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# Engineer Suggests Use of Worn-Out Cars to Confine Rivers

## WRECKS PROVE AID TO FLOOD PROBLEM WITHIN GEM STATE

### F. A. Tolman of Reclamation Department, Tells of Method of Preventing Change in Stream Channel

(By The Associated Press)  
BOISE, March 15.—A new use for worn out automobiles has been discovered—that of hemming rivers within their bounds.

They have already been used on the Snake river in small places near Rigby where the river threatened to cut away its bank into a prosperous farm, and there they were very successful.

F. A. Tolman, engineer for the department of reclamation, described the use of the wrecks. Tolman, who has been cooperating with county commissioners in setting the Snake river where it is threatening to break through into a new channel, said they were merely dumped down into the curve of the bend in the stream where the worst cutting was done. They were formed a rip-rap structure which quickly filled with silt and debris and the river farther back into its channel.

**Use for Old Wrecks**

Now Tolman said it had been suggested that a rip of these old wrecks be placed in the vicinity of Rigby, where the river is giving minor trouble, and used to rearrange the stream.

This matter of guiding the Snake river within its present channel has bothered the settlers along it for many years, and, according to Tolman, is likely to worry them for many more, in fact, until it has its way.

"It means that many years ago the great old cars were used to form a channel somewhat shorter than the present one in that section, instead of the 40 to 50 miles in a wide loop, it cut 35 miles straight across through what is now Lower Sloss and the Great Pacific canals. Years before scientists began tracing out its course, however, it changed into its present channel, which has at that time lower down in the valley.

**Change in Channel**

For many years it flowed generally along, carrying logs and timber in winter. Then several years ago during the period of high water, the old stream peeped over its bank and saw that its old route was not so short but now on a somewhat lower level.

With that in mind, some of the rivers, the Snake in particular, to change their minds about where they want to go, it headed cross-country for the first time.

## UTAHNS CONTINUE PROBE OF MURDER

**Authorities Complete List of Witnesses to Appear On Resumption of Inquest**

SALT LAKE CITY, March 15.—(By The Associated Press) With a view to establishing the route of the flight of the automobile used to crash the life out of Mrs. Dorothy Moore, Utah authorities today announced that they have completed their list of witnesses for re-sumption of the inquest into the murder of the woman.

Officers have summoned witnesses who are expected to testify that they saw the motor car stop near the other bank here shortly after the murder is supposed to have been committed, and a small man lock the doors of the machine and hurry away.

Nona Wilson and Sarah King, who reside in the vicinity where the car was found by police several hours after the murder, volunteered information that they saw a man leave the driver as small and dressed in a dark suit.

## INDIAN GIRL FACES YEARS IN PRISON

**Tears Stream Down Checks Of Accused Slayer's Fellow Tribesmen Near-End**

COLEVILLE, Wash., March 15.—(By The Associated Press) A young Indian girl, Hattie Mose, 23, and her white sweetheart, Clarence Hartley, 25, were doomed to prison today by a jury which found them guilty of murdering the girl's aged mother, Mrs. Susie Mose.

The conviction of second degree murder followed what Superior Judge Charles Leary described as one of the most remarkable trials he had ever seen.

"It was the girl's tribesmen who testified for her, and she was crowded to hear Prosecutor Thomas Oskahol characterise Mrs. Mose as a mother who died trying to reclaim her 'wayward daughter,' and educate her like a white woman.

The gaudy black, dark skin and nose of hundreds of Indians made a dramatic background for the startling exchange of charges that been with the trial. The girls admitted 'snatching her mother because she objected to Clarence.' Then she declared her sweetheart fired the fatal shot after playing her mother and herself with liquor.

## PROSECUTION RESTS IN DOHNEY'S TRIAL

**Defense For Man Accused Of Offering Bribe to Ex-Secretary Ready to Begin**

WASHINGTON, March 15.—(By The Associated Press) The prosecution of Edward L. Dohney on a charge that he bribed Albert P. Ball, former secretary of the interior, to award his company a lease to the Elk Hills naval oil field, was concluded today with testimony from a government witness that his company would have liked to secure such a lease but was not offered the opportunity. The defense will begin its case on Monday.

