go on with its meeting.

County Judge Arranges With Santa to Provide Little Girl With Nose

SPARTA, Wis., Dec. 12 (AP)—Eight-year-old Doris Glaw, whose mother is dead and father missing, wants Santa Claus to bring her a new nose.

She wrote a letter to Santa which appeared in the "Star" Herald and which asked for only one gift—a nose. Several months ago a cupboard tipped over on her, the glass from the door cutting off her nose.

County Judge H. A. Richards is playing Santa before Christmas eve. It was learned today he has arranged for Doris to go to the Wisconsin general hospital at Madison where physicians will attempt to graft her new nose.

EMMETT JAIL OPENS FOB DRIVER OF CAR

J. C. McClurg Will Answer On Murder Charge For Death of Young Spouse

EMMETT, Idaho, Dec. 12 (AP)—J. C. McClurg was arrested tonight and charged with murder in his 39-year-old wife, whose charred body was found in their burned automobile today morning.

The arrest followed a coroner's inquest yesterday, the jury being unable to decide the exact cause of the woman's death. Investigation by the sheriff and prosecuting attorney developed suspicious circumstances, they said, including a \$10,000 insurance policy on her life taken 10 days before her death, and the additional fact that McClurg had been held a few days before for investigation by federal authorities on a statutory charge.

McClurg and his wife were visiting relatives here. They were married in Cle Elum, Washington, last September. McClurg, 37, has been married four times, officers said.

Joe Emerick, father of the girl, was expected here soon from Cle Elum, Washington.

NATIONALIST FORCES TRIUMPH IN DRIVES ALONG MAJOR FRONTS

Rumors of Missing Church Workers From America Mingle With Stories of Broadening Civil Strife

(By The Associated Press) SHANGHAI, Dec. 12.—China's Nationalist forces battled successfully on three major fronts today against rebel armies seeking the overthrow of President Chiang Kai-shek and his government.

Having lost half their number in a vain attempt to capture Canton, the "Ironsides" division were reported retreating after three days of battle which killed or wounded thousands of both rebel and Nationalist government troops. The Kwantung province rebels, cooperating with the Ironsides division, also were repulsed. Nationalist troops took several thousand prisoners.

Mutineers' Tanks Swell The Pukow mutineers, with numbers swelled to 20,000 or more, were reported checked at Chingkuo, 50 miles north of their objective, Nanking, seat of the Nationalist government. Troops drawn from less affected areas of rebellion by the government were holding their lines and fighting which had lasted several days was subsiding.

The march of Tang Sen-chih's rebel troops toward the Yangtze river at Hankow was said to be checked for the present in Honan province.

The fate of American missionaries at Kanchow is unknown, since November 20, when they reported the Kanchow province city threatened by Communist armies. Communication with them has been impossible.

CHICAGO POLICE CAPTURE ALLEGED COUNTERFEITER

CHICAGO, Dec. 12 (AP)—Morrin Trian, 43, sought by Los Angeles authorities for questioning in connection with a counterfeiting ring on the coast, was arrested today by police and government operatives.

Plan will be arranged tomorrow before a United States commissioner and a hearing on extradition will be held. Officers here were told that, in a raid on the ship's headquarters in Los Angeles, machine guns, gas masks, tear bombs and dynamite were found. Plan carried an automatic pistol and a revolver when arrested today, police said.

WRECKER OF TRAINS CONFRONTS CALLOWS

Prosecutor Pitts Prepares to Demand Death for Bandit in Two Daring Plots

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12 (AP)—Tom Vernon, recently returned here from Pawnee, Oklahoma, pleaded guilty to charge of train wrecking before superior judge William T. Angeler today. Judge Angeler set December 17 for sentencing and granted a request of the public defender that physicians be allowed to examine Vernon for insanity.

Prosecutors read the grand jury indictment against Vernon, who charged him with loosening the rails on a trestle in the Southern Pacific railroad tracks in Soledad canyon, near Staiga, California, November 10, and causing the derailment and wrecking of an engine and four cars of a passenger train.

