served in most of the capitals of Europe today with parades of Communists and Jobless, many arrests were made and leaders in chains with the police but with very little display of impudence, except in Berlin.

Paris Thursday, March 6.—In Dublin there were some lively incidents as a large number of unemployed attempted to march on Leinster house where the daily sits. They were charged by the police who used their batons and arrested eight demonstrators.

There were demonstrations in Stockholm, Seattle, Antwerp, Copenhagen and Budapest and in Gloucester were reported although in some cases arrests were made.

TEAR BOMB DOES WORK
WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—The gas from a tiny tear bomb ended the heralded Communist demonstrations in front of the White House today after 150 had begun to fly.

Several demonstrators were arrested. Four of them and two policemen were slightly bruised in a fight which halting distance of the office where President Hoover was busy at work.

Some 3000 persons, many of them government workers away from their desks for lunch, were watching the Communists taking part in the international clearance of the employment day. The president had ordered that they be not disturbed unless they trespassed on federal property.

The demonstrators formed a small knot at the center of the crowd of Communist after Communist in parading back and forth. Many of them were negroes.

William Lawrence, Baltimore, a leader of the Communists, sought to address his followers from a vantage point in the front line of the parade which surrounded the White House. A patrolman and a detective forced him down and then the melee began.

Some of the police were hit and they returned with tear gas which immediately caused a dispersal of the demonstrators. Others were rendered by the gas.

FURY—OILIONS
NEW YORK, March 6 (AP)—Incited by fiery orators, several hundred Communist turned a peaceful unemployment demonstration into a riot in Union Square today when they attempted to storm through police lines in defiance of orders not to parade.

MORE THAN 4000 other persons attracted to the square through curiosity, became innocent victims of the police charges that followed and scores were injured in the rush. Almost a hundred persons, including three policemen, were taken to hospitals.

HEILIN POLICE ACTIVE
BERLIN, March 6 (AP)—Mounted policemen stamping heavy clubs rode down Communist demonstrators in International Unemployment day manifestations tonight, and cleared them from the streets. One Communist was killed. Police reported that seven civilians and seven policemen had been injured and 270 arrested.

COALITION MOVES TO GUARD AGAINST FURTHER DEFEATS

Democratic-Republican Independent Group, Undismayed by Vote on Sugar Tariff, Guards Triumph

By D. HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer)

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—Undismayed by their defeat on the sugar tariff, leaders of the Democratic-Republican Independent coalition braced themselves today in preparation for the effort to stave further possible aspects of victory already won on important items in the tariff bill.

Despite three further secondary overtures in votes during the day on the chemicals, oil, and a patent schedule, the coalition chiefs believed they had a majority again to prevent the voting of rates on cement, oil, and lumber, and to retain reductions in taxes on aluminum and pig iron.

Reports were heard of threats to seek a reconsideration of yesterday's vote whereby the tariff on sugar was increased, if the senate reversed itself and approved a tariff on cement, but there also were expressions that not enough votes to overturn the sugar decision were available. The senate recessed late today until tomorrow in respect to Representative James P. Clegg, Connecticut, who died today.

Face Test

The Republican Independents, four of whom left that group to vote for a higher sugar tariff, were regarding prospective votes on cement and other commodities as a test of whether any "trading agreements" on rates actually existed. On the other hand, Republican regulars cling to their stand that vote-juggling was being indulged in. Although some were inclined to be not any too anxious for further important reversals, the trading charges were renewed.

Of more than 100 requests for separate votes only seven had been taken up to late in the day, and the remainder embraced all the major commodities. This led leaders to express doubt of passage of the bill this week.

Of the six votes up to 4 o'clock, three were specific for the coalition. The present rates on litharge and lead pigments used in paint were restored, whereas the coalition had cut these respectively, from 2½ to 2½ cents a pound and from 2½ to 2½ cents.

Sodium, potassium, lithium, beryllium, and caesium, which previously were restored to the free list, were given a rate of 25 per cent.

