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SECRETARY STIMSON AND JAPANESE LOOK FOR LIMIT ON ARMS

Optimism Marks Conversations Between Oriental and American on Outcome of Conference at London

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Secretary Stimson and former Premier Kajiro Wakatsuki, Japan, exchanged optimistic hopes, for the success of the forthcoming London conference during a three-hour discussion today of the underlying problems of the United States and Japan involving sea armaments.

The conversations were initiated at the home of the secretary of state, a statement issued tonight at the state department said the meeting had been "frank and friendly."

The text of the state department statement, which was issued jointly to American and Japanese newspapers, follows:

Both Mr. Wakatsuki and Secretary Stimson expressed optimistic hope for the successful termination of the conference and the increase of good will between the two countries which is a solution of the national problems helps to maintain.

Former Premier Wakatsuki said before Secretary Stimson the Japanese case in connection with the government's proposed demand at the London party for a 10-to-17 ratio in auxiliary class.

overturned and smashed. The major aviator and released his companion. A short time later natives reached them and guided LaRee-Borges to the ruins of Santo Antonio Do Salto near the northeastern coast of Brazil. As soon as word of their plight was received by officials and officials hurried to the spot.

Santo Antonio is remote and inaccessible and it was some time before a coherent account of the landing was obtained. Lieutenant Challe was severely bruised.

Major LaRee-Borges, who went to Santo Antonio for aid after the fliers had been abandoned by a party of horsemen, said that he and his comrade had struggled against head winds most of the way across the South Atlantic.

They gave up their attempt to reach Montevideo after a flight of more than 30 hours from Seattle, which they left at 12:40 P. M. Sunday, and covering 3000 miles.

"For the first few hours of the flight the winds were favorable," Major LaRee-Borges explained. "But after passing Cape Verde in the Atlantic, we ran into head winds so unfavorable that about 4 o'clock in the afternoon we decided to seek the coast of the nearest land and head it."

Necessary to Change Course He said they found it necessary to change their course from Pernambuco, where they were planned to land, to make for the nearest point on the northeastern coast of Brazil. They were unsuccessful in finding their way because they were unable to get their position by wireless.

"Flying low to pick up the land, we could not see the lights of the coast as quickly as finally we decided to land. The wheels struck soft ground and the plane turned over on its unconscious.

"I recovered first and found Challe under the plane. I dragged him out and he soon recovered. He was not hurt, but he was badly bruised. Then I started to find help and the natives at Santo Antonio helped the authorities aided me generously.

Percentage of Freshmen Failures at University of Idaho Shows Increase

BOISE, Dec. 17.—A rising percentage of freshmen are "flunked out" of the University of Idaho each year, a compilation received today by W. D. Vincent, commissioner of education, revealed.

During 1925-26 and 1926-27 the percentage was constant at about 5 per cent. The following year, however, it topped up to 7 per cent and last year reached 8 per cent.

Those dropping out included students who were failed each semester as well as those who dropped out during the semester when they found themselves passing in too few subjects to enable them to re-register the following period.

The number of sophomores and juniors who were dropped ranged generally between 2 and 3 per cent and averaged 2 1/2 per cent last year.

With the seniors—those too near the brink to pull out—the number who were dropped held to 1 per cent or below. The number of students enrolled ranged fairly constant, at about 1850.

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BOISE, Dec. 17.—Broader educational requirements were laid down by the supreme court today for candidates for admission to the bar.

Most prominent was the requirement for an increasing amount of general college education prior to law school. At present the candidate must have the equivalent of a high school education.

After 1932 the candidate must have credit for one year of general college study and at least 1032 at two years. Correspondence school work will not be considered.

As for legal training, the rules required three years of study at the University of Idaho or a course of study in other ways equivalent.

For the law school course, a four-year attendance at night law school or four years of study under personal supervision of a practicing attorney can be substituted.

POULTRY OWNERS PLAN ANNUAL MEETING HERE

Tentative plans for holding the annual meeting of the Twin Falls, Canyon and Trust association, an organization of poultry raisers, to be held in the courthouse either in the district court room or law library on January 3, at 2 P. M. were discussed last evening at a meeting of the board of directors in the office of the board of county commissioners.

