INQUEST INTO UTAH MURDER CASE ENDS

Coroner's Jury at Salt Lake City Returns Verdict But Makes no Recommendation

SALT LAKE CITY, March 17 (AP)—A verdict that Mrs. Dorothy Moore was killed February 21 "by means of a bomb" and that the persons with felonious intentions, was returned by a jury of three members at the conclusion of the inquest into the death here this evening. The jury made no recommendation and was dismissed.

The jury's verdict, recited that Mrs. Moore came to her death on February 21, 1929. She was killed by being struck over the head with a piece of iron and then run over by a car.

20 PERSONS DIE IN BLAZE IN STEAMER IN SOUTH AMERICA

Vessels in La Dorado Harbor Stand by Helplessly While Passengers Perish On Petroleum Laden Ship

(By The Associated Press) BOGOTA, Colombia, March 17.—More than a score of passengers and many of the crew of the river steamer Bucaaramanga lost their lives today when the boat's cargo of petroleum caught fire in dock at La Dorado, on the Magdalena river.

Only 10 of a passenger list thought to number more than 30 were rescued. Most of the crew, including Captain Alfonso Velez, perished.

The fire in the La Dorado harbor stood helplessly by, afraid to come to the rescue because of the explosive nature of the Bucaaramanga's cargo.

Everyone but the night watch and few of the crew were asleep when flames suddenly burst out from the boat. Trapped in their beds, men and women became panic stricken and scrambled to the deck.

BOOKS BARRIED BY CENSORSHIP DRAW 'SOLONS' ATTENTION

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 17.—Borah today drew attention to books barred from circulation in this country under censorship provisions of the Espionage law, the statute for almost six years today debated a proposal by Senator Reed Smoot, Republican, to amend the law, the provisions for excluding such books.

"The question they argued was whether the literature and other material articles should be 'stopped at the post' on the judgment of a customs inspector, or 'taken to the courts' by the light-house, whether importation of such books should be made a delinquent crime. Debaters on both sides expressed their views on the subject."

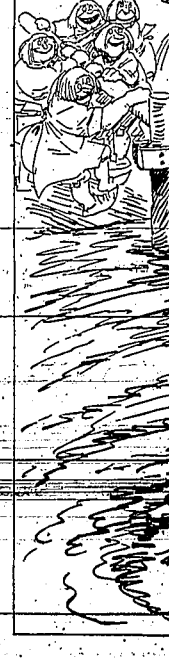

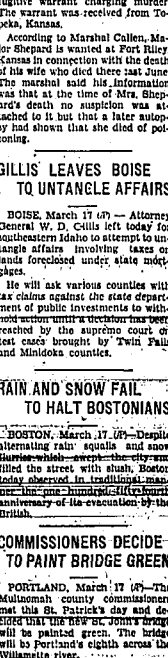
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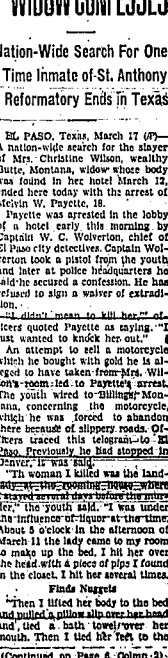
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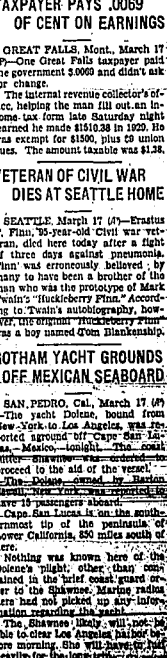
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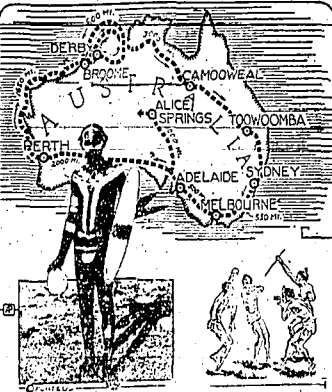
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Native Australians Cling To Belief In Death-Dealing Wish