M. E. Lombard, Berkeley, California, testified that the Pacific Oil company with which he was connected in 1922, would have liked to secure the contract to construct a naval oil storage plant at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, if it contained a clause giving the company a lease to Elk Hills. The Pacific Oil company did not bid on the contract. Nothing was said in the specifications regarding the lease.

The government previously had introduced documents and testimony in about a dozen of the Pan-American company submitted two bids for the contract, one complying with the specifications in the call and another containing a clause which gave the defendant the government's preference to lease. This bid, which was not complying with the specifications, was accepted by the government and the best bidder.

Testimony and documents showing that the interior department had sought to curtail production of oil production in California in 1922 and that Dohney had submitted plans for increasing production through construction of oil refineries and pipe lines were introduced by Owen J. Roberts, special government prosecutor.

When the prosecution rested, Dohney moved to dismiss the indictment on the ground that the evidence did not uphold the charge. This was denied by Justice William Hill.

Frank R. Hogan, chief counsel for the defense, announced that he would open his case Monday with introducing of documents and the testimony of government witnesses and the testimony of officers to tell of the operations which led up to the execution of the Pearl Harbor contract.

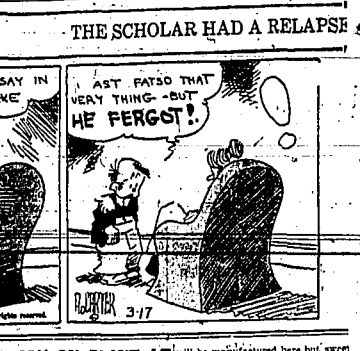

## Illinois Athlete Becomes World's Best High Hurdler

### Lee Sontman Lowers Best Time Ever Made in 75-Yard Event, Cutting One-Tenth Second From Previous Mark

(By The Associated Press) CHAMPAIGN, Ill., March 15.—Seven records including a world's mark were shattered tonight at 1000 athletes from 100 universities and colleges finished their competition in the University of Illinois thirteenth annual indoor relay carnival.

Lee Sontman, hurdler from Illinois, had the distinction of winning the world's record in the 75-yard high hurdles twice in one day. Sontman first developed into one of the greatest hurdlers the world has ever seen, cut one-tenth second from the record of 29 1/4 in winning his preliminary event. Then, coming back for the final, after Sontman shaved the record one-tenth second more in 29 1/4 in the semi-finals and repeated the performance in winning the final. Not content with winning the high hurdle event, Sontman returned to competition a few minutes later to capture the 75-yard high hurdles in 28 3/4.

### New Relay Records

New records for the carnival were established in the four-mile university relay, one-mile university relay, college medley relay, 75-yard high hurdles, 1000-meter run, 1000 yard run and the shuttle hurdles.

Judson Timm, Twin Falls, Idaho, grid star participated in relay events. Sontman shared honors with Barney Berlinger, University of Pennsylvania all-around star. Coming back to defend the championship he won in the all-around competition last year, Berlinger outclassed the field to win the event with 60.4% points, 1 1/4 short of his carnival record. Everett Utterback, University of Pittsburgh hero star, was a comparatively poor second—59.4% points. Berlinger won four of the seven events. He captured the pole vault, with a leap of 12 feet 10 1/2 inches, the shot put with a toss of 46 feet 8 inches, the high jump with a 5 1/2 inches and the 75-yard high hurdles in 28 3/4.

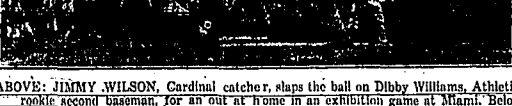
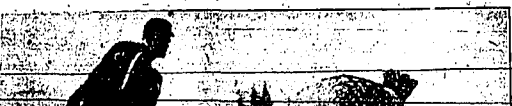

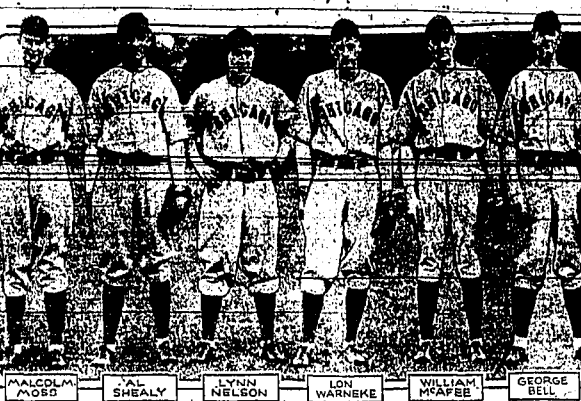

## Turnstile's Click Grows Fainter As Foul Chant Rises

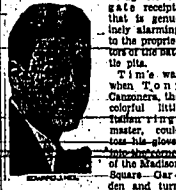
Inclination Increases Among Fight Fanatics to Get At Home by Radio and Rest Bad News by Way of Air

