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EARLY ADOPTION OF SENATE RESOLUTION ON TAX CUT LOOMS

Overwhelming Majority Lines Up for Proposal During Day in Upper House on \$160,000,000 Reduction

By FRANCIS M. STEPHENSON (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—The passage of the \$160,000,000 income tax reduction resolution by the senate tomorrow seemed in prospect as an overwhelming majority lined up on the proposal during the day.

Several times the senate seemed on the verge of agreeing to an hour for a vote after Senators McMaster, Howells, and Brookhart had withdrawn objections. Senator Jones, Washington, the assistant Republican leader, refused to bring a proposal to a vote at 4 P. M. tomorrow and the senate quit for the night.

The Republican Independents led by Senator Norris, Nebraska, and Borah, Idaho, looked upon the tax resolution as a bonus to those who had been involved in the stock market collapse and urged instead that the treasury surplus be applied to the reduction of the war debt.

Senator Simmons, North Carolina, the ranking Democrat on the finance committee, supported an amendment to start a line of Democrats and Republican regulars for the tax slash was apparent in the roll call. Senator Brookhart submitted an amendment to eliminate the proposed reduction in the corporation tax and to substitute for the present corporation tax a 10 per cent tax on the net income of consumers and the reduction of their taxes for next year would just amount to a bonus.

Senator McMaster announced that he would re-offer his defeated substitute as an amendment to the resolution. He said his scheme for a reduction in freight rates on agricultural products will do more to stimulate the purchasing power of the people as a whole than this resolution putting some money into the pockets of the rich.

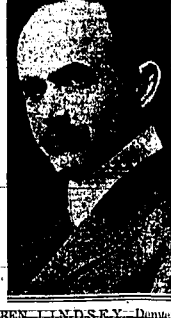
Two Gunmen Get \$1000 in Zion City Hold-Up

INFLUENZA VACCINE GOAL OF SCIENTISTS

"We Hope" to Prevent Disease by Means of Spraying Throat, Says Dr. Falk

CHICAGO, Dec. 13 (AP)—A stocky, quick moving young man with a determined set to a somewhat prominent chin sat modestly among test tubes today and said: "We hope."

"We hope" he repeated to a group of newspapermen, "in fact we have some success in our experiments that it may be possible to prevent influenza by means of a vaccine sprayed into the throat."

And the newspapermen hurried off to broadcast the "hope" to the world—a hope that got its first year ago when Dr. Leonard S. Falk and his associates succeeded in isolating the germ that causes influenza.

For one year Dr. Falk and his assistants, working in the most rickety building on the campus of the University of Chicago, plied evidence upon evidence, and not until last night did anyone on the outside learn that the germ, which has for only the laboratory label number 42X, was isolated.

The governor, while refusing to comment upon this demand, hurried from New York toward Albany. "When Commissioner Kiehl heard of the demand for his removal, he laughingly said he 'hoped they would be successful.'"

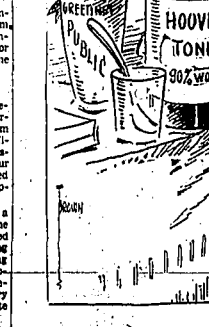

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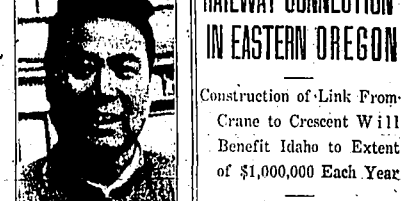

CASSIA COUNTY TURKEYS RECEIVE ACCREDITATION

BURLEY, Dec. 13 (Special to The News)—John T. Montgomery, extension specialist, together with County Agent W. W. Palmer, have visited 10 turkey flock owners in Cassia county where Montgomery has completed accrediting the flocks. There were 88 tons accredited and 156 hens. These birds were banded and listed, and some of them were scored. They were selected from flocks aggregating nearly 2000 individual turkeys. The accredited birds will be kept separate from all other turkeys, and will be used for breeding purposes. Flock owners agree with the extension service to keep the accredited birds by themselves during the breeding season, and they are under the supervision of the county agent. All flocks are of the bronze variety, except two flocks of Narragansett. There were four flocks accredited at Jackson, four at Malta, one at Nat. and one near Burley.