HAWAIIAN EDUCATOR TELLS OF PECULIAR CUSTOMS OF TRIBES

Inhabitants of Interior of Island Continent East of Hawaii Spalls Over Enemies, Avers Dr. S. C. Porteus

It is one of the curious heresies of these people to say "that no one dies naturally, but that each death is brought about by a spell cast by an other person. . . . 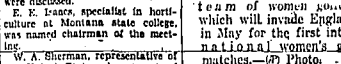

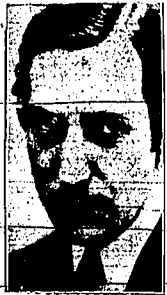

HANSEN MAN URGES ROTATION OF CROPS

President of Beet Growers Outlines Plan for Maintenance of Soil Fertility

Appeal for adoption of a policy of crop rotation with a view of maintaining soil fertility was issued yesterday by W. O. Sampson, Hansen, president of the Twin Falls County Beet Growers' association. Mr. Sampson urges adoption of a livestock feeding program to rebuild soil fertility. He declares that sugar beet crops in this county should be rotated with a crop of alfalfa which is very essential in maintaining soil fertility and the eradication of noxious weeds. Also, in connection with a livestock program there is no crop of more value than the sugar beet and its by-products.

"At this season of the year the soil is confronted with the perplexing problem of what crops, as well as the acreage of each, to be grown in 1930. The condition of the soil and the crop best adapted to such condition should be of a greater deciding factor than the market price for any crop. Because the market quotation on any crop changes so very decidedly between planting and harvest that it is rather poor policy to plant a crop because it is, or has been, high in price.

"Nevertheless, it is a very vexing problem to determine what crop to plant in a field after seven or eight successive years of beans or other cultivated crop, without the application of any form of fertilizer. The soil of such a field is overloaded with nitrogen and absolutely depleted of humus, a condition which should never exist on any well-organized farm.

"The farmers' problem should be one of maintaining soil fertility, rather than one of building a depleted soil. A well-balanced system of crop rotation, persistently carried out, will

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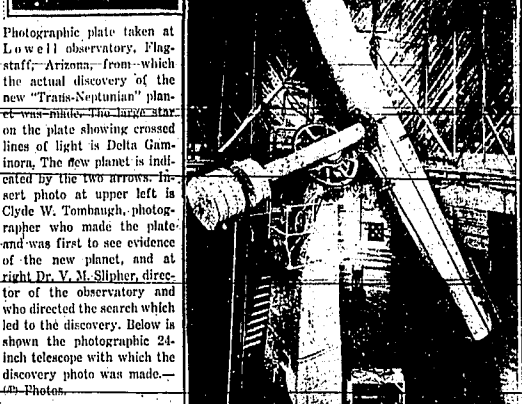

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GIPSON APPEALS TO OWNERS TO SPRAY

Inspector Suggests Trimming Before Application of Oil Emulsion or Lime-Sulphur

Appeal to owners of small families orchards and to owners of a spray tank or sprayer to spray promptly in order to eliminate destructive pests is made by E. V. Gipson, district horticultural inspector.

He suggests that owners are urged to trim out trees or brush to spray material may be used for the fruit and the grower may control several pests with one spray, if used judiciously.

For the leaf-roller egg masses, oil emulsion at the rate of a gallon to 100 or 150 gallons tank should be used and this spray will also kill scale and the eggs of aphid or spider mites which may be on the trees.

Where no leaf-roller is evident, the amount of emulsion may be cut down to 10 gallons to a 200 gallon tank.

Where scale is present either alone or with blight, many growers prefer to use lime-sulphur, either in the dry or liquid form, both of which may be obtained on the

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COUNCIL GETS NEW VIEW ON RULES FOR MILK INSPECTION

H. L. Walter, Former City Chemist, Offers Suggestions For Strengthening Of Proposed Regulations

Twin Falls city council in session last evening heard H. L. Walter, former city chemist, discuss and offer a number of suggestions for alteration of proposed regulations for regulation and inspection of Twin Falls milk sources and distribution agencies, and then postponed formal introduction of the measure with a view to further consideration of these recommendations.