At the loss of his reading, Vernon was asked to plead.

"Guilty," he said in a weak voice. An indictment charging Vernon with robbery of H. E. Pierson, a passenger on the train, then was read. Again Vernon pleaded guilty. Two other indictments charging robbery of passengers were read, to which Vernon pleaded not guilty.

The maximum penalty under California law for train wrecking is death. District Attorney Burton Pitts, who personally filed California's claims upon Vernon while he was under arrest in Oklahoma, announced upon his return here he would demand the maximum penalty.

Judge Angeler appointed Dr. Paul R. Bowers, Dr. Victor Parkin and Dr. Aaron Rosanoff to examine Vernon and report December 17.

Worming authorities made an effort to extradite Vernon from Oklahoma to that state to face a charge of train wrecking and a charge of kidnapping a wreck, similar to that in Soledad canyon, near Chilesburg in November.

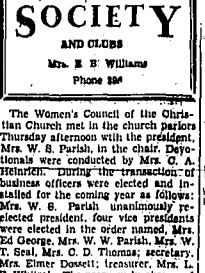

WHITE HOUSE OPENS TO ALFRED E. SMITH

Former Governor of Empire State May Be Luncheon Guest of Chief Executive

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The White House to which the American electorate elected Alfred E. Smith about a year ago may be opened to him tomorrow by his successful opponent in the campaign.

The former governor of New York has an appointment with Secretary Adams tomorrow and at the White House it was said that he probably would call upon President Hoover and be invited for luncheon. Except for a brief visit to the Democratic candidate, Mr. Hoover in Florida before his inauguration, the two have not met.

A favorable reception was forecast for the ex-governor at the White department if he comes with a proposal for moving the giant airplane ship building to the former New York streets.

DRURY LANE REVIVES ANCIENT PANTOMIME

Thousands of Children in London Happy Following Announcement of Theatre

LONDON, Dec. 11.—(By.—) Thousands of children have been made happy by the news that, after a lapse of 10 years, Drury Lane Theatre is once more to revive its ancient Christmas pantomime.

Pantomime has never wholly died out in England. Always in one or two London houses and in the provinces, the "pantomime" who is almost always a girl has swaggered on the boards in the character of Jack the Giant Killer or some other figure of nursery lore, and the "dame" who is almost always a male comedian has cracked jokes, many of which are, fortunately, beyond the comprehension of the juvenile members of the audience.

But pantomime seems never quite to have subsided. The old theatre of Drury Lane with its memories of Dan Leno and other legendary figures, and adults as well as children are pleased at the thought that instead of conventional musical shows the cloven "Here we are war!" will once more ring out and policeman and paragon will belabor each other with strings of sawages.

SOLONS APPROVE OF FURTHER INCREASES IN DUTIES ON WOOL

Senate Takes Action Upon Tariff Proposal Before Adjourning to Take Action On Tax Reduction

By D. HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Major increases in wool tariffs were approved by the senate today before it adjourned to make possible action on the \$100,000,000 income tax reduction proposal.

By adjourning instead of recessing, the parliamentary situation will be such tomorrow as to permit a motion to be made for consideration of the tax cut proposal without debate. The resolution itself, however, will be open in an unlimited discussion. Leaders of both parties predict its early adoption without unduly delaying the tariff measure.

The finance committee Republicans postponed today to wane away enough Democrats and Republican Independents from wool growing states to put through increases in duties on wool wools, carbonized wool and wool yarns to compensate for the increase previously voted on raw wool from 31 to 35 cents a pound.

The only roll call of the day reported by 65 to 34 an amendment by Senator Hayden, Democrat, Arizona, to restrict the existing combination of 23 cents a pound and 20 per cent ad valorem on carbonized wool, including tops, not reported advanced than voting. The committee rate of 37 cents a pound and 20 per cent was accepted without a record vote.

Arguing for his amendment, Hayden contended that the rate on raw wool was not wholly effective and consequently the outside the prison walls searched tonight for the missing guns, but every source of information within the prison was being tapped in an attempt to learn the identity of the three convicted and banded major.