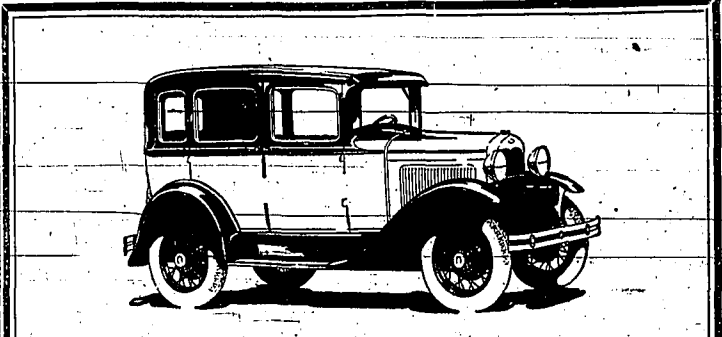

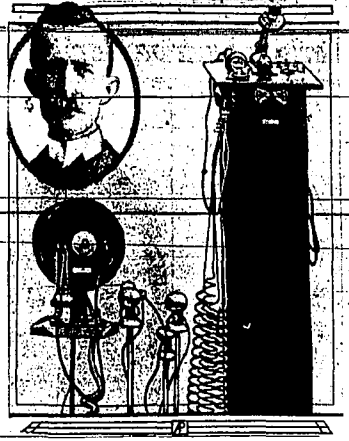
# Kentucky Town Plans Monument to Pioneer Radio Inventor

## MEMORIAL RISES TO FIRST MAN TO SEND VOICE THROUGH AIR

Residents of Murray Honor Eccentric Genius on Second Year After Death

MARKER TO STAND ON SITE OF OLD SCHOOL

Friends Think Speculators Reaped Financial Benefit of Valuable Discovery



(By The Associated Press)  
MURRAY, Ky., March 16.—Two years after he died—half starved and alone—a rural Kentuckian's radio pioneer is to be honored by his home town.

He was Nathan B. Stubblefield, who in 1902 demonstrated that the human voice could be transmitted without wires.

Stubblefield was the second anniversary of his death. The marker will stand on the site of a wireless school now in ruins, he founded in 1908. On the same grounds is a million dollar state teachers college.

Little School Training

The eccentric genius who reaped financial benefit from his discoveries conducted his early experiments in Murray, where he was born in 1869. His first public demonstration was in 1902, when he showed a thousand Murray residents that the human voice could be transmitted and received without wires.

Capitalists surrounded Stubblefield in Philadelphia and Washington for further demonstrations. Five years later he obtained a patent on a device whereby his wireless bulbs could be installed in automobiles.

Lost to Speculators

But he lost his invention to speculators who had Murray friends and, disappointed, came home to Murray where they had an economic. He had refused to permit his children to attend school and in his last year had buried a daughter who had died in the family home.

He separated from his wife and children and lived as a recluse in a small hut. Although disappointed, he refused all offers which he carried on experiments with wireless bulbs. Some writers have recognized Stubblefield as the "inventor of radio" and Murray has the ruins of his school in the town of the same name.

Several hundred New England investors have joined in establishing a wireless school at Bedford, Massachusetts.

PERLAKTOWE, England, March 15 (AP)—Great Britain soon will begin to establish a new airplane speed record.

## ACCURATE CENSUS ASSISTS IDAHOANS

MOSCOW, March 15 (Special to The News)—It is to the interest of every farmer to do his best in giving complete and accurate information in the 1929 census data.

Dr. Paul A. Eke, economist with the University of Idaho college of agriculture experiment station, says the results of the report should be a minor consideration in a whole-hearted cooperation with the census enumerators.

In this day of large-scale cooperative marketing under the direction of the federal farm board, and of the attempted stabilization of production and prices through agricultural outlook reports and stabilization corporations, the accurate information essential to success.

