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FIVE MEN PERISH IN GAS EXPLOSION OF ALCOHOL PLANT

Score of Men in Refining Establishment Receives Critical Injuries When Blast Starts Conflagration

(By The Associated Press) ELIZABETH, N. J., Feb. 10.—Five men were killed and 60 injured, more than a score critically, in a gas explosion late today at the Bayview refining plant of the Standard Oil company. Most of the injured were burned about the face and hands. Physicians feared some would lose their eyesight.

A brief statement by J. Raymond Carleton, general manager of the plant, said the blast was caused by the rupture of a "gas line." A number of the injured men were seen to be "blowing" steam from their faces as they escaped from the sheet of flame enveloped them.

Most of those injured were bricklayers, pipe fitters and carpenters, working on a building under construction about 100 feet from the alcohol plant.

One man said he turned at the sound of the explosion, to see "everybody alive" and "running or falling from the scaffolds." In addition to burns, several of the injured suffered broken bones.

Identically Dead Man Of the dead, only four men were identified.

These were: WILLIAM CASEY, DOMINICK BION, JOHN LUDWIG, WILLIAM DUFFY.

Every available ambulance from the city's three hospitals were called, about a mile beyond the outskirts of Elizabeth, when word of the accident arrived.

From the "hot" corridor to the Elizabeth general and St. Elizabeth's became an emergency ward. Within an hour, the doctors were being assisted by relatives of the dead and injured.

The explosion came about an hour before the men were to start working in the new building, which the men believed the gas "would be" in the air.

It had not reached a force full of glowing coils used for heating fuel, the plant manager said.

The plant from which the gas came, a one-story brick affair containing distilling apparatus, was situated by the blast and fire. Four tool sheds nearby were destroyed.

The destruction of the Standard Oil company extinguished the flames within half an hour after the explosion. While the work was carrying out the injured went.

One man who told of working 46 years in oil refineries said he had never seen anything like this.

"I don't know what happened and probably never will," he said, "but I believe it was a gas leak."

Only one man in the vicinity to escape unhurt.

And the injured who could speak, were agreed that three explosions came, in rapid succession. They knew the first explosion was the "big one," the sheets of flame seemed to be flying in all directions and at everybody.

ARKANSANS SAVE DOG FROM AWFUL DEATH BETWEEN TWO WALLS

(By The Associated Press) CLARENDON, Ark., Feb. 10.—A dog, a small, black, scruffy animal, was the pampered pet of a Clarendon widow after most of the town's population had been killed by a gas explosion.

Caught for three days in a narrow aperture between brick walls, the dog's back of distress was answered by the citizens' rescue.

Relief expeditions were organized. Ropes were commandeered from hardware stores. Chisel bones were snatched from butcher shops to feed the prisoner as the work of rescue went forward.

One group even made preparations to tunnel through one of the walls.

But at last a grapping committee, from a vantage point on a scaffold in the street, succeeded in dropping a rope over the weakened form below.

Breathless but with tail wagging, the dog was pulled up, the deafening cheers a reward for the town.

INVALID BURNS TO DEATH

(By The Associated Press) SMITHFIELD, Texas, Feb. 10.—Mrs. Lora B. Buckworth, 76-year-old invalid, was burned to death in a fire believed to have started from an explosion of an oil stove in her room.

Five buildings were destroyed by the flames and three men were killed, attempting to rescue the woman.

CRIMINALS RESUME WINDY CITY REIGN

Murder of Young Mother and Slaying of Chinaman Figure in 24-Hour Period

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—A young mother was murdered, a Chinaman was slain, two women were attacked and a youthful pool hall frequenter was probably fatally shot during the last 24 hours in Chicago, while police continued the roundup of lawbreakers in an effort to avenge criminals.

Discovery of the body of Mrs. Agnes Lavender, 35, on the north-west side, after an all-night search, was the first of a series of crimes against women and hoodlums in a lawless search for the slayer.

A lawless search for the slayer, Mrs. Lavender was found in a pool hall, the head and her body was left in a ravine near a lumber yard adjoining the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific railway tracks.

Her purse and other personal belongings were found a quarter of a mile distant in the forest preserve. A bill dated in Chicago was found in the pocket of the body.

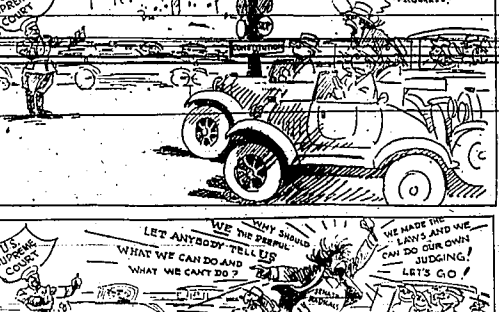
Early tonight two suspects were in custody. Both men were found in the vicinity who could give no explanation of their presence.

The two criminal attacks reported to police occurred last night. One was the slaying of a woman, the other a beating of a man.

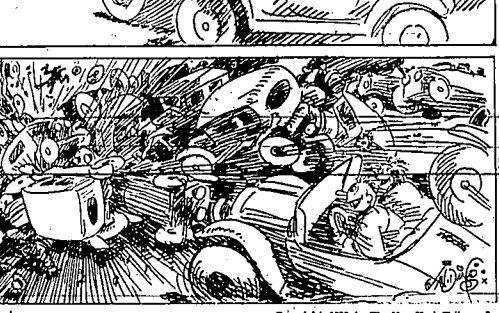