Major J. C. Roosa, chief clerk of the state department of correction, was conducting the investigation for the state, while District Attorney Ben M. Kenyon, Cayuga county, and Coroner Paul M. Parker conducted inquiries in the deaths of the eight convicts in the hope that some clue might be uncovered.

Outside the prison walls comparatively quiet relations were maintained between troops and national guards were withdrawn in part although sufficient reinforcements had been left to aid the troops in coping with any unexpected outbreak.

JAPANESE PREDICTS BAN ON ARMAMENTS

Former Premier of Flowery Land Sets Forth Views During Stop in Seattle

SEATTLE, Dec. 12 (AP)—The time will come, says a Japanese diplomat, when the abolition of all implements of warfare, rifles, tanks, submarines and other armaments, will be the result of the London armaments conference, said here today.

"Of course, it is not at present in the realm of reality; but these conferences, such as we held at Geneva and Washington and now in London, are doing much to teach people the benefits of disarmament," the statesman declared.

"Total abolition of armaments would be a great step forward in human progress and should be believed, the ultimate aim of all nations," he said. "Japan is satisfied with much less than five times that of other powers. The five-five-three ratio of capital ships adopted at the Washington conference will stand as far as Japan is concerned. However, my country desires to possess 70 per cent tonnage of auxiliary ships, including submarines, as compared with the powers having the greatest strength. We cannot agree to establishment of the submarine as suggested by England and the United States."

The former premier scoffed at the idea of war between the United States and Japan or that his country was desirous of obtaining the Philippine Islands. At a special ceremony of the Japanese society in Seattle in one of Seattle's parks today, several thousands of Japanese were present by the delegation were planted. Admiral T. Takahara, member of the group, presented the delegates to Seattle in the name of his country.

The delegates left Seattle tonight for Washington by way of Chicago. Six special cars were to be attached to a trans-continental train. They were expected to arrive in Chicago Sunday and in Washington Monday, where they will stand with President Hoover before leaving for London, December 20.

PARIS, Dec. 14.—Twelve thousand French actors and singers are out of work and the government is going to do something about it.

Employment of foreign artists, the smaller casts of modern plays and the dissolution of provincial stock companies are blamed for the condition. The minister of labor, Louis Loucheur, told the chamber of deputies he would lighten the burr against the theater.

In presenting the case, a deputy told parliament that at the Opera, subsidized by the government, there was given recently, "Bibacinto," an Italian opera, with a Spanish tenor, a Danish soprano, a Belgian-baritone and an Australian bass.

Washington University Obtains Purdue Coach's Services

Destiny of Seattle Eleven Passes Into Grid Wizard's Hands

Board of Control Approves Selection of Outstanding Mentor, James D. Phelan, to Succeed Enoch Bagshaw

(By The Associated Press) SEATTLE, Dec. 12 — James M. Phelan, coach of the Purdue university football team which won the Big Ten championship this year, has signed a contract to coach at the University of Washington from January 1, 1930, to June 1, 1931.

Earl Campbell, graduate manager at Washington, made this announcement here today after a long distance telephone conversation with Phelan in Lafayette, Indiana. Campbell arrived in Seattle from Chicago this morning and immediately got in touch with Phelan.

Campbell said Phelan had not definitely agreed to accept the Washington post when the graduate manager left Chicago Monday.

Phelan's salary has not been officially announced, but it was reported that the new mentor is to receive between \$6000 and \$12,000 a year. Advice from Lafayette, however, were that he was to receive \$15,000.

The selection of Phelan to succeed Enoch Bagshaw, who resigned as the Washington coach a few weeks ago after a year's controversy with the students, was officially approved by the university board of control at a special meeting this afternoon.

The Purdue coach will come to Seattle next month to take over the football reins.

