

SENATE INCREASES TARIFFS OF DOZEN PRODUCTS OF FARM

Eastern Democrats Continue Protest in Favor of Con- sumer's Interest but Fail To Influence Decisions

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—The senate today went through the agricultural tariffs from cheese to chickens and boosted rates on more than a dozen farm products. Eastern Democrats continued to protest that the consumers' interest was being served but as yesterday they got nowhere.

Senators of various factions—Republican regulars, Republican progressives and Democrats—joined in the amendment offering and all succeeded with ease. Not a single increase was defeated and only one amendment swept away existing protection. The latter affected some minor products not produced in this country.

Among the commodities on which rates were raised were cheese and cheese substitutes, pigskins, dates in packages, dried beans, green peas, frozen halibut, sauerkraut and raw chile.

In addition, canned oysters, alligator pears and mangoes were transferred from the free to the dutiable list.

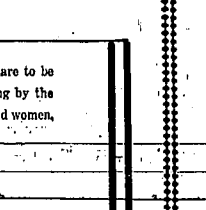

(Special to The News) OAKLEY, Feb. 19.—Playing in Oakley's big gymnasium, on a floor somewhat too slippery for fast basketball, Twin Falls tied one game and won the other. The girls' teams battled to their second tie in the season at the Oakleyites, 35 to 28.

The girls' game was close all the way, not more than 3 points separating the teams at any time, with the lead swinging from one team to the other. At the half Oakley had a 1-point advantage, 15 to 14, and the second half was a struggle on the one side to keep the advantage, and on the other to take it away. Senior was less frequent in the second half, partly due to closer defense and partly to the natural weariness from playing on an slippery footing. The play of the teams was so closely matched that the score fairly expressed the game.

When the boys played at Twin Falls the Bruins won, 25 to 17. Since then both teams have picked up their attack, and look to be going into the district tournament at full speed.

Association Seeks Light on Dempsey

Secretary of National Organization Calls for Decision From Ex-Champion

CINCINNATI, Feb. 19 (AP)—The National Boxing association, through John W. Driskill, secretary, today asked Leonard Sachs, manager of Jack Dempsey, to obtain a statement in writing from the former world's heavyweight boxing champion as to just where he stands in the fight picture.

Driskill said the National Boxing association would not recognize the winner of the Sharkey-Bout, as Dempsey, who has made an announcement that he will not fight, would not recognize a champion until at least one more fight after that.

In the meantime, Driskill said the association wants to know whether Dempsey intends to fight again, whether he is willing to fight again, or whether he is through. Driskill said association officials felt Dempsey and Max Schmeling, German contender, are entitled to consideration before a champion is decided and that even if Schmeling should fight and defeat the winner of the Sharkey-Bout, he would not be declared champion by the association if Dempsey was still in the picture.

Driskill said Sachs told him he believed Dempsey would furnish the association with a statement regarding his attitude on further competition.

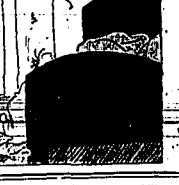
