PROHIBITION'S FOES CONCLUDE CASE IN COMMITTEE INQUIRY

Chairman Graham Prepares For Seven-Day Presentation of Evidence by Supporters of Volstead Act

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 4.—A dozen anti-prohibitionists, including four women, occupied the seventh and last day of appeal before the house judiciary committee for removal of the Volstead amendment with accounts of a conspiracy, racketeering, "drinking days, drunken young girls and crowded courts" in arguing that the law has been a failure.

Chairman Graham of the committee, a Philadelphia lawyer, aged 80, testified today by denouncing prohibition as an inhumanity which had never been and would never be enforced. He stated that the amendment which he looked on as the opening of the heavens, evoked cheers from the seated committee room which were heard by the pounding of his gavel.

This ended the presentation of testimony by opponents attacking the 10-year-old amendment, on the first anniversary of the inauguration of President Hoover, of those who claimed a strict law enforcement plan. Tomorrow friends of the prohibition law will commence their defense of them, and they also will be allowed seven days.

Representative Lathrop, Democrat, Maryland, chief of the unindicted body, called today and reviewed the testimony of the previous witnesses who demanded repeal of the law. He said that the law had been a failure and that the amendment should be removed.

MERCHANT FINDS EAST SOUND BUT PESSIMISTIC

Returning yesterday after a two-month buying tour during which he visited St. Louis, Chicago, Philadelphia, New York, and South Manchester, Conn., Mr. J. H. Besch, president of the Idaho Dairy store, declared that he had a pessimistic outlook for the dairy business from the viewpoint of a purchaser, owing to the reaction resulting from the stock market crash and the fact that all other sales are possible to buy almost at the buyer's own price.

At the height of the condition in which he found the market, Mr. Besch said he not only bought goods for the spring and summer season, but made some exceptional purchases in fall goods, which will be stored until the autumn season.

The condition in the east is unusual, Mr. Besch said. "In speaking to a businessman you get the idea of a depression. The condition is personal-innerever. Most of them took severe personal losses and this is reflected in their talk even where their business is prosperous. As a whole, business appears to be based on pessimism. There is plenty of money in the country, and recovery is certain to come within a short time. However, I would rather be in Twin Falls than in any of the cities which I visited in the East."
