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Britain Cordially Greets America's Delegation To London Naval Conference

Colonel Stimson Remains in Consultation With British Prime Minister for Three Hours on Reaching Capital

By FRANK HAVLAND KING (Associated Press Staff Writer)

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Cordially welcomed to England at Plymouth at dawn today, Secretary of State Stimson hastened up to London by fast train with the American delegation to the naval disarmament conference here, made a brief stop at the Admiralty, Downing Street, official residence of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald.

For more than three hours Colonel Stimson remained in consultation with the British prime minister, but he was completely silent about the situation at home.

He declared that the talk was "pleasant" and not interrupted except by a nice cup of the prime minister's tea. He succeeded in getting information about it and successfully parried the efforts of journalists of all nations to find out what really passed over the tea cups between America's chief negotiator and the head of the British government. It was the longest pre-conference meeting yet held in London.

Early this morning Stimson still felt that the impression of being a tired man after the stormy journey of the last few days was not the best of his condition. He was, however, in the best of health and beginning work for the conference.

At noon tomorrow he will lead the American delegation to the Admiralty, where they will be met by the British delegation. Then they will go to the premier's country place in Middlesex, where they will make their final arrangements before leaving for the conference.

At the regular sessions of the conference yesterday, President R. B. Egan, chairman of the American delegation, announced that he had been elected to the position of president of the conference.

The board of directors named at the conference further considered the preliminary program at noon today, but failed to reach a decision.

PHYSICIAN PUSHES TUBE THROUGH VEIN TO HEART

PHILADELPHIA, Germany, Jan. 10.—Dr. Werner Forstmann believes he has found a method of saving precious moments for patients needing immediate introduction of stimulants into the heart and blood circulation.

He demonstrated it fearlessly by pushing a thin rubber hose ten feet long up his artery directly into his heart.

ON THE SIDELINES by BRIAN BELL

THE poor football coach who is reputed to get the money while the college professors do all the heavy work should have a word said in his defense. Not all head football coaches are overpaid. Some earn every penny they get. At least one college in a good conference lays down very exacting requirements for the head coach. In addition to coaching football, he acts as head coach in either basketball or baseball, this extra assignment interfering by the way with his duties as football coach for he would like to have spring football practice during the latter part of the basketball season and early stages of the baseball practice. Another responsibility is acting as general superintendent of the gymnasium and athletic fields, keeping an alert eye on the janitors and various grounds keepers. And then he has to do a good deal of teaching.

WHEN one coach reported at this college he was told that a part of his duties included teaching two gymnasium classes. "I am no gym man," he said. "How can I teach two gym classes?" They are both freshmen," he was told. "You can give them some setting up exercises and let them play indoor basketball, volleyball, etc." His teaching duties do not end in the gymnasium, however. He must actually invade the classroom proper with a couple of textbooks under his arm. After the football season closes and until the baseball year opens, he lectures on physical hygiene for one term and anatomy for another. A football coach should, of course, know something about hygiene but why he should necessarily be an expert on anatomy is not clear.

It seems quite possible that this football coach does as much as any member of the faculty at his institution. And in spite of his activity he seems in grave danger of losing his job. The professor at least has more than a 50-50 chance to spend his life in his family chair, fearful of the number of his students, pushing or failing in their studies. If he loses too many football games, many a coach finds a college president or faculty athletic director, flanked by two indignant alumni, handing him his hat.

A meeting of football coaches in New York the other year closed there were a dozen coaches looking for connections. There were less than half a dozen positions open and there were no indications that any of the colleges out of coaches for the moment were considering the jobless one waiting in a thoroughly receptive mood. All the coachless institutions seemed to want some one engaged somewhere else. It was another illustration of the saying: "Them that has, gets."
