16 PERSONS PERISH IN NATION'S WORST AVIATION DISASTER

Mass of Wreckage in Muddy

Bean Field 80 Miles From Los Angeles Battles Experts Attempting Solution

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20—

A pitiful, crumpled mass of wreckage in a muddy California bean field, 80 miles south of here, today marked the greatest disaster in American commercial air transportation. Sixteen persons—eight women and eight men, went to a quick death there last night when one of the modern air liners, a tri-motor all-metal monoplane of the Transcontinental and Pacific Airways line, crashed and burned. All on board were lost, the two pilots and 14 passengers.

It was a sacrifice to the storm, the annihilation of human life, in the opinion of officials in the preliminary stages of the investigation, a sudden squall from the sea proved the great monoplane down to earth and with it the destruction of the lives seeking to turn and scurry back to safety in the confusion of the storm.

Independent investigations are being carried on by the United States department of commerce, division of aeronautics, the coroner of San Diego county and the transport line. A formal inquest, merely to legally identify and release the bodies of the victims to relatives will be held tomorrow at Oceanside, near the scene of the crash.

It was dark shortly after 8 o'clock last night when the sky liner, the all-metal plane, was speeding from Aqua Caliente, Lower California, to Los Angeles, a run of some 125 miles. Over Oceanside, less than 10 miles from a low ceiling was encountered. Some 10 miles north, Pilot Russell found a "mild north wind" and a "rain squall." Then came the end while other planes behind him were scurrying to safety.

Passengers in the Western Air Express monoplane on the same run, which landed safely, witnessed the flames of the gasoline explosion, so did many men on the ground. The plane was seen to burst into flames and to fall in a bean field. The wreckage was seen by J. C. Markler, a local farmer, who was making a left hand turn, Russell, who apparently was at the controls, hooked a sharp turn to the right and reported Sunday showed a 1200-foot ceiling forecast when the plane was seen to burst into flames.

Spice Nut Cake and Filling
Cakes
Breaded Veal for 2-3 inch thick.
1 pound veal round, cut 2-3 inch thick.
1/2 teaspoon salt.

Wipe off steak, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Heat and brown on both sides. Add boiling water and lid and cook slowly 45 minutes.

4 tablespoons flour
1 cup water
2-3 cup dried mushrooms
1/2 teaspoon salt.

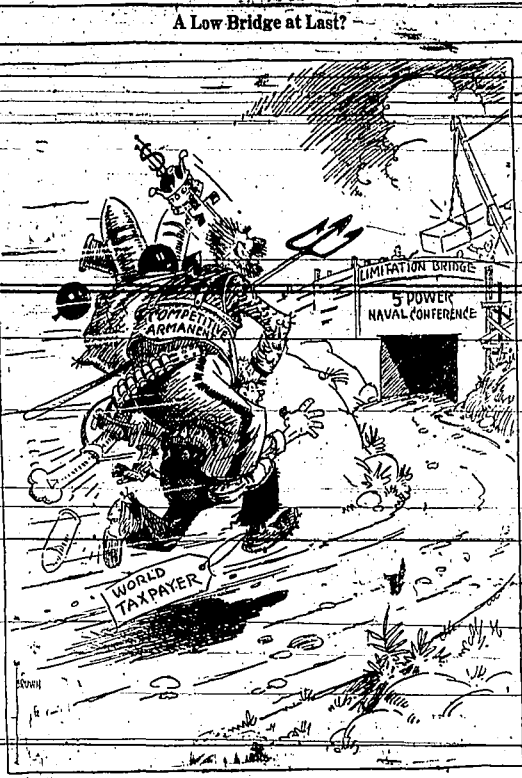
