ICY WINTER GRIPS WEST AND STORMS THREATEN SECTION

Layer of Ice Spans Columbia River to Point Below The Dalles and Snow Chokes Highways in Many Places

(By The Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—Winter gripped the West today while official weather forecasts promised storms for tomorrow. The temperature was distributed generously along the Pacific coast, highways only a few miles inland were choked with snow, and the Columbia river was frozen from bank to bank to a point below the Dalles.

Snow was falling in Salt Lake City and was expected tonight in Reno, Arizona, too, felt the cold, although telephone communication was established with Grand Canyon, where the Mexican president-elect, Pascual Ortiz Rubio, and his party were off from the world a number of hours by the noon train to Los Angeles.

Puddles in Los Angeles streets from over night, although rain today was fair. San Francisco continued to suffer although some fog replaced the clearer weather of yesterday. The sun shone in Portland, Oregon, but did little to melt the earlier snow, while the temperature in Seattle was 19 degrees above zero.

Two Men Lose Lives

Two men were frozen to death in Arizona over the week-end, and one in Washington state. Stealing accidents and traffic mishaps accounted for half a dozen other deaths.

Wire and railroad communication were in good shape today, considering the season. Motor traffic for the most part moved except in the mountain districts. The ridge route between Los Angeles and Bakersfield in California still was closed to pleasure motoring but many cars were permitted to pass.

Reno, Nevada reported all highways closed. California closed across the one to Redding by way of Eureka.

Perry service across the Columbia river was suspended by the ice, but those who wished to cross were able to go on foot.

49 Miners Minus Food

Forty miners were said to be without food at the Dunsmuir mine in Arizona. Rescue parties for all were organized in Prescott, Maricopa county, veteran parties for the Western Arizona Express was sought between Las Vegas, Nevada, and Salt Lake City. He was last seen at the night of the 13th.

2,000,000 Chinese Stare at Death As Famine Stalks Over Land With Winter

International Relief Agency Confronts Most Hopeless Situation Ever Faced in Northern Region Where Thousands of Persons Die Daily from Starvation and Exposure

(By The Associated Press) PEIPING, China, Jan. 13.—The China International Relief Agency is confronting the most hopeless situation it has ever faced in famine-ridden China in the northern province of Shensi, where thousands of persons are dying daily from famine and exposure.

The agency, which is a former Peiping newspaper editor, returning from a six-week inspection trip in the Wei river district, said today that 2,000,000 persons were doomed to die within a few months. He asserted that after investigating whether the famine relief could be of aid, he had absolutely no hope of saving them.

He estimated that 2,000,000 persons out of 6,000,000 in the province, which extends on both sides of the Wei river, died during the last eight months. Thousands were frozen to death during the recent cold wave, which the thermometer at 21 below, Shensi province suffered the coldest weather recorded in its history.

The people, accustomed to a minimum temperature of 15 above for more than 40 years, were caught unprepared.

Thousands begged for a piece of bread; for corpses, for anything I could give them," he said.

"I consulted the various local authorities, but no remedy was suggested because of transportation difficulties and dangers from bandits, the roads being the property of persons who have taken to robbery for food."

"Even if the China famine relief had plenty to pour into the area we could not reach it for months. The local authorities are helpless, and in many instances are themselves on the verge of starvation."

The famine sufferers, who were gradually weakening through fighting, lack of food and lack of shelter, said today that they had no hope of survival.

TERRIFIC GALES IN NORTH OREGON END 42 PERSONS' LIVES

Crew of 23 Sailors Aboard Naval Tug Goes to Watery Grave When Mountaintop Channel Seas Deal Blow

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Jan. 13.—A great gale raging over England last night and early today had been sweeping over northern Europe, causing the death of 42 persons in England, on the continent and at sea. This list of known dead is supplemented by a longer one of those suffering from injuries.

Twelve sailors were taken down with the naval tug St. Geney, which was blown into the sea by a gale, and 11 of the crew were killed.

Fourteen deaths occurred in the north of England, and 11 in the south. The deaths were caused by falling trees and masonry and similar accidents, though a youth was actually blown into the water and drowned while standing on a bridge.

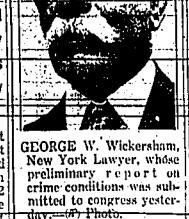
Telegraph and telephone services were disrupted in many districts, and the communication between London and some of the big provincial centers.

RULERS OF CHICAGO FIGHT OVER BUDGET

Board of Education Predicts Closing of Metropolitan Schools in Few Weeks

CHICAGO, Jan. 13 (AP)—Chicago's city council still was deadlocked tonight over its 1930 budget; 25,000 city employees still were waiting pay checks, and the president of the board of education was predicting the closing of metropolitan schools.

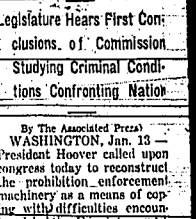

PRESIDENT HOOVER URGES CHANGES TO ENFORCE BUREAU LAW