Senator Copeland, Democrat, New York, attempted to give caesium a

other boat from 5½ to 8 cents a pound as against 2½ cents in the present law and the house bill but lost, 41 to 34. Caesium is made from skimmed milk and is used for coloring—especially in paint—country's chief competitor.

Spirited debate preceded this vote. Senator Hovers, Republican Independent, Nebraska, contended for the 8-cent rate as an aid to the dairy industry. Senator Vane, another Independent, from Wisconsin, argued 5½ cents was the difference in American and Argentine production costs and that a higher levy would benefit only the processor.

After lengthy debate, Senator Stetler, Republican, Oregon, won approval of an amendment to place on the free list sodium-oxide, zinc oxide, and 1½ cents a pound, this chemical is used to manufacture on farms and railroad rights of way.

Just before the recess, Senator Hayden, Democrat, Arizona, was defeated in an attempt to place a duty of 4½ a ton on sulphuric sodium sulphate.

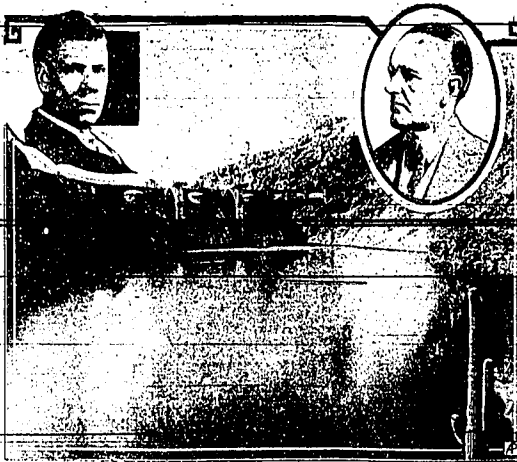

GLAIN WOMAN'S FUNDS IN BANKS OFFER CLEW

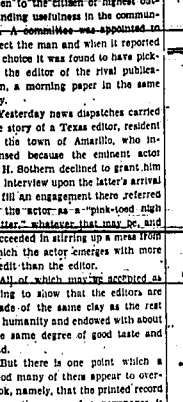

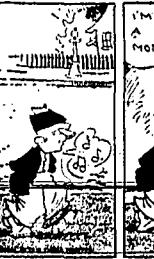

Roger W. Babson, Noted Bay State Statistician, Explains Need for Engineering on Personal Incomes

Business of Saving and Investing Fully as Important as Method of Earning and Requires Study Says Expert

(By ROGER W. BABSON) — high grade bonds. However, a man getting from \$1500 to \$5000 a year must not neglect the study of the business of saving and investing fully as important as the business of earning. Moreover, it is a specialized field and requires intensive study and constant effort. Many a successful business man has made an utter failure in his personal investments because he assumed that his knowledge in his own specialized field of business would enable him to handle his personal income without any study of the investment field. I believe colleges should offer courses in "income engineering" just as they do in electrical, mechanical and chemical engineering. These courses should be open to all students, graduates, but to practical business men, professional men and workers. By "income engineering" I mean the science of building up a plan which will eventually provide complete financial independence. The personal income can and should be placed on a business basis. One portion of it must be used toward building up an investment fund, and the handling of that fund should be in accordance with a definite working plan—a plan which will increase the principal and as the same time provide safety and a fair yield.

Budget First Step
A large portion of business and industry are run on a budget. Without a budget, partners in business or in marriage get along all right as long as there is plenty of cash in the bank. It is only when financial distress arises that troubles begin. There is only one way to avoid such a possibility, and that is to set up a budget plan. It is to set up the dollars where to go instead of asking them where they went. — The business man and worker should have a budget plan in his business. There is no reason why everyone should not adopt the same plan in handling their personal incomes. In fact it is even more important for the workman, the clerk, the dentist, the physician, the lawyer, the engineer, the salesman, the broker, the insurance agent, and others who render personal service. 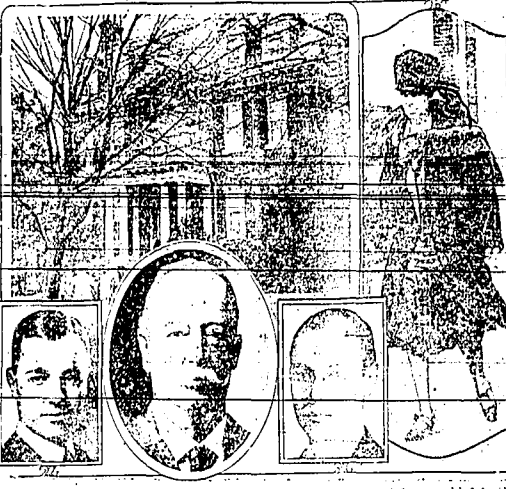

