TAFT HOLDS UPPER HAND IN STRUGGLE AGAINST DISEASES

Former Chief Magistrate of Nation Able to Receive Friend, President Hoover, and First Lady of Land

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5—Displaying recuperative powers which surprised even his doctors, William Howard Taft, who is dangerously ill at his home here, was able to receive today his friend, President Hoover, and his wife.

The chief executive and the broken man who once held the presidency and only a few days ago relinquished the office of chief justice of the United States, were together only a few minutes. There was a lingering handclasp as they parted.

Mr. Taft, for whose ultimate recovery physicians have little hope, was sitting up and cheerful when the president called. He motioned his hand and greeted him with a smile and an expression of gratification that he was feeling better.

The former president smiled and joyfully expressed the pleasure of the visit, the first the two had had since before Mr. Taft received a fatal blow last month for treatment and later left for Asheville, North Carolina, for three weeks rest.

President's Visit Brief

The president remained in the room for only a little while, exchanging a few words with the sick man. As he took his departure, he motioned his hand and greeted him with a smile and an expression of gratification that he was feeling better.

Accompanied only by Mrs. Hoover and secret service men, Mr. Hoover drove to the Taft home in Wyoming avenue late in the afternoon. He remained for about a quarter of an hour. The visit was at the invitation of Mrs. Taft, who had had the forenoon after the physicians had found their patient to be in better condition than they had hoped.

Mrs. Taft greeted the president and Mrs. Hoover and introduced them to the physicians, Dr. Francis R. Wood and Dr. George W. Wood, who had arrived earlier to prepare their patient for the coming of the chief executive.

The physicians and Mr. Taft's secretary accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Hoover to the sick room. Mr. Hoover then went to the study to write. The president met them there later and expressed to Mrs. Taft his hope that the former chief justice must constitute of some improvement.

It was the first time that the statement quoted Biggs as saying, "He was reminded on bail, and I was having three months' home-made affair and was said to have had the approximate explosion of a few pounds of dynamite. One story is that Biggs, interested in Journalism, had sought to attract attention to himself and thereby get a job on a London paper."

CHICAGO'S GUNMEN DEFY AUTHORITIES

Wierd Sympathy of Gangster Murderers Plays on With Deadly Staccato Notes

CHICAGO, Feb. 5 (AP)—The mad sympathy of gunmen killed today with staccato notes. One man was wounded, another died of yesterday's wounds. Scores for one week; seven dead, two hovering over the edge of death.

Explorer Gets Freedom If Attorney General Approves Recommendation of Board

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5 (AP)—Once again will Frederick A. Cook be a free man? The recommendation of the federal board of geographers, which he has released from prison on March 1, is approved by Attorney General Clegg.

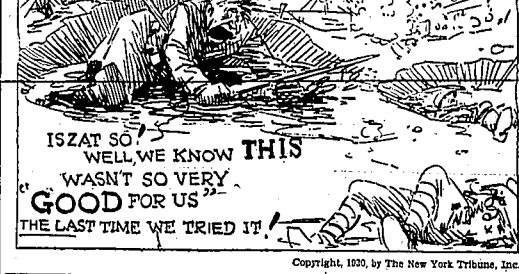

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 5—An unsuccessful attempt was made upon the life of Pascual Ortiz Rubio, new president of Mexico, today, only two hours after he had been sworn in as chief executive of the nation.

The president was wounded in the jaw by one of six bullfights fired by a youthful assailant who lay in wait for him at the honor guard of the national square. The president was rushed to his home and then to the Red Cross hospital for treatment.

Confessed Kidnapner of Two Children Draws Sentence To Washington Prison

ABOTIN, Wash., Feb. 5 (AP)—Arthur K. Howe, confessed kidnapner of two children, who enjoyed several months of freedom after a daring escape from jail, was sentenced to seven days in prison to serve from 10 to 15 years.

BUILDING BUSINESS MEN OPPOSE ROAD PLANS

Chamber of Commerce of West End City Expresses Opinions in Resolutions

DULLES, Feb. 5 (Special to The News)—A series of resolutions opposing Governor H. C. Baldwin's plan for a "needed" highway program was unanimously adopted at the regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce in the City hall here tonight.

The organization, went on record to oppose the calling of a special session of the legislature on a vote on the proposed plan; opposed authorization of the issuance of the \$1,000,000 tax anticipation notes, and disapproved the state's matching of federal funds.

The governor's plan, if carried, it was contended, would result in double taxation for many communities; would reduce revenue necessary to maintain roads in districts that have already been bonded to capacity; would encourage the building of a scenic highway at the expense of necessary farm district roads; would produce an inflation of credit, and would create an improbability of false prosperity.

Chamber members recommended that there be created a non-political state commission, to consist of not less than five men, to draw up a system of road improvement and to submit the present commission's plan, the state would be divided into districts, and one commissioner would be chosen from each division.

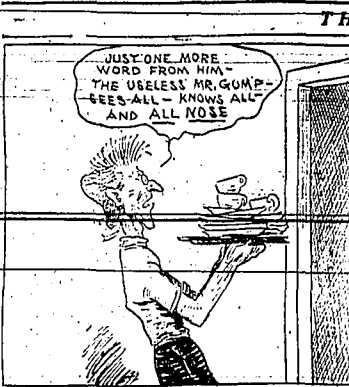

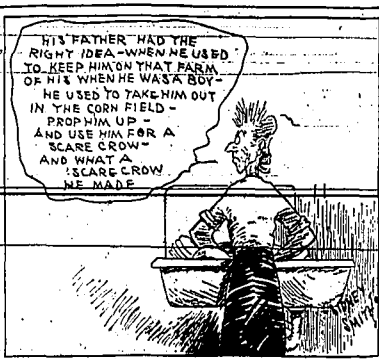
