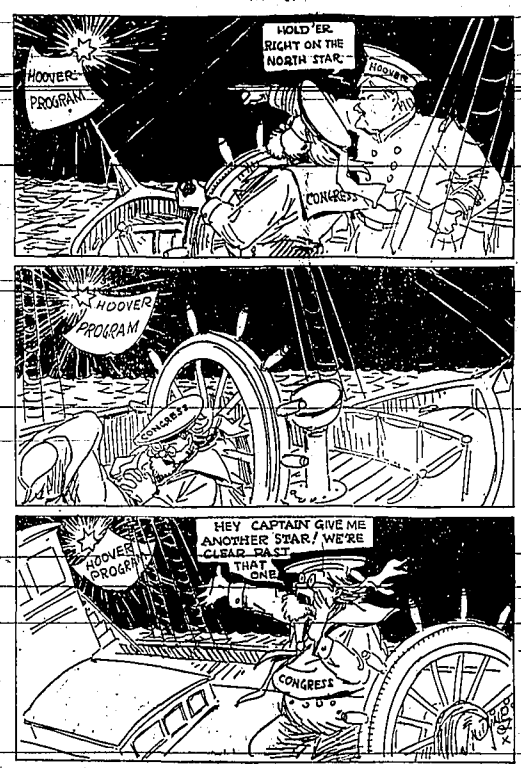

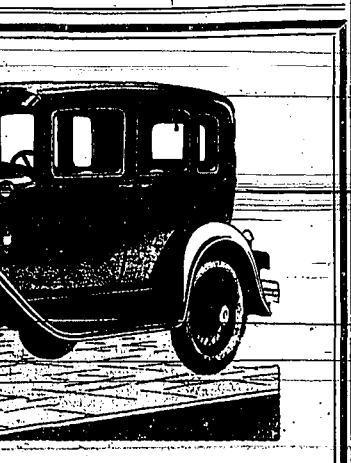

Suits For Recovery of Funds Follow Disclosure Of Shortages At Orde's

Three of Twin Falls county's rural district yesterday instituted suits in district court here against three Twin Falls banks for recovery of money advanced by the banks. These actions follow disclosures of shortages totaling \$10,583.07 in funds of out of 37 rural school districts in the county as a result of apparent forgeries of school district orders for warrants since February, 1928. Auditors who examined the records agreed that the apparent forgeries appeared to have been written by the same person, while Miss Viola Lowe, former clerk in the office of the county superintendent of public instruction, was found guilty at trial in district court here last December on a charge of forging one of the suspected orders.

In suit filed yesterday to recover money involved in these shortages, no reference is made to any forged orders. It is asserted simply that the banks illegally caused the county auditor to issue warrants and that the banks obtained the money illegally.

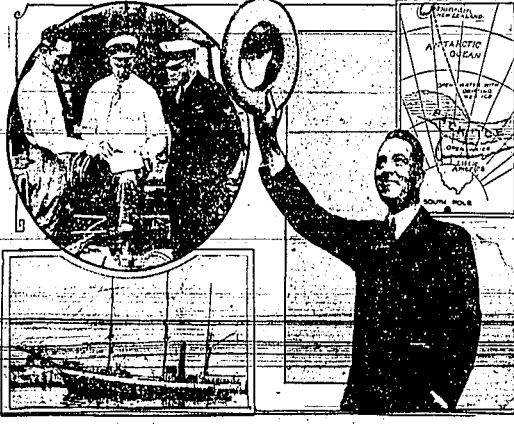