A beneficial public policy toward agriculture must rely upon facts, and these are furnished by the census. Continues Dr. Eke. The census will have important bearing on such matters as taxation and freight rates. Allocation of public funds for the control of diseases and pests, for general research, for water reclamation and law enforcement, and for general public services are dependent upon accurate information as to location and extent of the various agricultural enterprises.

Moreover, census data helps explain the present location of markets and the various price relations between the large central markets and foreign markets.

Civil and community welfare associations as well as farm organizations, are also dependent upon census data in inaugurating programs for local development.

And lastly, he relates, the information derived from the census will give the individual farmer as well as organized growers a chance to adjust their forces to meet the competitive struggle in which agriculture is engaged. It will show the competition of farmer with farmer, but in dealing with corporations selling or buying from the farmers, and also, in the great struggle of the agricultural industry, as a whole against other large national and world industries.

Some of the important new features of the census are: An enumeration of taxes paid by farmers, the movement of population to and from the farm, other occupations of the farm operator during the year, the amount of land to be planted for corn during the coming season of 1930, a more complete enumeration of forest products taken from the farm, the separation of crops grown on irrigated land from crops grown on non-irrigated land, and the location and enumeration of all irrigation projects serving even less than five farms.

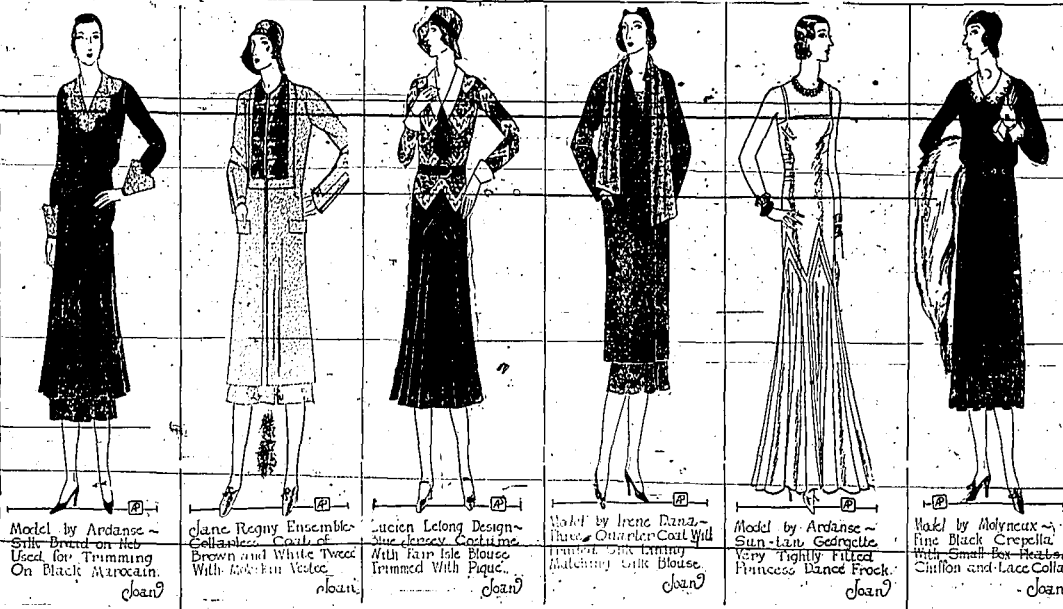

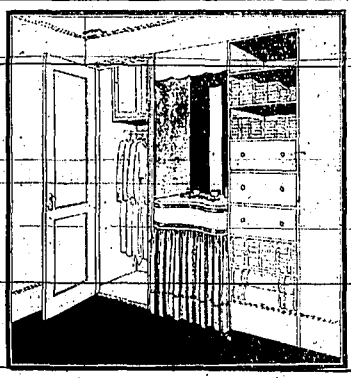

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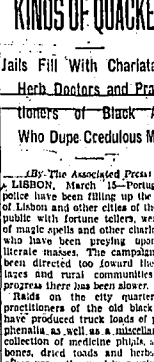

"The commercialization of root-feeders, which has been increased through truck trafficking, tends to disrupt the feeding arrangement of beet growers who are supporting the industry and following a consistent feeding program."

"It was the unanimous opinion of those present that the fullest advantage should be taken of the good beet year by increasing acreage planted to cash crops, eliminating to some extent, speculative possibilities."