(Continued From Page One) walk several blocks along the bridge path of Polkman park after his taxi driver put him out at the wrong place. So he arrived late. But virtually the entire personnel of the navy department waited patiently and as he stepped into the corridors of the building the familiar "Hello, Al" was heard on every side, and "Al" responded with the equally familiar brown derby and his broadest smile. The crowd—mostly women—clothing about him, cheering, grasping at his hand and shouting, guests were necessary to force a way through to the secretary's office. As he left, the demonstration was renewed, and this time the former governor stepped to shake hands with many about him. "I am glad to see I have so many friends in the navy department," he told them.

Before leaving, however, he posed with Secretary Adams and Rear Admiral Moffett, chief of navy personnel, for pictures, joking most of the time. Smith said he merely wished to establish the contact with the navy, as they are the only people in the country who know about such matters, and engineers of his company—which is building the towering structure on the site of the old Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York—will go further into the question with the engineers of the navy to determine the feasibility of the plan.

The main crowd stood 30 feet above the 45-story building and would cost more than \$300,000. Smith estimated tentatively, but he said they were prepared to go through with the project both as a means of strengthening national defense and to encourage lighter-than-air development commercially, if the navy approved.

Texas Authorities Face Obstacles In Arrest of Calles

(Continued From Page One) allowed to take his case if such immunity were not extended to Calles. Valles' letter was in reply to a communication from the state department forwarded through Counsel Boyce advising the district attorney that Calles bore a Mexican diplomatic passport issued by the proper authorities and that the president of the United States recognized Calles' diplomatic status. The letter requested a statement of Valles' intentions in the matter.

Valles in his reply declared "information put conveyed is too vague and indefinite for a definite answer." After stating "no amount of evidence will convince me that my government would deliberately invest with diplomatic immunity a fugitive from justice for the foul purpose of enabling him to evade arrest and punishment," Valles closed his letter by saying: "I therefore advise you that if Calles should unfortunately be able to procure a certificate from the secretary of state under the great seal of that office, attesting diplomatic immunity, he will be allowed to proceed unmolested. Otherwise, the law will take its course as in ordinary cases."

General Alvaro Obregon, assassinated after he was elected to the presidency, also was charged by Valles in the conspiracy. Recently the Webb county grand jury returned indictments in connection with the case against Duke Carver, Bexar county, Texas, constable, and Allen Walker, former United States marshal. Carver is under bond, and Walker is reported to be in Mexico.

The bodies of the Mexican officials, handcuffed together, were found in the Rio Grande several days after they were alleged to have disappeared from a Laredo hotel.

WASHINGTON AND IDAHO PLAN MOTORING RULES

SPOKANE, Dec. 13 (AP)—As a step toward driving the irresponsible driver from the highways of Washington and Idaho and protecting responsible drivers from the motorists who has no funds to pay for damage in an automobile accident, the Inland Automobile association is sponsoring the adoption by the legislature of the two states, a law similar to the model American Automobile association safety responsibility law which has been passed by 11 states.

The safety responsibility law would require a driver who has had an accident in which a judgment has been given against him to pay the judgment within a specified time or his license would be revoked.

Jimmy McLarnin Knocks Goldstein Out in Second Round

19,000 Customers
Reel from Stadium
After Brief Battle

Three Times in Short Session Flaming Kid From Far West Smashes Idol of Jewish Race to Floor

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—Blue-eyed Jimmy McLarnin, that flaming kid from the West with the dynamite-laden hands and deceptively smiling baby face, crushed temperamental Ruby Goldstein, pride of the Jewish race, tonight with a two-round knockout that turned 19,000 of the faithful into a howling, raving mob of worshippers.

In a battle that lived up to all the promises of the fight, the first round was a tussle between two round-men for a nine count at the start of the second and finally for a toll that could have been a huge one if not for the fact that Ruby failed to carry on the hopeless struggle. It was as brilliant and fearful a punching exhibition as this battle scared arena has ever seen.

Night for Comeback
 Tonight was the night Goldstein had set for his great comeback, his final effort to prove to his countrymen that their faith in his speed, boxing ability and great punching power had not been misplaced. It was to be the trial of fire for the soft-mannered, handsome little chap with Jewish ties and a thick nose like a fact that a savior.