JAMES M. PHELAN'S FINISHES EIGHT YEARS AT PURDUE

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Dec. 12 (AP) — James M. Nixon, treasurer, showed that the district will be able to meet all bills for the current year and, if all quotas are filled, will have a surplus at the beginning of 1930. It was determined to defer the making of formal appointments until after the meeting of the executive committee which will be held in Rupert early in January, at which time a budget will be completed and formally adopted. All members of the area council are invited to this meeting. It is stated, hereafter all badges received by any districts must be paid for in advance, it is announced in accordance with new regulations.

INDEPENDENT MARKET APPEALS FROM RULING

The Independent Meat Market has been given an appeal in its return to the United States supreme court from the decision of the special federal statutory court, composed of F. S. Dietrich, circuit judge, and C. C. Cavanaugh and J. Nerster, district judges, announcing in a notice received yesterday by T. K. Huckman, attorney for the plaintiff who asks the appeal.

The action was instituted in an effort to set aside an unconstitutional statute regarding branding of stock introduced in this state. Previously it was necessary to hold the hide of a slaughtered animal 30 days for identification. Under the new law, which, however, leaves the hide inspected for brands after the animal is slaughtered, the hide is stamped by an inspector. Each of the four quarters is also branded. The person or company slaughtering the animal must pay 20 cents for each bovine animal so inspected and 25 cents sheep.

The special statutory court upheld the law and the independent now takes an appeal from this decision.

Horn, the officers said, declared that he had ridden to Twin Falls on the morning board of the rider's car, arriving here early the next morning. The battered cash register taken from the roadhouse was discovered by the police on the sign of Beck Creek canyon near the Shoshone street bridge.

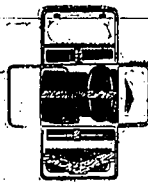

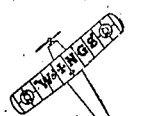

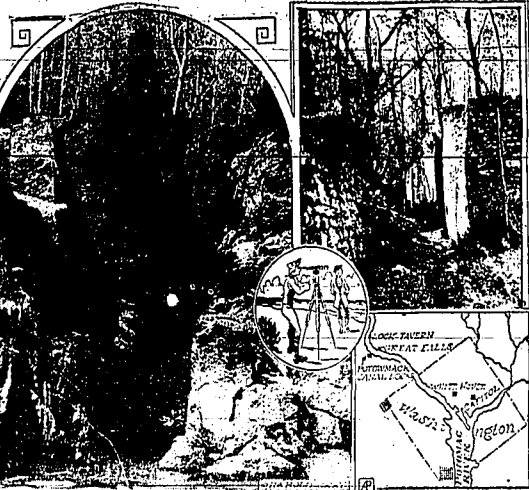

Engineers Would Restore Canal Started By Washington

Council Of Construction Experts Considers Rebuilding Relic For Memorial To President's Effort

Work On Project Dependent Upon Passage of Bill Introduced Into Legislature by Michigan Solon

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The "Potowmack" canal, long surviving relic of George Washington's work as an engineer, may be restored as a memorial by members of the profession.
Engineers of the nation, through the American Engineering Council, have recommended the reconstruction of the old waterway as their part in the 1929 celebration of the two-hundredth anniversary of Washington's birth.
Work on the project is dependent on passage of the Granton bill by congress, authorizing government acquisition of the property as part of the George Washington Memorial parkway along the Potomac from Mount Vernon to Great Falls.
Flanking the falls, where nature has huffed the river over a boulder-strewn bed, crumpling rocks and a ditch remain as solid evidence of America's first corporate attempt at inland improvement of waterways and for communication with the Western country.
An obscure path leads to the old commodious basin, now a field, past the age-consumed ruins of the house of this superintendant of the five locks, two of them blasted through solid rock in a cleft between two towering peaks.

Besides Mount Vernon, perhaps no other spot was more intimately associated with the everyday life of Washington who, as a surveyor at the age of 16, first had the vision of a canal to make the Potomac the principal trade route between the Atlantic seaboard and the Great Lakes.
Washington was first president of the "Potowmack Canal Company" when it was organized May 17, 1785, and for some time actively kept in touch with work on the spot where more than 200 men, many of them slaves, labored.
The project moved slowly, lacking the advice of an expert engineer, and was not put into operation until 1802. Two decades later, the wood decaying and the entire canal in need of repairs, it was taken over by the builders of the Chesapeake and Ohio canal, located on the Maryland side of the river, and abandoned.