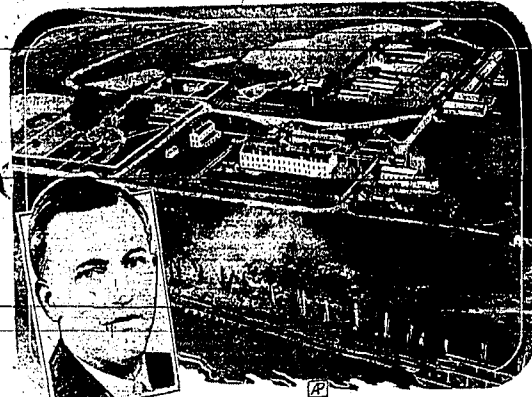

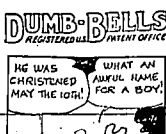

By BRIAN HILL (Associated Press Sports Writer, ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 6)—Boston Braves are not going anywhere in the National league race, but they would like to annoy the other clubs along the way.



Bill McKechnie, a canny Scotchman, who has won pennants for both Pittsburgh and St. Louis, is starting a four-year term as manager at Boston. McKechnie, calling himself a "pessimistic optimist," is keeping a stiff upper lip, but it may be that he is hoping for the best and fearing the worst.

McKechnie is starting his task of building up the Braves along original lines; he is not content with the positions his athletes think they play, if he is convinced they can hit, he will find a place for them somewhere. As a result of this experiment, outfielders may be found in the infield; infielders catching and throwing; and some of the team opens in April.

Walter Berger, a big outfielder from Los Angeles may find himself playing third base. He has shown that he can hit, and he has a great throwing arm, so "why not third base?" asks the Scot. Russell (Pop) Hollings was a third baseman in the National league with the Red Sox, but if Berger strong-arms his way into that position the Mobile, Alabama, boy will be moved over into second, with the Freddy Maguire did the work of a manager in the field last season but failed to cause opposing pitchers to hit as he has. 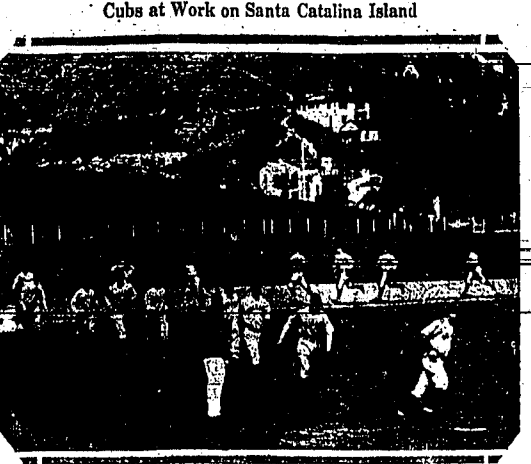

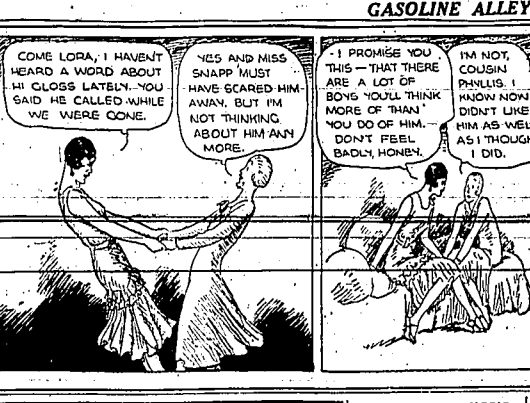
