Here Before Canals

Hayes in 1903 made the survey of Millner dam which diverts Snake river water to the Twin Falls canal system, and was for some time thereafter employed as engineer in construction of the canal system as survey of townships. ## BEAN ASSOCIATION PLANS PRICE RAISE

Directors Vote to Withdraw  
Sales Offers for Weak  
Tariff Increase Plea

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
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