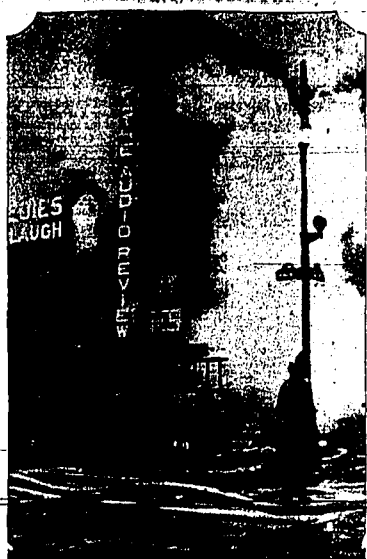

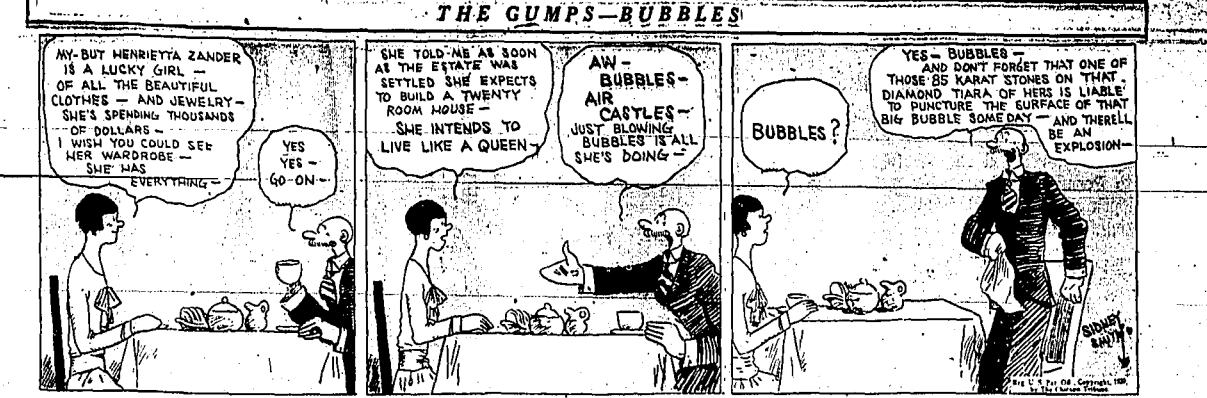

Roger W. Babson Urges Investors To Divide Funds Into Four Parts And Gives Administration Advice

Experience Shows Noted Bay State Financier Way to Permanent Success Financially Lies In Adopting Definite Program, Adaptable to Changing Fundamental Conditions in Business

By ROGER W. BABSON
 BABSON PARK, Mass., Dec. 12.—Instead of worrying over what the market should do, investors should now do what they should have done long ago—namely, lay out a well balanced, safe and sane program of investment. There is no time for stock market post-mortems and excuses. Like the duck hunter who loses a chance at another flock while explaining why he missed the last shot, the investor who is now busy offering alibis will miss some splendid opportunities for future success. By this it does not mean that the Dow Jones stock averages have reached their low point. It is doubtful if this average figure has yet seen its final line for the bear market now in progress. The fact that the decline has been so drastic, however, indicates that the worst is over and that when the final turn upward does come, the advance should be rapid, with great opportunity for the recovering spec. But remember that the turn has not yet come!

Working Plan for Money
 Experience has taught me that the only way to be permanently successful as an investor is to have a definite plan which is adaptable to changing fundamental conditions in the financial and business world. The best plan I know is to divide your funds into three or four parts, setting each part aside for use at the proper time and in the proper type of investment. The amount of money which you set aside, into each will depend on the position of business and finance at the time.