Having memorized the rejuvenated Ruby, his soft, smiling face, wearing the first round, showing straight lefts to Jimmy's jaw. Some Jimmy took, some the round men saw his opening, lashed in with a left hook to the head, and drove his right to Ruby's temple. The Jeweled fought back desperately, beginning to totter, but his other right to the jaw dropped him for a count of nine. Goldstein came up flapping but was taking a bad body beating at the bell.

With his zamezness about to be put to the final test Ruby did not fall. He dashed out for the second round, supported by the ministrations of his seconds.

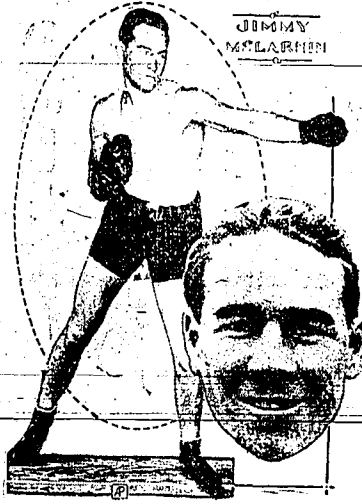
Stunning Right Fatal
 Jimmy cornered his man near the ropes in his own corner and the stunning right that finished Terry, Sam Baker, Phil McGraw and a half dozen other stars, flashed full on Goldstein's jaw. Ruby crumpled, fell through the ropes and hung there, his head in the press row and his body held up by the lower strand of the ring ropes.

Ruby reached up, caught the upper strand, and pulled himself to his feet. McLarnin was upon him like a wolf, tearing in with both hands at Ruby's sleek head, burning him after him upon the weaving, beaten boy's chin. IDAHO QUICKSILVER INDUSTRY EXPANDS

National Mercury Corporation Entry Indicates Interest in Valley County

The National corporation is reputed to own patents issued to Dr. Glaser for a chemical process of extracting mercury that is said to be more effective and more economical than mechanical processes heretofore generally employed.

The National Mercury Corporation was organized under the laws of the San Domingo Copper corporation in Delaware last April 17. The next month the name was changed to the National Mercury corporation. Its annual statement filed here yesterday showed 750,000 shares of stock, of which 500,000 have \$10 par value and 100,000 no par value.

Directors of the National Mercury Corporation are Benjamin C. Warnick Philadelphia; George W. Smith, Twin Falls; Lewis S. Durling, Bryn Athyn, Pennsylvania.

Mr. Smith has been identified with the Fern Quicksilver interests from their inception.

BANK AND TRUST PUTS IN AFTER-HOUR DEPOSITORY

In order to avert the "burglar's" hazard which merchants experience when compelled to leave their money overnight, Sundays and holidays, in unprotected safes, registers and tills, The Twin Falls Bank and Trust company has installed an after-hour depository which enables its customers to deposit their late cash receipts at any hour, day or night.

Upon the outside of the bank building is a bronze door. The customer unlocks this door and puts toward him the deposit receiver, or carrier, into which he drops a bag containing his deposit. The deposit receiver returns itself and automatically completes the deposit. The customer then closes and locks the door again. He can not remove his key until the door is locked.

The money is taken from the special combination depository safe in the morning and deposited in the regular vault. The after-hour depository is further protected with complete electrical protection which is connected to the burglar alarm system. It is impossible for any attack to be made against the after-hour depository without sounding an alarm because the depository is completely enveloped with electrical wiring, cables, and other protective devices.

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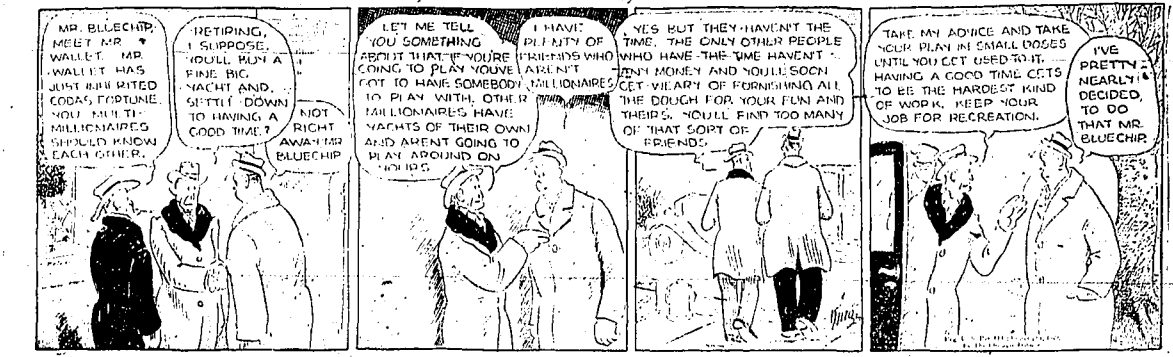

