Nicholson, Cherry Chase, Maryland, president of the National Women's Democratic Law Enforcement Association; and Miss Hilda Olson, Cambridge, Massachusetts, treasurer of the Woman's National Committee for Home Missions.

Witnesses not affiliated with Mrs. Peabody's organization were Mrs. Henry Marshall Kendrick, Washington, D. C., president of the National Council of Federated Church Women; Mrs. William Tilton, Cambridge, Massachusetts, legislative chairman of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers; and Mrs. Clara Ross Marshall Bush, Miami, Florida, president of the League of American Penwomen.

Representing the national advisory committee of the law enforcement agencies were former Mayor Bertha K. Landes, Seattle, and Mrs. Clarence Macy, Rochester, New York.

Twelve state officers of the committee added their testimony in person. Messages supporting the witnesses were read from Mrs. Henry Ford, Mrs. Thomas Edison, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, New York, and others.

Most of the women witnesses were middle aged and gray-haired. Mrs. Peabody opened the testimony with the declaration that "five to 12,000,000 women pledged to loyal service of this government" and advised that they would "use their ballots to secure loyal representatives" who will be questioned tomorrow.

Fishers Discuss Closing of River

Considerable discussion has been created over the fishing regulations of the state under the statute of 1929. Portions of the Snake river and tributaries in Idaho are closed to fishing until May 15 and other portions are closed until April 16. It appears from "The Fish and Game Laws of Idaho" issued by the state department of fish and game. Following the opening declaration "It shall be lawful to catch any kind of fish with hook and line at any time of the year, except as hereinafter provided," the statute continues: "It shall be unlawful to fish in Snake river or its tributaries above the American Falls dam, from January 1 to May 15, both dates inclusive." "In Snake river, from Maladocum down to the intersection of the west line of Blaine county, from January 1 to April 15, both dates inclusive." "It shall be unlawful to fish for either trout or bass in any of the streams or waters of the state during season of season, which differ with different localities."

Norton Wins Bout When Cortez Goes Blind in Contest

Mishap Gives Oregon Victory by Technical Knockout Over Boise Battler

On American Legion Card

Willard Norton, Eugene, Oregon, 151, defeated Joe Cortez, Boise, 150, with a technical knockout in the last round of a scheduled 10-round main event of an American Legion boxing card here last night, when Cortez stopped suddenly and turned about in his own corner and declared that something had happened to his eye and that he could not continue. The referee was called to the ring and plainly stated. Examination made by a physician an hour later showed that the injury was a rupture of the eye. Norton's opponent had been sneered on Norton's ear between rounds to stop bleeding.

Heatcher Lets Go

A mishap that might have had serious consequences occurred when a crowd of spectators of bleachers gave away, dropping more than 100 persons to the floor. Only three persons were injured, but one of them, injury severe. Mrs. Lawrence E. Slater, falling from the top row of seats, suffered from nervous shock, but showed no scratch on his left cheek, and R. M. Metcalf re-

ceived a bruise on the leg. The mishap occurred during the first preliminary bout. Spectators all over the crowd from kept their places and the bout continued without interruption. The crowd slowly filed out of the hall following announcement that Norton was the main bout of the evening, and many persons stood in their places while a debate continued over the main bout of the night. "There was no question about the victory when Norton and Cortez began their battle. Both adopted a cautious posture and sparred throughout the opening round. Norton (teasing the Mexican and dodging and blocking) found their mark on both sides. Cortez frequently mislaid with his right and connected with his left. In the second round, Norton, who had his left tied up in a clinch, landed an amazing right. Norton connected with a right to Joe's jaw early in the third round and seemed to slacken his pace. Norton came up with an attack to the body. Cortez threw away a whole arsenal of punches, but was driving Cortez back and driving Norton forward. Slagers Oregon Boy Cortez missed a wicked swing and left his elbow high in the air. He came, early in the fourth round, Cortez charged Norton to the ropes and landed two hard lefts. In the fifth round, another left to the jaw staggered the Oregon boy. Norton jogged a left to the body and Cortez "went" and slipped Norton, narrowly as the round ended. Norton took a stand in the center of the ring in the fifth and requested Cortez to circle about him. Cortez, lashed out with flashing lefts that frequently went home. Norton landed on the chin and body and was, snatched at the end of the period. Norton was definitely and decidedly the aggressor in the sixth round. He brought Joe up against the ropes with a smashing blow that sent him half way across the ring and Cortez was in apparent distress for a moment and quite reluctant to break away from clinches. Cortez was, however, but he was dangerous when he came up for the seventh round. He put over a hard left. Norton missed and was hit again. The pace was decidedly slower and it was apparent that both boys were tiring. Cortez resumed the lead in the eighth. He found Norton easier to hit, but Norton was blocking most of them. Norton shined one on the Mexican's face just before the going. Norton stepped out in the ninth to become the aggressor again. Cortez recoiled from a blow and slipped to his knee. 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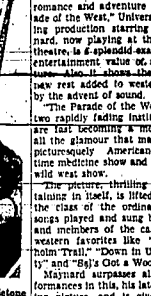