The first part of your funds is that which you use to buy a broad list of good common stocks when the market as a whole is obviously too low based on earnings, dividends, and prospects. This group you should hold for the ensuing business and stock market recovery and sell before the next bull market reaches its peak. I do not believe the time has yet come for whole sale purchase of common stocks. Hence, this part of your funds should be kept liquid a while longer, either in cash, United States certificates, bankers' acceptances, or high-grade, short-term corporation bonds. Do not be stampeded into large purchases of stocks just because they show a temporary upward movement. There may be many false starts followed by further disappointments. It should be remembered that the average investor who buys a bull market they go above their true worth.

Bond Investments at Maximum
 I have repeatedly emphasized the wisdom of holding a good back-log of sound bonds. The second part of your funds should be invested for safety and income. Good bonds meet these requirements. Hence, the proportion of funds which you invest in bonds should now be at its maximum. So long as mortgage bonds of companies can be bought to yield more than what the common stocks of these companies yield, it is evident that bonds will be more attractive than common stocks to real investors and come back again into style. There also are three other reasons why bonds should form part of your gain in attractiveness. One is that money rates should continue favorably; a second is that the equities projecting these loans should become so much greater; and a third is that the purchasing power of the dollar should tend to increase. Hence, this is a time to buy bonds.

Long-Growth Stocks Attract
 The third part of the investor's funds should be devoted to a few sound stocks of defunct industries which have attractive long-growth possibilities. Such opportunities occur from time to time. Some stocks have at last fallen to prices at which they yield an excellent rate of income. They should be bought only for cash, not on margin, and the buyer should be prepared to hold them over a period of years, if necessary, for long-term growth of the industry. If one who deals for cash waits too long to buy such issues, it may be as bad as

waiting too long to sell. On the other hand, one should not buy too heavily of any stock, and the proportion invested in "part three" (funds should not be too large. The stock market have withstood the crash better than any other group. Moreover, their increased volume of business, through the future seems to be the brightest. Under uncertain conditions of production and retailing, however, the latter pipe line securities offer the greatest safety, yield, and opportunity for profit if they are held in thickly settled areas and serve large cities. A few selected public utilities can be added as opportunity arises. Remember, however, that this is no time to rush into the stock market and buy up heavily, even on sound long-growth stocks. There will be further opportunities in the coming

Trailing Fund For Wealthy
 The fourth fund should be set aside only by wealthy investors who can afford considerable risk. This fund is used for day to day and week to week trading purposes. It is for those wealthy investors who desire to trade for cash in stocks that are alright to hold if the market falls away. It should be remembered in connection with this fund that in a bear market you should buy each time at a lower price than you bought the last time, and should be content with small profits. In other words, buy on bad days and sell on good days. I absolutely do not recommend such trading for the average investor. He should confine his funds to three parts as outlined above.

In summary I wish to give a catalogue for investment. These should always be followed: (1) Keep risk and investment separate. (2) Don't be misled by a name. (3) Be wary of new promotions. (4) Be sure of marketability of your securities. (5) Insist on complete information. (6) Diversify your investments properly. (7) Insist on an able and upright management. (8) Buy securities that meet your particular requirements. (9) Always buy outright, never on margin. (10) Pay due regard to price and yield.

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 12.—A year ago the wise men of the movies were predicting the "passing of the westerns."
Today the "westerns" are riding forth again, not so wild, perhaps, as they were in the days of "Broncho Billy" Anderson, but just as western.
The old style western horse-carried his two guns and fired them into the air to scare off bad Indians, or into the heart of Pedro, the bad hombre, to bring about the fadeout climax with the heroine.
Today the handsome hero carries not only his two guns, but a glorious voice, which he fires at the microphone more often than his guns. He is a romantic troubadour of the plains and mountains—a comic opera Buffalo Bill. It's a long trail from the hard-fisted "Broncho Billy," one of the first western heroes to attain a following, to the daintily romantic John Boies of

"Song of the West" or to the litho Spaniard (by virtue of make-up) of Frank Fay in "Under a Texas Moon" or to Warner Baxter's Cisco Kid of "In Old Arizona."
Even Gary Cooper, who never thought his boyhood cuppingchance would serve him in the talkies, rides and sings his way through "The Virginian."
The point is, his singing now seems more important than their equestrian ability.
In the face of the talkies two of the old guard of western heroes continue to rouse the kids to cheers. They have added sound and talk to their former genre, the rough-riding, ride 'em cowboy movie.
Ken Maynard, who "sank" temporarily from sight when talkies came, was the first to use sound effects and dialog in his westerns, of which he has made several already.
Hoot Gibson was not far behind.