The purpose of the organization, which was formed here August 9, 1928, as stated in the constitution, is to protect its owners against theft of poultry kept on the premises. It is empowered to offer rewards to further its own purposes and the Twin Falls organization has a standing reward of \$150 for the arrest and conviction of anyone who has stolen poultry from any of its members. It provides for co-operating with officers in enforcing the law. Further, all members selling poultry not for immediate slaughter, to give the buyer a bill of sale and notify the secretary of the association of the number and kind sold.

The organization has now 45 members, which it is hoped to increase. It is planned to have a speaker furnished by the extension department of the University of Idaho, secured with the assistance of R. E. Brossard, county agricultural agent.

Clothing will be distributed without cost of the persons receiving the same, he stated.

Mr. Ware said that although conditions were in some cases serious, the situation as a whole was not as bad as last year. He had, he said, in connection with his work as commissioner, shifted a great many families out of the county during the year, who would have been objects of charity if they had remained. Mr. Ware said it would be the policy of the commissioners to make people who are receiving relief keep their homes as clean as possible.

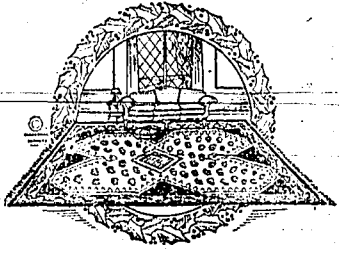

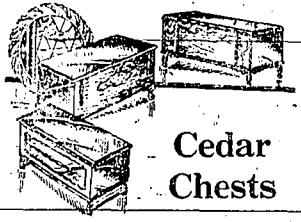

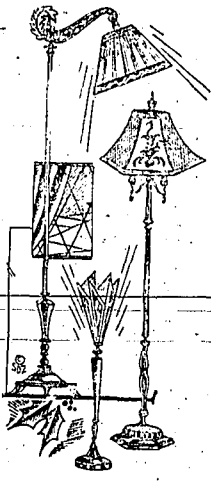

EXPERT'S TESTIMONY TRACES FORGERY TO ACCUSED GIRL'S PEN

C. S. Kingsley, Handwriting Specialist, States Conclusions of Study and Explains Investigation

A rural school district order for \$480 warrant was written by the same person who penned handwriting identified as that of Miss Viola Love, former clerk in the office of Twin Falls county superintendent of public instruction, Charles S. Kingsley, Boise, during cross-examination of the case of Miss Love on forgedy charge in district court here yesterday.

Mr. Kingsley's demonstration and explanation of ways and means by which he reached this conclusion occupied most of the second day of the trial. J. W. Taylor, of defense counsel had just started cross-examination of the case expert when court adjourned last evening.

George H. King, Denver, handwriting expert, will follow Mr. Kingsley on the matter to be after handwriting experts employed by the defense.

Two as yet unidentified men sitting inside the rail in the courtroom were reported to be after handwriting experts employed by the defense.

Inspects Exhibits
The accused young woman, with her father, mother and elder sister, during the recess in the afternoon, examined the handwriting expert's display of enlarged photographic specimens of penmanship arranged on a big case in front of the jury box.

More than 100 spectators filled all the available seats and many more were standing at times during the day. Opening cross-examination after Mr. Kingsley finished recounting the story of his study of handwriting involved in this action, Mr. Taylor demanded first whether the expert could determine by examination of the questioned document alone whether it had been written by a man or woman, and whether he could tell the sex of the writer.

Mr. Kingsley answered both questions in the negative.

Handwriting Characteristics
He defined individual characteristics in handwriting and said characteristics would appear in all normal handwriting. Attempt to simulate another person's handwriting, he said, involved struggle between effort to imitate the other's writing and to disguise his own.

He explained in detail resemblances and coincidences, as he went along, the explanation being commensurate with reason of necessity for frequent reference to respective exhibit numbers.

