NAVAL CONFERENCE PREPARES TO SOLVE DIFFICULT PUZZLES

**Delegates Plan to Attack
Problem of Allotment of
Tons And Guns to Each
Sea Power Participating**

LONDON, Feb. 3 — The Londoners today prepared themselves for tomorrow's attack on the crossword puzzle of naval disarmament — the alibi of tonnage guns-to each of the five nations participating.

As cross-word puzzle fans surround themselves with dictionaries and the naval delegates and experts have gathered their Dosiers, memoranda and bundles of statistics to carry to St James' palace and there start filling in the great white spaces of the tonnage plan.

A British spokesman announced that the British plan was intended to widen the scope of discussions to a spirit of conciliation and agreement. The French delegates, after being informed of its details, accepted the proposal as such. They expressed the opinion that general disarmament discussions would be advanced thereby.

The Americans will have no suggestions to make, but it is assumed that they have discussed the situation with the British and the French delegations are not far apart on questions of limiting tonnage. Great Britain, the United States and Japan embrace the theory of limiting

France and Italy favor limitation by total tonnage only.

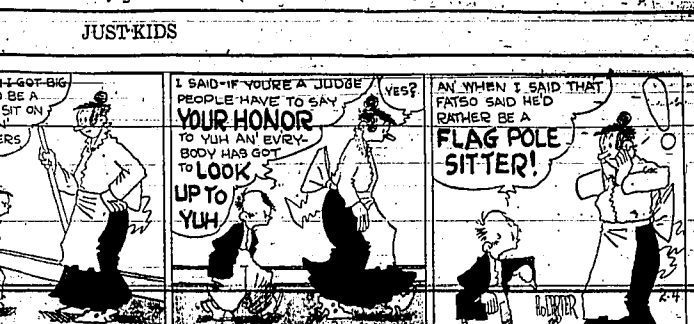