Whereas Maynard keeps his stories to the period when the west was wild and wide open, Gibson brings his up to date with thrilling airplane escapades and the like.
Some of the actors who made reputations, and probably fortunes, fighting movie Indians and hanging movie cattle rustlers, still are acting, but not as western heroes.
The greatest of them, William S. Hart, now 57 years old, lives in retirement on his ranch near here. Tom Mix is with a circus. Harry Carey is off in Africa playing the title role in a filmation of "Trader Horn." Fred Thomson died a year ago.

RUPERT JURY FAILS TO REACH VERDICT

Minidoka County Criminal Case Against Mike Little Results in Mistrial

RUPERT, Dec. 12.—The jury in the criminal case against Mike Little, charged with the murder of the late Mrs. Little, failed to reach a verdict today.

Germans Celebrate as British Soldiers Quit Rhineland

LAST OF ENGLAND'S TROOPERS EVACUATE TEUTONIC TERRITORY

Wiesbaden Becomes Scene of Rejoicing Parallel With Observance of First Work of Cessation of War

(By The Associated Press) WIESBADEN, Germany, Dec. 12.—Scenes reminiscent of the first Armistice day celebration were enacted here tonight after the Union Jack had been hauled down from British headquarters and the last soldiers of Great Britain had evacuated the Rhineland.

British aviators mounted guard at the approach of the column banners and the detachment then passed in review before General Thwaites, British commander, for the last time on German soil.

There was a long roll from the drums and the military band struck up "God Save the King" as the British flag fluttered down the staff. When the troops wheeled into column and marched to the station where they entrained.

General Guillaumet, commander of the French troops in the Rhineland, and his chief of staff, also witnessed the ceremony of departure. A detachment of French aviators was drawn up before the railway station.

The only British official remaining in the Rhineland is William Beeda, British high commissioner on the inter-Allied Rhineland high commission since 1923. He will remain in Germany until termination of all occupation of the third zone.

Device Utilizes Exhaust To Dissipate London Fog

LONDON, Dec. 12 (AP)—A cure for London's pen soup fog has been discovered, but it's all hot air.

The hot air is produced by the exhaust of an automobile and is blown out in front of the machine instead of behind it, in order to create a current of warm air just ahead of the front wheels.

According to the inventor of the device, this rising current literally lifts the fog for about 10 feet ahead, and does it quickly enough to permit a forward speed of about 15 miles an hour. The fog lifter can be attached to any car's exhaust in a few minutes, and is much simpler than the average windshield wiper. Whether it will be as effective has not been proved.

WILLIAM S. VARE ILL AT NEW JERSEY HOME

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Dec. 12.—William S. Vare, former senator-elect from Pennsylvania, was ill at his home in South Berkeley Square, Chelsea, tonight, with what was said to be a lapse from his recent illness. The release is believed to have been caused by overexertion in his efforts to raise his seat in the United States senate and the consequent worry over his failure.

Mrs. Vare and their daughter, Mrs. William Kipp, also were ill of colds in an adjoining room at the Vere cottage. Miss Beatrice Vare, another daughter, said this afternoon that a recent call had been sent to Dr. Edward H. Kirby, Philadelphia, the Vare family physician. She said she was unable to say whether her father had suffered another stroke, but she admitted it seemed to be seriously ill.

NEW ALTIMETER IN NEED OF SOUND TONE

University of California Physicist Conducts Investigation of Noises

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12 (AP)—Search for the source of a sound which will filter through noises aboard an airplane is being conducted by Leo P. DeLassus, of the physics department of the University of California, in an effort to perfect a precision altimeter.