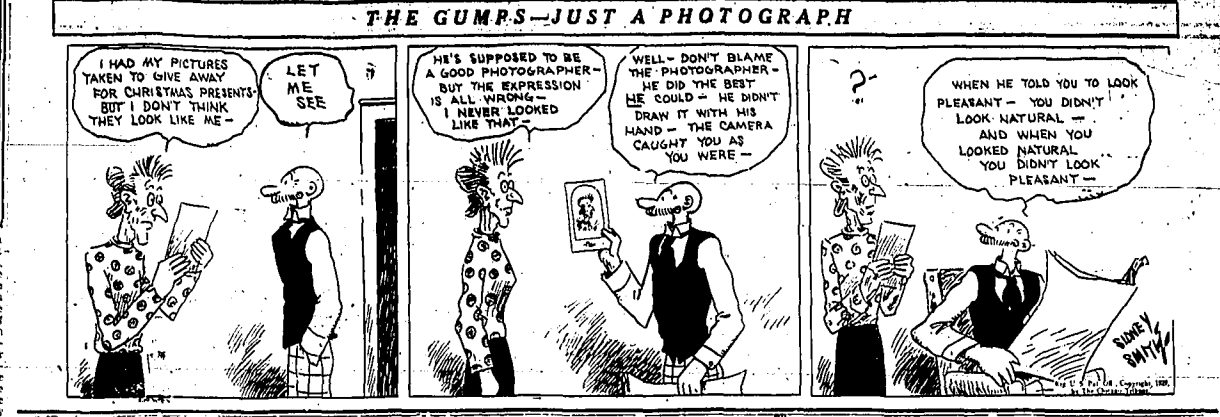

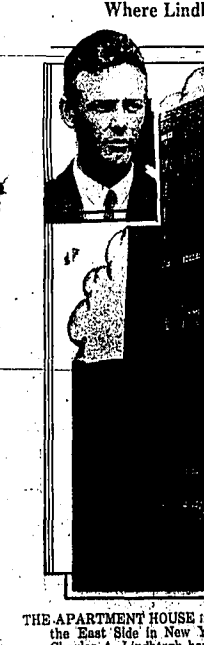

Going on record in favor of the idea embodied in the federal farm board law, nearly 200 wheat growers and other farmers from Twin Falls and three adjoining counties in session in the courthouse here yesterday afternoon appointed the following committee to arrange programs in rural communities for the discussion of the matter of affiliation with the North Pacific Rural association: Lake Shoshone, Buhl, for Twin Falls county: J. W. White, Edna, for Jerome county: Thomas Service, Murray, for Cassia county, and F. W. Howell, Hildahl, for Lincoln county. Coordinate county was not represented at the meeting, but the committee voted to ask H. E. Hargy, postoffice Jerome, to act for that county. It is expected to extend the work into Camas, Blaine and Minidoka counties.

The meeting was called to order by F. L. Atkins, Buhl, master of the Twin Falls Punaona Grange, who represents wheat growers of the Snake river valley on the Idaho Wheat Growers' committee. Speakers included E. J. Iddings, Moscow, dean of the agricultural school of the University of Idaho; G. F. Mix, Moscow, chairman of the Idaho Wheat Growers' committee; James R. Howard, Washington, director of organization of the federal farm board, and R. E. Stierlein, Jerome, president of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce.

Declares Purposes
Dean Iddings in his address outlined the purposes of the federal farm board as developed at a recent meeting in Chicago at which he with representatives of the agricultural colleges of all other states attended. The greatest purpose, he said, was to give America an organized agriculture, which would en-