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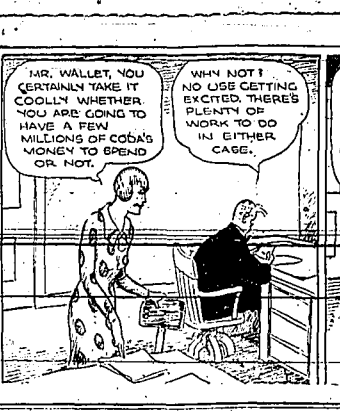

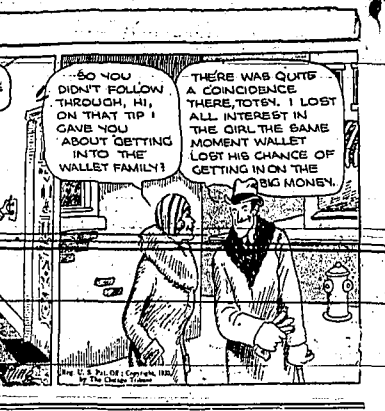
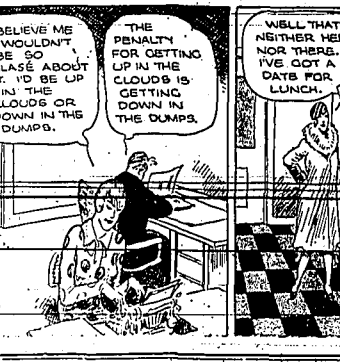

BROSSARD RESIGNS AFTER NINE YEARS AS COUNTY AGENT

Agricultural Leader Will Enter Upon Work in New Field With Long Record of Successful Effort—Here

B. E. Brossard, Twin Falls county agricultural agent for nine years past, has resigned to take up his office here next Saturday. It was announced last night.

The resignation was addressed to J. H. Rousden, Idaho county agent, last March 1. In R. Mr. Brossard referred to "the county agent" as "my dear Willie" in writing with "forward looking, intelligent farmers" of the county as "my friends." He stated that he was resigning with regret, but he said, "I feel that a new agent coming in here will have his better judgment as to the different things and personally and making a new success."

Announcement of the appointment of Mr. Brossard as successor here is expected shortly.

Mr. Brossard stated that he is considering several possibilities while deciding where he will be located in the future.

Letter to Leader

This letter conveys his resignation to the county agent leader as follows:

"I wish at this time to tender you my resignation as county agent of Twin Falls county to take effect, if agreeable to you, on Saturday, March 15."

"As you know, I began work in this county November 1, 1921, following several county agents whose tenure of office was temporary rather brief. Since that time I have enjoyed the work in the county very much and believe that some constructive advancement to the agricultural practice of the county has been made. This success has been due to cause to the large number of forward-looking intelligent farmers found on the street and their willingness to cooperate with me in the extent to those enterprises which are for their object the betterment of the farming industry as a whole. It has been a real pleasure to work with such men and wives. I regret, however, my connection with them, yet I feel it is a new line of work which cannot help but stimulate further interest along these lines, bringing with it new and different thoughts and personality and making new contacts.

"I have not as yet decided definitely just where I will be located but since there are several possibilities awaiting decision, I will make up my mind as soon as possible."