In the course of the explanation, Mr. Kingsley pointed out elements of resemblance that he had noted in the writing of the name M. P. Smith, which appears on the questioned document both in type and in cursive. He said Mr. Kingsley's conclusion that the name in both instances had been written by the same person, and that the writer was Miss Love.

Differences and Resemblances
He pointed out marked difference in the initial letters "S", and then went on to show similarity in the letters that followed—mith. He referred to

and circumvents, distance between letters and rise from the base of these factors, he said, indicating to his satisfaction that the same person had written the name in the several instances.

Testimony of the handwriting expert was introduced after Harry C. Parsons, county auditor, testified regarding the course of school district orders for warrants through the office of the county superintendent and county auditor to the county treasurer's office, and also identified a specimen of Miss Love's handwriting which, he said, he had seen her write.

Ed Muscott, former employe of a Twin Falls bank, testified that the asserted forged order had been received through his window, but he could not tell who had presented it for payment.

He gave it to his opinion that Miss Love had written the signatures alleged to have been forged.

MULTI-MILLIONAIRE OWES ACHIEVEMENT TO HUMBLE GOOBERS

Wooden Shack Gives Way to Two of Largest Plants of Kind in Southland

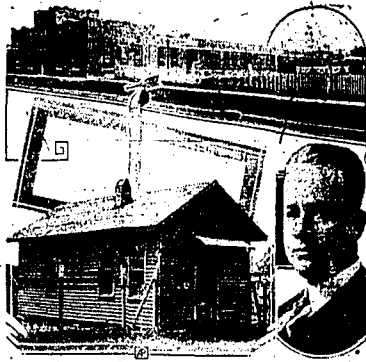
Many Machines in Use in Big Factory Product of Youthful Commercial Success

By PAUL SANDERS (AP Feature Service Writer)

COLUMBUS, Ga., Dec. 17—The humble goober, once the chief food of blacks in slave trading days, has made Tom Huston a millionaire in four years.

Starting with a pocketful of peanuts and a small wooden shack as a factory here in 1925, Huston now sells a \$2,500,000 worth of goobers and peanut confections a year.

The wooden shack has given way to two of the largest peanut confection factories in the

South. And the whole thing started because Huston, born on a farm near Trinity, Texas, felt it was time when peanut shucking tasks left his fingers blistered and raw.

He invented a peanut shelling device operated with a hand crank and resembling an old-fashioned ice cream freezer. This came to Columbus and arranged with a manufacturer to make power machines. But the shelling business

swayed as the field became saturated. Huston again turned to peanuts, bought a pocketful and loaded them himself in a small wooden shack. Then he roasted more and started selling them to retailers with the help of one salesman whose major activity was peddling paint.

Factory Burns. The business grew and he built a larger factory. It burned and he started over again. By 1927 the business was so big that Huston constructed one of the largest peanut factories in the South, and he added another plant this year.

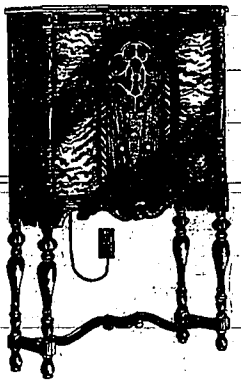

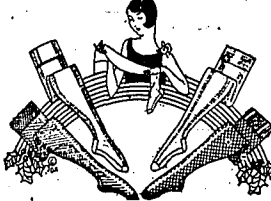

BARNES DISAPPROVES OF FEDERAL BOARD'S POLICY OF FARM AID

Commerce Chamber Board's President Expresses View While Testifying Before Senate Lobby Committee

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Opposition to the farm board policy in advancing to wheat cooperatives funds equivalent to the current value of the wheat was expressed today before the senate lobby committee by Julius H. Barnes, chairman of the board of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

He was questioned for two and one-half hours concerning a conference he and other grain men had with Alexander Lege, chairman of the farm board. Barnes who is also chairman of the business advisory committee formed after President Hoover's business conference and head of a \$3,000,000 grain exporting company, told the committee the price advanced to wheat growers by the board "will be found to stimulate such an acreage as to produce another burdensome surplus."