An altimeter which will accurately record the height of an airplane over the ground over which it is flying without the calibration needed in the present atmospheric altimeters, is one of the great needs of aviation.

DeLassus, working with funds made available by the Guggenheim Fund for the promotion of aeronautics, hopes to

develop an "acoustic altimeter" which will measure height by the time it takes a sound to travel to the ground and echo back to the airplane.

One of the chief difficulties, DeLassus found, was the multiplicity of sounds aboard aircraft. He was faced with the necessity of finding a tone entirely different than any of those of aircraft.

This has been accomplished and now the task is to find the source of such a sound which will be of sufficient pitch and intensity to actuate the recording device.

An "acoustic altimeter" would be of inestimable value to aircraft because it would permit pilots caught in fogs over unfamiliar territory to know exactly how high they were.

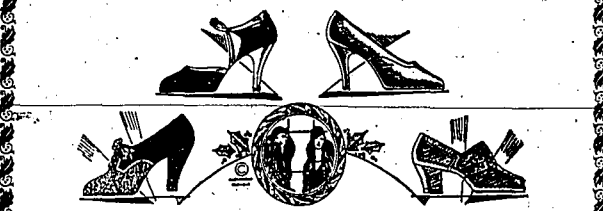

SPOUSE OF WEALTHY CHICAGOAN TESTIFIES

Mrs. Katherine McCormick Tells of Efforts to Aid Incompetent Rich Husband

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Dec. 12 (AP)—Mrs. Katherine McCormick related from the witness stand in superior court today her efforts over 23 years to bring her incompetent husband, Stanley McCormick, back to mental health, including denial to herself of even a view of him for 20 years of that period.

McCormick, son of the late Cyrus H. McCormick, Chicago horsecar magnate, was adjudged incompetent in 1906, and later placed in custody of a personal board of care, which at present is composed of Mrs. McCormick, Harold F. McCormick, a brother, Mrs. Anita McCormick Blaine, sister, and Cyrus H. McCormick, eldest son of the horsecar king. Cyrus, however, has not been guardian.

Mrs. McCormick charges in the present court proceedings that Harold McCormick and Mrs. Blaine as co-guardians, are disposing her husband's \$50,000,000 estate in the employment of Dr. Edward J. Kempf, New York, the invalid's \$120,000-per-year personal physician. She seeks the ousting of the co-guardians and the dismissal of Dr. Kempf, whose ministrations she contends are ineffectual.

The witness told of her husband's breakdown, soon after she herself had been graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and related that, at the suggestion of relatives, she had not attempted to see her husband again for 20 years, fearing that a visit would excite him unduly. She preceded the invalid and his physician, at that time Dr. Adolph Meyer, Chicago, to River Rock, the McCormick estate at Montecito in 1908, and prepared the estate for the patient's occupancy, but did not see him when he arrived. She testified she had visited Santa Barbara several times each year for 20 years, in order to give what aid she could in the fight against his mental illness. Each year she arranged Christmas decorations and gifts at the estate but always without McCormick's knowledge or her presence.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—Robert L. Kester, Jr., 43, vice president of the Claude R. Liggett corporation, was held a warrant for his arrest on a complaint filed by Charles V. Bob, financier, who charged that Kester, along with William T. 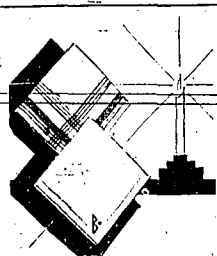

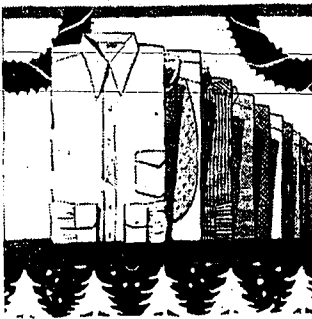

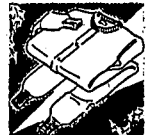

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—Industries engaged in making machinery took show the largest relative increase in payroll totals since 1926.