The proposed regulations, lately drafted by E. M. Bowers, city attorney, and Dr. F. T. Harris, meat and dairy inspector, after extended investigation and study, already have been considered by the council since March 10, and expression of opinion by interested persons has been invited before launching the measure on the council agenda to its adoption as an ordinance. Mr. Walter's discussion last evening was his response to this invitation.

Mr. Walter, who has been actively interested in food inspection for about ten years, gave his endorsement to the bulk of the proposed resolution, which he declared to be an excellent piece of work. But, he declared, too much emphasis has been placed on the part to be played by the chemist and too little on the inspector's share in the work. He placed the value of chemical and bacteriological analysis at 10 and 15 per cent as against 85 per cent for physical examination of the premises, animals and utensils.

Bacteria Count Supplemental. The inspector, he said, is best qualified to determine whether the sediment in milk, and, he said, any sediment whatsoever, bacteria count in the laboratory, he said, should be regarded as supplementary to the inspector's examination of premises and animals. The bacteria count, he argued, would not disclose the presence of dangerous disease germs in a milk sample with false-negative results. He suggested raising the maximum permitted bacteria count.

He also said that provision be made for determining total solids other than butterfat, as a means of detecting adulteration of milk. Milk samples to be tested should be sealed in the presence of the milk vendor, he asserted.

CANAL BOARD CUTS LEVY ON SALMON ASSESSMENT OF 45 CENTS PER SHARE REDUCTION OF 15 CENTS UNDER LAST YEAR

Salmon River Canal company directors, in session at Holliester last evening, adopted a budget for the coming year and levied an assessment of 45 cents a share, which is a reduction of 15 cents under last year's 60-cent assessment. A dividend is expected to yield \$27,000 revenue this year. The assessment is payable April 1.

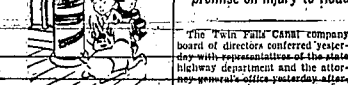
The company's financial statement at the close of last year showed a surplus of \$27,000 with \$13,257 surplus and no indebtedness. Last year's expenditures totaled \$245 for general maintenance and \$460 for main canal improvements.

Storage Level Rising. Directors at last evening's meeting received a report at 10 o'clock of a rising water level at the reservoir Monday morning, indicating a greater storage than on the corresponding date last year, and with favorable outlook for this season's runoff that is just beginning.

The canal company is now making a domestic water run to fill cisterns. It is the first run of water through the canal system since late last fall.

HIGHWAY CONDITION BEFORE CONFERENCE

Twin Falls Canal Board And State Officials Seek Compromise On Injury To Road



The Twin Falls Canal company board of directors conferred yesterday with representatives of the state highway department and the state representative's office yesterday afternoon here in regard to responsibility for damage to the paved state highway in the Filer neighborhood, which the state claims to be due to illegal driving of a canal company dredger over it for a distance of 10,000 feet last fall.

The state originally claimed damage in the aggregate sum of \$10,000 but it is stated that this sum has been reduced, though no exact figure is named. The canal company yesterday involved a possible compromise. The amount of highway said to have been actually damaged is placed at 200 feet at different points along the line of 10,000 feet over which it is said the dredger traveled.

In defining the position of the board, its attorney, James H. Botwin, said yesterday that in order to endeavor to reach an understanding without litigation, the claim of the state that the canal company was responsible had not been denied at the meeting, but that it had not been specifically admitted.

The board decided to investigate the situation more fully within the next week or 10 days and continue to negotiate with the state highway department in hope of adjusting matters satisfactorily.

In representing the state at the meeting here yesterday were P. E. O'Leary, state maintenance engineer; C. P. Humphreys, Boise, state paving and culing engineer; A. N. Ashline, Shoshone, district engineer, and P. A. Boreck, Boise, assistant attorney general.

IMPRESSIVE TRIBUTE AT RITES FOR FILER WOMAN

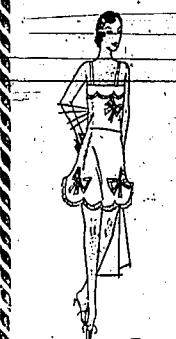

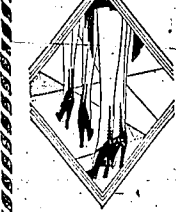