The witness testified that the grain men do not accept that it is fair to extend acreage to cooperative farmers and to the general run of farmers. "If that was open to all farmers," he said, "it would be in a different class, out to make it a premium to join a cooperative organization. I say that kind of thing in an organization will cause it to dissolve under any distress. That will not form a cooperative in this country. It will cause the wheat the first time stress starts."

NEWEST ARTIFICIAL SUGAR HIGH IN GRAPE PROPERTY

BERLIN, Dec. 17 (AP)—German medical circles are keenly interested in the recently invented synthetic sugar, Silegan, produced by a chemist of the great I. G. company. It is said to be a substitute for sugar in nutrition of diabetics. The synthetic product has a decided sweet taste and may be used for sweetening tea, coffee, soft drinks and various kinds of sweet table dishes. Its principal value, it is claimed, is that it contains virtually the same number of calories as grape sugar. Silegan is said not to increase the sugar content of the blood.

RUM LAW BREAKERS PRESENT DEFENSES

Attorneys for 28 Alleged Conspirators Attack Testimony of State Witness

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, Dec. 17 (AP)—Attorneys for 28 alleged rum conspirators today attacked the testimony of the state's first witness, but he stuck to his stand that the city of Millan sold protection-dollars and paid the money for civic improvements.

Mr. Needham, former chief of police of the little mining town, told how he was given a list of bootleggers and operators of disorderly houses, and gambler places by the "city fathers" and ordered to collect. The prices paid monthly for protection, he said, were as follows:

"Booze joints on the Main street, 225; disorderly houses, 225; inmates of such houses \$15 each, and gambling dives, 225."

The police chief was allowed to fix his own price for liquor and beer sold in the outskirts of the town, Needham said. With this money, United States District Attorney H. E. Ray said the city councilors of Millan paid their police force, paved the streets and performed other civic works.

Attorneys Attack Story
Attorneys for 28 defendants in the so-called "Millan rum ring conspiracy" attacked the story of Needham, making an admission that Needham was discharged from his position and sought revenge on the city councilmen, who were since indicted, and claiming that he encountered trouble while "collecting" because of his alleged friendship with inmates of disorderly houses. He admitted that he wanted to force the Millan councilmen to resign but denied other charges in the cross-examination.

Declaring that cities of the Coeur d'Alene mining district in northern Idaho were using a system "unique in the United States" by taxing bootleggers to swell their empty civic coffers, District Attorney Ray secured indictments for conspiracy against 27 individuals, including city officials of Wallace and Millan and Shoshone county officers.

"Twenty-eight persons are on trial, including most of the Millan city councilmen. The others are to face trial later. Many men and women were arrested for possession, sale, manufacture and transportation of liquor in North Idaho and many were convicted in the great rum crusade of the federal forces.

Millan city officials said they did charge business firms for licenses because their town was in desperate financial straits, but denied that they licensed vice. The district attorney reported that the mining cities were defying federal law and running the administration of the liquor statutes to suit themselves.

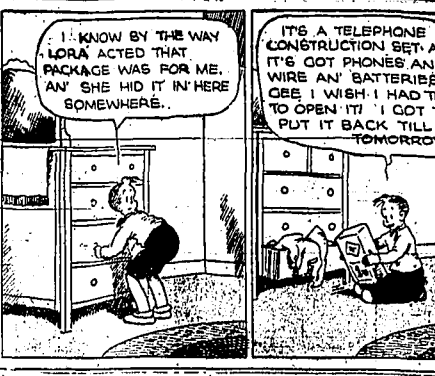

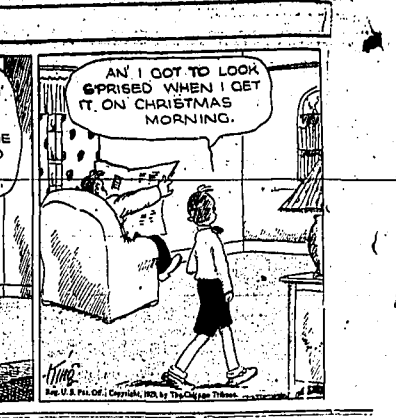
